President Flynn in the Chair. Absent Councilor Worrell.

Pastor Dieufort J. "Keke" Fleurissaint, Tabernacle Church delivered the invocation and the meeting was opened with the pledge of allegiance to the flag

President Flynn moved to adopt the minutes from the May 11, 2022 meeting. Motion prevailed.
