Short-Term Rentals 2024 Report to the Boston City Council

Introduction

This report is being submitted to meet the requirements of Section 2 of the Ordinance Allowing Short-term Residential Rentals in the City of Boston (the "Ordinance"), passed by the Boston City Council on July 13, 2018. The implementation of the Ordinance took place in stages, with complete implementation in December 2019. Therefore, this report is responsive to the research questions in the Ordinance.

Definitions

The following definitions are being used in the implementation of the Ordinance:.

Short-term rental: A short-term rental uses a residential unit for residential occupancy for a period of fewer than 28 consecutive calendar days for a fee.

Short-term rental types:

Limited share units: Limited share units are private bedrooms or shared spaces in an owner-operator's primary residence. The owner would be present during the rental. The fee for this type of unit is **\$25 per year**. Occupancy is limited to three guest bedrooms or six guests, whichever is fewer.

Home share units: Home share units are whole units available for short-term rental at the primary residence of an owner-operator. The fee is **\$200 per year**. Occupancy is limited to five bedrooms or ten guests, whichever is fewer.

Owner-adjacent units: Owner-adjacent units are within owner-occupied two- or three-family buildings. In this situation, the owner lists a single secondary unit as a short-term rental. The fee is **\$200 per year**.

Other types of short-term rentals:

Lodging houses. A residential unit offered as a short-term rental that is located in a dwelling holding a current and valid Certificate of Occupancy as a lodging house from ISD and a lodging house license from the Boston Licensing Board.

Existing bed and breakfasts. A residential unit offered as a short-term rental that holds a current and valid Certificate of Occupancy as a bed and breakfast from ISD.

Other uses are not subject to all the provisions of the short-term rental ordinance.

Hospital stays. The use of a dwelling unit or portion thereof for which a contract exists between the owner of the dwelling unit and a health-care facility, government entity, or non-profit organization registered as a charitable organization with the Secretary of the Commonwealth of

Massachusetts, or classified by the Internal Revenue Service as a public charity or private foundation that provides for the temporary housing of individuals who are being treated for trauma, injury, or disease, or their family members, a is not considered a short-term rental.

Furnished institutional or business stays. The use of a residential unit for which a contract or an agreement exists between the building owner, a corporate housing operator, or an institution or business for the temporary housing of employees or individuals affiliated with such institutions or businesses, where the minimum stay is at least 10 days, is not considered a short-term rental.

For further information on the STR regulations, please refer to <u>An Ordinance Allowing Short-Term</u> <u>Rentals</u> in the City of Boston, filed June 13, 2018.

Introduction

Short-term rental (STR) licenses peaked in 2024 after the full implementation of the STR ordinance in December of 2019 at nearly 1,000 active licenses. The lowest count was 677 in 2022. The recent increase resulted from ISD's efforts to bring unregistered Short-Term Rentals into compliance.




Chart 1: Total Short-Term Rental Registrations by Year

Estimate of the Impact of the Rental of Owner-Adjacent Units on the Number of Units Removed from the Long-Term Housing Stock

As of June 1, 2024, the Inspectional Services Department ("ISD") had 989 active STRs. Of these, only 182, or 18.4 percent, were owner-adjacent units. Owner-adjacent units increased by 33 (+22.1%) from the year prior and 56 (+44.4%) from two years prior.

In addition to the fact that STRs are concentrated in smaller properties (3.2 units on average, excluding condo buildings), properties with registered STRs tend to be small-scale landlords as they own fewer than four properties on average.³

The top three neighborhoods for STRs are Dorchester (12.4 percent), Downtown (12 percent), and Jamaica Plain (10.3 percent). After the city's STR ordinance became fully enforced, the distribution of STRs became more even throughout the city.



Map 1 shows an STR unit heat map. A heat map draws point features as a dynamic, representative surface of relative density. The map shows STR hotspots, or areas where STRs are more dense, in Back Bay, the South End, and downtown Boston.

Estimate of the Number of Evictions Caused by Conversions from Long-Term Housing to Short-Term Rentals

In October 2020, the City of Boston passed the Housing Stability Notification Act. This ordinance requires any landlord planning to end a tenancy agreement to provide the tenant with a Notice of Tenants' Rights and Resources. In addition, The Housing Stability Notification Act also requires landlords and foreclosing owners to provide the City of Boston's Office of Housing Stability with a copy of the Notice to Quit or Notice of Non-Renewal of Lease and a Certificate of Compliance/Service.

Thus far, the city has received over 25,000 notices, primarily for nonpayment of rent. In 2023, just 20 properties had a notice-to-quit and an STR license associated with the same parcel. No evidence was found that a notice-to-quit was issued to establish an STR. According to the Notices to Quit, the primary driver of these evictions is nonpayment of rent, followed by cause (i.e., lease violations).

Estimate of the Effect of the Ordinance on the Change in Home and Rental Prices in Owner-Occupied Two and Three-Family Homes

The Mayor's Office of Housing maintains databases of both property sales and advertised rental listings.⁴ This data is used to estimate the impacts of the ordinance on neighborhood rents and sales prices. A multiple linear regression (MLR) is a simple and common way to explore whether a set of variables predicts the outcome of a dependent variable and which variables are most significant in that prediction to answer this question. Note that regressions are used here primarily for prediction purposes and not to prove causation, as regression studies different relationships between variables.

Previous MLRs conducted by MOH on home sales prices reflect that prices after December 2019 rose by \$59,000, suggesting that the Ordinance did not immediately result in lower two- and three-family house prices. The onset of the COVID-19 shutdown (after March 15th, 2020) showed a price decline of \$62,000. Previous models show more bathrooms were more significantly associated with prices (showing an \$89,000 increase) than the COVID-19 pandemic or the new ordinance. Purchasing in the spring or summer is associated with a jump of nearly \$20,000. Purchasing a home in IDP Zone A (i.e., Back Bay, Beacon Hill, Downtown, and the Seaport) would add a million dollars to the price.

The nt MLR on rental listing prices is based on over 203,000 rental listings from 2014 to 2021. The rent MLR model suggests the STR ordinance increased monthly rent listing prices by \$45, while the COVID-19 shutdown in March 2020 contributed to a more significant \$189 drop in monthly rents. Of course, factors like the number of bedrooms, neighborhood, and when the property is built have a much more substantial impact on rent prices. For additional details on the Rent MLR, please see the appendix.

The Differential Between Short-Term Rental Revenue and Long-Term Rental Revenue in an Owner-Adjacent Unit

The average monthly revenue from short-term rentals of entire homes in Boston in 2024 is estimated to be \$910 (table 5). Based on advertised rents from the same period, the median monthly revenue from a long-term rental is \$2,285. According to these estimates, an owner could potentially make an average of \$2,090 more monthly rent for a unit as a long-term rather than a short-term rental. Even so, even in neighborhoods where the differential is highest, there may still be specific properties that could earn more as an STR than a long-term rental.

Still, the \$2,090 citywide average differential suggests that short-term rentals are much less lucrative than long-term rentals. The revenue of a short-term rental depends highly on seasonal tourism, the average length of stay for the typical renter, and the overall supply of short-term rentals, which can impact relative listing prices. Additionally, long-term rentals are guaranteed revenue set during lease-up, and are not subject to the same regulatory risk as short-term rentals.

Methods: Data on short-term rental hosts' revenue are not available. To calculate this, we used a San Francisco Planning Department methodology (Marqusee, Alex, 2015) to align with existing scholarship on this subject. Airbnb and San Francisco: Descriptive Statistics and Academic Research. San Francisco Planning Department Administrative Code Text Change, April 16, 2015, page 42 (https://commissions.sfplanning.org/cpcpackets/2014-001033PCA.pdf). This method multiplies the listed price, the minimum nights listed (a proxy for the number of nights per stay), and the number of reviews per month (a proxy for the number of stays) inflated by 28 percent (this assumes that 72 percent of stays leave a review, as reported by Airbnb in 2012). This method yields a somewhat conservative estimate of short-term rental revenue instead of actual data from short-term rental platforms. Revenues could be higher if renters in short-term

rentals stay longer than the minimum number of nights (not accounted for in this methodology), or the review rate is significantly lower than estimated here (72 percent).

Future Projections of the Number of Owner-Adjacent Units and Their Impact on the Housing Market

The number of STRs has remained stable over the last few years, and the number of owner-adjacent units is negligible compared to the number of units in the city. The recent increases between 2023 and 2024 are attributed to ISD's efforts to bring units into compliance with regulations and not necessarily an increase in owners converting LTR units to STR units. However, MOH will continue to monitor for future increases in subsequent reports.

Inside Airbnb Listing Data Analysis

Inside Airbnb scrapes data from the Airbnb website and makes it available to the public. They do not scrape other platforms, such as VRBO. This section relies on this data to look at short-term rentals, including those not covered by the city's STR ordinance.

This data shows the dramatic effect of the ordinance's implementation on the number of listings on Airbnb. Listings for entire units (apartments/homes) rented for less than 28 days decreased to 1,444 in December 2019, a 50 percent decline from 2,901 in November 2018. As mentioned above, partial implementation of the ordinance began in November 2018, and full implementation occurred in December 2019. The total listings of entire apartments/homes on Airbnb fell to their lowest point tracked in this report at 778 in August 2020. The total listings have steadily increased from 783 in December 2021 to 1,980 as of March 2024.




Chart 1: Entire Home/Apt STR Airbnb Listings, September 2018 to March 2024

The following chart (Chart 2) shows STRs (<28 days, red line) and non-STRs (>28 days, blue line). As shown in the previous chart, STRs significantly dominated the listings on the Airbnb platform until the full ordinance was implemented in December 2019. Since then, for the most part, STRs and non-STR listings have been nearly equally represented in the listing data. Please note that the rapid drops and increases shown in the last year of the data reflect a change in reporting from monthly to quarterly.

Approximately 68% of all listings on Airbnb are full homes/apartments. Inside Airbnb estimates that these listings' average annual income is \$19,494 for all full homes/apartment listings and an average of \$40,006 for those recently and frequently booked. This is equivalent to a per-month average of \$1,624 to \$3,333. For STRs, Inside Airbnb estimates that the annual revenue ranges from \$26,706 to \$40,786 annually, or \$2,226 to \$3,399 monthly. Approximately 34% of all entire home/apartment listings are unlicensed.⁶


The following chart shows the bedroom and bathroom count distributions for the entire home/apartment, no matter the minimum days of the rental. Thirty-five percent of Airbnb listings for entire units have two bedrooms, while 25% have one bedroom. Regarding the number of bathrooms, 68% have one, and 20% have two.



According to data from Grancicus, which helps the city track the compliance of a host with STR regulations, approximately 600 STR listings have been identified as non-compliant with STR regulations (about 33% of all listings). ISD monitors these issues closely to bring non-compliant hosts into compliance. Over the previous 12 months, there have been 54 tickets written for STR violations, totaling \$15,660 in fines. In addition to the fines, ISD also delists non-compliant listings.

Interpretation: The rent MLR is based on over 203,000 rental listings from 2014 to 2021. This model explains 37 percent (R-square) of the variance in price, the dependent variable. In other words, if you plug the results (coefficients) into the MLR equation, it will predict the sale price 37 percent of the time. Price is the dependent variable. The numerical variables include year and bedrooms. The dummy variables include ordinance (1 = Dec 2019 and After), COVID (1 = 03/16/2020 and after), Quarter (1= Spring and Summer), New Construction (1 = built after 2011), neighborhood (1 = above the citywide rent price median), and a monthly period related to the S&P Case Shiller Index for Home Values.

The rent MLR model suggests rental list prices increased by \$45 after the full ordinance implementation. At the same time, the COVID-19 pandemic variable is correlated with a more significant impact of decreasing rent list prices by \$189. Again this is partly offset by the \$190 increase in the yearly coefficient (each additional year). The more significant variables impacting rent prices include the number of bedrooms (each bedroom adds about \$600), and the neighborhood or location (add \$1,162 for the City's most desired areas). Newly constructed rental listings also demand a premium, adding over \$1,000 in price to the MLR model. The period associated with the monthly frequency of the Case-Shiller Home Price Index showed a decrease of \$9 in rental list price per month. Since the home price index has increased over the last decade, this finding is counterintuitive and requires further research.

This letter is to communicate to the Boston City Council, through the Chair, important information related to *Docket #1213*, *Order for a hearing to audit the City of Boston's accountability, transparency and accessibility regarding the enforcement of City of Boston Code 8-10. On motion of Councilors Mejia and Fernandes Anderson, Rule 12 was invoked to include Councilor Weber as an original co-sponsor. Referred to the Committee on Post-Audit: Government Accountability, Transparency, and Accessibility.*

After we filed the hearing order to audit the City of Boston's accountability, transparency and accessibility regarding the enforcement of City of Boston Code 8-10, we received documents from the Administration outlining the reasons why the ordinance was vetoed in 1990 prior to the Council's vote to override. Docket #0682, message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend a grant from Eversource valued in the amount not to exceed Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000.00) (grant includes the value of rebates and equipment) for the purpose of promoting energy efficiency and energy savings to various public buildings and infrastructure projects.

This matter was sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu and referred to the Committee on April 10, 2024.

Summary of Legislation

Docket #0682 is a grant from Eversource, in an amount up to \$10,000,000 that will fund the City's purchase of energy efficient equipment and improvements in City buildings.

Information Received at Hearing

The Committee held a hearing on Tuesday, August 20, 2024 to discuss Docket #0682. Carleton Jones, Executive Director, Public Facilities Department (PFD), testified on behalf of the Administration. Mr. Jones introduced the grant, and shared the Administration's excitement to apply such grants to the City's capital projects and advance its green initiatives.

Mr. Jones explained that the City applies for grants throughout the year, and this grant, like others, are meant to be used for public facilities, specifically departmental assets. He explained that the timing of when the grant is approved and appropriated will determine which projects it will fund, based on how that timing matches with eligible capital projects in the pipeline. He explained that the grant will fund energy efficient equipment such as air handling units, heat pumps, energy recovery units, and geothermal equipment for City buildings.

The Committee discussed the use of geothermal energy, examples of energy efficient improvements in other city facilities and coordination with Boston Water and Sewer on capital projects.

Committee Chair Recommended Action

As Chair of the Committee on Environmental Justice, Resiliency, and Parks, I recommend moving the listed docket from the Committee to the full Council for discussion and formal action. My recommendation to the full Council is that this matter **OUGHT TO PASS.**

- WHEREAS, Mr, Darius has pursued higher education in fields relevant to public safety and technology, holding an Associate degree in Computer Engineering Technology from Benjamin Franklin Institute of Technology, a Bachelor's degree in Business Management Information Systems from Bay State College, and a Master's degree in Criminal Justice Cyber Security from Boston University; and
- **WHEREAS,** Mr. Darius's dedication to public safety is evident from his previous internship at the Boston Police Headquarters, where he supported various technological systems critical to police operations and served as a liaison for related tasks; *and*

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS THE CURRENT STATUS OF THE ELEVATOR SYSTEM IN BOSTON HOUSING AUTHORITY (BHA) DEVELOPMENTS

WHEREAS: The elevator systems in many Boston Housing Authority (BHA) developments are rapidly aging and require significant repairs. Recent reports highlight extensive problems, with several documented breakdowns causing serious public safety concerns; and

WHEREAS: In District 2, over the last few years, tenants have reported that elevator breakdowns are a frequent occurrence at the Ruth Barkley Apartments in the South End, while issues of elevator breakdowns have taken place at both Torre Unidad at West Dedham Street and St. Botolph BHA; *and*

WHEREAS: Residents have reported being stuck in elevators, and elevators skipping floors. Seniors and persons with disabilities have been particularly impacted, as using stairs is not an option for those who are in wheelchairs, use canes and walkers; *and*

WHEREAS: Seniors and persons with disabilities have also expressed their frustrations with not being able to leave their apartments for as long as two weeks due to these elevator failures, resulting in not being able to get basic needs such as groceries as well as missed medical appointments. There are increasing concerns that these conditions violate federal and state laws, including the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA); and

WHEREAS: Residents have also expressed that even when elevators are repaired in the short-term, given the frequency of breakdowns, they are afraid to get on in fear that they will get stuck during an emergency; *and*

WHEREAS: It is reported that it takes between \$1.5 and \$5 million to repair an elevator, and the repairs at Ruth Barkley Apartments are expected to cost \$6 million. Repairs often require parts to be shipped from other parts of the country, and this often takes a long amount of time; *and*

WHEREAS: Given the public safety and quality of life concerns for our seniors and persons with disabilities, it is critical for the BHA to have a financial and maintenance plan to address these serious issues. It is imperative that the BHA conducts a comprehensive review and inspection on the status of every elevator in BHA developments, including the repair history of each elevator, the frequency it has been shut down due to failures, and how often first responders have had to visit; *and*

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:

That the appropriate Committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to address ongoing concerns about the safety and reliability of the elevator system across BHA developments and discuss a financial and maintenance plan. Representatives from the Boston Housing Authority and other relevant and interested parties shall be invited to attend.

- **WHEREAS,** Extreme heat is the deadliest weather pattern, killing more people annually than hurricanes, floods, and tornadoes combined; *and*
- **WHEREAS**, The impacts of extreme heat are most dangerous for our seniors and our youth; and
- WHEREAS, Ten Boston Public Schools, including Bates Elementary, Otis Elementary, Mather Elementary, Kenny Elementary, Lee Academy, Charles H. Taylor, Melvin H. King Middle, Melvin H. King High, Community Academy, and Mozart Elementary, are not equipped with adequate cooling systems, instead relying upon open windows and fans to keep facilities cool; and
- **WHEREAS**, Several of these facilities are utilized during the summer months; and
- **WHEREAS**, Nearly all of these schools are housed in environmental justice communities; and
- **WHEREAS,** According to BPS data, the temperature inside schools such as Lee Academy without these systems have reached over 90 degrees; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Exposure to these high temperatures for extended periods of time puts students' and faculties' health and wellbeing at risk; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** There has yet to be a clear plan provided improving the conditions for these schools; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** an immediate plan for installing AC in all remaining BPS schools must be enacted in order to ensure the safety of all students; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**
- **ORDERED:** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss plans to ensure all schools have the HVAC systems necessary to provide a safe, comfortable learning and teaching environment year-round and that

contingency plans are in place during the interim period and that representatives from Boston Public Schools and other interested parties be invited to testify.

WHEREAS, Beginning in 2022, Boston residents have worked together to form the Walking City Trail, a 27-mile urban hiking route connecting 17 Boston neighborhoods from the Neponset River Reservation to Bunker Hill Monument, journeying through some of Boston's most scenically immersive parks, gardens, urban wilds, gardens, and residential neighborhoods; and,

WHEREAS, The trail route is the result of thousands of hours of community participation by hundreds of people in group hikes, wayfinding explorations, and dozens of collaborative trail planning meetings, reflecting how the "Instant Urban Trail" method pioneered in cities like San Francisco and Worcester fosters grassroots opportunities for community members to create urban hiking trails without the barriers of construction or investment in physical infrastructure required; and,

WHEREAS, The Walking City Trail has captured the imagination and interest of Boston residents and visitors alike, yielding collaborations with many Boston-area organizations, including the Appalachian Mountain Club, the Emerald Necklace Conservancy, Family Nurturing Center Massachusetts, Northeastern University, and Boston Birding Festival; and recognition by many media publications, including an Outside Magazine article naming Boston as a top hiking destination in America, The Boston Globe, WBUR and NPR, Chronicle, Boston.com, Men's Health, NewEngland.com, Streetsblog Massachusetts, Mass Live, Mountain Gazette, The Seattle Times, and several other local and national publications; and,

WHEREAS, On March 2, 2023, the Boston City Council held a public hearing to discuss how the City of Boston could embrace the lessons from the development of the Walking City Trail to establish additional walking routes connecting Boston neighborhoods and recreational spaces, and the benefits that physical signage could provide for increasing the number of Boston residents and visitors exploring interconnected city green spaces and neighborhoods by foot; and,

WHEREAS, With encouragement during the Boston City Council hearing, particularly by Councilors Lara and Bok, volunteer organizers subsequently undertook a signage pilot by creating and installing 60 homemade laminated paper trail signs with scannable QR codes leading to the trail website with maps and directions, which were scanned by curious passersby over 1,200 times from August 2023 through March 2024; excited by this initial success, dozens of community members crowdfunded \$4,200 to replace the initial paper signs with 70 weatherproof signs, expand the Trail's website and maps, and undertake additional projects. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to discuss Boston's Walking City Trail, the momentum and accomplishments since the March 2023 City Council hearing, and opportunities for the City of Boston to be directly involved with furthering the demonstrated success of the trail. Representatives from the Office of Civic Organizing; Community Engagement Cabinet; Parks and Recreation Department; Boston Transportation Department; Tourism, Sports, and Entertainment Department; Meet Boston; the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation; and community advocates will be invited, and members of the public are encouraged to attend and testify.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS B.C.Y.F. SERVICES IN THE ALLSTON-BRIGHTON NEIGHBORHOOD OF THE CITY OF BOSTON

- WHEREAS, The Boston Centers for Youth & Families (BCYF) is the City's largest human service agency, enriching residents' lives through partnerships offering a range of programs responsive to neighborhood needs, including afterschool activities, childcare, summer camps, youth employment, adult education, and senior services; and
- WHEREAS, In the early 1970s, new school constructions led to the vision of these buildings as neighborhood hubs for civic engagement and community resources, which resulted in the establishment of a network of school-based and standalone centers; and
- WHEREAS, Chapter 18 of the Ordinances of 1972 established the Community School Program under the jurisdiction of the Public Facilities Commission, and in 2001, BCYF was formed by consolidating the services once provided by Boston Community Centers, the Office of Community Partnerships, the Boston 2:00–6:00 After-School Initiative, and the Recreation Division of the Parks and Recreation Department; and
- WHEREAS, The Foundation for Boston Centers for Youth & Families is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization focused on securing funding to support BCYF programs; and
- WHEREAS, The Jackson Mann facility opened in Allston's Union Square in 1976 to house the Jackson Mann K–8 School, the Horace Mann School for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, and the Jackson Mann Community Center, operated in partnership with the Jackson Mann Community School Council, Inc., a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization incorporated to provide educational, cultural, social, recreational, and community services to the diverse residents of the Allston-Brighton neighborhood of Boston; and
- WHEREAS, A Capital Improvement Project Request was initiated in 2019 to address long-standing deferred maintenance at the Jackson Mann facility, leading the Public Facilities Department to commission a full-scale external engineering review, which resulted in findings that a majority of the mechanical systems exceeded their useful life and suggested that keeping the site open long-term was not a viable solution; and
- WHEREAS, In March 2020, the Boston Public Schools communicated that the Jackson Mann facility's condition constituted a building emergency and that it must be vacated by the end of the 2020–2021 school year, a one-year delay was announced in November 2020, and the closure of the Jackson Mann K–8 School was announced in May 2021 and approved by the School Committee in December 2021, effective June 2022; and
- WHEREAS, The Horace Mann School vacated the Jackson Mann site and relocated to Charlestown after the 2023–2024 school year until a permanent facility is identified; *and*
- WHEREAS, The services of the BCYF Jackson Mann were to be temporarily relocated but now remain on the site until a permanent facility is identified; and

- WHEREAS, While there are over 30 BCYF facilities in the City of Boston, the Jackson Mann is the only BCYF site in Allston-Brighton, a growing and resilient neighborhood of nearly 80,000 residents, many of whom depend on its programming; and
- WHEREAS, The BCYF Jackson Mann hosts a teen program and adult education programs including English as a Second Language, while its preschool and school-age programs were discontinued amid the COVID-19 pandemic and school closures; and
- WHEREAS, The BCYF Jackson Mann Community Center facility has served as a neighborhood emergency shelter, cooling center during extreme heat, warming center during winter emergencies, and polling location for five precincts during elections; and
- WHEREAS, In fiscal year 2021 (FY21), \$500,000.00 in capital funds were authorized to study facility needs for the Jackson Mann School and the BCYF community center; and
- WHEREAS, In FY22–FY23, \$125,000.00 in capital funds were authorized for a programming and siting study for a new BCYF community center in Allston-Brighton, and in FY24 an additional \$4 million was authorized following an October 2023 final report; and
- WHEREAS, In FY23, \$150,000.00 in capital funds were authorized to develop a building program for the design and construction of a new preK-6 school located on the Jackson Mann site, and an additional \$10 million was authorized in FY24; and
- WHEREAS, Since 2022, \$1 million in federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) have been budgeted, within an eligible expenditure category for neighborhood features that promote strong and healthy communities, to ensure the continuity of BCYF services in Allston-Brighton by supporting the transition of the BCYF Jackson Mann Community Center to a short-term swing space facility and, as of the January 2024, April 2024, and July 2024 quarterly reports, a total of \$46,310.00 have been obligated to be expended; and
- WHEREAS, The Boston Public Schools Long-Term Facilities Plan, released in December 2023, identified plans for a preK–6 school in Allston-Brighton on the site of the former Jackson Mann campus alongside the BCYF Jackson Mann Community Center; and
- WHEREAS, As the Allston-Brighton community's sole BCYF community center operates out of a facility long deemed inadequate, and while other Boston neighborhoods have multiple BCYF centers or processes underway for additional sites, it remains crucial for there to be concrete plans and urgent coordination for current and future BCYF services in the Allston-Brighton neighborhood; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss Boston Centers for Youth & Families (BCYF) services in the Allston-Brighton neighborhood of the City of Boston, and that representatives of BCYF, the Office of Human Services, Boston Public Schools, the Public Facilities Commission, the Foundation for Boston Centers for Youth & Families, the Jackson Mann Community School Council, human and social service providers, BCYF members, Allston-Brighton residents, and interested members of the public be invited to attend.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS TOWING PRACTICES IN THE CITY OF BOSTON, WITH A PARTICULAR FOCUS ON PUBLIC AUTHORITY-ORDERED TOWING

WHEREAS, The Transportation Oversight Division of the Massachusetts Department of Public Utilities (DPU) monitors and regulates the rates and practices of common carriers used to transport passengers and property, including trucks, railways, buses, household moving companies, and towing companies; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to G.L. c. 159B, § 6B, the Department has jurisdiction over certain tow company charges such as maximum tow rates and fees associated with "involuntary towing" of motor vehicles, which include police-ordered towing, public authority-ordered towing, and trespass towing; and

WHEREAS, Police or public authority-ordered tows often occur after an accident on a public way, during a snow emergency, street cleaning, or when a stolen vehicle is recovered; and

WHEREAS, Trespass towing generally refers to a contractual arrangement between a property owner and a licensed tow company to remove unauthorized vehicles, and property owners may hire a company to monitor a property and conduct trespass tows; and

WHEREAS, The DPU does not have jurisdiction to regulate the terms of the contracts between property owners and tow companies or the rates associated with voluntary tows; and

WHEREAS, Several departments, including the Boston Transportation, Fire, Police, and Public Works Departments, separately procure towing services, whether for vehicles in the City fleet, street sweeping enforcement, evidentiary purposes, heavy duty, off-hour emergencies, or for the disposal of motor vehicles declared abandoned; and

WHEREAS, Parking and towing policies are inconsistent across school facilities, both for faculty and staff during the school day and for neighborhood residents parking after school and overnight, and information about contracted towers are not always posted; and

WHEREAS, The City of Boston can establish the description of services and specifications for the multi-year contracts awarded to licensed tow operators as qualified vendors conducting public authority-ordered towing; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss towing practices in the City of Boston, with a particular focus on public authority ordered towing, and that representatives of City departments, Massachusetts Public Interest Research Group (MASSPIRG), Statewide Towing Association, consumers, licensed tow operators, and interested members of the public be invited to attend.

AN ORDER TO INCREASE THE VETERANS PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION

- **WHEREAS,** According to 2022 U.S. Census estimates, Boston is home to more than 13,000 veterans, with the largest age group being the more than 3,600 veterans who are 75 and older; and
- WHEREAS, Eligibility for the veterans exemption, which for most categories is set at the maximum \$400 for FY25, is only granted to Purple Heart recipients, Gold Star parents, veterans with a service-related disability of at least 10 percent, or surviving spouses, and veterans with other specific injuries; and
- **WHEREAS,** The HERO Act, which was passed by the State Legislature and signed by Gov. Maura Healey in August, allows for the city to increase its property tax exemption for eligible veterans; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** With more than \$500 million in certified "free cash," Boston is in an advantageous financial position to offer the maximum amount of relief, which for most categories would be \$840 starting in FY26, to veterans who served their country; and
- WHEREAS, Boston should provide the maximum amount of property tax relief for eligible veterans by locally adopting state law M.G.L. c. 59, Section 5, 22I and 22J; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the City of Boston accept General Laws Chapter 59, Section 5, Clause 22I (which authorizes an annual increase in the amount of the exemption granted under G.L. c.59, s.5, Clause 22, Clause 22A, Clause 22B, Clause 22C, Clause 22E and Clause 22F by the percentage increase in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the previous year as determined by the Commissioner of Revenue) and General Laws Chapter 59, Section 5, Clause 22J, (which authorizes an annual increase in the amount of the exemption granted under General Laws Chapter 59, Section 5, Clause 22, Clause 22A, Clause 22B, Clause 22C, Clause 22E and Clause 22F by 100% of the personal exemption amount, subject to the conditions in Clause 22J) to be effective for applicable exemptions granted for any fiscal year beginning on or after July 1, 2025.

Implementation and Effective Date: Pursuant to the accepted provisions, this order shall be effective at the start of FY26.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE NEW MADINAH COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

- WHEREAS, Boston's housing crisis demands immediate and urgent attention, with at least 200,000 homes needing to be built across Massachusetts by 2030 to "accommodate growth and achieve a healthy vacancy rate," according to state housing officials, with the City of Boston establishing a 53,000-unit target itself; and
- WHEREAS, In light of the City's efforts to create more accessible, affordable, and climate-friendly housing, including the new Healthy and Green Retrofit Pilot Program, the City of Boston has an obligation to support projects which approach building emissions and climate with determination and precision; and
- **WHEREAS**, At the same time, there is a substantial demand for new community spaces where residents of all backgrounds may gather, take part in community events, take advantage of mutual aid opportunities, and celebrate the rich cultural history of our community; and
- **WHEREAS**, The Society for Islamic Brotherhood, which currently occupies an undersized facility at 726 Shawmut Avenue in Roxbury, submitted plans to the BPDA to redevelop their site through the Article 80 process; *and*
- WHEREAS, This proposal creates 38 units of new affordable housing, a new worship space for the over-300 members who have expressed interest in worshiping at the Mosque for Praising Allah, a new food pantry to support the organization's food assistance efforts, dedicated education spaces, and a "public bazaar"; and
- WHEREAS, In addition, the project proposes adding a dozen new street trees, widening the sidewalk to make it more physically accessible, and implementing sustainability measures such as a heat-island reducing green roof, high-performance windows and doors, continuous thermal and air envelope, groundwater recharge, and efficient lighting and appliances; and
- WHEREAS, Despite positive feedback from the community, the Planning Department elected to not allow the project application to proceed to a board vote, stating the the development's need to remove two street trees in order to accommodate the massing prevents the project from moving forward, with the Department proposing changes to the massing to accommodate these existing trees; and

- WHEREAS, At the request of the Planning Department, the project team hired an arborist with which the city had a working relationship to assess the tree's species, caliper, health, and impact, finding that required pruning and construction around the trees, even with the BPDA's proposed alternative, there would likely be severe health and longevity impacts to both trees, and it is recommended that the trees be removed prior to construction; and
- **WHEREAS**, Furthermore, keeping the existing street trees would not ameliorate the existing sidewalk width condition, which is currently below the City of Boston's preferred 5 foot width; and
- WHEREAS, As the City of Boston continues to advocate for more affordable housing, job creation, expanding mutual aid opportunities, and substantively addressing climate change, it is imperative that the city not miss the forest for the trees and move forward with the development process at 726 Shawmut Ave; NOW THEREFORE BE IT
- **RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council offers its support to The Society for Islamic Brotherhood and the Mosque for Praising Allah in their effort to redevelop 726 Shawmut Avenue.

- **WHEREAS,** Emmett Till was born on July 25th, 1941 in Chicago, Illinois to Louis and Mamie Till, and was known by his mother as an industrious little boy who would help out with chores around the house; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Despite dealing with a bout of polio when he was six years old, which left him with a pronounced stutter, Emmett frequently found himself the center of attention amongst his friend circle, with a reputation amongst his friends for being a smart dresser and a fun-loving prankster who loved to tell jokes; and
- WHEREAS, During a trip to Mississippi when he was 14 years old, Emmett and his relatives went into Bryant's Grocery and Meat Market to buy candy, during which multiple conflicting accounts detail the interactions between Emmett, his friends, and then-21 year old Carolyn Bryant who owned the store alongside her husband Roy Bryant; and
- WHEREAS, While it was claimed in the ensuing trial that Emmett had wolf-whistled at Carolyn Bryant that day, witnesses who were there that day could not confirm any inappropriate behavior on Emmett's part, with his mother later stating that she taught Emmett to whistle to help him through his stutter, which was particularly pronounced with b-words like "bubblegum," which Emmett may very well have been asking for at Bryant's Grocery that day; and
- WHEREAS, Later that night, upon hearing Carolyn Bryant's false retelling of her interaction with Emmett, her husband Roy Bryant drove to where Emmett was staying with his family, forcibly removed Emmett from the house, and drove him to Bryant's barn, where Bryant and his gang brutally lynched him in an act of deep-seated racism and injustice which too-often plagued the Jim Crow South; and
- WHEREAS, In an act of immense bravery, Emmett's mother Mamie Till-Mobley insisted on having an open-casket funeral for her son to reveal the brutality he endured, galvanizing a generation of activists and underscoring the urgent need for racial justice and accountability; and

- **WHEREAS,** Emmett Till's memory continues to serve as a poignant reminder of the countless lives lost to racial violence and discrimination, inspiring ongoing efforts to combat systemic racism and achieve true equality for all; and
- **WHEREAS,** Recognizing Emmett Till Day provides a crucial opportunity to not just to recognize the immense work which must be undertaken in order to repair the centuries of brutal systemic racism and violence, but to also celebrate the life of Emmett Till and the joy and happiness he spread to those around him; and
- WHEREAS, By recognizing Emmett Till Day, we affirm our commitment to honoring his memory, advancing racial justice, and creating a society where every individual is treated with dignity, respect, and equality under the law; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- **RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council recognize August 28th as Emmett Till Day in the City of Boston; **AND BE IT FURTHER**
- **RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council continues to pledge to work with unwavering dedication to make the vision of a world free from racialized-violence, systemic oppression, and discrimination a reality.

RESOLUTION CALLING FOR THE REINSTATEMENT OF EDDY CHRISPIN TO BOSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT COMMAND STAFF

- WHEREAS, Sergeant Detective Eddy Chrispin, a 25-year veteran of the Boston Police Department and well-respected leader in the Boston community, was removed from the Boston Police Department Command Staff in July of this year. Prior to his removal, he was appointed to the Massachusetts Peace Officer Standards and Training Commission (POST) in June of this year; and
- **WHEREAS,** POST is a police oversight board that was created after the 2020 Police Reform Act to establish uniform training standards and accountability for all law enforcement officers in the Commonwealth; and
- WHEREAS, When Sergeant Detective Chrispin was removed from the Police Command Staff, many in Boston expressed confusion and disappointment about the decision. Sergeant Detective Chrispin is a seasoned and knowledgeable leader who has demonstrated a deep dedication to serving the Boston Police Department and our community, and his removal is a huge loss to the important work of the department and the communities we serve; and
- WHEREAS, The Boston Police Department stated that their decision to remove Sergeant Detective Chrispin from Command Staff is due to a conflict of interest in his role serving on the POST Commission. However, the POST Commission Director Enrique Zuniga, as well as Massachusetts Attorney General Andrea Campbell, who appointed Chrispin to the post, have questioned this decision and stated that there is no conflict of interest in Sergeant Detective Chrispin serving both roles; and
- WHEREAS, Community leaders and the Massachusetts Association of Minority Law Enforcement Officers (MAMLEO) also raised questions with regard to the Boston Police Department's explanation of removing Sergeant Detective Chrispin, expressing frustration with a lack of transparency; and
- **WHEREAS,** Earlier this month, the Boston City Council submitted a letter to the Boston Police Department sharing the disappointment of the removal of Sergeant Detective Chrispin and advocating for his reinstatement; *and*
- WHEREAS, Sergeant Detective Chrispin is an outstanding leader in our community and a respectable voice in our Police Department. His removal from the Police Command Staff and the explanation provided continues to puzzle and fail to convince; NOW THEREFORE BE IT
- **RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council calls for the Boston Police Department to reinstate Eddy Chrispin to the Boston Police Department Command Staff.



2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.



³Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

Ordinances: Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Loan Orders: Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.

Orders: Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Home Rule Petitions: Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City

Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.

Order for a Hearing: A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular

matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative

action of placing it on file.

Legislative Resolution: A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal

effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as

a whole.

RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING NATIONAL PURPLE HEART DAY

- **WHEREAS:** National Purple Heart Day, observed on August 7th of every year, commemorates the creation of the oldest American military decoration for military merit. It is a day when Americans pause to remember and honor the brave men and women who were either wounded on the battlefield or paid the ultimate sacrifice with their lives; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** The Purple Heart is awarded to American Service members who served in the U.S. military who are injured, wounded or died while a prisoner of war (POW). It honors and recognizes the bravery and sacrifices of the men and women who served this country; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** Known as the Badge for Military Merit in the Revolutionary War, the Purple Heart was created by General George Washington in 1782, which was presented to soldiers for "any singularly meritorious action." The design included a purple heart-shaped piece of silk, and symbolized the devotion and courage of an American patriot; *and*
- WHEREAS: The Purple Heart was largely a footnote in the history of the Revolutionary War, until General Douglas MacArthur received the first modern day Purple Heart for his actions in World War II, and the U.S.War Department created the Order of the Purple Heart. The Purple Heart medal now bears a bust of George Washington and his coat of arms; and
- **WHEREAS:** Before 1944, the Purple Heart was presented to service members for their commendable actions. Since 1944, the Purple Heart has been awarded to service members wounded or killed in combat. It is estimated that nearly 1.9 million service members have earned Purple Hearts since its creation; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** Notable Purple Heart recipients include Senator John McCain, Senator Tammy Duckworth, Secretary of State Colin Powell, as well as President John F. Kennedy; *and*
- WHEREAS: The Purple Heart Foundation was founded in 1957 as a non-profit that raises funds to support our nation's veterans and their families. They fund important programs to help veterans recover and rehabilitate, provide academic scholarships, counseling services, financial, occupational and health education to military veterans and their families, and support research efforts and resources for veteran issues facing Post Traumatic Stress (PTS) and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI); and
- **WHEREAS:** US Military personnel, veterans, and fallen heroes have made important contributions and sacrifices to our country. On National Purple Heart Day, we remember and honor their achievements and stand in solidarity with them; *and*

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:

That the Boston City Council honors and recognizes those who are wounded in combat or made the supreme sacrifice in service to our country on National Purple Heart Day, continues to support our veterans and military families, and declares today National Purple Heart Day in the City of Boston.
