ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS THE RESULTS OF LAST YEAR'S YOUTH SUMMER JOBS PROGRAMS AND THE SOCIAL EMOTIONAL BENEFITS OF SUMMER EMPLOYMENT

- **WHEREAS,** The commitment to youth development and social emotional health includes providing employment during the summer months; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Summer jobs promote confidence, skill building, networking, self-management, relationship skills, responsible decision making and income; *and*
- WHEREAS, The City, through the Department of Youth Engagement and Employment (DYEE) SuccessLink Employment Program, offered 6,000 job opportunities for Boston youth last summer. This was 1,000 more jobs than 2021; and
- WHEREAS, Last year a grant funding component was added, providing youth wages for grantees. The goal was to expand the job opportunities by partnering with organizations to increase the diversity and quality of workforce development opportunities for the young people of Boston. DYEE awarded \$2.2 million for nearly 1,200 youth positions.; and
- WHEREAS, Many of the City's Youth Summer Jobs go unfilled, despite the fact that there are many youth, and families looking for employment for their teen children, and the data shows that when we offer our disadvantaged youth, vulnerable youth, and youth with identified risk barriers access to employment opportunities it may help them to develop a wide range of beneficial attributes, such as the capacity to take responsibility, develop time-management skills, overcome shyness with adults, relationship skills, and handle money; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss the social emotional health benefits of summer youth employment. Representatives from the Mayor's office, Boston Public Health Commission, Boston Public Schools, DYEE SuccessLink Employment Program, community leaders and other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO AUDIT THE CITY OF BOSTON'S PROCUREMENT PROCESSES, PROCEDURES AND PROGRESS

WHEREAS, In 2020, the City of Boston published a Disparity Study, which indicated a

disproportionate underutilization of minority- and women-owned businesses; and

WHEREAS, In response to the 2020 Disparity Study results, in February of 2021, the Mayor

issued an Executive Order to address and ameliorate the outcomes by committing to a utilization goal of at least 25% contracting with minority- and women-owned

businesses across all contracts awarded in any fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, Given these stated goals, it is imperative to discern if minority and

women-owned businesses, small or micro, attempting to contract with the City of Boston are able to compete with businesses that are more knowledgeable and experienced with the City of Boston's procurement processes, practices and

procedures; and

WHEREAS. The Executive Order attempts to remedy both the historical and current barriers

minority- and women-owned businesses encounter when interacting with the city's contracting processes. It is essential to determine if there are any compounding disadvantages that need to be further identified and properly addressed through an audit of the City of Boston's Chapter 30B procurement

processes, practices and procedures; and

WHEREAS, An important component to creating access to opportunities for minority and

women-owned businesses is an effective communication strategy which targets minority- and women-owned businesses to ensure that a broader population of businesses are notified about the opportunities to bid on contracts from all city agencies and quasi-public organizations funded by the City of Boston; *and*

WHEREAS. Furthermore, the cultural sensitivity of these advertisements, outreach efforts, and

technical assistance support, are also important and necessary steps to ensure small, micro, minority- and women-owned businesses are fully aware of existing

and future contracting opportunities, and thus, the effectiveness of these efforts must be evaluated; *and*

WHEREAS,

Once a micro or small business is given an opportunity to do business with the City of Boston, working capital is often an issue. The payment schedule is inconsistent with the financial constraints of many micro and small businesses and a quick pay policy for small businesses needs to be explored in order to ensure minority- and women-owned, micro or small businesses have the cash flow needed to fully participate and scale; *NOW THEREFORE BE IT*

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to examine the City of Boston's procurement practices and enact a prompt pay policy for micro and small businesses. Representatives from the administration, including the Administration and Finance, Auditing, Procurement, and Economic Opportunity and Inclusion. Community advocates such as the Black Economic Council of Massachusetts, Amplify Latinx and local organizations and members of the public are also encouraged to testify.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS THE RISE IN PUBLIC CONSUMER ENERGY COSTS

- **WHEREAS,** Electric and gas prices have significantly increased this winter in the City of Boston, with National Grid estimating costs to power bills rising nearly 60% in the last year; **and**
- **WHEREAS,** According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, as of October 2022, the 29.1 cents per kWh that Boston households paid for electricity in October 2022 was 75.3% higher than the nationwide average cost of 16.6 cents per kWh; **and**
- **WHEREAS,** Boston area electricity costs have exceeded the national average by at least 48.9% over the past five Octobers; **and**
- **WHEREAS,** Near the end of 2022, Eversource announced that new rates would be in effect for the first six months of 2023, increasing the average customer's bill by 23%; **and**
- **WHEREAS**, Eversource recently increased its Basic Service rates to 25.649 cents/kWh for residential customers, a 63 percent increase from their winter 2022 rate; **and**
- **WHEREAS,** The City of Boston has a Boston Community Choice Electricity (BCCE) program that gives residents three cost saving options; **and**
- *WHEREAS*, Through the BCCE program, the most expensive option of 100% renewable electricity is only 13.987 cents/kWh with rates locked in through December 2023; *and*
- WHEREAS, Rising energy costs place additional economic barriers on low-income and middle class residents in Boston, recently determined the second most expensive City to be a renter in the entire United States; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss the City of Boston's efforts to sign residents up for Boston's BCCE program, MASS Saves and other energy cost-saving programs. Representatives from the Boston Community Choice Electricity Program, Mass Saves, Environment Energy and Open Space Cabinet, and Senior Saves Program, advocates and community members are invited to provide testimony

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS HOW THE CITY BUDGET IS ADDRESSING EQUITY

- WHEREAS, In 2020, the City of Boston declared racism as a public health crisis; and
- WHEREAS, 80 percent of white residents own a home, while 33 percent of American less than 20 percent of Dominican and Puerto Rican, and 50 percent of Caribbean Black residents are homeowners; and
- WHEREAS, The median net worth for white households in Boston is \$250,000 while the median net worth for Black households in Boston is \$8; and
- **WHEREAS,** Residents of Roxbury have the shortest life expectancy in Boston, of less than 59 years, while residents less than a half-mile away in Back Bay have a life expectancy of around 92 year; and
- WHEREAS, The public health crisis of COVID-19 has been exacerbated by social determinants of health perpetuated by systemic racism; and
- WHEREAS, Studies have shown that race determines how poor a person is, and poverty is directly correlated to negative factors such as poor health, lack of leadership opportunities, housing insecurity, minimal access to economic opportunities, minimal opportunities to create generational wealth, health inequities, food deserts, barriers to transportation, absence of access to arts and culture, climate injustice, prevention of youth development, civic death, and inadequate recovery from COVID-19; and
- WHEREAS, The City of Boston is committed to addressing inequity through budget priorities and has enacted policies, ordinances, and executive orders designed to ensure that all residents share the opportunities that the City has to offer; and
- **WHEREAS,** The City of Boston does not have an equity driven accountable allocation system in place that tracks budgeted and actual revenues and expenses across district neighborhoods to show disproportions that studies have shown to exist; and

- **WHEREAS,** It is the responsibility of the Boston City Council to foster and cultivate an inclusive and transparent review of the City's budget and how the City expends budgeted funds to ensure equity; and
- WHEREAS, It is the desire of Mayor Michelle Wu, to assure the City Council will have, "... a larger partnership in ensuring our City's dollars are equitably allocated according to the needs, interests, and visions of our residents"; and
- WHEREAS, It is the desire of Boston City Council President, Ed Flynn to, "... develop a budget for the City of Boston that addresses our long-standing needs, such as housing affordability and stability, public health, public and pedestrian safety, climate resiliency and sustainability, and equitable access to city services"; and
- WHEREAS, The City Council, as stewards of the city's budget and representatives of our constituents, needs to know specific information in order to best advocate for the interests of our constituents, with emphasized attention to marginalized communities and historically disenfranchised Bostonians; NOW THEREFOR BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to gather data and information from the City's various departments and the community to ensure that the City's budget is meeting equitable threshold allocations in order to monitor and measure the progress regarding: Equity in Housing, Capital Investments, Economic Opportunity to support Generational Wealth Creation, Health Equity, Food Access, Hiring in Leadership Diversity, Pay Equity, Streets, Transportation and Sanitation, Arts and Culture, Environment, Energy, Open Space and Climate Justice, Youth Development, Civic Engagement and 311 response Data, and COVID-19 Recovery for Marginalized Communities.

- **ORDERED:** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss the creation of municipal indoor playgrounds and that representatives from Boston Centers for Youth & Family, Parks & Recreation, and other relevant and interested parties be invited to attend.


The following ordinances, appropriations and/or orders recommended by the Mayor for passage by the City Council become effective after the date specified unless previously acted upon ¹

¹Section 17E of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The mayor from time to time may make to the city council in the form of an ordinance or loan order filed with the city clerk such recommendations as he may deem to be for the welfare of the city. The City Council shall consider each ordinance or loan order so presented and shall either adopt or reject the same within sixty days after the date when it is filed as aforesaid. If such ordinance or loan order is not rejected within sixty days, it shall be in force as if adopted by the city council unless previously withdrawn by the mayor.



2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.



Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

³Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

Ordinances: Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Loan Orders: Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.

Orders: Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Home Rule Petitions: Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City

Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.

Order for a Hearing: A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular

matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City

Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative

action of placing it on file.

Legislative Resolution: A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal

effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as

a whole.
