



Dear City Council,

I am writing in response to your 17F Request regarding the FY27 proposed budget (Docket #0873 filed on 4/22/2026).

The full FY27 proposed operating budget with all reductions and increases to departments can be found [here](#). Since the filing of your 17F Request, the Administration has attended 31 hearings to answer questions from the City Council regarding any program or staffing changes.

As stated when filing the budget, federal relief funding and City investments over the past four years enabled Boston to increase services for residents by supporting small businesses and nonprofit partners, fill vacant storefronts, expand cultural programming across our neighborhoods, and much more.

In evaluating the FY27 budget, the Administration faced rising fixed costs and significantly tighter fiscal conditions than in prior years. In order to protect the core services residents rely on most, we made difficult decisions across many discretionary areas of the budget, including reducing or removing funding for the list of grant programs attached.

These decisions were not made lightly and do not reflect the value, effectiveness, or importance of these programs and the work supported through these grants. In fact, many of these programs were selected for grant funding precisely because of the meaningful benefits they provide to residents.

Wherever possible, we have preserved City programs that provide similar services and are leveraging public-private partnerships to help supplement community-based programming. In FY27, we also expect to leverage federal, state, philanthropic, and participatory budgeting funds to open grant programs that will support partnerships with community organizations. City grant programs are, and will continue to be, distributed through an open, competitive process and will be posted on boston.gov/grants. Grants are monitored by City departments to ensure funds are used effectively in support of Boston residents.



We will continue to work with partners across the City to support organizations and businesses that serve our residents. Our City staff remain committed to delivering excellent services in every department within the proposed budget.

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS OF THE SITE:

The Swallow Mansion, built in 1845, is architecturally significant as a rare Boston-area example of a Greek Revival temple-form house with a full-height columned portico capped by a pediment. Although the Greek Revival style was common throughout New England, only a handful of homes in Boston are temple-fronts with full-height porches. With the monumentality of its columns, entablature, and pediment, the Swallow Mansion could be considered the finest example of a Greek Revival house in Charlestown, and one of the finest in all of Boston. Set back from the street, the house's position on its site is also unique for its neighborhood. From the south end of Cordis Street, the Swallow Mansion rests on its foundation like a temple projecting from the incline of Breed's Hill.

The Swallow Mansion is best known as the home of the Swallow family, whose grocery store chain and foray into local politics were well known in Boston during the second half of the nineteenth century. However, a closer look at the house's past reveals that this is only one part of its rich history. The report is intended solely for the use of management, the Audit Committee, other related entities, its legal counsel and regulatory authorities, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The **Boston Main Streets** review was performed by the Advisory Group at the request of Boston’s City Auditor. Our review encompassed two objectives. The first objective, Phase I, was to evaluate the adequacy of related processes and controls of the Boston Main Streets program. The second objective, Phase II was to perform a three-year lookback on transactional activity recorded in Salesforce, the system of record, to verify appropriate documents were retained, accurately processed, and supported to substantiate recorded disbursements.

These objectives were not designed or intended to be a forensic audit.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation for the cooperation and assistance we received from management and employees during our review.

Scope and Results Summary

The objectives of the review were:

Audit Area	Phase 1 – Control Evaluation
Scope of Coverage	Determine that adequate operational and financial controls over the management and oversight of the Boston Main Streets program are in place and working as intended.

Audit Area	Phase 2 – Transactional Lookback

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Finding	<p>The control environment over processing and disbursing Boston Main Streets program-related transactions can be enhanced to include proactive fraud prevention and resolution. There is no automated fraud monitoring system or controls in place to detect and respond to potentially fraudulent transactions or activities in real time.</p> <p>The implementation of a fraud monitoring system and proactive fraud prevention controls decreases the risk of undetected fraud, waste, and misuse of public funds.</p>
Recommendation	<p>Implement a fraud monitoring system capable of analyzing activity, flagging anomalies, and supporting investigating workflows for the Boston Main Streets program.</p>

Recommendation	<p>Update the above-mentioned narrative as needed and ensure the “End of Year Narrative FY25” document includes activity from the current year. Ensure the review process going forward includes this component.</p>
Management's Response	<p>The Small Business office in the Economic Opportunity and Inclusion Cabinet implemented procedures to ensure annual information is up-to-date and current. These were implemented prior to June 30, 2025 and do not allow information to be carried forward.</p>

Title	3. Salesforce Transactions
<p>Finding</p>	<p>Management lacks administrative oversight of Salesforce to ensure all transactional activity is appropriately captured, monitored, and reported. Approximately 80% of transactions for the year were received during August 2023.</p> <p>Missing transactions increases the risk of financial reporting errors, reputation criticism, and potential financial loss.</p>

<p>Finding</p>	<p>Management has not consistently retained and processed all documentation in Salesforce as required by Policy. Testing of transactions during the lookback period identified the following exceptions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Twenty-five transactions had no supporting documentation retained on file. • Two transaction request forms included food and sales tax, which conflicts with the Eligible Expense Policy. • Two transaction amounts did not agree to supporting documentation. • One transaction had a date on the request form that did not agree to supporting documentation. <p>Details of each exception identified above were provided to management.</p>
<p>Recommendation</p>	<p>Implement the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Review and assess all project records to ensure supporting documentation is attached.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Verify the appropriate amount and date is stated to ensure agreement between the request form, system of record, and supporting source documentation. • Enhance language stated in policy on sales tax, food, beverages, and alcohol are not eligible to align with current processes and HUD standards.
<p>Management's Response</p>	<p>The department continues to update their policies and procedures to ensure that all payments have accurate and appropriate documentation to support amounts paid.</p>

- Reviewed the Boston Main Streets Executive Director Handbook, Boston Main Streets Grants Policy, Boston Main Streets Reporting and Reimbursement procedures for three Fiscal Years (FY) specifically 2025-2023, Boston Main Streets Reporting Schedule procedure for FY 2025-2023, Boston Main Streets Eligible Expenses procedure for FY 2025-2023, and Small Business Unit Program Policies and Procedures.

Background and Identified Fraud Scheme

The Boston Main Streets Program currently supports the following 20 independent nonprofit organizations:

The program operates under the oversight of the Office of Economic Opportunity & Inclusion (OEOI), specifically through the Office of Small Business. Each district receives financial and technical assistance, with funding primarily sourced from the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, supplemented by non-CDBG funding for districts not eligible for CDBG assistance.

The program operates on a reimbursement basis, with districts required to submit monthly reimbursement requests including itemized expenses, receipts, proof of payment, and bank statements. The approval process involves multiple required stages of review, including NBM, Program Director, Director of Small Business, Compliance, Accounting, and Operations.

The Boston Finance Commissions for the City's Three Squares Main Street program discovered a fraudulent related incident during the period. Specifically, an altered bank statement was discovered resulting in approximately \$32,000 in funds missing. The current controls in place are designed to include multiple required stages of review. The level and type of review is different across multiple individuals. For example, the NBM is the initial reviewer that verifies the appropriate documents are collected in alignment with program requirements. This review process is different in nature than what is completed in Accounting which verifies vendor information, accurate payment records, appropriate postings to the general ledger, and disbursement through ACH or check. The review process is completed by multiple individuals across different departments but can be enhanced to include fraud prevention controls preventative in nature instead of detective in nature. There is not a Fraud monitoring related system in place which would be used to monitor and track anomalies, suspicious activity, and irregularities in real time. Please see Finding #1 in our Findings and Recommendation section for more information.

Overview of Program and Controls

With an annual budget of \$2.5 million, the program supports a network of 20 independent nonprofit Main Street organizations across Boston's districts. Each participating organization follows the National Trust for Historic Preservation's comprehensive Main Street Four-Point Approach, focusing on economic vitality, design, promotion, and organization to revitalize neighborhood areas. The program provides substantial financial support to each district, with annual funding of up to \$125,000 per organization, \$100,000 of which is allocated for administrative and operating expenses, and \$25,000 designated for community programming activities.

The program's funding structure relies primarily on federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, supplemented by non-CDBG and City operating funds to ensure comprehensive coverage across all districts. Program oversight is centralized under dedicated Neighborhood Business Managers (NBM) assigned to specific districts based on factors such as language requirements, experience, and geographic considerations. This structure ensures personalized attention and specialized support for each participating organization while maintaining consistent program standards and accountability measures.

Financial controls operate on a reimbursement basis, requiring participating organizations to submit detailed monthly documentation including itemized expenses, receipts, invoices, and bank statements as proof of payment. The approval process incorporates multiple required stages of review across various departments. All documentation and approvals are systematically tracked through Salesforce, providing a complete audit trail from initial submission to final payment authorization.

Monitoring and oversight activities are structured around a risk-based approach that tailors supervision intensity to each organization's assessed risk level. Annual subrecipient risk assessments evaluate multiple factors to determine appropriate monitoring frequency, ranging from three to ten site visits per year depending on the organization's risk profile. The monitoring framework includes standardized site visits using established checklists, monthly surveys and compliance tracking through Google forms, quarterly financial and narrative reporting requirements, and annual workplan and budget submissions. These activities are designed to ensure ongoing compliance with program requirements while providing technical assistance and support to participating organizations.

The program operates within a formal compliance framework established through standardized agreements (CM-20 and CM-21) that detail specific terms, conditions, and performance expectations for each participating organization. Procurement oversight ensures that grant terms comply with federal regulations and legal requirements.

The Salesforce platform serves as the primary document management and approval workflow system, while Google forms facilitate data collection for surveys and compliance tracking, the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS) handles federal reporting requirements and fund drawdown processes, and the PeopleSoft financial system manages payment processing and accounting functions.

Dear Mayor Wu and Administrator Bok,

An elevator at Boston Housing Authority (BHA) Ruth Barkley apartments failed for almost 22 hours yesterday. This morning, I was on-site with a resident, a disabled, double amputee in a wheelchair, who was not able to get into his apartment to get his medication as a result of the elevator failure. Consequently, he was forced to sleep outside of South Station overnight because BHA did not provide him with a hotel voucher to stay while he could not access his apartment. Reportedly, BHA staff insisted that he call the fire department to carry him upstairs, an option that left him with no dignity.

Thankfully, a neighbor stepped up to pick him up from South Station this morning and retrieve his medication from his apartment. We can not continue to normalize elevator failures at Ruth Barkley apartments and force our neighbors in public housing to sleep outside in a situation that could have been entirely avoidable.

As you know, the Boston Housing Authority was fined \$363,000 (with a reduction to 1%, amounting to \$3,630) as a result of the investigation into the Ruth Barkley Apartments' elevator failures. I'm grateful to the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board for taking these public safety violations and quality of life issues involving the BHA seriously.

In light of this troubling incident, I am again respectfully requesting a full investigation into any and all BHA properties with an elevator, including Ruth Barkley Apartments. BHA and its contractors must be held fully accountable for every elevator failure, and all related complaints must be promptly reported to the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board. Residents have repeatedly shared that these persistent breakdowns leave them feeling unsafe, unwanted, neglected and forgotten. As you know, I have held a City Council hearing the last two years where seniors and persons with disabilities shared heartbreaking stories - being unable to make appointments, pick up medication, or make it to their unit to use the restroom. We all know that is not right and unacceptable.

I advocated for a Boston Housing Authority Elevator Safety Commission to be established and composed of representatives from the BHA Task Force, as well as representatives from BHA leadership, the Boston Fire Department, the Inspectional Services Department, the Disabilities Commission, a City Council member, and a representative from the elevator maintenance industry. Please note I am offering to Chair this Commission because we can no longer ignore these dangerous public safety issues across the City of Boston.

The Committee on Public Safety and Criminal Justice was referred the following docket for consideration:

Docket #0969, Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Twelve Million Five Hundred Seventy-Three Thousand Six Hundred Four Dollars (\$12,573,604.00) in the form of a grant, 2026 FIFA World Cup Grant Program, awarded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, passed through the MA Executive Office of Public Safety & Security, to be administered by the Office of Emergency Preparedness. The grant would fund support to the safety and security needs of our Massachusetts state and local entities directly involved with providing services for the Boston 2026 World Cup event.

This matter was sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu, and was referred to the Committee on May 13, 2026.

Summary of Legislation

Docket #0969 is a grant that would fund support for the safety and security needs of the state and local entities involved with providing services for the Boston 2026 World Cup event.

Information Received at Hearing

On Thursday, May 28, 2026, the Committee convened a hearing to consider Docket #0969. The following testified on behalf of the administration: Adrian Jordan, Chief of Emergency Management; Sean Martin, Assistant Bureau Chief of Field Services, Boston Police Department (BPD); Kevin Coyne, Deputy Commissioner of Administration & Finance, Boston Fire Department (BFD); Neal Mullane, Deputy, Office of Field Services, BFD; and Malik Canty, Director of Administration & Finance, Office of Emergency Management (OEM).

The panel outlined the planned use of the awarded funds, explaining that Boston received these resources through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), with grant administration managed by the state Executive Office of Public Safety and Security (EOPSS) Office of Grants and Research. They emphasized that the funding is intended to enhance public safety, strengthen emergency management capabilities, and support operational readiness in advance of the FIFA World Cup 2026.

As Boston prepares to host multiple large-scale events ranging from official matches to fan experiences and regional gatherings, the City anticipates a significant increase in public safety and emergency response needs. This funding is reimbursement-based and may be used only for allowable, pre-approved grant expenditures in accordance with FEMA, Department of Homeland Security (DHS), and Commonwealth requirements.

The grant does not create any long-term financial obligation for the City's operating budget and is intended to offset costs associated with hosting and securing FIFA World Cup related activities.

I transmit herewith for your approval an Order authorizing the City of Boston to appropriate the amount of forty-seven million one hundred and twenty thousand two hundred ninety-two dollars (\$47,120,292) for purposes of funding the Snow & Winter Management appropriation to meet operating expenses of the fiscal period commencing July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026.


As noted in our March update to the Council, even as revenues have come in at or above target in this current fiscal year, historic snowfall levels in early 2026 resulted in a deficit in the snow removal budget that surpassed what could be managed through standard adjustments. This reflects a broader regional trend; nearly 80 percent of communities in Massachusetts had to secure additional funding to cover snow-related costs exceeding their budgets in FY25. In five of the six fiscal years prior to FY25, the City of Boston underspent our budgeted snow removal line, resulting in surpluses that accumulated in the general fund and contributed to the City's reserve balances. This year's storm activity is precisely the kind of unforeseen, non-recurring cost that reserves exist to address.

Spending controls, including delayed hiring, for FY26 were first put into place in December 2025 in order to both manage current year uncertainty with the spike in health insurance costs for City employees and prepare for a FY27 budget under continued federal economic stress. In response to the significant snowfall and projected \$48.4 million deficit in March 2026, additional, stricter expenditure controls, including continued delayed hiring and freezes on non-personnel expenditures, were put into place so that the City could minimize any additional deficit. These expenditure controls will remain active through the end of the fiscal year and continue to mitigate overall FY26 costs.

This request is a reflection of responsible fiscal management to close the fiscal year with a balanced budget after careful oversight to mitigate unexpected one-time expenses. Boston's top bond rating with a stable outlook, affirmed by both major rating agencies earlier this month, reflects disciplined financial stewardship, strong reserves, and a consistent commitment to meeting the City's long-term obligations. That standing gives us the flexibility to deploy reserves as intended—to address extraordinary, one-time costs without disrupting the core services our residents rely on. This appropriation is consistent with that approach and leaves the City on solid financial footing.

The expenditures related to this appropriation are considered extraordinary and one-time in nature as non-recurring costs of the City, and therefore, are appropriate to be funded with non-recurring revenue. As such, unrestricted prior-year budgetary fund balance, or free cash, will be used as the source of funding for this request. The City's free cash has been certified by the Director of Accounts at the Massachusetts Department of Revenue and is now available for appropriation. I respectfully request your favorable action on this order.

The Committee on Ways and Means was referred the following docket for consideration:

Docket #1030, Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to appropriate the amount of Forty-Seven Million One Hundred Twenty Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-Two Dollars (\$47,120,292.00) for purposes of funding the Snow & Winter Management appropriation to meet operating expenses of the fiscal period commencing July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026

This matter was sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu and was referred to the Committee on May 20, 2026.

Summary of Legislation

Docket #1030 is a message and order authorizing the City of Boston to appropriate the amount of Forty-Seven Million One Hundred Twenty Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-Two Dollars (\$47,120,292) for purposes of funding the snow and winter management appropriation needed to meet operating costs for fiscal year 2026 (FY26).

Massachusetts General Law Chapter 44 § 31D allows any town or city to incur liability and make expenditures in any fiscal year in excess of available appropriations for snow and ice removal provided the following: such expenditures are approved by the chief administrative officer and the appropriation for such purposes in said fiscal year equaled or exceeded the appropriation for said purposes in the prior fiscal year.

In FY25 the City budgeted \$22,468,938 in snow and winter management; in FY26, the City budgeted \$22,676,037, thereby allowing it to exceed appropriations for FY26.

This appropriation requests appropriating funds from the budgetary fund balance, which has been certified by the Director of Accounts (within the State's Department of Revenue) pursuant to Chapter 59 § 23 of Massachusetts General Laws. The budgetary fund balance (commonly referred to as "free cash") is the portion of available reserves, generated to a considerable degree by annual operating surpluses, which the City can responsibly appropriate for spending. The appropriation of free cash certified by the Department of Revenue is only considered to offset certain fixed costs (such as pensions and other post-employment benefits, or OPEB) or to fund extraordinary and non-recurring events as determined by the City auditor. This appropriation is categorized as the latter.

In recent fiscal years, prior appropriations from the budgetary fund balance were for the OPEB trust fund and the Housing Accelerator fund. Please see below for a history of the budgetary fund balance as certified by the Director of Accounts within the Department of Revenue.

Information Received at Hearing

The Committee held a hearing on Wednesday, May 27, 2026 to discuss Docket #1030. Ashley Groffenberger, Chief Financial Officer, City of Boston, and Jim Williamson, Budget Director, City of Boston testified on behalf of the administration.

Director Williamson provided a brief overview of the docket being discussed. He reiterated the Administration continues to value the shared responsibility with the City Council to safeguard the City's limited public resources and serve the City's residents. He provided an overview of the impacts of this appropriation alongside the appropriation being discussed in the afternoon (Docket #1031).

Director Williamson stated the funding source that will support these appropriations will be free cash, which has been most recently certified at \$601M. The City started FY26 by budgeting \$40M for the Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB) trust fund, a practice it has employed for several fiscal years. Combining the OPEB appropriations with the two appropriations aforementioned (Docket #1030, the subject of this hearing, and Docket #1031, the BPS appropriation) the total drawdown on the balance will be \$110M. Additionally, the FY27 budget includes another \$40M appropriation to the OPEB trust fund, meaning the City will draw down \$150M from the free cash balance over two fiscal years, or approximately 24% of the balance.

The snow and winter management supplemental will cover snow and ice contractors for the Public Works Department (PWD), Boston Public Schools (BPS), Parks and Recreation, and the Mayor's Office of Housing (MOH). The City provides for snow and ice removal for all roads open to public travel, municipal parking lots, public stairways, and is the landlord for City owned lots, requiring the clearing of sidewalks in front of said lots. Expense items include contractors for emergency response and post-storm removals, staff overtime (which includes managing contractors and driving trucks for roadway treatment), roadway treatment/salt, the renting and operating of snow melters, City equipment repair and debt payment (for equipment such as snow spreaders and plow blades), and weather monitoring costs. The renting and operating of snow melters was a unique one time expense, as the City moves excess snow from major thoroughfares into snow farms, which are often housed at City owned assets (like the municipal golf course). As the City reduces the number of assets under its control, the number of snow farms has reduced, requiring the need for snow melters to make space in storage areas.

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Director Williamson provided context for the increased snow removal costs. He stated the City is not alone amongst Massachusetts municipalities in requesting a free cash appropriation to cover snow and winter management costs. Nearly 80% of Massachusetts communities had to secure additional funding to cover snow-related costs exceeding their budgets. He stated the reporting deadline for the utilization of said free cash is not until September 15th. He reiterated the sensitivity of municipal budgets to snow costs, evidenced by the procedures and State laws enforced by the Department of Revenue to manage snow costs.

Director Williamson provided context for the 2025-2026 winter season. In this season, Boston accumulated a total of 61.6 inches of snow, marking it the coldest and snowiest winter in 11 years. Temperatures averaged -2.1 degree Fahrenheit below normal, reversing a 10-year warming trend (+3 degrees Fahrenheit over normal). The City managed 20 distinct winter weather events this winter, requiring continuous ice response. The following are major 2025-2026 winter storms: January 25-26 (23.2 inches of snow in a 36-hour window), February 22-24–Winter Storm Hernando (17.1 inches of snow). Winter Storm Hernando was concentrated mostly in Rhode Island and South Eastern Massachusetts, leading to a lower accumulation of snow in Suffolk County; therefore, the county did not meet the eligibility for FEMA reimbursement.

Director Williamson stated even prior to the winter, the City had implemented spending controls due to revenue not meeting expected totals, amongst other financial constraints. The City implemented a controlled hiring process which has led to more modest personnel savings and has tried to incorporate said savings into its February projection for the FY26 deficit (which was communicated to the Council in February). Other spending controls include additional spending restrictions implemented in March that have driven modest savings across contracted services, supplies, and equipment. The City did maintain continued hiring for essential roles such as 911 call takers, lifeguards, and parking enforcement officers. He stated spending control gains have been offset by both World Cup security costs and increased energy costs since the start of the Iran War. He reiterated the supplemental appropriation being requested should allow the City to end the fiscal year on balance.

Committee Chair Recommended Action

As Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means, I recommend moving the listed docket from the Committee to the full Council for discussion and formal action. At this time, my recommendation to the full Council will be that this matter **OUGHT TO PASS**.

Dear Councilors:

I transmit herewith for your approval an Order authorizing the City of Boston to appropriate the amount of twenty-two million, eight hundred forty-five thousand, six hundred seventy-two dollars (\$22,845,672) for purposes of funding Boston Public Schools to meet operating expenses of the fiscal period commencing July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026. This appropriation request was approved by the Boston School Committee on May 6, 2026, and is intended to cover projected deficits in health insurance (\$18,087,750) and utility spending (\$4,757,922).

Over the course of FY26, BPS has been managing projected cost overruns in a number of areas, including historically high health care premiums, yellow bus transportation, and student food services. In November 2025, the district paused Central Office hiring, stipends, and contracts; and in December 2025 expanded to district-wide controls. Through these spending controls and active management, the projected deficit has decreased by approximately \$20 million.

Current projections for the remaining FY26 budget deficit are primarily due to health insurance and utility costs, both of which have seen unusual and unexpected cost growth this year. The administration has taken proactive steps to manage these areas of spending in our proposed FY27 budget and beyond to ensure that BPS can continue to invest in core academic priorities—even amid a challenging budgetary environment.

The expenditures related to this appropriation are one-time in nature and non-recurring costs of the City, and therefore are appropriate to be funded with non-recurring revenue. As such, unrestricted prior-year budgetary fund balance, or free cash, will be used as the source of funding for this request. The City's free cash has been certified by the Director of Accounts at the Massachusetts Department of Revenue and is now available for appropriation. I respectfully request your favorable action on this order.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIR

May 27, 2026

Dear Councilors,

The Committee on Ways and Means was referred the following docket for consideration:

Docket #1031, Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to appropriate the amount of Twenty-Two Million Eight Hundred Forty-Five Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Two Dollars (\$22,845,672.00) for purposes of funding Boston Public Schools to meet operating expenses of the fiscal period commencing July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026. This appropriation request was approved by the Boston School Committee on May 6, 2026, and is intended to cover projected deficits in health insurance (\$18,087,750.00) and utility spending (\$4,757,922.00).

This matter was sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu and was referred to the Committee on May 20, 2026.

Summary of Legislation

Docket #1031

Boston Public Schools (BPS) has faced unexpected cost pressures in Fiscal Year 2026 and is anticipating overruns in multiple areas, including healthcare for employees, utilities for facilities, transportation for students, and food services for students. BPS introduced spending controls for their Central Office in November 2025, and expanded those spending controls district wide in December 2025. BPS estimates that it reduced its projected end of year deficit by \$20 million. This appropriation order would address the remaining projected deficit in health insurance and utility spending.

This appropriation order would appropriate \$22,845,267.00 for BPS to cover BPS's projected end of fiscal year deficit, of which \$18,087,750.00 is intended for health insurance and \$4,757,922.00 is intended for utility spending. The Boston School Committee, which votes on appropriation orders for Boston Public Schools before the City Council, approved this appropriation order at the Committee meeting on May 6, 2026. This appropriation order is funded by a one time withdrawal from the City's available funds on hand. The Mayor's accompanying message indicates that, since the expenses are extraordinary one-time and non-recurring expenses, the amount will be allocated from the City's certified free cash, which was certified by the Director of Accounts at the Massachusetts Department of Revenue as being \$601,601,14 at the beginning of the fiscal year in July 2025.

Information Received at Hearing

The Committee held a hearing on Wednesday, May 27, 2026 to discuss Docket #1031. Chief Financial Officer of Boston Public Schools David Bloom testified on behalf of the Administration.

Chief Bloom explained that BPS has or anticipates cost overruns in several areas, primarily driven by the forecasted overrun in health insurance, increased salary costs due to lower-than-expected vacancy rates, transportation, special education, and utilities.

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Chief Bloom outlined BPS's cost-saving efforts, noting that BPS saved an anticipated \$26 million by pausing Central Office discretionary spending in November and school-based discretionary spending in December. Additionally, Chief Bloom stated that BPS closed another \$6 million of the projected deficit through active cost management strategies in transportation, facilities, food services, reviewing Individualized Education Programs, and identifying available grant funds.

Despite cost-saving measures, Chief Bloom explained that at the end of March, BPS determined the forecasted end of fiscal year deficit to be \$28.3 million and that the requested \$22.8 million supplemental appropriation is intended to cover the outstanding deficits in health insurance and utilities. He noted that the remaining \$5.5 million of the \$28.3 million anticipated deficit will be managed through continued spending pauses, further cost-saving measures, and identifying available grant revenues, expressing confidence that the district would successfully balance its budget by the end of the fiscal year.

In response to questions from Councilors, Chief Bloom described changes to BPS's budget forecasting models to adjust for shortcomings in this year's forecast. Regarding health insurance, he stated that appropriating funds for BPS health insurance costs separately from the BPS budget would be logistically complicated and would not alter anything substantive for BPS's budget. Chief Bloom also clarified that while the district is not laying off educators with three or more years of experience, some educators did not have their contracts renewed, and despite efforts to match educators to available jobs within the district, some are still expected to depart BPS. He offered to provide final numbers on expected departures related to the district's ongoing right-sizing efforts when the numbers are available.

Committee Chair Recommended Action

As Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means, I recommend moving the listed docket from the Committee to the full Council for discussion and formal action. At this time, my recommendation to the full Council will be that this matter **OUGHT TO PASS**.

ORDINANCE TO REQUIRE QUARTERLY REVENUE REPORTS TO BE PROVIDED TO THE CITY COUNCIL

WHEREAS, The Boston City Council is provided with quarterly expenditure reports as required in the City Charter; *and*

WHEREAS, Under a prior agreement with the former chair of the Committee on Ways & Means, the Council received quarterly revenue reports from the Office of Budget Management; *and*

WHEREAS, Although the City Council currently has no power to set estimated revenues for the city, transparency about revenue streams would provide more information and data behind the city's annual revenue projections; *and*

WHEREAS, Boston underestimated revenue projections by an average of \$216 million from Fiscal Years 2022 through 2025; *and*

WHEREAS, While higher-than-expected interest from investment drove some of that surplus, even subtracting that line item, the city underprojected by \$171 million in FY22, \$244 million in FY23, \$144 million in FY24 and \$58 million in FY25; *and*

WHEREAS, At the state level, revenue reports are released monthly so that revenue collection can be tracked to prior trends and the Legislature can adjust accordingly; *and*

WHEREAS, The City Council, when being asked to authorize supplemental funds for FY26 and approve a budget based on downward revenue estimates in FY27, should have a more transparent view into the city's revenues than is being offered; *and*

WHEREAS, Revenue reports should be produced without request on a quarterly basis; **NOW, THEREFORE**

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

Section 1.

The City of Boston Code, Ordinances, Chapter 5, Section 1.5 is hereby amended by inserting the following language immediately after the fourth sentence:

“The Supervisor of Budgets shall be required to provide quarterly revenue reports detailing all revenue collected to date by item, no later than 30 days after the end of the fiscal quarter.”

Section 2.

The provisions of this ordinance are severable and if any provision, or portion thereof, should be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions, which remain in full force and effect.

Section 3.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be effective immediately upon passage.

WHEREAS, The Boston City Council is provided with quarterly expenditure reports as required in the City Charter; *and*

WHEREAS, Under a prior agreement with the former chair of the Committee on Ways & Means, the Council received quarterly revenue reports from the Office of Budget Management; *and*

WHEREAS, Although the City Council currently has no power to set estimated revenues for the city, transparency about revenue streams would provide more information and data behind the city's annual revenue projections; *and*

WHEREAS, Boston underestimated revenue projections by an average of \$216 million from Fiscal Years 2022 through 2025; *and*

WHEREAS, While higher-than-expected interest from investment drove some of that surplus, even subtracting that line item, the city underprojected by \$171 million in FY22, \$244 million in FY23, \$144 million in FY24 and \$58 million in FY25; *and*

WHEREAS, Under current law, only the Mayor shall allocate funds from a surplus, allowing the Mayor to freely use it for legal settlements, overtime, and snow removal, in addition to later allocating it to debt payments or other funds through free cash, a fund that the administration has allocated \$260 million from in the past 18 months; *and*

WHEREAS, At the state level, revenue reports are released monthly so that revenue collection can be tracked to prior trends and the Legislature can adjust accordingly; *and*

WHEREAS, City Councilors and Boston residents deserve to see trends in revenue on a quarterly basis so that they can better conceptualize the ups and downs of each line item across a fiscal year; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**

RESOLVED: That the Boston City Council officially recognizes that the Finance Cabinet should produce quarterly revenue reports no later than 30 days after the fiscal quarter concludes.

WHEREAS, Boston's Main Streets programs were created to support neighborhood commercial districts through revitalization, small business assistance, and community engagement, with millions in city and federal funding distributed annually; *and*

WHEREAS, In 2025, the Boston Finance Commission uncovered alleged financial irregularities at Three Squares Main Streets in Jamaica Plain, including forged bank statement transactions and the potential misuse of nearly \$150,000 in federal grants; *and*

WHEREAS, The discrepancies were flagged by a city employee who demonstrated accountability and civic responsibility in reporting suspicious financial activity; *and*

WHEREAS, In response, the City contracted Wolf & Company, a national CPA and consulting firm, to conduct a wide-ranging audit of up to 20 Main Streets organizations across the city, with a three-year agreement capped at \$150,000; *and*

WHEREAS, The Wolf & Company audit report, published in December 2025, found that internal controls did not meet reasonable standards to manage risk. The report also confirmed fraud involving approximately \$32,000 in missing funds through an altered bank statement, and found that two Main Streets programs did not accurately report their annual narratives in their FY24 submissions; *and*

WHEREAS, The findings and report raise broader concerns about financial oversight, internal controls, and transparency in the administration of city-supported nonprofit programs; *and*

WHEREAS, Dozens of other Main Streets organizations across Boston continue to operate with integrity, providing valuable services and support to small businesses and commercial corridors; *and*

WHEREAS, It is the duty of the City Council to ensure that all public funds are used for their intended purposes, and that the community trust in city-supported nonprofit

partnerships is upheld through proper stewardship and accountability; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss Boston's Main Streets Programs and the recently released Wolf & Company audit, and that the Mayor's Office of Economic Opportunity and Inclusion, the Boston Finance Commission, Wolf & Company, relevant Boston Main Streets Programs, and other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

AUTHORITY TO ADOPT, AMEND, OR REJECT THE ANNUAL BUDGET
UNDER THE BOSTON CITY CHARTER**

WHEREAS, The Fiscal Year 2027 budget process has generated significant public discussion regarding the scope of the Boston City Council's authority under the Boston City Charter; *and*

WHEREAS, The 2021 Charter Amendment established a shared budget process between the Mayor and the City Council and explicitly states that "the mayor and city council of the City of Boston shall hold budgetary powers together"; *and*

WHEREAS, The Charter grants the City Council the authority to take definite action on the annual budget by adopting, amending, or rejecting it; *and*

WHEREAS, Recent public statements have suggested that the Council's primary responsibility is limited to proposing amendments to the Mayor's budget, raising questions regarding the intended purpose and practical use of the Council's rejection authority; *and*

WHEREAS, Budget rejection has historically existed as a legislative tool available to governing bodies throughout the United States to express policy disagreement, seek additional negotiations, elevate public concerns, and exercise independent oversight over executive spending priorities; *and*

WHEREAS, Residents, advocates, labor organizations, service providers, and community stakeholders have raised concerns regarding proposed Fiscal Year 2027 reductions affecting youth employment, food access, immigrant services, housing stability programs, arts and culture initiatives, equity-focused programs, and other community investments;; *and*

WHEREAS, The public deserves a clear understanding of the legal, historical, procedural, and democratic purposes of the City Council's budgetary powers, including the circumstances under which adoption, amendment, or rejection may be appropriate legislative responses; *and*

WHEREAS, Transparency regarding the intent of the 2021 Charter Amendment is necessary to ensure meaningful public participation in Boston's budget process and to preserve the balance of powers between the legislative and executive branches of municipal government; ***NOW THEREFORE BE IT***

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to examine the City Council's authority under the Boston City Charter to adopt, amend, or reject the annual budget; the intent and implementation of the 2021 Charter Amendment establishing shared budget powers; the role of budget rejection as a tool of oversight, accountability, and democratic governance; the impact of current budget procedures on public participation and Council decision-making; and potential charter, ordinance, or procedural changes to strengthen transparency and clarify the Council's budgetary authority. Representatives from the Law Department, legal scholars, public finance experts, former elected officials, advocates, and members of the public shall be invited to testify.

- WHEREAS,** The Mayor's Office of Housing owns 915 vacant lots across the city, including 187 in District 4; *and*
- WHEREAS,** That number is only a portion of the vacant lots across the city, which could be used for the creation of residential or commercial property; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The Mayor's Office of Housing has successfully launched three phases of Welcome Home Boston and an expansion of GROW Boston in order to utilize some of the vacant lots; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Hundreds of city-owned vacant lots remain, including more than 100 in District 4 as well as a number of privately owned vacant lots; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The current zoning laws require a minimum lot size ranging from 3,000 to 7,000 square feet across District 4 for single-family to three-family units; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Vacant lots are often targeted for illegal dumping, storage of vehicles, and numerous other code enforcement violations; *and*
- WHEREAS,** In District 4, more than 60 vacant city-owned lots are under the 3,000 square-foot minimum lot requirement and dozens more are smaller than the 7,000 square-foot minimum lot requirement; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Cities across the country, including Spokane, Washington, and Austin, Texas, have reduced their minimum lot size in order to spur building production; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Boston's Squares and Streets program relies primarily on building lot coverage and setback requirements rather than minimum lot size; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Removing the minimum lot size requirement across District 4 would allow for the creation of additional housing by right on vacant lots, and would allow for more existing housing in the district to conform with current zoning regulations; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing about eliminating minimum lot size in District 4, and that the Planning Department, Mayor's Office of Housing, and other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

WHEREAS, The FY27 budget proposal states that many of the functions previously performed by the Boston Human Rights Commission will be absorbed by other departments within the Equity Cabinet and supplemented through a heavier reliance on existing state resources; *and*

WHEREAS, The City Council has a responsibility to examine the implications of eliminating the Boston Human Rights Commission, including the potential impacts on civil rights enforcement, discrimination complaint intake and resolution, community outreach, language access, and public trust in local government institutions; *and*

WHEREAS, Questions remain regarding whether existing Equity Cabinet departments possess the staffing, expertise, resources, and operational capacity necessary to effectively absorb the Commission’s responsibilities and whether state agencies can adequately address the needs of Boston residents in a timely and accessible manner; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing regarding the proposed elimination of the Boston Human Rights Commission in the FY27 Operating Budget and the transfer of its responsibilities to other Equity Cabinet departments, and that representatives of the Equity Cabinet and other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

WHEREAS, In a city of more than 700,000 people, public bathrooms remain a scarce resource for many residents across the City of Boston, with entire areas of the city that do not have public facilities outside of privately-owned spaces that may allow for occasional access to the public, which is not the same as a public restroom that is freely accessible to our residents when they need it; *and*

WHEREAS, This points to a lack of proper space for people to address their needs in private, and compounds disparities for already marginalized populations such as those with disabilities and/or health complications, and breastfeeding and menstruating residents who need access to free, sanitary, private spaces to take care of their needs; *and*

WHEREAS, While libraries and community centers offer access to public bathrooms when they're open, many of those facilities are open for 8 hours a day and less than 7 days a week, leaving sporadic public access; *and*

WHEREAS, The lack of access to free public restrooms poses a significant public health concern with the potential to contribute to the spread of illness and disease; *and*

WHEREAS, Other cities present examples of sustainable public bathroom programs, such as Cambridge, which piloted a successful Portland Loo model in 2018 that has now become a neighborhood staple; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to examine best practices and models for establishing and maintaining free and accessible public restrooms across the City of Boston, and that members from the Parks Department, Public Works, the Boston Water and Sewer Commission, the Boston Public Health Commission, advocates and experts in public health, disability rights and feminist equity spaces, and other interested parties shall be invited to attend and testify.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS THE 2025 BOSTON FIREARM TRAFFICKING REPORT

WHEREAS, Gun violence is a leading cause of death and injuries in this country, causing harm to not only the individual, but also to communities that experience gun violence in their neighborhoods; *and*

WHEREAS, In October of 2022, the City Council unanimously adopted a resolution declaring gun violence as a public health emergency. In November of 2023, the Boston City Council approved an ordinance requiring the Boston Police Department to study the trafficking of illegal firearms and publish a report every year on their findings; *and*

WHEREAS, According to Boston Police Crime Stats, from January 1, 2025 to December 28, 2025, there were 122 shooting victims; *and*

WHEREAS, Gun trafficking and illegal flow of firearms is a major contributor to gun violence, with the Boston Police recovering 819 total illegal firearms in 2025, down from 901 in 2024. There were 470 arrests for firearm related charges in 2025. 73 of the arrests were juveniles, an increase of 13% compared to 2024; *and*

WHEREAS, With growing concerns relating to “ghost guns,” an illegal firearm that is either not registered, or made from a 3D printer, it is critical that the Boston Police Department continue to collect data to help law enforcement and policymakers better understand the impact of illegal gun trafficking. According to the report, 54 crime guns recovered were privately manufactured, or “ghost guns”; *and*

WHEREAS, With ongoing concerns relating to gun violence in the Boston area, including a shooting at a hotel near TD Garden, a shooting on Memorial Drive in Cambridge involving a rifle, and a shooting leaving one person dead on Bowdoin Street, it is critical that the Boston City Council closely evaluates last year’s illegal firearm trafficking report to reduce gun violence in Boston; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss the 2025 Boston Firearm Report. Representatives from the Boston Police Department shall be invited to testify.

WHEREAS, The Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) community has made great contributions to our city and country, and generations of our AAPI residents have enriched all aspects of our city and nation's history; *and*,

WHEREAS, According to the most recent American Community Survey (ACS 2024), approximately 10.2% of Boston residents and 7.5% of Massachusetts residents identify as Asian American, and Asian Americans continue to be the fastest-growing racial or ethnic group in both the Commonwealth and the nation; *and*,

WHEREAS, Boston is home to the largest AAPI population in Massachusetts, including the third-largest Chinatown in the United States, a vibrant and growing Vietnamese community in Dorchester, and many other AAPI communities across Allston-Brighton, Roslindale, Jamaica Plain, East Boston, and other neighborhoods; *and*,

WHEREAS, The AAPI community is extraordinarily diverse, representing more than 50 ethnic groups and over 100 languages and dialects, and the histories, cultures, and lived experiences of AAPI residents are inseparable from the broader story of the United States; *and*,

WHEREAS, AAPIs contributed to the building of this nation, with the examples of Chinese immigrants being essential in the building of the transcontinental railroad, and Japanese, Korean, and Filipino immigrants being an important workforce in areas such as Hawaii and California; *and*,

WHEREAS, Despite their achievements and contributions, AAPIs have faced strong institutional discrimination and racism, with the Chinese Exclusion Act prohibiting immigration from China, and Japanese internment during World War II being two of the most prominent examples; *and*,

WHEREAS, Anti-Asian hate incidents surged nationally during and after the COVID-19 pandemic, and AAPI residents in Boston continue to report verbal harassment, physical assaults, and discrimination, underscoring the need for continued vigilance, solidarity, and community-centered safety efforts; *and*,

WHEREAS, Boston's AAPI communities continue to strengthen the city through cultural heritage, civic leadership, entrepreneurship, and intergenerational community-building, and it is essential that the City of Boston celebrate, uplift, and protect these communities; *and*,

WHEREAS, May is officially designated as Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month under 36 U.S.C. § 102, which calls upon all residents of the United States to recognize and celebrate the achievements and contributions of AAPI communities; *NOW, THEREFORE BE IT*

RESOLVED: That the Boston City Council honors and recognizes the contributions, achievements, and cultural heritage of our Asian American and Pacific Islander residents during AAPI Heritage Month in May 2026, and reaffirms its commitment to supporting AAPI communities, combating discrimination and racism, and ensuring that Boston remains a welcoming and inclusive city for all.

RESOLUTION AFFIRMING THE CITY OF BOSTON'S COMMITMENT TO GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE

WHEREAS, Green infrastructure is a highly-effective climate adaptation strategy involving the design of infrastructural systems that utilize natural materials to reduce flood risk, mitigate extreme heat, improve air, soil, and water quality, and strengthen overall neighborhood resilience; *and*,

WHEREAS, Due to the global impacts of climate change, Boston faces a climate crisis; extreme heat, heavy rainfall, and coastal flooding are among the effects of climate change in Boston, all of which disproportionately impact the City's marginalized communities; *and*,

WHEREAS, In response to this crisis, the Wu Administration created the Office of Green Infrastructure ('OGI') within the City's Streets Cabinet in 2022; this Office was created to lead the implementation of interdepartmental green infrastructure and stormwater projects throughout City; *and*,

WHEREAS, Released in April 2026, the City's 2030 Climate Action Plan identifies green infrastructure projects as a key strategy to address stormwater and inland flooding events; the Office of Green Infrastructure is specifically identified as the City Department that will lead recommended actions to accelerate green infrastructure deployment in public spaces and establish a Citywide green infrastructure standard; *and*,

WHEREAS, As has been reported, City leadership eliminated the Office of Green Infrastructure on May 26, 2026; this decision was made with no public input and has prompted questions about the City's commitment to its climate goals and capacity to deliver essential green infrastructure projects; *and*,

WHEREAS, Though the City faces a challenging fiscal year, the recommended FY27 Operating Budget proposes a modest increase to the Streets Cabinet's budget; *and*,

WHEREAS, The Office of Green Infrastructure had multiple projects and programs in process at the time of its elimination; the City has not indicated a succession plan for these former OGI initiatives, nor has it indicated how green infrastructure projects will be implemented by the City moving forward; *and,*

WHEREAS, Green infrastructure projects require stable staffing, long-term capital investment, and clear interdepartmental and interagency coordination, particularly between the Environment Department, Public Works, Boston Water and Sewer Commission, and the Parks Department; *and,*

WHEREAS, Boston residents have repeatedly called for increased transparency from the City's Streets Cabinet as to its overall goals, status of projects, use of external grant funding, and future transportation and streets-related planning efforts; *and,*

WHEREAS, The Boston City Council has a responsibility to ensure that the City takes bold action to meet its stated climate goals in a manner that is transparent, equitable, and accountable to the public and to ensure that the City Departments implementing this work are adequately staffed and resourced; *NOW, THEREFORE BE IT*

RESOLVED: That the Boston City Council affirms its strong support for green infrastructure implementation across the City of Boston, and urges the Administration and Streets Cabinet to restore and strengthen staffing capacity, provide clear implementation timelines, and ensure transparent reporting on all green infrastructure and stormwater resilience projects.

WHEREAS, An annual Juneteenth banner program would not only provide an outlet to help residents honor this important holiday and key leaders in the fight for Black liberation, but it could also help motivate more civic engagement around civil rights issues and the ongoing struggles for equity, autonomy, quality of life, and well-being for Boston's Black communities; *and*

WHEREAS, Such a program would provide opportunities to support Black businesses in creating and designing unique banners tied to different locations throughout the city; *and*

WHEREAS, Recognizing Juneteenth with an official banner program could be integral to increasing public awareness and education around the importance of Juneteenth and the realities of our collective histories, while also promoting and supporting Black businesses and present-day community leaders, and ultimately create

pathways to engage with and empower Black culture, experience, and discussion;
NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

RESOLVED: That the Boston City Council recognize Juneteenth as an official holiday in the City of Boston, and that the City work to establish an annual Juneteenth banner program to recognize and honor the history of Black Americans, their lasting fight for liberation and equity, and their contributions to Boston and around the world.

RESOLUTION CALLING FOR A FEDERAL INVESTIGATION INTO BOSTON HOUSING AUTHORITY (BHA) ELEVATOR FAILURES

WHEREAS, For years, residents in Boston Housing Authority (BHA) developments across Boston have endured repeated elevator failures that have left them trapped in their apartments, forced to miss medical appointments, unable to access groceries, and cut off from their families and daily life; *and*

WHEREAS, On both November 22, 2024 and October 16, 2025, the Boston City Council Committee on Housing and Community Development held a hearing to discuss the status of the elevators at BHA Ruth Barkley Apartments. At the hearing, residents shared that the broken elevators have caused them to miss critical services and difficulties making it to their bathroom in time. In one instance, it was reported these issues caused a resident to miss most of their child's funeral; *and*

WHEREAS, Most recently, a resident, a double amputee, disabled veteran, was not able to get into his apartment to get his medication as a result of a reported 22-hour elevator failure. Consequently, he was forced to sleep outside of South Station overnight because BHA did not provide him with a hotel voucher to stay while he could not access his apartment. BHA staff insisted that he call the fire department to carry him upstairs, an option that left him with feeling he was not treated with dignity and respect; *and*

WHEREAS, On May 11, 2026, the Boston Housing Authority (BHA) was fined \$363,000 (with a reduction to 1%, amounting to \$3,630) as a result of the investigation into the Ruth Barkley Apartments' elevator failures by the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board (MAAB); *and*

WHEREAS, The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has the authority to investigate whether BHA is violating federal housing quality standards or failing to maintain safe access; *and*

WHEREAS, At this time, the Boston Housing Authority should be subject to a federal investigation by HUD due to ongoing elevator failures that have left our seniors and persons with disabilities without reliable access to their homes. A federal investigation will help determine whether systematic maintenance failures and potential violations of civil rights have placed vulnerable residents at risk; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

RESOLVED: That the Boston City Council calls for a federal investigation into the Boston Housing Authority (BHA) elevator failures.

The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.

WHEREAS, Frantzdy Pierrot was born and spent his childhood in Haiti before moving to Melrose, Massachusetts at the age of eleven, where he developed as a student-athlete, attended Melrose High School, and distinguished himself as a standout soccer player before continuing his collegiate career at Northeastern University and later Coastal Carolina University; *and*

WHEREAS, During his collegiate career, Pierrot earned recognition as one of the top players in his conference, helped lead his team to a conference championship, and built the foundation for a professional career that began in 2018 and has since taken him to clubs across Belgium, France, Israel, Greece, and Türkiye; *and*

WHEREAS, Through his rise in international football, Pierrot competed at one of the highest levels of club competition through the UEFA Champions League, while also achieving domestic success and establishing himself as one of Haiti's most accomplished footballers; *and*

WHEREAS, As a member of the Haitian Men's National Team, Les Grenadiers, Pierrot has become one of the leading goal scorers in the history of the national team and has proudly represented Haiti on the international stage; *and*

WHEREAS, Pierrot is expected to represent Haiti in the 2026 FIFA World Cup, marking the nation's first appearance in the tournament in fifty-two years, with Haiti's opening match scheduled to take place in Greater Boston on June 13, 2026, creating a meaningful connection between his Massachusetts roots and Haiti's return to the world stage; *and*

WHEREAS, Beyond his accomplishments on the field, Pierrot has worked to expand opportunities for future generations through the Frantzdy Pierrot Academy, which seeks to develop young athletes in Haiti by providing access to training, mentorship, structure, and opportunity through sport; *and*

WHEREAS, Frantzdy Pierrot's leadership, athletic achievements, and commitment to youth development have elevated Haitian excellence internationally and inspired young people in Haiti, Massachusetts, and throughout the Haitian diaspora; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**
