



Dear Councilors,

The Committee on Environmental Justice, Resiliency and Parks was referred the following docket:

Docket #0822, Message and order for the confirmation of the appointment of Matt O'Malley, as a member of the Building Emissions Reduction and Disclosure (BERDO) Review Board for a term expiring April 24, 2026.

This matter was sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu and referred to the Committee on April 12, 2023. The Committee held a hearing on June 16, 2023.

#### **SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION:**

Docket #0822, is a message and order for the appointment of Matt O'Malley to the BERDO Review Board. Pursuant to Section 7-2.2(s) of the City of Boston Municipal Code these appointments are subject to Boston City Council Approval. The above docket calls for the following appointment:

1. **Matt O'Malley,** Chief Sustainability Officer, Vicinity Energy

#### INFORMATION GATHERED AT THE HEARING:

The Committee held a hearing on Friday, June 16, 2023. The Chair was joined by: Councilor Michael Flaherty, At-Large, Council President Ed Flynn, District 2; Councilor Liz Breadon, District 9 and Councilor Gabriela Coletta, District 1.

During this hearing, the appointee, former City Councilor Matt O'Malley, had the opportunity to give a brief presentation about himself, his qualifications, and his goals for serving on the Board.

O'Malley discussed his 11 years of experience as the District 6 City Councilor and Chair of the Committee on Environment and his more recent experience in the private sector with Vicinity Energy. O'Malley reviewed his experience on the Council working with multiple Administrations on BERDO and BERDO 2.0. In his current position at Vicinity Energy, North America's largest district energy system, leading in best-in-class technology, O'Malley oversees decarbonization efforts. O'Malley acknowledged the importance of working with the community and engaging all stakeholders to ensure an equitable, just, quick and effective transition as Boston works to reduce building emissions. O'Malley looks forward to implementing innovative, strong solutions and using his expertise and unique perspective as someone going from the public to the private

sector. O'Malley expressed excitement at the opportunity to serve on the advisory board and confirmed that he would recuse himself from any projects associated with his current employer, Vicinity Energy.

#### AN ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS PUBLIC SAFETY AND QUALITY OF LIFE ISSUES FOR OUR RESIDENTS IN PUBLIC HOUSING

- WHEREAS, The Boston Housing Authority ("BHA") is the agency statutorily responsible under Massachusetts law "for providing for families unable to afford housing without public subsidies" and "to carry out these responsibilities, BHA develops and manages housing projects and leases housing when necessary." BHA provides public housing and other affordable housing options to thousands of our most vulnerable residents in the City of Boston; and
- WHEREAS, The BHA's Administration and Operations Departments are "responsible for day to day management and maintenance of all the BHA housing developments," including Living Unit Inspections (LUI), annual HUD inspections, resident relations, and lease information. Having a clear understanding of the frequency and impact of these inspections to housing developments, and individual units, will be helpful to advocate on behalf of the residents; and,
- WHEREAS, The BHA's Department of Police and Public Safety is responsible to "preserve public peace and order, and to protect life and property" in BHA properties. The overall quality of life of our public housing residents, advocating for their safety, and helping lift up their voices is of the utmost importance to us; and,
- WHEREAS, It is imperative that there are reviews on the BHA's procedures and protocols to maintaining accurate lists of tenants and the dependent children in their care, that there are inspection, enforcement policies, and mechanisms relative to ensuring that all leaseholders are in compliance with BHA lease policies and guidelines, and that all children in BHA housing are officially and accounted for and safe. AND NOW THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED, That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to assess the Department's response procedures and protocols relating to public safety in BHA units, particularly the safety of children in BHA housing. Representatives from the Mayor's office, Boston Housing Authority Administrator Kenzie Bok, Chief of Emergency Management and Chief of Police for the Boston Housing Authority Shumeane L. Benford, and other interested parties shall be invited to attend. In addition, members of the public are encouraged to attend.

AN ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS THE PUBLIC SAFETY CONCERNS SURROUNDING A 32 YEAR OLD WOMAN ENROLLED IN BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

- **WHEREAS,** The Boston Public Schools allowed a 32 year old woman to enroll in three different schools, under three different names. This woman was a student at Burke High School since October of 2022 and enrolled at English High and Brighton High near the end of the school year; **and**
- WHEREAS, There are concerns around what documentation the adults, who posed as her foster parents, were allowed to use to register the woman for school. This is a case of extreme fraud, and the School Department will investigate where the breakdown in their system was that allowed an adult to enroll in Boston Public Schools without proper documentation; and,
- WHEREAS, The police report showed that this case was first assigned to the Human Trafficking Unit of the Boston Police and may have been moved to the Crimes Against Children Unit as more information has been uncovered. The Internal Boston Police Report, information from the Department of Children and Families (DCF), and any other information, will help us piece together the many questions surrounding this incident; and
- WHEREAS, This hearing calls for a full investigation by the appropriate authorities into whether any Boston Public School students have been harmed in any way; whether other adults aided the woman's fraudulent enrollment at three high schools and what their involvement entailed; and what was the intent of this woman and the adults who posed as her foster parents; AND NOW THEREFORE BE IT
- **ORDERED,** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to address these concerns. Representatives from the Mayor's office, Boston Public Schools, Boston Police and other interested parties shall be invited to attend. In addition, members of the public are encouraged to attend.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF IN-STATE TUITION FOR UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS IN MASSACHUSETTS

- **WHEREAS,** Education is a fundamental right that should be accessible to all residents, regardless of their immigration status, as it plays a crucial role in promoting social mobility, economic development, and the overall well-being of our communities; *and*
- WHEREAS, Undocumented immigrants residing in Massachusetts often face significant financial barriers to accessing higher education due to their immigration status, as students with DACA or Temporary Protected Status qualify for in-state tuition, but undocumented students do not no matter how long they have lived here and they all are ineligible for federal or state financial aid; and
- *WHEREAS*, In-state tuition can provide an affordable pathway to higher education for eligible residents, thereby fostering educational equity and increasing access to opportunities for all individuals in the state; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** At least 20 states across the country have laws or policies enabling students to enroll in in-state tuition at public colleges and universities, regardless of immigration status, and many also offer state financial aid, recognizing the importance of providing equitable access to education; *and*
- WHEREAS, Extending in-state tuition eligibility to undocumented immigrants would not only benefit the individual students but would also have positive economic impacts by creating a more educated and skilled workforce, contributing to the overall growth and prosperity of the state; and
- *WHEREAS*, As of June 23, 2023, the proposed Massachusetts budget would make all students eligible for in-state tuition, regardless of immigration status, as long as they attend a Massachusetts high school for a period of time; *NOW, THEREFORE BE IT*
- **RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council go on record in support of the Massachusetts Legislature granting in-state tuition eligibility to undocumented immigrants residing in the state, and that copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Massachusetts Governor, Senate President, and Speaker of the House of Representatives to serve as an expression of the City of Boston's commitment to educational equity and inclusivity for all residents of the Commonwealth.

#### **Sixty Day Orders**

The following ordinances, appropriations and/or orders recommended by the Mayor for passage by the City Council become effective after the date specified unless previously acted upon<sup>1</sup>

#### <sup>1</sup>Section 17E of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The mayor from time to time may make to the city council in the form of an ordinance or loan order filed with the city clerk such recommendations as he may deem to be for the welfare of the city. The City Council shall consider each ordinance or loan order so presented and shall either adopt or reject the same within sixty days after the date when it is filed as aforesaid. If such ordinance or loan order is not rejected within sixty days, it shall be in force as if adopted by the city council unless previously withdrawn by the mayor.

In effect after July 21, 2023, Message and order for your approval an Order to reduce the FY23 appropriation for the Reserve for Collective Bargaining by Eighty-Five Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$85,600.00) to provide funding for the Boston Public Health Commission for the FY23 increases contained within the collective bargaining agreements between the Boston Public Health Commission and the SENA, Local 9158. (Docket #0963)

In effect after July 21, 2023, Message and order for your approval a supplemental appropriation Order for the Public Health Commission for FY23 in the amount of Eighty-Five Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$85,600.00) to cover the FY23 cost items contained within the collective bargaining agreement between the Boston Public Health Commission and SENA, Local 9158. The terms of the contracts are October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022 and October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2025. The major provisions of the contracts include base wage increases of 1.5% in January of 2022, 2% in January 2023, 2% in January 2024, and 2% in January 2025. The agreements also contain other benefits including increased hazardous duty differentials. Filed in the Office of the City Clerk on May 22, 2023. (Docket #0964)

In effect after July 21, 2023, Message and order for your approval an Order to reduce the FY23 appropriation for the Reserve for Collective Bargaining by Thirty-Two Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Four Dollars (\$32,334.00) to provide funding for the Parks and Recreation Department for the FY23 increases contained within the Collective Bargaining agreement between the City of Boston and the Boston Park Rangers' Association. (Docket #0965)

In effect after July 21, 2023, Message and order for your approval a supplemental appropriation Order for the Parks and Recreation Department for FY23 in the amount of Thirty-Two Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Four Dollars (\$32,334.00) to cover the FY23 cost contained within the collective bargaining agreements between the City of Boston and the Boston Park Rangers' Association. The terms of the contract are July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2023. The major provisions of the contract include base wage increases of 2%, 1.5% and 2%, to be given in October of each fiscal year of the contract term. Filed in the Office of the City Clerk on May 22, 2023. (Docket #0966)


Message and order for your approval an order authorizing the City of Boston to enter into one or more leases, lease-purchase or installment sales agreements in Fiscal Year2024 in an amount not to exceed Thirty-Nine Million Dollars (\$39,000,000.00). These funds are to be used by various City departments for the acquisition of equipment in furtherance of their respective governmental functions. The list of equipment includes: computer equipment (hardware and software), motor vehicles and trailers, ambulances, firefighting equipment, office equipment, telecommunications equipment, photocopying equipment, medical equipment, school and educational equipment, school buses, parking meters, street lighting installation, traffic signal equipment and equipment functionally related to and components of the foregoing. Filed in the Office of the City Clerk on April 10, 2023. (Docket #0764)

Message and order for your approval an appropriation order in the amount of Six Hundred Fifty-Seven Million One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$657,110,000.00) for various capital improvement purposes for city departments including the Boston Center for Youth and Families, Department of Innovation and Technology, the Environment, Fire, Parks and Recreation, Police, Property Management, Public Works, and Transportation departments, Mayor's Office of Housing, Mayor's Office of Arts and Culture, Boston Public Library, Boston Housing Authority, Boston Planning and Development Agency, and the Boston Public Health Commission. #### 2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.



Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

#### Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

*Ordinances*: Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.

**Loan Orders:** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.

*Orders*: Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Home Rule Petitions: Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City

Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.

*Order for a Hearing*: A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular

matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City

Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative

action of placing it on file.

Legislative Resolution: A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal

effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as

a whole.

#### RESOLUTION CELEBRATING FLAG DAY

WHEREAS: Flag Day is celebrated every year on June 14th in remembrance of the adoption of the flag of the United States in 1777, as it is a national symbol of patriotism and freedom. On this day it is important to express an appreciation for the values and the history that the

flag embodies; and

WHEREAS: In 1775, the "Grand Union" flag, also known as the Continental Colors, was flown in the colonies. It resembled the U.S. Flag as it had thirteen red and white stripes, yet the upper letherd corner displayed the English flag instead of thirteen stars. This was the first flag

lefthand corner displayed the English flag instead of thirteen stars. This was the first flag flown in the United States, celebrating the creation of the Continental Army and Navy,

under George Washington's command; and

WHEREAS: Adopted by Congress in 1923, the United States Flag Code sought to provide guidelines

and instruction on the proper use and handling of the American flag. The code addresses how to maintain proper conduct while displaying the flag, during the pledge of allegiance, and during the national anthem, as well as providing other rules and

regulations regarding its use; and

WHEREAS: The Flag resolution of 1777 was officially adopted and designated as National Flag Day

on August 3rd, 1949 by an Act of Congress, which designated June 14th each year as

National Flag Day; and

WHEREAS: In 1960, Hawaii joined the Union, adding a 50th star to the flag, which has been in use

ever since; and

WHEREAS: Today, the American flag is a symbol of justice, freedom, and democracy here in our country and around the world. On Flag Day, we also honor all those who serve in our

military, and recommit our support to our veterans, military families and Gold Star families. We also recognize the services of our women veterans and all of whom made

sacrifices to protect and defend our nation; and

- **WHEREAS,** On July 5th, 1975, following years of plight and withstanding the clutches of Portuguese colonialism, Cabo Verde, also known as Cape Verde, emerged as a beacon of resilience when they achieved independence, which continues to inspire the world; *and*
- WHEREAS, This momentous occasion was made possible by the brave and heroic efforts of Cape Verdean leaders such as Amilcar Cabral, Titina Sila, and Francisca Pereira during which Aristides Pereira was the first president and Pedro Pires was the initial Prime Minister; and
- **WHEREAS,** Under their leadership, the African Party for the Independence of Guinea and Cape Verde (PAIGC) waged a successful armed struggle against the Portuguese; and
- **WHEREAS**, Cape Verde was one of several West African nations to withstand the effects of colonization prior to reaching national liberation and independence; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** PAIGC, the African Party for the Independence of Guinea and Cabo Verde, was the leading organ of this struggle, with Cabral as the leading theoretician; they centered their efforts around the countries of Guinea-Bissau and Cabo Verde; and
- **WHEREAS**, With an orientation of Pan-Africanism, anti-colonialism, and internationalism, they recognized that their enemy was just one element of the Western, imperialist, project that acted to subjugate Africa and its peoples for centuries; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Cabo Verde was used as one of the largest supply ports during the transatlantic slave trade, the largest forced migration of people in world history; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Their unwavering fortitude empowered them to prevail despite undergoing rapid economic decline, enslavement, natural disasters, Portuguese rule, and mass immigration in pursuit of a better life; *and*

- **WHEREAS,** As a result, there are 500,000 Cape Verdeans in the United States, where their rich culture and heritage has made foundational contributions to American society; and
- **WHEREAS,** Nearly 1 in 5 Cape Verdean Americans live in the state of Massachusetts with the population totaling 50,000 people including significant numbers in cities such as Brockton, New Bedford, and Boston; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Boston is home to the largest, deep-rooted Cape Verdean immigrant community in the Western Hemisphere, with an estimated population of 13,605 people; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Cape Verdeans exercise an influential presence in Boston, contributing with their unique culture made up of food, music, storytelling, language, and art which can be felt across the political landscape, community advocacy efforts, public services, and local businesses; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Considering the prominence of Cape Verdeans and their culture in the city of Boston, their history and achievements should be honored in alignment with ethnic groups that have received recognition in the past; *and*
- WHEREAS, The strength of the Cape Verdean community is reflected in their hard work, humility, and the difference they have made over generations despite difficult circumstances such as oppression, indigence, miscategorization of identity, and lack of recognition; and
