

Dear Councilors:

I transmit herewith a supplemental appropriation Order for the Boston Fire Department for FY24 in the amount of twenty-seven million, three hundred fifty-seven thousand, six hundred twenty-six dollars (\$27,357,626) to cover the FY24 cost items contained within the collective bargaining agreement between the City of Boston and the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF), Local 718. The terms of the contract are July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024. The major provisions of the contract include base wage increases of 3%, 3%, and 2.5%, to be given in July of each fiscal year of the contract term. The agreement also includes increases to hazardous duty pay and the detail rate.

As originally presented to you, the FY24 budget request included a Reserve for Collective Bargaining - a separate appropriation to fund projected collective bargaining increases. A separate order has been filed to reduce that appropriation to support this supplemental request.





ORDER FOR A HEARING REGARDING A COMPREHENSIVE, DISTRICT-WIDE PLANNING PROCESS FOR BOSTON'S WATERFRONT

WHEREAS: District One faces unique challenges as East Boston, Charlestown, and the North End are coastal communities bearing a significant burden of intentional and generational environmental injustices; and

WHEREAS: Boston's waterfront is a historic and treasured resource that is protected for all residents by the Public Waterfront Act (Chapter 91). As we prepare for sea-level rise due to climate change, we must prioritize waterfront planning and development that incorporates resilience, equity, accessibility; and

WHEREAS: According to a report from the First Street Foundation, Suffolk County faces the greatest risk of flooding with more than 45% of our critical infrastructure at risk, including hospitals, police, and fire stations. This is expected to increase by 20% by 2051; and

WHEREAS: Coastal flooding due to storm surge has increased on a more frequent basis and affects property owners and tenants alike. Severe flooding will result in the displacement of thousands, predominately those who are low-income and people of color, renters in basement or first-floor level units within the flood zone; and

WHEREAS: Boston has a significant role to play to protect our waterfront without depending on investments from private entities or developers. Taking a parcel-by-parcel approach to fortifying our coastline will not adequately address the urgent threat of coastal flooding. We must be able to meet the sea, on a district-wide scale, use both passive and active permeable landscapes; and

WHEREAS: In 2013, Boston began a Downtown Waterfront Municipal Harbor Plan (DWMHP) process that took four years to complete. By the time the plan was finalized in 2017, it did not adequately consider contemporary climate data and centered on individual development projects as a means to achieve resilience; and

WHEREAS: In addition, the community engagement process to solicit feedback on the Downtown Waterfront MHP was limited to a small group of residents with waterfront property. It did not take into consideration a majority of Bostonian’s priorities for amenities, programming, or public realm improvements that foster a truly welcoming and inclusive waterfront; and

WHEREAS: Mayor Michelle Wu recently launched a municipal harbor planning process specifically for East Boston to create a predictable framework that prioritizes waterfront equity and resiliency; and

WHEREAS: While we consider the next steps for East Boston’s new process, there are significant lessons to be learned from the Downtown Waterfront MHP in both the planning itself and community engagement; and

WHEREAS: The new planning process needs a holistic approach that is community-led with an emphasis on centering on the needs of residents and their vision for the waterfront. It should lean on progress made by both PLAN: East Boston and PLAN: Charlestown initiatives to ultimately shape a waterfront that offers affordable amenities including housing and commercial space, climate preparedness, transit infrastructure connectivity; and

WHEREAS: It should utilize contemporary resilience strategies seen around the world and meet goals set out by Climate Ready Boston. Collaboration with academic partners like the UMass Boston Stone Living Lab is key to analyzing the merits of large engineering solutions to sea-level rise, as applied in European cities such as Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and Venice; and

WHEREAS: Every resident has ownership of access to our waterfront but one only has to traverse the water’s edge to feel the uninviting nature of the harbor walk. There is a lack of wayfinding signage in multiple languages and disjointed walkways with private security. Therefore, the new planning process should implement an equity lens to plan for the inclusion of all Bostonians to enjoy the waterfront, regardless of race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status; and

WHEREAS: Recently, there have been increased discussions around lifting certain waterfront properties from the Designated Port Area (DPA). Additionally, there are existing proposals for mixed-use developments on the waterfront that perpetuate a piecemeal approach to resiliency. The City of Boston needs to develop and implement a comprehensive, districtwide waterfront plan that takes into consideration modern resilience strategies and through an equity lens to guide any new proposed developments; THEREFORE

BE IT ORDERED,

That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to discuss a holistic, district-wide planning process for Boston's district one waterfront, and that relevant members of the Cabinet of Environment, Energy, and Open Space, the Boston Planning and Development Agency, with other advocacy organizations and stakeholders invited to testify.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF BOSTON CODE RELATING TO THE STUDY AND REPORT ON THE TRAFFICKING OF ILLEGAL FIREARMS

WHEREAS: Gun violence is a leading cause of death and injuries in this country, causing harm to not only the individual, but also to communities that experience gun violence in their neighborhoods; *and*

WHEREAS: In October of 2022, the City Council unanimously adopted a resolution declaring gun violence as a public health emergency; *and*

WHEREAS: There has been more than 1,700 shootings recorded in the City since 2015, with more than 170 shootings in 2022; *and*

WHEREAS: Gun trafficking and illegal flow of firearms is a major contributor to gun violence, with the Boston Police recovering more than 900 firearms in 2022. In 2021, of the firearms recovered at crime scenes that were traced using the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network, only 10 percent were purchased in Massachusetts, while the rest were brought into Massachusetts from 18 other states; *and*

WHEREAS: The Boston Police, the Suffolk District Attorney's Office, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives have partnered together last year on a program called "Boston Firearm Intelligence Review Shooting and Trafficking" (Boston FIRST) to focus on the issue of illegal gun trafficking, and to investigate, identify, and prosecute gun traffickers; *and*

WHEREAS: A comprehensive study and review of the flow of firearms into the City of Boston would help law enforcement and policymakers better understand the impact of illegal gun trafficking, and this data will help craft strategies to reduce gun violence; **AND NOW THEREFORE,**

Be it Ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

That the City of Boston Municipal Code, Ordinances, Chapter 11-1 shall be amended by adding at the end thereof, the following new sections and subsections:

Section 11-1.11 REPORT ON GUN TRAFFICKING IN THE CITY OF BOSTON.

Section 1. Purpose.

The purpose of this ordinance is to create an annual study and report from the Boston Police Department with data on the flow of firearms and review of ways that illegal firearms are transported into the City, which will help law enforcement and policymakers in determining action in stemming the flow of illegal firearms.

Section 2. Reporting.

The Boston Police Department shall coordinate with Massachusetts State Police, the Suffolk County Sheriff's Office, the Suffolk County District Attorney's Office, and all other relevant municipal agencies to conduct a study on reducing the flow of firearms into the city and shall submit a report to the Mayor and the Boston City Council no later than three months after passage and annually thereafter. Such study and report shall include the following information for the preceding calendar year:

1. For each firearm seized or surrendered in the city and obtained by the police department:
 - (a) Whether the firearm was connected to a crime;
 - (b) Where the firearm originated, including where it was first sold, manufactured, imported or assembled;
 - (c) The date such firearm was seized or surrendered and the date such firearm was last sold legally;
 - (d) The location of such seizure, including latitude and longitude if available, but in all cases at least as specific as the nearest intersection;
 - (e) The make, model, type and serial number of such firearm;
 - (f) The manufacturer or importer of such firearm;
 - (g) Whether the firearm was a ghost gun or a firearm created using a three-dimensional printer, and if so, the entities that produced such firearm or parts thereof;
 - (h) The dealer of such firearm and whether such dealer was licensed; and
 - (i) Whether the firearm was registered in any state or federal database, including the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record.
2. A review of the ways firearms are illegally transported into the city, including through roadways on and connected to the interstate and sea ports or bodies of water;
3. Limitations on disclosure. If disclosure of any information specified in paragraph one of subdivision a of this section is prohibited by law, such study and report shall identify the information being withheld and the reason therefore, and shall, instead of such withheld information, include aggregate data to the extent available. Such study and report need not include information about any firearm obtained through a gun buy-back program or where

disclosure would compromise the safety of the public or police officers or could otherwise compromise ongoing law enforcement investigations or operations. Such reports shall include the total number of seizures for which reporting was withheld due to a pending criminal investigation, and upon completion of such investigations the information relating to such seizures shall be reflected in a subsequent report.

Section 3. Implementation.

This ordinance takes effect immediately after passage.

Section 4. Severability.

If any provision of this section shall be held to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such provision shall be considered separately and apart from the remaining provisions, which shall remain in full force and effect.

- WHEREAS,** The Boston Housing Authority (“BHA”) is the agency statutorily responsible under Massachusetts law “for providing for families unable to afford housing without public subsidies” and “to carry out these responsibilities, BHA develops and manages housing projects and leases housing when necessary.” BHA provides public housing and other affordable housing options to thousands of our most vulnerable residents in the City of Boston; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The BHA’s Administration and Operations Departments are “responsible for day to day management and maintenance of all the BHA housing developments,” including Living Unit Inspections (LUI), annual HUD inspections, resident relations, and lease information. Having a clear understanding of the frequency and impact of these inspections to housing developments, and individual units, will be helpful to advocate on behalf of the residents; *and,*
- WHEREAS,** The BHA’s Department of Police and Public Safety is responsible to “preserve public peace and order, and to protect life and property” in BHA properties. The overall quality of life of our public housing residents, advocating for their safety, and helping lift up their voices is of the utmost importance to us; *and,*
- WHEREAS,** It is imperative that there are reviews on the BHA’s procedures and protocols to maintaining accurate lists of tenants and the dependent children in their care, that there are inspection, enforcement policies, and mechanisms relative to ensuring that all leaseholders are in compliance with BHA lease policies and guidelines, and that all children in BHA housing are officially and accounted for and safe. **AND NOW THEREFORE BE IT**
- ORDERED,** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to assess the Department’s response procedures and protocols relating to public safety in BHA units, particularly the safety of children in BHA housing. Representatives from the Mayor’s office, Boston Housing Authority Administrator Kenzie Bok, Chief of Emergency Management and Chief of Police for the Boston Housing Authority Shumeane L. Benford, and other interested parties shall be invited to attend. In addition, members of the public are encouraged to attend.

¹Section 17E of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The mayor from time to time may make to the city council in the form of an ordinance or loan order filed with the city clerk such recommendations as he may deem to be for the welfare of the city. The City Council shall consider each ordinance or loan order so presented and shall either adopt or reject the same within sixty days after the date when it is filed as aforesaid. If such ordinance or loan order is not rejected within sixty days, it shall be in force as if adopted by the city council unless previously withdrawn by the mayor.

2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall

personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

Home Rule Petitions Not Responded to by the Mayor³

³*Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:*

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- Ordinances:*** Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Loan Orders:*** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- Orders:*** Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Home Rule Petitions:*** Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.

RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING NATIONAL POW/MIA DAY

WHEREAS: National POW/MIA Recognition Day is observed annually on the third Friday in September to remember and honor those who are prisoners of war (POW), missing in action (MIA), and to ensure that the country is doing its utmost to account for those who have never returned; *and*

WHEREAS: It was passed in Congress in 1979 through a proclamation signed by President Jimmy Carter to account for those who were POW/MIA in the Vietnam War; *and*

WHEREAS: According to the Department of Defense's POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA), more than 81,000 Americans who served in World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Cold War, the Gulf War, and more recent conflicts remain missing. 75% of the losses are located in the Indo-Pacific, and over 41,000 of the missing are presumed to be lost at sea; *and*

WHEREAS: The DPAA's mission is to provide the fullest possible accounting for missing personnel from past conflicts to their families and the nation. Their work includes searching for missing personnel to fulfill the nation's promise to leave no service member behind; *and*

WHEREAS: 65 recovery missions and 50 investigative missions have been conducted by the DPAA so far to uncover lost personnel. So far this year, four U.S. Army Air Forces Servicemen missing from World War II was accounted for; *and*

WHEREAS: The black and white POW/MIA flag was created by a World War II pilot Newt Heisley in 1972. The words "You Are Not Forgotten" appear on the flag and remind us to never forget our prisoners of war and those missing in action; *and now therefore be it*


