
The Trustees of the Boston Retirement Board hereby notifies the Boston City Council that it shall receive public comment relative to retiree Cost of Living Adjustment ("COLA") for FY24 at a public meeting scheduled for May 17, 2023, at 10:00 a.m., in Room 716 of Boston City Hall. The actual vote on the COLA base shall take place on June 21, 2023, at 10:00 a.m.

Each year, pursuant to G.L. c. 32, §103(c), the Public Employee Retirement Administration Commission ("PERAC") reports to the General Court the computation of any increase in the United States Consumer Price Index and the percentage thereof in the previous year by the Commissioner of Social Security. Any such increase is based upon the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers. This index is used annually to adjust benefits paid to Social Security retirees and beneficiaries.

The Social Security Administration has announced that the latest COLA is 8.7%. As such, the COLA which the Retirement Board may grant, pursuant to Chapter 32, Section 103(c), will thus be 3.0%. This figure reflects the Social Security Administration COLA, with a limitation of 3.0%. However, the Board may elect not to grant a COLA in the event it "determines that the cost of living adjustment recommended by said report shall substantially impair the funding schedule of said system," *see* G.L. c. 32, Section 103(c). *See also* PERAC Memo # 4/2023 attached hereto.

Finally, we note that our latest actuarial valuation, as of January 1, 2022, is included for your review as well. Thank you for your customary assistance with these matters.







- WHEREAS:** The Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) community has made great contributions to our city and country, and generations of our AAPI residents have enriched all aspects of our city and nation's history; *and*
- WHEREAS:** According to the 2021 population estimates from the Census Bureau, 9.8% of Boston's population and 7.2 % of the Massachusetts population identify as Asian American, and the Asian American population is the fastest growing racial or ethnic group in the country; *and*
- WHEREAS:** Boston has the largest number of AAPI residents in the state, the third largest Chinatown in the United States, a vibrant Vietnamese community in Dorchester, as well as many other AAPI communities throughout the city; *and*
- WHEREAS:** The AAPI community is incredibly diverse, as it comprised of over 45 distinct ethnicities, and over 100 language dialects; *and*
- WHEREAS:** The stories of the AAPI community are part of the story of the United States, and their experiences reflect the ups and downs in our nation's history; *and*
- WHEREAS:** AAPIs contributed to the building of this nation, with the examples of Chinese immigrants being essential in the building of the transcontinental railroad, and Japanese, Korean, and Filipino immigrants being an important workforce in areas such as Hawaii and California; *and*
- WHEREAS:** Despite their achievements and contributions, AAPIs have faced strong institutional discrimination and racism, with the Chinese Exclusion Act prohibiting immigration from China, and Japanese internment during World War II being two of the most prominent examples; *and*

WHEREAS: To celebrate AAPI Heritage Month, there are numerous events around the city and the state, including opera performances from Asian artists at the Boston Public Library and the Pao Arts Center, the Unity Dinner at the Edward M. WHEREAS: It is important that we recognize the contributions of our AAPI community, especially during this time when our AAPI residents are maliciously targeted because of COVID-19. We must celebrate and support our AAPI and immigrant communities as their experience and cultural heritage enrich our city and nation.

- WHEREAS:** May is Jewish American Heritage Month. During the course of this month, we recognize and celebrate the many contributions that Jewish Americans bring to our city and country; *and*
- WHEREAS:** Jewish American Heritage Month was first established in 2006 by President George W. Bush to recognize 350 years of Jewish contributions to American culture. May was chosen at the time because of the successful celebration of the 350th Anniversary of American Jewish History in May 2004; *and*
- WHEREAS:** According to a Pew Research Center Report, there are 7.5 million Jewish Americans in the United States. In Massachusetts, they make up 4.3% of the population, and in the Boston and the Greater Boston area, they make up 8% of the population; *and*

WHEREAS: This disturbing wave of antisemitism warrants a strong stance and condemnation from all leaders and communities throughout our country. We must categorically reject and denounce any attempts to normalize antisemitism or any form of hate; *and*

WHEREAS: It is critical that we continue to stand with our Jewish neighbors now, and always, in order to stop the rise of antisemitism we continue to witness in our country. We must continue to recognize the contributions of our Jewish community, and support and show up for them; *and*

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:

That the Boston City Council honors the contributions and achievement of Jewish Americans, recognizes May as Jewish American Heritage Month, and recommits to our Jewish neighbors by standing up to denounce antisemitism and hate.

WHEREAS, Graduate student workers at Northeastern University filed for a union election with the National Labor Relations Board on February 6th, 2023, as part of an organizing effort stretching back to 2016, with a majority of students signing cards at the time of filing; *and*

WHEREAS, Graduate student workers at Northeastern are fighting for better pay following the high cost of living in Boston, dental care, overwork protections, equity for international and domestic students, protections from racial and sexual discrimination, and other necessary improvements to working conditions; *and*

WHEREAS, Northeastern Administrators have untruthfully stated during the NLRB process that the workers who do work at the university are not workers and therefore do not have the rights of workers, and the law firm arguing on Northeastern's behalf to the NLRB has stated that all graduate students across the country should be undemocratically denied their union representation at private universities in what would be a ruinous precedent for labor organizing; *and*

WHEREAS, When workers rallied against Northeastern manipulating the NLRB process to obstruct and delay the majority of graduate workers' right to hold an election, the administration responded by politicizing the Boston Marathon Bombing to disparage the unit; *and*

WHEREAS, The Northeastern administration is sending the university police to surveil, harass, and exclusively target BIPOC and trans workers with the threat of criminal charges for participating in protected concerted union activity as part of a pattern stretching back to 2019; *and*

WHEREAS, Boston is a city that recognizes the contributions that union workers have brought and respects the critical gains that unions have achieved for all workers. - WHEREAS,** Approximately 8,000 residents of the Commonwealth are disenfranchised and have lost their right to vote due to a felony conviction; *and*
- WHEREAS,** More than half of disenfranchised voters due to federal convictions are black or Latinx; *and*
- WHEREAS,** In 2022, the Massachusetts Legislature passed the VOTES Act by including language creating protections for jail-based voting for those who still maintain the right to vote; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Massachusetts became the third state to advance full rights restoration out of committee last week; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Lawmakers in California and New York have also filed bills and amendments to end felony disenfranchisement; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Senators Liz Miranda, Adam Gomez, and Lindsay N. Sabadosa have proposed a legislative amendment to the Constitution relative to voting rights. Election Law; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Representative Erika Uytterhoeven and others have filed a legislative amendment to the Constitution relative to the voting rights of certain persons incarcerated in correctional facilities due to felony convictions; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Restoring the right to vote would complete the work of criminal justice reform and voting right expansion bills that the state has passed over the last few years; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***
- RESOLVED:** The Boston City Council Supports S.8/H.26, Proposal for a legislative amendment to the Constitution relative to voting rights. The Boston City Council urges the Massachusetts State Legislature to allow a ballot initiative that would enable citizens around the state to vote in ending the disenfranchisement of incarcerated people.

2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

*Home Rule Petitions Not Responded to by the Mayor*³

³*Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:*

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- Ordinances:*** Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Loan Orders:*** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- Orders:*** Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Home Rule Petitions:*** Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.
