### **APPROVAL OF THE MAY 6, 2026 CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES**

#### **COMMUNICATIONS FROM HER HONOR, THE MAYOR:**

**0968** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston, acting through its Mayor's Office of Housing, to accept and expend payments in the amount of Thirty Million Dollars (\$30,000,000.00) given to the City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Policy Fund. The City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Policy (IDP) Fund was established by Executive Order in February 2000 to support the production and preservation of affordable housing in new market rate housing developments. The IDP required all developers of residential development projects with ten or more units to include affordable units in their projects as a condition of receiving relief from the Boston Zoning Code. Further, the Executive Order provided the option for developers to make contributions to the IDP Fund in lieu of providing on-site affordable units, subject to the approval of the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA).

- 0969** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Twelve Million Five Hundred Seventy-Three Thousand Six Hundred Four Dollars (\$12,573,604.00) in the form of a grant, 2026 FIFA World Cup Grant Program, awarded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, passed through the MA Executive Office of Public Safety & Security, to be administered by the Office of Emergency Preparedness. The grant would fund support to the safety and security needs of our Massachusetts state and local entities directly involved with providing services for the Boston 2026 World Cup event.
- 0970** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of One Million Seventy-Three Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-Nine Dollars and Thirty-Four Cents (\$1,073,239.34) in the form of a grant, the FY26 Senator Charles E. Shannon Jr. Community Safety Initiative, awarded by MA Executive Office Of Public Safety & Security to be administered by the Police Department. The grant would fund regional and multi-disciplinary approaches to combat gang violence through coordinated prevention and intervention, law enforcement, prosecution, and reintegration programs.
- 0971** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Three Hundred Five Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$305,600.00) in the form of a grant, FY26 Local Cultural Council Program, awarded by Massachusetts Cultural Council to be administered by the Office of Arts & Culture. The grant would fund innovative arts, humanities, and interpretive sciences programming that enhances the quality of life in our city.
- 0972** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) in the form of a grant, 35-75 Morrissey Boulevard Mitigation Funds, awarded by Boston Planning & Development Agency to be administered by the Office of Economic Opportunity & Inclusion. The grant would fund mitigation funds from development project located at 35-75 Morrissey Boulevard to BPDA Community Benefits Fund which will be given via MOA to OEI for use in the Commercial Acquisition Assistance Program (CAAP).

**0973** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of One Hundred Ninety-Four Thousand Three Hundred Eighty-Eight Dollars and Twenty-Eight Cents (\$194,388.28) in the form of a grant, Federal FY26 Nutrition Services Incentive Program, awarded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, passed through the MA Executive Office of Elder Affairs, to be administered by the Age Strong Commission. The grant would fund incentives to states and eligible tribal organizations for the efficient delivery of nutritious meals to individuals aged 60 and older, with the overarching goal of promoting health, reducing hunger and food insecurity, and supporting the ability of older individuals to remain independent and in their communities.

**0974** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-Seven Dollars And Ninety-Six Cents (\$150,327.96) in the form of a grant, the FY25 Violence Against Women Act, a STOP Grant, awarded by United States Department of Justice, passed through the MA Executive Office of Public Safety & Security, to be administered by the Police Department. The grant would fund a Civilian Domestic Violence Advocate to provide services for victims in Jamaica Plain and East Boston, as well as for Spanish-speaking victims citywide and also supporting overtime for all Civilian Domestic Violence Advocates citywide.

**0975** Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) in the form of a grant, Boston Family Days 2026 Donor Support, awarded by Pilot House Philanthropy to be administered by the Office of Arts & Culture. The grant would fund 2026 flexible programmatic support for Boston Family Days (formerly known as BPS Sundays during the pilot program) from Amos and Barbara Hostetter via Pilot House.

I urge your Honorable Body to adopt this Order expeditiously so that the City may accept the funds and expend them for the purposes for which these funds were given.



**ORDERED:** That under the provisions of section 1.17F of Chapter 376 of the Acts of 1951 as amended by section 16 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982, and any other applicable provision of law, the Mayor, be, and hereby is, requested to obtain and deliver to the City Council, within one week of the receipt hereof, the following information regarding MWBE participation, local business inclusion, workforce impact, and procurement practices associated with the White Stadium project:

Please see the attached “White Stadium Supplier Diversity Initiatives Outreach Plan” for a detailed plan of the City’s outreach activities for the White Stadium project.

Outreach was conducted by both the City and the general contractor to ensure local M/WBEs were aware of project opportunities. BOND and BLFC contracted with a DEI in construction consultant, InOrder Business, to help notify and contact diverse qualified contractors of upcoming opportunities for both the East and West grandstands. The City hosted targeted, contracting fairs open to all local businesses to learn about upcoming opportunities and connect with the project teams. The City also publicly advertised upcoming opportunities via the White Stadium Supplier Diversity Initiative Dashboard and shared opportunities with the White Stadium Advisory Group to share with their networks.

InOrder Business also coordinated with local Unions to identify and engage signatory local MBE, WBE, and MWBE firms. These efforts uncovered 19 local subcontractors, each of whom were added to the respective bid lists for the CM controlled scopes on both projects. Additional direct outreach was conducted to these firms (and many other non-local MBE, WBE, MWBE firms). Further, BOND hosted a Meet The Primes event for local MBE, WBE, and MWBE firms looking for opportunities to engage as sub-tiers. To date, contracts have been issued to 5 of the 19 local MBE and M/WBE firms, while continuing to pursue additional awards as buyout continues.

Qualifications for the East Grandstand project were limited to Union businesses for non-149A (CM controlled) scopes of work and DCAMM Certification for 149A Filed Sub-Bids. On the West Grandstand project, all subcontractors need to be signatory Union contractors to qualify.

6. Please provide documentation describing how MWBE and local participation goals are monitored and enforced, including compliance reviews, reporting requirements, corrective actions, any waivers or modifications granted, and any penalties assessed.

East Grandstand: See the attached SDO Pilot Program Solicitation Language used for the White Stadium East Grandstand project. This language is only effective for the East Grandstand and relates to the M/WBE utilization goals (7.7% MBE & 9.5% WBE) set by

the City's Department of Supplier Diversity (DSD). DSD Construction Monitors work with the general contractor to track and monitor utilization goal compliance via the supplier diversity tracking software B2GNow. GC's are responsible for submitting audit reports which are reviewed and approved by DSD Construction Monitors. The language details all monitoring and enforcement efforts, how compliance is tracked and what penalties may incur should the GC fail to comply. Good Faith Efforts Waivers may be submitted but were not for this project.

**\*NOTE\*** - Goals were set once sufficient data on trades and trade estimates were available - goals must be set based on final project scopes/estimates & availability of firms in the City's market area as determined by the City's 2020 Disparity Study. Because this project operates as 149A - the final design was not ready at the time of GC solicitation. The final goals were established by the City's Department of Supplier Diversity and agreed upon by BOND once the design was completed - these goals would have been the same for any GC selected.

**West Grandstand:** The West Grandstand project follows a very similar process to the East Grandstand, implementing best practices including but not limited to: the collection of commitment strategies during the bid process, letters of intent issued to MBE/WBE once a prime contract is awarded, and dual party monthly expenditure reporting throughout construction to ensure payments are aligned with commitments.

Both sides of the project report and track progress towards goals publicly via the White Stadium Supplier Diversity initiative dashboard.

7. Please identify all specific changes made to the White Stadium project in response to community feedback, describe how those changes affected overall project costs, and provide documentation reflecting those changes and their impact on existing contract awards or allocations.

Since July 2023, the project team has conducted more than 100 public and small group meetings gathering feedback on design, programming, transportation, and community benefits. The changes below reflect that input directly:

**Design:** Park advocates and neighbors emphasized preserving Franklin Park's historic and character-defining features like viewsheds, legacy trees, Roxbury puddingstone outcroppings, and the landscape elements that define the park's identity. The design evolved through three major phases in direct response, resulting in: reducing the West Grandstand width and field size; removing the bean building in The Grove; protecting character-defining landscape elements; reducing pavement and aligning pathway design with Franklin Park Action Plan recommendations; removing vehicles from Playstead Road; consolidating program into wings; relocating the scoreboard; replacing permanent with temporary fencing; embracing cross-functional use of both grandstands; and maintaining and expanding the 8-lane track with

new field sports opportunities. Community feedback also drove the inclusion of park-facing restrooms and water fountains available to all park users 365 days a year, amenities that did not previously exist. All key BPS programmatic elements requested by BPS staff, coaches, and students were preserved through the design evolution.

**Lease Agreement and Community Benefits:** Community advocacy, led significantly by the Franklin Park Coalition, secured legally binding commitments in the lease including: a per-ticket surcharge dedicated to Franklin Park and the Franklin Park Action Plan; BLFC's \$500,000 annual community fund for youth sports, health and wellness for local Black and Brown communities, and local business investment; scheduling priority for BPS and community events; game time restrictions; lighting and noise monitoring; and establishment of White Stadium Neighborhood Advisory Council.

**On Cost and Contract Impact:** Design decisions were guided by clear community priorities to protect BPS Athletics programmatic spaces, add public park amenities, and implement Franklin Park Action Plan recommendations. These priorities shaped where resources were directed, with changes incorporated into updated cost estimates iteratively in coordination with the design and construction teams. Design changes made in response to community feedback were incorporated into project scope as part of the normal contracting process, not as modifications to existing awards. Community input defines what gets built, which then informs what goes out to contract. The City's supplier diversity goals and requirements applied consistently throughout.

The City has conducted a three-year community engagement process on the White Stadium project spanning July 2023 through the present (April 2026), hosting more than 100 public and small group meetings gathering feedback on design, programming, transportation, and community benefits. At every meeting, the City presented the most current version of the project and addressed the topics raised by attendees, ranging from design and transportation to BPS Athletics programming, community benefits, supplier diversity, and legal agreements. The



Franklin Park Coalition closely reviewed and commented extensively on the lease and stadium use agreement. **The most recent public materials, including the latest transportation meeting presentation, are available [here](#).**

Since July 2023, the City has maintained two publicly available feedback forms (general and transportation-specific) at [boston.gov/whitestadium](https://boston.gov/whitestadium), a monitored project email inbox, and public comment periods at all large meetings. Responses were tracked for recurring themes and fed back into planning. In 2024 alone, the project received over 900 public comments. In addition, [the Franklin Park Coalition independently surveyed over 700 park users](#), producing nearly 60 discrete recommendations, the majority of which have been incorporated into the project.

### **How Input Shaped the Project**

1. **Design:** Three major design phases responded directly to community feedback, resulting in: reducing the West Grandstand width and field size; removing the bean building in The Grove; protecting character-defining landscape elements; reducing pavement in The Grove and aligning pathway design with Franklin Park Action Plan recommendations; removing vehicles from Playstead Road; consolidating program into wings; relocating the scoreboard; replacing permanent fencing with temporary

infrastructure; embracing cross-functional use of both grandstands; and maintaining and expanding the 8-lane track with new field sports opportunities.

**2. BPS Athletics programming and operations:** Coaches, athletic directors, and BPS staff shaped the programmatic scope from the ground up, with ongoing engagement continuing to refine facility specifications and interior spaces.

**3. Lease Agreement and Community Benefits:** With the support of the Franklin Park Coalition and many neighborhood groups and residents, the City successfully negotiated for legally binding commitments including: a per-ticket surcharge dedicated to Franklin Park and the Franklin Park Action Plan; BLFC's \$500,000 annual community fund contribution for youth sports, health and wellness for local Black and Brown communities, and local business investment; explicit prioritization of BPS and community events in the Stadium; lighting and noise monitoring requirements; new annual funding for BPS athletics, establishment of White Stadium Neighborhood Advisory Council, and [the largest private benefits package ever negotiated by BPS and the City of Boston](#).

**4. Transportation:** Community input shaped core elements of the transportation plan, including MBTA shuttle station selection and a landmark commitment to electric shuttles. While the City expects to finalize the Transportation Access Plan Agreement (TAPA) shortly, after receiving and incorporating more than 200 comments, the City is continuing to seek feedback on neighborhood parking protection, visitor passes.

4. Please provide documentation detailing the full financial scope of the White Stadium project, including:

- All calculations related to project costs beyond the publicly stated \$135 million

The City plans to finance the project with the sale of General Obligation (GO) bonds. The authorization to issue debt for this purpose has been provided by the City Council in various loan orders filed over the past 3 years.

- Total projected cost over time, including repayment schedules

When the City issues bonds to pay for the cost of a project, we end up repaying both the principal and interest on those bonds. Typically, the City expects to see around 3-5% interest rates on our bonds.

- Documentation describing how these costs will be funded

To fund our capital projects, the City issues General Obligation (GO) bonds, which are backed by the full faith and credit of the City. We repay the debt on these bonds from the Operating Budget's debt service.

- The anticipated duration of any repayment obligations

The City typically issues bonds with a 20 year maturity.

Additionally, in June 2024, an additional traffic impact study with the assumption that there was a BLFC game day at full capacity to determine the impact of an NWSL event on the current transportation conditions within Franklin Park. Please find this traffic study attached to this response.

2. Please provide documentation describing the methodology used to conclude that White Stadium will operate as a carbon neutral facility, including how total emissions will be calculated, monitored, reported, and verified.

Details of monitoring, reporting, and verification are still being developed by BLFC at this time, but BLFC is committed to operating White Stadium as a "Net Zero Carbon" facility. As a reminder, the rehabilitated White Stadium will use no fossil fuels in its daily on-site operations, and natural gas lines are not even being installed as part of the current utility work. In collaboration with the City Planning Department's Article 37 review team, the West project is exploring the use of low-embodied carbon concrete (LECC). As committed to by BLFC in the BPDA Board Memo (July 2024) the project is designed with "efficient, all-electric systems and the Proponent will utilize 100 percent renewable electricity such as Boston Community Choice Electricity's 'Green 100' or similar source or the equivalent of Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) to annually achieve Zero Net Carbon operating performance." Furthermore, as a reminder, both the East and West are obtaining LEED certification: the West Grandstand remains on track to be "LEED Gold certifiable," and the East project is projected to be "LEED Silver Certified."

3. Please provide documentation quantifying the embodied carbon associated with demolition and new construction at the site, and identify the specific measures proposed to offset those emissions.

Expanding upon the response provided for #2 above, BLFC is committed to exploring appropriate applications for low-embodied carbon concrete (LECC) in all aspects of the project,

including the West Grandstand, the South Crescent Building, and the various concrete pours associated with site improvements. The BLFC design team is currently engaged in this work, and we are happy to provide an update in the coming months if so requested.

4. Please provide documentation describing any planned nature-based carbon offsets, including tree planting or green space expansion, and any analysis quantifying anticipated carbon sequestration relative to tree removal and existing site conditions.

As presented at the December 12, 2024 community presentation, “Tree Canopy at White Stadium: Impacts and Canopy Investments,” the White Stadium Rehabilitation Project has prioritized preserving all feasible mature, native trees while offsetting unavoidable removals through a combination of on-site planting and the creation of the “Franklin Park Tree Bank.” The Tree Bank will fund the planting of more than 500 new trees throughout Franklin Park by the Boston Parks and Recreation Department (BPRD) in addition to up to 100 trees that will be planted within the Stadium site prior to its reopening. Both the planting and removal of trees have been informed by the Franklin Park Action Plan. The new planting of native, climate-adaptive tree species will result in a net increase in canopy cover, support biodiversity and wildlife habitat, and are projected to sequester about 30,000 pounds of carbon annually when the new trees reach maturity

5. Please provide documentation describing the plan for a 100% electric shuttle fleet, including emissions projections during the transition period and any interim mitigation measures prior to full electrification.

As outlined in the Cooperation Agreement and the soon-to-be-executed Transportation Access Plan Agreement (TAPA); Boston Legacy Football Club will use environmentally sensitive shuttles with a fully electric shuttle fleet at the earliest commercially practicable time, which is targeted to be within two years of the execution of the TAPA (i.e. 2028 NWSL season). BLFC is currently evaluating shuttle options, including vehicle type, fuel source, and operational characteristics, to minimize greenhouse gas emissions and overall environmental impact to the extent practicable during the transition period.

6. Please provide any waste management or zero-waste operational plans associated with White Stadium events.

Per the legal agreements associated with the project, Boston Legacy will be responsible for maintenance and operations at the Stadium. This is projected to save the City over \$2M dollars annually. At this point in the design process, waste management plans have not been fully developed, however the City and BLFC are committed to minimizing waste at White Stadium. The waste management plan, including trash, recycling, and composting plans will be written into the Operations and Maintenance Manual (O&M Manual) which will outline how waste disposal will be addressed. The O&M Manual will be written in collaboration with BPS, Public Facilities Department, & BLFC.

7. Please clarify whether the Franklin Park parking and access analysis includes projected

event-day impacts associated with professional matches and other stadium events, and if not, please provide documentation explaining how cumulative park impacts were evaluated prior to construction.

As part of the Article 80 Large Project Review Process, a transportation impact assessment study was conducted. This transportation study adheres to the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) Transportation Access Plan Guidelines and Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) Article 80 Large Project Review process. The cumulative park impacts were determined by utilizing existing traffic data collected at multiple locations along Circuit Drive in June 2024. Weather conditions were optimal for activity within Franklin Park, with clear skies and temperatures above 70 degrees. The traffic associated with a full capacity, 11,000 spectators, NWSL events was then added to determine the impact of an NWSL event on the current transportation conditions within Franklin Park. 



### ORDINANCE FOR THE USE OF SCHOOL BUS VIOLATION DETECTION MONITORING SYSTEM DEVICES

**WHEREAS,** School buses should be respected by all parties using the road and yet their stop signs continue to be disregarded as little enforcement is currently available; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Across the Commonwealth, school districts have launched school bus camera pilots such as nearby Peabody that recorded over 850 vehicles illegally passing school buses within the first 5 weeks of the school year.

**WHEREAS,** School bus stop enforcement should be regarded as a community concern not just to those utilizing the school bus. Drivers must be held accountable for unsafe behavior that could result in the fatality of school children

**WHEREAS,** The Boston City Council voted, in 2025, to locally adopt M.G.L c. 40 Section 71 and M.G.L. c. 90 Section 14, authorizing the installation and operation of a school bus violation detection monitoring system to enforce violations; ***NOW,***  
**THEREFORE**

***Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:***

#### Section 1.

That the City of Boston Code Municipal, Chapter VII, Section 7 is hereby amended by the addition of subsection 5:

#### **7-7.5 Use of School Bus Violation Detection Monitoring System Devices.**

##### ***7-7.5.1 Purpose***

For the purpose of this Section is to create better safety enforcement for school buses when their stops signs are violated. The following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

**CITATION.** A notice upon which a Police Officer shall record an occurrence involving all automobile law violations by the person cited. Each **CITATION** shall be numbered consecutively and shall be in such form and such parts as determined jointly by the Administrative Justice of the District Court Department and the registrar.

**MOTOR VEHICLE.** Shall have the meaning provided in M.G.L. Chapter 90, Section 1, “motor vehicles”.

**OPERATOR.** Shall have the meaning provided in M.G.L. Chapter 90, Section 1.

**OWNER.** Shall have the meaning provided in M.G.L. Chapter 90, Section 1.

**REGISTRAR.** The registrar of motor vehicles.

**SCHEDULED ASSESSMENT.** The amount of the civil assessment for a particular civil motor vehicle infraction, as established jointly by the Chief Justice of the District Court Department and the registrar. A *Scheduled Assessment* shall not exceed the maximum assessment or fine established by law for each such violation. A schedule of such assessments shall be visibly posted in each Office of the Registry of Motor Vehicles and in the Clerk-Magistrate’s Office of each District Court.

**SCHOOL BUS VIOLATION DETECTION MONITORING SYSTEM.** Shall have the same meaning provided in M.G.L. Chapter 90, Section 14C.

**STOP ARM TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGN.** Shall have the same meaning provided in M.G.L. Chapter 90, Section 14C.

#### **7-7.5.2 Installation and Operation of School Bus Violation Detection Monitoring System Devices**

- (a) Pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 90 section 14C, the city shall install a school bus violation detection monitoring system to every school bus regularly employed in the transportation of children to schools in the city, solely to enforce the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 90 section 14 and 14C, and shall impose penalties pursuant to this section. Such systems shall be installed on the stop arm traffic control sign, as defined in M.G.L Chapter 90, Section 14C. This Section shall not apply to those vehicles owned or leased by the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority.
- (b) No school bus violation detection monitoring system shall be utilized in such a manner as to take a frontal view photograph of the motor vehicle that is in violation of the traffic control signal or to take a rear view photograph of the vehicle above the bottom of the rear window.
- (c) A school bus with a school bus violation detection monitoring system shall post signage indicating the use of said system. The signage shall remain on each school bus while a school bus violation detection monitoring system is in operation.

#### **7-7.5.3 Implementation and Administration**

- (a) The Executive Director of Transportation for Boston Public Schools shall supervise and coordinate the implementation and administration of school bus violation detection monitoring systems. Upon detection, the Executive Director of Transportation for Boston

Public Schools and the delivery of the photographic materials to the Boston Police Department.

- (b) The City may enter into an agreement with a private vendor or manufacturer to provide a school bus violation detection monitoring system on each bus within its fleet whether the school bus is owned or leased, including the installation, operation and maintenance of such systems. Said agreement shall only become effective after a vote of a majority of the School Committee.

#### **7-7.5.4 Record Keeping of Photographic Evidence Obtained**

- (a) Photographic and other recorded evidence obtained through the use of automated enforcement devices deployed as a means of promoting traffic safety authorized herein within the city shall be destroyed within two weeks of final disposition of any recorded event.
- (b) No photographs, microphotographs or other recorded images taken in conformance with this act shall be discoverable in any judicial or administrative proceeding other than a proceeding held pursuant to this Section; and no photographs, microphotographs or other recorded images taken in conformance with this Section shall be admissible in any judicial or administrative proceeding other than in a proceeding to adjudicate liability for such violation of this Section.
- (c) Other than for purposes of enforcement of a violation of this Section or for purposes of an owner defending a violation of this Section, no private entity or individual may obtain photographs, microphotographs or other recorded images or records taken pursuant to this Section.

#### **7-7.5.5 Inspection of Evidence: Citations and Penalties**

- (a) An evidence file of an alleged violation pursuant to section 14C shall be forwarded to the Boston Police Department. After inspection of photographs, microphotographs or other recorded images produced by the system, an officer shall issue a citation in the manner provided in M.G.L. Chapter 90 section 14 and 14C and M.G.L. Chapter 90C on the owner of a motor vehicle for failure by the operator thereof to comply with the laws, codes, regulations, ordinances, rules and/or other forms of legislation governing the behavior of the operator of a motor vehicle.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the Boston Police Department to deliver the citation to the registered owner or owners of any motor vehicle identified in any photographs, microphotographs, streaming video or other recorded images produced by such device as evidence of a violation pursuant to this Section. Such citation shall contain, but not be limited to, the following information: a copy of the aforementioned recorded images showing the vehicle in violation of the stop arm traffic control sign; the registration number and state of issuance of said registration number of the vehicle; the date, time and intersection location of the violation; the specific violation charged; a schedule of fines for such violation as established by the city or town; instructions for the return of the

notice; and text as follows: “This notice may be returned personally, by mail, or by an Agent authorized in writing. A hearing before a magistrate of the district court may be obtained upon the written request of the registered owner in writing. Failure to obey this notice within 20 days of issuance will result in the non-renewal or suspension of the license to drive and/or the certificate of registration of the registered owner”.

- (i) In the case of a citation involving a motor vehicle registered under the laws of the commonwealth, such citation shall be mailed within 14 days of the violation, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, to the address of the registered owner or owners as listed in the records of the registrar of motor vehicles. In the case of any motor vehicle registered under the laws of another state or country, such notice of citation shall be mailed within 21 days of the violation, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, to the address of the registered owner or owners as listed in the records of the official in such state or country having charge of the registration of such motor vehicle. If said address is unavailable, it shall be sufficient for the Boston Police Department to mail the notice of citation to the official in such state or country having charge of the registration of such motor vehicle.
- (ii) Any motor vehicle owner to whom a citation has been issued pursuant to this act may admit responsibility for such violation and pay the fine provided therein. Payment shall be made by mailing both payment and citation to the registrar at the address indicated on the citation or by appearing before the registrar during normal business hours, either personally or through a duly authorized Agent. Payment by mail shall be made only by money order, credit card or check made out to the registrar. Payment of the established fine and any applicable penalties shall operate as a final disposition of the case. Payment of the fine by one motor vehicle owner shall be satisfaction of the fine as to all other motor vehicle owners of the same motor vehicle for the same violation.
- (iii) Any owner to whom a citation has been issued may within 20 days of the mailing of said citation request a hearing to contest liability, by making a signed request on the back of the citation and mailing such citation to the registrar at the address indicated on the citation, or by appearing before the registrar during regular business hours, personally or through a duly authorized Agent. Upon receipt of hearing request, in accordance with M.G.L. Chapter 90C, Section 3, the registrar shall notify the Clerk-Magistrate in the District Court in judicial district in which the violation occurred of such request for a hearing. The Clerk-Magistrate shall send written notice of the date, time and place of said hearing by first class mail to each registered owner and the Police Officer who issued the citation. The hearing shall be conducted by a Clerk-Magistrate or justice in accordance with M.G.L.

Chapter 90C, Section 3. If, at the conclusion of the hearing, the violator is found responsible, the Clerk-Magistrate or justice shall order the violator to pay an assessment to the registrar, which shall not exceed the scheduled assessment for the infraction.

- (c) Any owner to whom a citation has been issued shall not be liable for a violation under the provisions of this Section:
  - (i) If the violation was necessary to allow the passage of an emergency vehicle;
  - (ii) If the violation was necessary in order to protect the property or person of another;
  - (iii) If the violation was incurred while participating in a funeral procession;
  - (iv) If the violation was incurred during a period of time in which the motor vehicle was reported to the Police Department of any state, city or town as having been stolen and had not been recovered prior to the time the violation occurred;
  - (v) If the operator of the motor vehicle was operating the motor vehicle under a rental or lease agreement and the owner of the motor vehicle is a rental or leasing company and has complied with the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 90, Section 20E; and
  - (vi) If the violation was necessary to comply with any other law or regulation governing the operation of a motor vehicle at the intersection.
  
- (d) An owner disputing a citation under this Section shall, within 20 days, provide the registrar with the citation with a signed request for a hearing on the back and a signed affidavit stating:
  - 1. The reason for disputing the violation;
  - 2. The full legal name and address of the owner of the motor vehicle;
  - 3. The full legal name and address of the operator of the motor vehicle at the time the violation occurred;
  - 4. The names and addresses of all witnesses supporting the owner's defense and the specifics of their knowledge; and
  - 5. Where applicable, signed statements from witnesses.
  
- (f) The consequences for an owner to whom a citation has been issued who fails to pay the fine provided for in said notice in accordance with this section, or fails to appear for a requested hearing in accordance with this section, or fails to receive a favorable adjudication of said citation at a hearing, or fails to pay the assessment or fine imposed by the Clerk- Magistrate or justice in division (D)(6) above, are as follows: Upon notification of such failure to the registrar, the registrar shall notify the violator that after the expiration of 30 days from the date of the mailing of notification until the fine or assessment and any applicable late fees are paid, the registrar shall not issue or renew or

may suspend such owner's license to operate a motor vehicle and/or motor vehicle registration.

- (1) For each violation the owner or owners of a vehicle shall be fined the maximum scheduled assessment for the infraction of a red light violation.
  - (2) All penalties may be increased by up to 33% if said fine remains unpaid in excess of 30 days after a citation has been issued.
  - (3) A penalty imposed for a violation shall not be deemed a criminal conviction.
- (g) The compensation paid to the manufacturer or vendor of the school bus violation detection monitoring system deployed as a means of promoting traffic safety as authorized herein shall not be based upon the number of traffic citations issued or any portion or percentage of the fine generated by such citations. The compensation paid to such manufacturer or vendor of the equipment shall be based upon the value of such equipment and the services provided or rendered in support of the school bus violation detection monitoring system.

#### **7-7.5.6 Annual Report**

The administrator of the school bus violation detection monitoring system within any city, town or district accepting this section shall submit an annual report to the Massachusetts Department of Transportation regarding the use and operation of each system. The report shall contain:

- (a) Data on the number of citations issued under this section at each particular intersection, and of those citations, shall detail:
  - (i) The number paid without a request for a hearing;
  - (ii) The number found responsible after a hearing; and
  - (iii) The number dismissed after a hearing; and
  - (iv) The cost to maintain each system and the amount of revenue obtained from each 95 system.

#### **7-7.5.7 Severability**

If any of the provisions of this Section, or the application of such provision to any persons or circumstances, shall be held invalid, the remainder thereof, or the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those wherein it is held invalid, shall not be affected thereby.

#### **Section 2.**

The provisions of this ordinance shall be effective immediately upon passage.

### ORDER FOR A HEARING TO EXAMINE FIREARM TRAFFICKING, GUN VIOLENCE HOTSPOTS, AND THE CONCENTRATION OF FIREARM VIOLATIONS IN BOSTON POLICE DISTRICTS B-2 AND B-3

**WHEREAS**, The Boston Police Department's 2025 Boston Firearm Trafficking Report documented that the Department forensically processed 819 firearms in 2025, including 515 firearms identified as crime guns, and identified continued concentrations of firearm recoveries in areas experiencing elevated levels of gun violence; *and*

**WHEREAS**, The report found that firearm recoveries and firearm violence were heavily concentrated in specific neighborhoods and police districts, particularly within Boston Police District B-2, which includes parts of Roxbury, Mission Hill, and the South End, and Boston Police District B-3, which includes Mattapan and parts of Dorchester, as reflected in the hotspot comparison maps analyzing shootings, shots fired incidents, and firearm recoveries throughout the City; *and*

**WHEREAS**, The report documented ongoing concerns regarding illegal firearm trafficking, including the continued recovery of ghost guns, firearms equipped with high-capacity magazines and modifications, firearms originating from outside Massachusetts, and increasing juvenile firearm arrests; *and*

**WHEREAS**, According to the report, approximately one-third of crime guns recovered in 2025 were equipped with high-capacity or extended magazines, more than half of traced firearms originated outside Massachusetts, and juvenile firearm arrests increased in 2025 compared to prior years; *and*

**WHEREAS**, Residents, community organizations, violence prevention workers, and neighborhood stakeholders have consistently called for a comprehensive examination of the root causes contributing to firearm violence, including illegal firearm trafficking, youth involvement, repeat exposure to violence, economic inequities, neighborhood disinvestment, and gaps in behavioral health and intervention services; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The Boston Police Department report emphasized the importance of strategic deployment, data analysis, and coordinated responses to firearm violence, while also highlighting the need for continued evaluation of prevention and intervention efforts in the communities most impacted by gun violence; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**

**ORDERED:** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to examine firearm trafficking, gun violence hotspots, and the concentration of firearm recoveries in Boston Police Districts B-2 and B-3, including trends identified in the Boston Police Department's 2025 Boston Firearm Trafficking Report, the geographic concentration of firearm violence, the role of illegal firearm trafficking, youth firearm involvement, community violence prevention strategies, and opportunities for targeted public health and public safety interventions; and that the Boston Police Department and other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

### **ORDER FOR A HEARING TO EXAMINE HOW THE CITY OF BOSTON CAN STRENGTHEN SUPPORT, TRAINING, AND RESOURCE COORDINATION FOR FIRST RESPONDERS AND DISPATCHERS RESPONDING TO MENTAL HEALTH CRISES**

**WHEREAS,** Dispatchers, police officers, firefighters, emergency medical personnel, and other first responders are routinely called upon to respond to mental health and behavioral health emergencies and serve an essential role in protecting public safety and connecting individuals in crisis with care and support; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Emergency dispatchers and 911 call-takers often serve as the first point of contact during behavioral health emergencies and play a critical role in gathering information, coordinating resources, and ensuring that responses are tailored to the needs and safety of individuals in crisis, responding personnel, and the broader community; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Crisis Intervention Team (“CIT”) training standards in Massachusetts recognize the importance of dispatcher-specific training related to identifying mental health crisis calls, gathering relevant information from callers and collateral contacts, conducting risk assessments, improving de-escalation practices, and appropriately coding and routing calls involving behavioral health emergencies; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The Massachusetts State 911 Department and Metro Boston CIT programs provide training opportunities and best practices related to crisis intervention, suicide prevention, behavioral health response, cultural competency, coordination between 911 and 988 systems, and communication with individuals experiencing mental health crises; *and*

**WHEREAS,** As mental health-related emergency calls continue to increase nationwide and locally, it is important that the City of Boston continue exploring opportunities to strengthen training, coordination, responder wellness, resource triaging, and collaboration between first responders, dispatchers, healthcare providers, and behavioral health professionals; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Supporting first responders and dispatchers with effective tools, training, staffing resources, and coordinated response systems can improve public safety outcomes, strengthen community trust, and help ensure that individuals experiencing crises receive timely and appropriate care; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

**ORDERED:** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to examine how the City of Boston can strengthen support, training, and resource coordination for first responders and dispatchers responding to mental health crises, including but not limited to Crisis Intervention Team training, dispatcher and responder wellness supports, coordination between 911 and 988 systems, behavioral health response partnerships, de-escalation training, communication protocols, and opportunities to improve coordination among police, fire, EMS, dispatch, and public health agencies; and that representatives from the Boston Police Department, Boston Fire Department, Boston Emergency Medical Services, the Boston Public Health Commission and other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

### ORDER FOR A HEARING TO EXAMINE ESTABLISHING A COMMUNITY-BASED MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS RESPONSE PILOT

**WHEREAS**, Community members, advocates, mental health workers, and public health organizations have called for the establishment of a free, non-police, non-carceral, community-based mental health crisis response model in the City of Boston; *and*

**WHEREAS**, In 2021, the City of Boston funded a community-led design process, facilitated by The City School and Boston Liberation Health, engaging more than 200 youth and adult community members through surveys and listening sessions conducted in English, Spanish, and American Sign Language to develop a proposed mental health crisis response model for the City of Boston; *and*

**WHEREAS**, The resulting Boston Community-Led Mental Health Response Model recommended a 24-hour, community-based crisis response system rooted in public health principles, staffed by community responders with lived experience, accessible through 911 diversion, 988, and a dedicated crisis line, and designed to reduce unnecessary police involvement in mental health crises; *and*

**WHEREAS**, The proposal identified that communities most impacted by the absence of a community-based crisis response system include Black and Indigenous people and people of color, undocumented residents, disabled residents, unhoused residents, people who use drugs, survivors of violence, young people, and LGBTQ+ community members, and emphasized the importance of culturally competent, non-carceral, and consent-based approaches to care; *and*

**WHEREAS**, Community-based crisis response models operating in cities including Eugene, Oregon; Denver, Colorado; New York City; and Cambridge, Massachusetts have demonstrated that mental health-focused response systems can divert crisis calls away from law enforcement, connect residents to care and services, reduce unnecessary hospitalization and criminalization, and improve trust between communities and emergency response systems; *and*

**WHEREAS**, The Boston Community-Led Mental Health Response Model further recommended that any pilot program include strong community oversight and accountability mechanisms, coordination with emergency dispatch systems,

multilingual accessibility, neighborhood-based outreach, and independent evaluation to inform future expansion efforts; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

***ORDERED:*** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to examine establishing a community-based mental health crisis response pilot in the City of Boston, including implementation strategies, operational models, dispatch coordination, community oversight structures, public health impacts, and lessons learned from existing programs nationally; and that the Boston Public Health Commission, Boston Emergency Medical Services, and other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

### RESOLUTION URGING THE CITY OF BOSTON TO RESUME IN-PERSON WORK FOR A MINIMUM OF FOUR DAYS PER WEEK

**WHEREAS,** When the COVID-19 pandemic began, many companies quickly shifted to remote work and work from home policies to keep employees safe and comply with federal, state, and local public health guidelines. As a result, millions of people started working from home and using communication technologies like Zoom to remain in contact and productive; *and*

**WHEREAS,** In September 2023, the Boston City Council Committee on City Services and Innovation Technology held a hearing to bring City of Boston meetings and boards back in-person with a hybrid option, including abutters meetings, the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA), Boston Licensing Board (BLB), and the Boston Planning and Development Agency Board (BPDA). Since that time, only the BPDA Board has resumed true hybrid meetings of both an in-person and virtual option, while the others remain only virtual. This continued practice has excluded many of our seniors and those lacking digital access; *and*

**WHEREAS,** In 2024, a joint study with Tufts University and the Boston Policy Institute indicated that falling commercial property values on account of continued remote work policies would potentially cost the City of Boston between \$1.7 billion - \$2.1 billion in annual tax revenue. While municipalities across the country also face this vexing issue, the City of Boston may potentially be most vulnerable as 70% of its revenue is derived from property taxes, and over 50% of the City's land is owned by nonprofits or nontaxable; *and*

**WHEREAS,** At this time, with Boston over \$100 million in debt after two straight years of double digit property tax increases, the City can no longer afford all sectors of our economy to work from home indefinitely and continue to contribute towards falling commercial property values; *and*

**WHEREAS,** In April, Fidelity announced that employees would be required to return to the office five days a week beginning in September. The public sector also has a responsibility to bring foot traffic back to the City and Downtown Boston to support our small businesses and local restaurants. Being in-person is a fundamental part of public service, helping to build strong relationships with constituents and better understand their needs. Boston needs to be a desirable place to do business and remain a key driver of our city, state, and regional economy; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

**RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council urges the City of Boston to resume in-person work for a minimum 4 days per week.

- WHEREAS,** The City of Boston, in partnership with Boston Unity Soccer Partners, is undertaking construction at White Stadium in Franklin Park, a project currently estimated at \$325 million; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Construction activities have advanced into the “vertical construction” phase, including the installation of structural components that will form the permanent superstructure of the facility; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The project remains the subject of active litigation currently before the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court, which heard oral arguments April 8 2026, regarding the legality of the project under Article 97 of the Massachusetts Constitution and related statutory interpretations; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The outcome of this case may determine whether legislative approval is required, whether the current project structure is permissible, and whether elements of the project must be altered, paused, or reauthorized; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The Court is expected to issue a decision within approximately 130 days of oral arguments, creating a defined timeline for judicial resolution; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Continuing construction activities that may be difficult to reverse during this period could expose the City to financial, legal, and operational risks, including the need for rework; *and*
- WHEREAS,** A temporary pause limited specifically to new vertical construction activities would preserve the City’s flexibility while respecting ongoing legal proceeding; ***NOW THEREFORE BE IT***
- RESOLVED,** That the Boston City Council calls on the Administration to pause all new vertical construction activities at White Stadium, including the installation of structural and superstructure elements, until a final decision is issued by the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court in the pending litigation.

**WHEREAS,** This year, on May 16, 2026, Veterans and Friends of the General Edward O. Gourdin Statue Project will celebrate the 21st Annual African American Heritage Day at Edward O. Gourdin African American Veterans Memorial Park; and

**WHEREAS,** Newly renovated in 2023, culminating in the installation of artwork created by the late Fern Cunningham, the park is located directly across the street from BPD Station 2. Named in honor of Massachusetts' first African American Superior Court Judge and Brigadier General Edward O. Gourdin, the park features his statue and ten surrounding bas reliefs of African American Veterans, honoring their bravery, sacrifices, and legacy in military history—serving both our nation and our communities; and

**WHEREAS,** Twenty-one years ago, in May of that year, the Organization of Afro-American Veterans and other military veterans organizations in Boston first gathered at Peace Park—now known as the General Edward O. Gourdin African American Veterans Memorial Park—to acknowledge the history and contributions of African American military veterans; and

**WHEREAS,** African Americans have participated in every war fought by or within the United States, including the Revolutionary War during the colonial period, the War of 1812, the Mexican-American War, the Civil War, the Spanish-American War, World Wars I and II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Afghanistan War, the Iraq War, and more recent conflicts over the past several decades; and

**WHEREAS,** The 272nd Field Artillery Battalion, commanded by General Gourdin during the Korean War, was the last all-African American Army unit to be disbanded in

1954—six years after President Harry S. Truman signed Executive Order 9981 on July 26, 1948, which mandated the integration of the U.S. military and called for equality of treatment and opportunity for African American soldiers; and

**WHEREAS,** African American veterans from Boston bravely fought for freedom abroad, often at great sacrifice and risk, yet upon returning home, they frequently faced denial of those very freedoms. Despite these challenges, they persisted, thrived, and became leaders across various sectors of society and their communities; and

**WHEREAS,** The annual celebration on May 16th, known as African American Military Heritage Day, in Gourdin Park is a commemorative event honoring the service, sacrifice, and contributions of African Americans in the military. It highlights both historical and present-day achievements and challenges. **NOW, THEREFORE IT**

**RESOLVED:** The City of Boston recognizes the vital role that General Edward O. Gourdin African American Veterans Memorial Park in historic Roxbury plays in commemorating this history, ensuring that it will not be forgotten. **AND BE IT FURTHER**

**RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council acknowledges and celebrates African American Military Heritage Day on Saturday, May 16, 2026.

**WHEREAS,** KOSA, if enacted, could grant future presidential administrations, including those hostile to LGBTQIA+ rights, sweeping authority to censor LGBTQIA+ content under the guise of protecting minors, despite the opposition of hundreds of parents of transgender children, including more than one hundred from Massachusetts; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Mandatory age verification laws would require Internet users to upload government identification or submit to invasive biometric scans, creating barriers to access, undermining privacy, and disproportionately harming marginalized communities; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Weakening or repealing Section 230 would enable states with extreme anti-LGBTQIA+ or anti-reproductive rights laws to criminalize access to online content about abortion, gender-affirming care, and other constitutionally protected information and sever connections local Boston LGBTQIA+ individuals hold with the larger LGBTQIA+ community as online forums and exchanges are censored by tech companies; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Weakening or repealing Section 230 would enable states with extreme anti-LGBTQIA+ or anti-reproductive rights laws to criminalize access to online content about abortion, gender-affirming care, and other constitutionally protected information and sever connections local Boston LGBTQIA+ individuals hold with the larger LGBTQIA+ community as online forums and exchanges are censored by tech companies; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The City of Boston supports efforts to hold Big Tech accountable through legislation that targets harmful business practices without infringing upon free expression or the rights of marginalized communities, such as the Algorithmic Justice and Transparency Act, the Safe Sex Worker Study Act, the Ban Surveillance Advertising Act, the Open App Markets Act, the American Innovation and Choice Online Act, and the My Body My Data Act; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The City recognizes that protecting digital freedom is integral to safeguarding civil rights, ensuring equitable access to information, and promoting the well-being of all residents. ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

**RESOLVED:** That the City Council of Boston formally opposes the Kids Online Safety Act, the SCREEN Act, the App Store Accountability Act, any legislation requiring invasive age verification for Internet access, and any attempt to weaken or repeal Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act; ***AND BE IT FURTHER***

**RESOLVED:** That the City Council calls upon members of the Massachusetts congressional delegation and the Governor to publicly oppose these harmful bills as they stand and instead to work with the community to create and advance legislation that holds Big Tech accountable while protecting online free expression, privacy, and access to lifesaving resources; ***AND BE IT FURTHER***

**RESOLVED:** That the City Clerk shall send a copy of this resolution to the Massachusetts congressional delegation, the Governor, and the coalition of Massachusetts-based organizations opposing digital censorship.

**WHEREAS,** Haitian Heritage Month is celebrated annually across the globe during the month of May to recognize the rich history, culture, and contributions of Haitians to society, and to promote awareness and understanding of the Haitian-American community; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Haiti is the only country founded from a slave revolt, the first free Black republic in the world, the first independent state in the Caribbean and the second independent state in the Western Hemisphere after the United States; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The Haitian Flag, adopted on May 18, 1803, symbolizes the pride, resilience, and spirit of the Haitian people in their fight for freedom and independence, and is now celebrated annually on May 18th worldwide to commemorate Haitian heritage, culture, language, food and history; *and*

**WHEREAS,** While Haiti continues to navigate ongoing political and humanitarian challenges at home, many Haitian immigrants across the United States face legal uncertainty related to Temporary Protected Status (TPS) and concerns about safely returning. However, Haitians are finding unity and pride as Haiti's national team, known as Les Grenadiers, are set to take the global stage at the 2026 FIFA World Cup for the first time since 1974 right here in Boston on June 13 as the opening World Cup Boston game, serving as a source of hope for the Haitian diaspora; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Everyone throughout Boston is encouraged to participate in activities and events throughout the month that celebrate Haitian culture, including: Haitian flag raising ceremony (5/15), Haitian Flag Day Parade along Blue Hill Avenue through Mattapan and Dorchester (5/17), New England Revolution Soccer Haitian Cultural Community Night at Gillette Stadium (5/9) and Red Sox Haitian Cultural Night at Fenway Park (5/22); ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

**RESOLVED:** That the City of Boston recognize May as Haitian Heritage Month, and encourage all residents to join in celebrating the rich culture and history of the Haitian community in Boston; ***AND, BE IT FURTHER***

**RESOLVED:** That the City of Boston hereby recognize May 18th as Haitian Flag Day and, in recognition, the Boston City Council orders the Property Management Department to raise the flag of the Republic of Haiti on the third flagpole on City Hall Plaza on May 15th, 2026 in place of the City of Boston flag.

### RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE RIDE SAFE ACT

**WHEREAS,** This week, Governor Healey filed *An Act to enhance the safe use of micromobility devices*, a first-in-the-national bill attempting to regulate e-bikes, mopeds, scooters, and other delivery vehicles; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Cities and towns including Boston have experienced a significant increase in concerns related to unsafe operation of both motorized devices and delivery vehicles, including speeding, riding on sidewalks, ignoring traffic signals, and reckless driving in densely populated neighborhoods; *and*

**WHEREAS,** Improving roadway safety is critical to protecting all pedestrians, including our seniors, persons with disabilities, and young families, as well as drivers, and delivery workers alike while ensuring that emerging transportation technologies operate responsibly within local communities; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The Act, also known as the Ride Safe Act, seeks to establish clearer accountability measures, improve enforcement mechanisms, strengthen registration and identification requirements, and promote safer operation of motorized vehicles throughout Massachusetts; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The Ride Safe Act would restrict “higher-speed devices” from sidewalks, bike lanes, and other “high-risk areas”, restrict modifications to make micro-mobility devices to go faster, and require the use of helmets. Lower speed e-bikes would follow bike lane rules and have helmet requirements for those under 16, while higher speed devices like mopeds would have stricter requirements like license, registration, insurance and roadway restrictions. The legislation also introduces a minimum age requirement for certain e-bikes and scooters; *and*

**WHEREAS,** The streets of Boston have undeniably become less safe due to mopeds frequently traveling through red lights and stop signs, operating on sidewalks, and driving the wrong way on one-way streets. Reports indicate that delivery drivers are often incentivized to prioritize speed over safety in order to secure more assignments, maintain higher ratings, and preserve their employment. This has further exacerbated the existing pedestrian safety crisis already caused by speeding vehicles. The Ride Safe Act is a critical component to address Boston’s public and pedestrian safety crisis; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

**RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council goes on record in support of the Ride Safe Act.

- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.



For generations, local families and caretakers in the Netherlands have sponsored the graves of *American* soldiers, placing flowers on birthdays and holidays and preserving the memory of those who sacrificed their lives in the liberation of the Netherlands during World War II.
