TO THE CITY COUNCIL

Dear Councilors:

I transmit herewith for your approval an Order authorizing the Parks and Recreation Commission, on behalf of the City of Boston, to acquire by an eminent domain taking two parcels on the western shore of Sprague Pond at 0-4 Lakeside Avenue in Hyde Park as permanently protected parkland to be known as the Sprague Pond Shoreline Reserve, and to use Community Preservation Fund monies appropriated to the Parks and Recreation Department to award damages as determined by the Commission.

In addition, this Order authorizes the Parks and Recreation Commission to grant to the Southwest Boston Community Development Corporation a perpetual conservation restriction in accordance with M.G.L. Chapter 44B, Section 12(a), which requires such a restriction for lands acquired with monies derived by the Community Preservation Act.

These parcels on the western shore of Sprague Pond are undeveloped, contribute to the scenic beauty of and provide access to this Great Pond, provide natural resource protection to the state-designated Fowl Meadow and Ponkapoag Bog Area of Critical Environmental Concern, are within the boundaries of the Camp Miags Civil War-era training camp and hospital, where the Massachusetts 54th and 55th Volunteer Regiments trained, and are within an area considered "archaeologically sensitive for ancient and historic period archaeological resources" by the Massachusetts Historical Commission. This intersection of natural resource protection, historic preservation, and archaeological sensitivity make this a particularly worthy acquisition to Boston's parklands, and provide a public good of profound significance to this City and the Commonwealth that justifies the serious responsibility involved in the taking of private property with just compensation.

I urge your Honorable Body to adopt this Order so that the City may acquire this property expeditiously and expend Community Preservation Fund monies for the purposes for which they are granted.



AN ORDER TO AUTHORIZE THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION TO TAKE BY EMINENT DOMAIN FOR PARK AND COMMUNITY PRESERVATION PURPOSES, AND TO GRANT A CONSERVATION RESTRICTION ON, TWO PARCELS ON SPRAGUE POND IN HYDE PARK.

ORDERED: That the Parks and Recreation Commission, on behalf of the City of Boston, for the community preservation purposes of providing a park, passive recreation, natural, historical, cultural, and archaeological resource conservation, and public access to the Great Pond known as Sprague Pond, be, and hereby is, authorized to take by eminent domain in accordance with G.L. Chapter 79, Chapter 185 of the Acts of 1875, and G.L. Chapter 44 B, Section 5 (e) the fee simple interest, inclusive of trees and structures standing upon and affixed thereto, of two parcels of land at Unnumbered (aka "0") and 4 Lakeside Avenue in the Hyde Park District, consisting of 51,545 square feet more or less (1.18± acres) of open land identified in the records of the Assessing Department as Parcels 1812998000 and 1812999000 respectively, and shown as "Parcel - A" on a survey titled "Plan of Land Taken for Park and Passive Recreation Purposes by the Parks and Recreation Commission, City of Boston, 0-4 Lakeside Avenue, Hyde Park District, Boston, MA" dated May 18, 2022, and prepared by Joyce Consulting Group, PC, Braintree, Massachusetts, , and to enter into all contracts, agreements, or documents and execute any and all instruments as may be necessary to effect said taking. In accordance with G.L. Chapter 44B, Section 5 (e), the Parks and Recreation Commission, on behalf of the City of Boston for the community preservation purposes cited above, using Community Preservation Fund monies appropriated to the Open Space Acquisition Fund of the Parks and Recreation Department by votes of the City Council on March 31, 2021 and April 12, 2022, is hereby authorized to expend said Community Preservation Fund monies for the purpose of paying any damages determined by the Parks and Recreation Commission for which the City of Boston may be liable by reason of this taking for community preservation purposes.

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED: That the Parks and Recreation Commission, on behalf of the City of Boston, be, and hereby is, authorized to grant a perpetual conservation restriction in said parcels of land to the Southwest Boston Community Development Corporation in accordance with G.L. Chapter 44B, Section 12(a) and G.L. Chapter 184, Sections 31 through 33, and to enter into all agreements and documents and to execute any and all instruments as may be necessary to affect said perpetual conservation restriction.

HOME RULE PETITION

AUTHORIZING ELECTRONIC APPLICATION &
TRANSMISSION OF ABSENTEE BALLOT FOR ABSENT
UNIFORMED SERVICES VOTERS

WHEREAS: Massachusetts citizens have a right to vote in all elections, even if deployed or stationed overseas. The Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA) is a federal law that guarantees voting rights for the United States military, who are known as uniformed services voters; *and*

WHEREAS: Eligible uniformed services voters strictly include those on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard (including reservists), Space Force, and merchant marine members, as well as their spouse or dependents. Absent uniformed services voters are located outside of their voting district; *and*

WHEREAS: In Massachusetts, absent uniformed services voters are exempt from voter registration requirements, but instead must mail an absentee ballot application to their local election office to obtain a ballot; *and*

WHEREAS: For municipal elections in Massachusetts, a blank ballot will only be delivered through the mail and must also be returned by mail; *and*

WHEREAS: However, for federal elections, a ballot can be emailed, faxed, or mailed based on preference, and the voted ballot may be mailed back or electronic returned through email or fax; *and*

WHEREAS: Mail-in ballots have already caused problems in some elections: In Wisconsin, 9,000 requested ballots were never sent, and thousands were postmarked too late to count. In New Jersey, 9.6% of mail ballots cast in that state's local elections were rejected because signatures didn't match the ones on file or arrived too late. In Pennsylvania, tens of thousands of votes were either not cast or not counted due to deadline confusion; *and*

WHEREAS: Electronic application for an absentee ballot for municipal elections will streamline the application absentee ballot process for absent uniformed services voters by eliminating the mailing time to receive and deliver an application; *and*

WHEREAS: Electronic deliverance and return of the ballots itself will help better guarantee voting rights for absent uniformed services voters by also streamlining the voting process, ensuring each ballot is counted, and reducing the number of rejected ballots; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

ORDERED: That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this Order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause One (1) of Section Eight (8) of Article Two (2), as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

PETITION FOR A SPECIAL LAW RE:

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE AUTHORIZATION OF ELECTRONIC APPLICATION AND ELECTRONIC TRANSMISSION OF BALLOTS FOR ABSENT UNIFORMED SERVICES VOTERS

SECTION 1:

Notwithstanding any law, rule, or regulation to the contrary, absent uniformed services voters shall be allowed to apply for absentee ballots electronically. Absent uniformed services voters shall be entitled to receive and return their ballots electronically, through email or fax, for local elections. The Board of Election Commissioners for the City of Boston shall be authorized to implement procedures to comply with this act.

SECTION 2:

This act shall take effect upon its passage.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS SOLUTIONS TO HISTORIC AND DISPROPORTIONATE STATE DISINVESTMENT IN THE CITY OF BOSTON

- WHEREAS*, State aid which the City of Boston receives from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts has been substantially reduced over the last two recessions, and since fiscal year 2002, the City's net state aid has been trending down steeply, being reduced by \$300.2 million, or 70.1 percent; *and*
- WHEREAS*, Boston, the capital city of the Commonwealth, has experienced long-term state aid reductions that have not been reinstated, leaving a systemic issue of the City shifting significantly toward increased reliance on property tax for revenue growth; *and*
- WHEREAS*, In FY03, Boston received \$476.6 million in state aid and was charged \$101.1 million in state assessments, yielding \$375.5 million in net state aid, while in the FY23 recommended budget, the City anticipates receiving \$495.2 in state aid (an increase of 3.9 percent since FY03) and will contribute \$367.1 million through state assessments (an increase of 263 percent over two decades), resulting in \$128.1 million in net state aid received by the City (a loss of 65.9 percent since FY03); *and*
- WHEREAS*, In FY03, property tax represented 55.6 percent and state aid comprised 25.6 percent of the City's revenue sources, then property tax rose to 67.2 percent and state aid dropped to 16.1 percent by FY13, and the City anticipates for property tax to reach 74 percent and state aid to lower to 12.4 percent of revenue in FY23; *and*
- WHEREAS*, In FY03, state assessments were 5.4 percent of the City's expenditures, rising to 6.9 percent by FY13, and are anticipated to be 9.2 percent in FY23, and as a result, net state aid received by the City comprised 20.2 percent of revenue in FY03, 9.2 percent in FY13, and is anticipated to be only 3.2 percent of the budget in FY23; *and*
- WHEREAS*, While Boston's share of state aid has diminished, the Commonwealth generated a revenue surplus of \$5.86 billion in FY21, and state tax revenues have thus far exceeded FY22 benchmarks through April by \$4.23 billion, leading Governor Baker to file a \$1.7 billion FY22 supplemental budget (*H.4802*) on May 19, 2022; *and*
- WHEREAS*, Divestment by the State has largely been driven by stagnant increases in K-12 education and increases in state assessments, while phasing in of the Student Opportunity Act of 2019 is anticipated to provide much needed reform to the education funding formula provided in Chapter 70; *and*

- WHEREAS*, The amount of funds to be distributed each year to a municipality is described on the “Cherry Sheet,” a listing of estimated assessments and receipts of local aid, such as library aid, school construction, school transportation and other reimbursements, and highway funds, and preliminary Cherry Sheet estimates for FY23 demonstrate the City will be assessed \$367 million, more than double its assessment in 2013; *and*
- WHEREAS*, A 2006 report of the Boston Redevelopment Authority Research Department titled, “Boston Gives More than it Gets From the Rest of Massachusetts,” found that Boston comprised 9.3 percent of the state’s population and 0.6 percent of its land, but generated 15.6 percent of state jobs, 19.3 percent of state tax revenue, 23.5 percent of the state’s income, corporate excise, and business tax revenue, 30 percent of state visitor revenue, and 41 percent of state hotel tax revenue; *and*
- WHEREAS*, A 2010 update to the report found that on average, each worker in Boston produced \$125,195 of the Gross State Product in comparison to \$76,012 per worker in the rest of the state, but the City is left with state aid disproportionately low in light of its economic contributions and population base; *and*
- WHEREAS*, The City of Boston has transformed immensely since the initial 2006 report and 2010 update commissioned by Mayor Menino, and an updated assessment of Boston’s present conditions and contributions to the Commonwealth is urgently overdue; *and*
- WHEREAS*, The scope and implications of Boston’s restricted local control have long been scrutinized, particularly in the *Boston Bound* report series by Harvard Law School professors Gerald Frug and David Barron comparing the legal powers of Boston with Atlanta, Chicago, Denver, New York City, San Francisco, and Seattle, finding that “Boston’s power is constrained by the state to an extent that is unique among the places studied” and that “the City of Boston lacks the power that other major American cities enjoy to shape its own future”; *and*
- WHEREAS*, State aid distribution in Massachusetts has historically disinvested in low-income and communities of color by directing more funds to wealthier, Whiter towns, thus, a more equitable distribution of state aid is necessary to support Black and brown communities, and the City should be allowed to recover a greater share of the wealth it produces in return for the taxes generated for the Commonwealth; *and*
- WHEREAS*, Updating the City’s state aid formula requires coordinated and strategic collaboration with the Mayoral administration, members of the City Council, the Boston delegation to the Legislature, leadership of the State House and Senate, and the incoming gubernatorial administration; *NOW, THEREFORE BE IT*
- ORDERED*: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss solutions to historic and disproportionate state disinvestment in the City of Boston, and that Administration officials, members of the Boston legislative delegation, and interested members of the public be invited to attend.

**ORDER FOR A HEARING ON ACCOUNTABILITY AND
ACCESSIBILITY OF LANGUAGE ACCESS SERVICES IN THE
CITY OF BOSTON**

- WHEREAS,** In August of 2021, the Boston City Council passed An Ordinance Amending City of Boston Code, Ordinances, Chapter VI, Section 6-10, Language and Communications Access for City Services which made substantial changes to the city's language access policies; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The ordinance established an Office of Language and Communications Access, creating new rules regarding the timeline of information disbursement in addition to changing what languages are required for translation in neighborhoods and across the city and had an implementation timeline of 12 months after passage; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Since the ordinance was passed, new budgetary priorities have been introduced that change the scope of work for the Office of Language and Communications Access; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The FY23 budget invests in seven new positions, including in-house translators and LCA specialists to better support departments; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The hiring and employment standards for interpreters in different official capacities can vary depending on their role, with court interpreters requiring a college degree, a completed legal interpreter training program, and passing a court interpreter certification exam; *and*
- WHEREAS,** It is important for the Council to be updated on the implementation of the ordinance and to learn more about the hiring practices and standards for these new in-house translators as well as the selection process and quality control measures currently used for contracting out interpretation and translation services; *and*

WHEREAS, The Council passes ordinances that change the operations of the city's government and it is important that this body provide oversight over the laws and rules it promulgates; **NOW THEREFORE BE IT**

ORDERED:

That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing on the accountability and accessibility of language access services. Representatives from the City of Boston, including the Office of Language and Communications Access, in addition to individuals with professional experience as interpreters/translators, as well as community advocates are encouraged to attend.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO EXPLORE FIRE AND EMERGENCY DISASTER RELIEF SERVICES IN THE CITY OF BOSTON

WHEREAS, Every year, fires in residential properties wreak havoc on the lives of families and individuals; *and*

WHEREAS, By way of examples, on April 7, 2022 a fire destroyed 13 apartments and displaced over 40 people in Mattapan; *and*

WHEREAS, on April 29, 2022, young leaders from the Mattapan Teen Center held a bake sale at Almont Playground to raise money for the families displaced by the fires, most of whom lost all of their belongings in the fire and had difficulty securing alternative housing; *and*

WHEREAS, on February 28, 2022 a fire displaced 25 people including two elementary students and one high school student in East Boston; *and*

WHEREAS, A GoFundMe page was created by the East Boston community to support the displaced residents, raising \$50,055 by 526 individual donations; *and*

WHEREAS, Families and individuals that lack resources and capital, disproportionately our Black and Brown families, have trouble meeting their basic needs upon displacement and often do not have renter's insurance; *and*

WHEREAS, All landlords must maintain insurance policies for multi-unit residential buildings that provide for relocation benefits to tenants, and upon written request disclose the name of the insurance company; *and*

WHEREAS, Tenants may not be charged rent during the period the unit is uninhabitable and return any security deposit and last month's rent, and must be notified of this benefit at the beginning of the rental period; *and*

WHEREAS, Displacement by fire is grounds for priority one status for Boston Housing Authority (BHA) Section 8 and project-based subsidized housing. Tenants should get a copy of the Fire and Inspectional Services reports as proof of displacement; *and*

WHEREAS, Priority BHA housing is based on a point system that gives points to applicants where certain priorities are given more points than others are, such as displacement from a fire; *and*

WHEREAS, The City of Cambridge has a Fire Relief Fund that residents, public and private entities, and others can donate to in order to assist those facing displacement due to fire; *and*

WHEREAS, Analyze Boston’s Fire Incident Reporting system includes property and content loss figures but provides no quantifiable data on injury and displacement numbers; *and*

WHEREAS, The City of Boston has an Emergency Assistance Fund for victims of fire or natural disaster that should be connecting victims with clothing, food, health services, and helps cover upfront costs associated with obtaining new housing and be more inclusive of community-based efforts; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss fire and emergency disaster relief services in the City of Boston and ensure that all relief funds are appropriately maintained and funded, and that the Office of Neighborhood Services, Mayor's Office of Housing, Boston Housing Authority, Boston Fire Department, displaced individuals, and relevant departments, government entities, non-profits, and persons be invited to testify.

RESOLUTION URGING THE MASSACHUSETTS LEGISLATURE TO OPPOSE H.1234 AND THE PROPOSED 2022 STATE BALLOT INITIATIVE

WHEREAS, In 2019, the California legislature passed AB5, a simple test for determining who is an employee and who is an independent contractor, which determined that Uber and Lyft ride-hail drivers, DoorDash, Instacart, and Postmates food-delivery workers are employees; *and*

WHEREAS, App-based companies such as Uber, Lyft, and DoorDash responded by spending \$224 million on Proposition 22, a ballot initiative meant to exclude ride-hail and food-delivery app-based workers from employee rights under state law, including the right to a minimum wage, time-and-a-half for overtime, expenses reimbursement, and benefits such as unemployment compensation and state workers' compensation; *and*

WHEREAS, California Superior Court Judge Frank Roesch found that the ballot initiative infringed on the power explicitly granted to the California Legislature to regulate workers' compensation and was therefore unconstitutional and unenforceable; *and*

WHEREAS, In 2020, Uber's CEO stated that "*Going forward, you'll see us more loudly advocating for laws like Prop 22,*" and other Big Tech CEOs have joined them in their promise to bring laws that depress wages, violate civil rights, and put consumers at risk to states across the country; *and*

WHEREAS, Massachusetts Attorney General Maura Healey is suing Uber and Lyft for failing to follow Massachusetts law by misclassifying employees as independent contractors; *and*

WHEREAS, In an attempt to escape these violations and avoid paying into Social Security, avoid paying taxes, and harm workers and consumers; the companies are slated to spend \$100 million in support of House Bill 1234 and a 2022 state ballot referendum question asking Massachusetts legislators and voters to grant them special exemptions from our labor, civil rights, and consumer protection laws; *and*

WHEREAS, H.1234, sponsored by Big Tech, exempts these "gig economy" businesses from paying into Social Security and unemployment, costing Massachusetts taxpayers

hundreds of millions of dollars, weakening these programs for everyone, and shielding these businesses from liability and financial responsibility if customers or members of the public are injured; *and*

WHEREAS, According to a study by the University of California, Berkeley’s Labor Center, under the proposed state ballot initiative, Massachusetts drivers may make as little as \$4.82 per hour, while those who qualify for a health care stipend may earn as little as \$6.74 per hour, which is significantly less than the Massachusetts minimum wage and roughly one-third of the required minimum pay for drivers under New York City and Seattle industry-specific pay standards; *and*

WHEREAS, H.1234, if passed, would create a permanent underclass of low-wage, mostly Black, Brown, and immigrant workers by allowing these companies to pay their workers less than minimum wage and provide few if any, benefits; *and*

WHEREAS, At a moment of racial reckoning in our country, the bill would exclude app-based workers from the robust protections against racial discrimination and sexual harassment under the Massachusetts Civil Rights Act, MGL c. 151B; and according to many leading voices, passing this bill would be among the biggest steps backward in the fight for equity and opportunity at work since the passage of the 1964 Civil Right Act; *and*

WHEREAS, The Boston City Council has a responsibility to prioritize workers over corporate profits, protect consumers, and oppose any measure that would facilitate wage theft and undermine the rights and benefits of the working-class people who keep our city running; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

RESOLVED: That the Boston City Council joins the Somerville City Council, workers, consumers, community members, faith organizations, environmental and racial justice advocates, labor rights, civil rights, and union organizers to urge the Massachusetts Legislature to oppose House Bill 1234 and the proposed 2022 state ballot initiative; ***AND BE IT FURTHER***

RESOLVED: That the Clerk of the City of Boston is respectfully requested to transmit a suitably attested copy of this Resolution to the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of the Joint Committee on Financial Services, the Senate President, the Speaker of the House, the presenters of the proposed legislation Representatives Mark J. Cusack and Carlos González, and the Boston Delegation to the General Court.

The City Council shall consider each ordinance or loan order so presented and shall either adopt or reject the same within sixty days after the date when it is filed as aforesaid. If such ordinance or loan order is not rejected within sixty days, it shall be in force as if adopted by the city council unless previously withdrawn by the mayor.

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

Home Rule Petitions Not Responded to by the Mayor³

³***Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:***

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- Ordinances:*** Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Loan Orders:*** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- Orders:*** Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Home Rule Petitions:*** Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.
