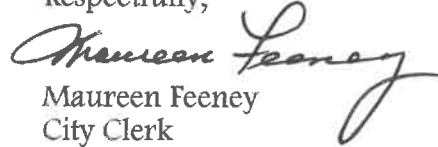

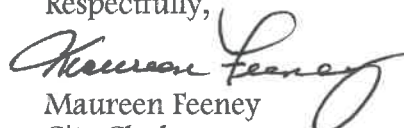

ACTION FOR BOSTON CHILDREN

June 2019

To the students, families, educators, and community members in Boston,

I am calling for Action for Boston Children.

Over the last several years, numerous studies and reports have detailed the systemic and long-standing challenges related to equity and quality in the Boston Public Schools. Racial and ethnic gaps across many achievement measures are stark, and some of them have even increased in the past decade. Too many of our students with special needs and English Learners, and the majority of students in poorer neighborhoods, are unable to access quality programs and schools. And when some of our city's brightest students – our valedictorians – struggle to complete college and never earn a middle-class income, what does it say about Boston's ability to provide a quality public education?

In my role as City Councilor, I have had the privilege of hearing and learning from many educators and community partners, witnessing the important work they do with our children. These public servants are doing their best, and in many cases helping students achieve great things. But these bright spots in many classrooms contrast against a school system that is not moving forward at the rate we need; to the contrary, I am struck by the sense that progress in education often gets *stuck* in Boston.

As we welcome a new Superintendent to Boston, we have before us a pivotal opportunity for change. I have spent the last several months asking families, school leaders, educators and the community to reflect with me on a few important questions: How can we accelerate action for Boston children? Which issues are most critical to address? And what steps should we take to get started? Their answers informed my thinking, and I highlight them here:

- ▶ **First, we must align on a common set of values that guide us.** For me, and many others, the overarching value is equity. But equity can mean different things to different people, and we as a community need to align on what it will mean for our public school system. I offer my definition in this report, and hope to continue the dialogue across the city.
- ▶ **Second, we must focus on a few areas that are most critical to unlocking progress for our children.** After hearing from a broad, diverse set of voices in the community, I see four areas as most critical:
 - ▶ #1: A Central Office that Serves Schools and the Community
 - ▶ #2: Access to Quality Schools
 - ▶ #3: Early Foundations for Lifelong Learning
 - ▶ #4: High Schools that Prepare Students for Success
- ▶ **Third, the district needs to make concrete commitments that allow for real public accountability.** In the past, BPS has "agreed" with outside research, but left its response vague enough that it is hard to know what is really changing. In this report, I recommend specific action steps, along with expectations for timing. These won't solve everything, but they can create momentum towards greater equity and excellence.

Ultimately, taking action is a matter of public and political will. We all must demand that the pace of change in BPS rise to meet the urgency of our children's needs. As we welcome a new Superintendent to Boston, I look forward to collaborating with the district on taking bold and courageous steps to move forward, and encouraging my partners and constituents to do the same.

I invite you to join me in calling for Action for Boston Children.

WHEREAS: S1441/H2029, "*An Act Relative to the Architectural Access Board*" is sponsored and championed by numerous state legislators including many members of the Boston delegation, as it updates the Architectural Access Board's jurisdiction to align with the Americans with Disabilities Act; *and*

WHEREAS: The Massachusetts Architectural Access Board (MAAB) is the state's accessibility and oversight enforcement body, which develops and enforces regulations designed to make public buildings accessible to, functional for, and safe for use by persons with disabilities, yet it can only uphold compliance with state law, which has fallen decades behind the federal Americans with Disabilities Act; *and*

WHEREAS: S.1441/H.2029 would make more housing units accessible by requiring adaptable units in renovated buildings, as well as requiring employee areas in commercial buildings to be accessible; *and*

WHEREAS: The passage of S.1441/H.2029 would ensure that the buildings in the Commonwealth are ADA compliant, and that our residents with disabilities are able to have accessible living and working spaces; *now therefore be it*

RESOLVED: The Boston City Council strongly supports the passage of S.1441/H.2029 "*An Act Relative to the Architectural Access Board*", and urge prompt action in the approval of this legislation; *and be it further*

WHEREAS: Boston administration officials and advocates spoke about ways to expand opportunities for persons with disabilities, including in workforce training and employment; *and*

WHEREAS: According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the unemployment rate for persons with disabilities is twice as high as those without a disability in 2018, and it is critical that we support measures to increase and ensure access to opportunities for those with disabilities in education, vocational training, and employment; *and*

WHEREAS: The Representatives of Work Inc. together with other advocates, requested from the Boston City Council through its Committee on City, Neighborhood Services and Veteran and Military Affairs for support and advocacy for the passage of an important legislation being considered in the Massachusetts Legislature called "*An Act Relative to the Employment of Persons with Disabilities on State Contracts*"; *and*

WHEREAS: S.1810/H.2671 "*An Act Relative to the Employment of Persons with Disabilities on State Contracts*" is sponsored and championed by many state legislators including many members of the Boston delegation; *and*

WHEREAS: The bill calls for contracts issued for services in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts or any political subdivision that receives appropriated funds from the state to have at least 10% of the people hired for the contract be individuals with disabilities; *and*

WHEREAS: The hiring percentage requirement laid out in the bill would be phased into effect as follows: January 1, 2021, at least 2% hired would be persons with disabilities; January 1, 2022, at least 4%; January 1, 2023, at least 6%; January 1, 2024, at least 8%; January 1, 2025, at least 10%; *and*

WHEREAS: This legislation would expand opportunities for persons with disabilities in the workforce and help them to achieve their full potential and career goals, and allow the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to be a leader in promoting equity for persons with disabilities; *now therefore be it*

RESOLVED: The Boston City Council supports the passage of S.1810/H.2671 “*An Act Relative to the Employment of Persons with Disabilities on State Contracts*” and urge prompt action in the approval of this important legislation; *and be it further*

- WHEREAS, The City of Boston is in a building boom with a projection of 69,000 units of housing to be built by 2030; and
- WHEREAS, This building expansion has been responsible for the loss of an unprecedented numbers of old growth trees, with little thought being given to the detrimental effects this loss will have on the environment, the city and its residents; and
- WHEREAS, Trees are recognized for their ability to improve air quality, protect from glare and heat, reduce noise, aid in the stabilization of soil, provide natural flood and drainage control, enhance aesthetics and property values, contribute to the character of neighborhoods and provide natural privacy to residents; and
- WHEREAS, Boston had a goal of planting 100,000 street trees by 2020 and to date Boston has planted 10,000 and removed 6,000. These numbers do not include the number of trees Removed from development sites; and
- WHEREAS, Trees are often removed from a piece of land well in advance of a development proposal entering into the permitting and design process preventing input from the city or the community regarding removal or replacement; and
- WHEREAS, Cities, towns and municipalities, including Wellesley, Lexington, Newton and Portland, have successfully instituted permitting processes, ordinances and bylaws to protect and preserve the tree canopies of their municipalities; and
- WHEREAS, Boston is in the process of developing a Climate Ready Boston plan to address the effects of global warming it would be a perfect opportunity to enhance that plan by addressing methods to protect and preserve existing old growth trees in the city; and

NOW,

THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED.

That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss expansion of city development requirements with a focus on achieving baseline tree preservation and replacement. The City Council shall consider each ordinance or loan order so presented and shall either adopt or reject the same within sixty days after the date when it is filed as aforesaid. If such ordinance or loan order is not rejected within sixty days, it shall be in force as if adopted by the city council unless previously withdrawn by the mayor.

2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

Home Rule Petitions Not Responded to by the Mayor³

³Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- Ordinances:*** Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Loan Orders:*** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- Orders:*** Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Home Rule Petitions:*** Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.

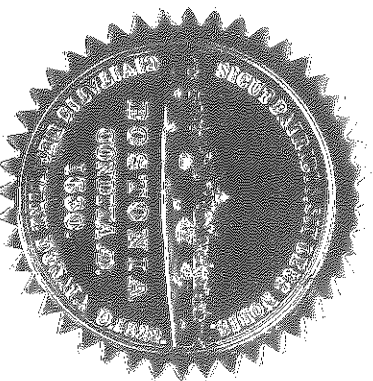

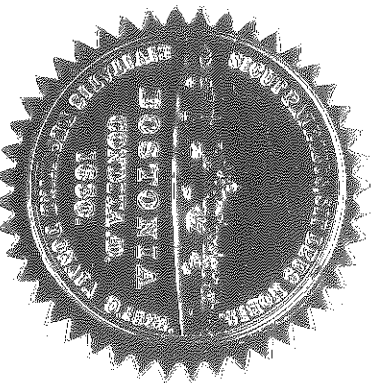
