Re: Boston Police Crime Laboratory

Dear Commissioner Cox:

I'm writing to express my concerns over the staffing shortage at the Boston Police Crime Laboratory, and to advocate for more resources for this important office. As you know, the Crime Lab is currently not meeting the state mandated deadline of testing sexual assault kits within 30 days, is not using the most advanced DNA testing technology, and is facing a void in leadership that negatively impacts the operations of the lab. The Crime Lab's work in processing, examining, and analyzing evidence, such as sexual assault kits, is indispensable to the investigation and solving crimes, but it is now facing urgent challenges. I urge the Boston Police Department to expeditiously address these issues, and to ensure that the Boston Police Crime Laboratory has the appropriate resources to function smoothly.

In 2018, the state legislature mandated that sexual assault kits be tested within 30 days, in order to ensure swift processing of evidence that will bring justice for sexual assault survivors. At the City Council hearing that I sponsored last week to discuss resources for the Boston Crime Lab, we learn that testing sexual assault kits within 30 days is very difficult for the Crime Lab due to staffing shortage. We also learned that the Crime Lab is currently without a director, as the current director is out on leave since August of 2022, and various people had to step in as interim director in the meantime. The staffing shortage and absentee director not only hinder the operations of the Crime Lab, but it also hurts the morale of the staff. As I have stressed in the hearing, it is critical that we have a director for the Crime Lab who is responsible and accountable to this office, and addressing this should be a top priority for the Boston Police Department.

Moreover, we learn that the Boston Crime Lab is not using "Y screening", a DNA testing technique that is utilized by the Massachusetts State Police Crime Lab, and is understood to be a

quicker and more efficient method of DNA testing. Panelists from the Crime Lab indicated that they would be open to using this method, but it would require significant budget increase. I urge also that the Crime Lab consider using Y screening that will help them improve processing turnaround time, and that BPD provide the Crime Lab the necessary resources to allow them to use new and advanced technology.

I hope that BPD addresses the staffing shortage, absentee leadership, outdated technology, and other challenges that the Boston Crime Lab faces, so that sexual assault kits will be tested within 30 days, and that survivors of sexual assault can see justice swiftly. On behalf of Boston Housing Authority (BHA), we are hereby notifying your office that a Release Notification Form (RNF) and Immediate Response Action Plan to evaluate a potential Critical Exposure Pathway (CEP) is being submitted to the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) for the above-referenced site. This notification is being made in fulfillment of the notification requirements of the Massachusetts Contingency Plan (MCP; 310 CMR 40.1403[3][b,h]). A copy of the RNF is enclosed.

The RNF was prepared for the detection of chlorinated volatile organic compounds (VOCs) in indoor air of an eight-unit condominium building in Boston (Roxbury), Massachusetts. The IRA consists of assessment-only; mitigation will be performed if necessary.

The RNF was submitted to MassDEP Northeast Regional Office in Wilmington, Massachusetts. The report was submitted via eDEP and is available for review online. Public officials may request additional public involvement activities under 310 CMR 40.1403(9) and upon tier classification under 310 CMR 40.1404.

HOME RULE PETITION

- **WHEREAS:** Sergeant Deputy Sheriff Brian C. McPherson sustained serious injuries while in the performance of his duties, and as a result is incapacitated from further service as a Sergeant Deputy Sheriff in the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department; *and*,
- **WHEREAS:** While employed in the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, Sergeant Deputy Sheriff Brian C. McPherson's pay and retirement are under the jurisdiction of the Boston Retirement Board; *NOW THEREFORE BE IT*
- **ORDERED:** That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause 1 of Section 8 of Article II, as amended, of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

PETITION FOR A SPECIAL LAW RE: AN ACT REGARDING THE DISABILITY PENSION FOR BRIAN MCPHERSON

Section 1.

(a) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Boston Retirement Board shall increase the accidental disability retirement allowance payable to Brian McPherson, a retired Sergeant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department who, as a result of injuries sustained while in the performance of his duties on May 13, 2008, is totally and permanently incapacitated from performing the essential duties of a Sergeant Deputy Sheriff.

(b) The annual amount of pension payable to Brian McPherson shall be equal to the regular rate of compensation which would have been paid had he continued in service as a Sergeant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department at the grade held by him at the time of his retirement until his death or reaching mandatory retirement age, whichever comes first. All amounts paid under this act shall be non-taxable to the extent allowable under state and federal law. (c) Notwithstanding Sections 8 and 91A of Chapter 32 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, Brian McPherson's annual earnings, when added to his retirement allowance, may annually earn up to one-half the amount of his retirement allowance without refund penalty.

(d) Upon attaining the mandatory retirement age for a Sergeant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, Brian McPherson shall receive a pension pursuant to Section 7 of said Chapter 32, a yearly amount of pension equal to 100 percent of the annual rate of the compensation he was receiving on the day before he reaches the mandatory retirement age for a Sergeant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department.

(e) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the benefits granted herein shall be funded and administered by the Boston Retirement Board, consistent with and subject to chapter 32 of the General Laws.

Section 2.

Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, Brian McPherson shall be entitled to receive indemnification for all hospital, medical and related expenses that have been or may be incurred after the date of his retirement as a result of the injuries sustained by him while in the performance of his duties on May 13, 2008, in accordance with Sections 100 and 100B of Chapter 41 of the General Laws.

Section 3.

Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Boston Retirement Board shall forthwith pay to said Brian McPherson the amount credited to him as accumulated total deductions in the annuity savings fund of the Boston Retirement Board as of the effective date of this act.

Section 4.

Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, if Brian McPherson was married upon retirement, upon his death, if he is still married to the spouse he was married to upon retirement then, should his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement survive him, the Retirement Board of the City of Boston shall pay to the spouse an annuity in the amount of 75 percent of the amount of the pension which otherwise would have been payable to Brian McPherson until the spouse's death. The pension benefits provided for in this section and section 1 shall be subject to Section 103 of Chapter 32 of the General Laws.

Section 5.

In the event that both Brian McPherson and his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement die before their children reach the age of eighteen, the payments that would otherwise have been made to his spouse shall be payable, in equal shares, to each surviving children under the age of 18; provided, however, that payments shall continue for the benefit of a surviving child 18 years or older who, on or before the date of death of Brian McPherson or his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement, whichever is later, had been medically determined to be permanently physically or mentally incapacitated from earning or for the benefit of a child under the age of 22 who is enrolled as a full-time student as determined by the criteria of the educational institution.

Section 6. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIR

May 8, 2024

Dear Councilors,

Docket #0263, Petition For A Special Law Re: An Act Regarding The Disability Pension For Brian Mcpherson, was sponsored by Councilor Flynn and referred to the Committee on January 31, 2024.

Summary of Legislation:

Docket #0263 is a Home Rule Petition (HRP) seeking to increase Brian McPherson's accidental disability retirement benefits. McPherson is a retired Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department.

The petition seeks to revise McPherson's disability benefits by increasing the annual amount of pension payable, the annual amount that may be earned in addition to McPherson's annual pension allowance, reimbursement compensation, and benefits allowance and disbursement for his beneficiaries.

Section 1. (b)

This section of the proposed HRP seeks to increase the annual amount of pension payable to McPherson from the regular rate of compensation he was paid in 2008, to the regular rate of compensation he would have been paid had he not been injured. Currently, the annual amount of pension payable to McPherson is based on the rate of compensation he earned in 2008 when he was injured.

Section 1. (c)

This section of the proposed HRP seeks to increase the annual amount that McPherson may earn in addition to his annual pension payments. Currently, Chapter 32, section 91A of the General Laws states, "If such earnings exceed an amount which when added to the member's retirement allowance is greater than the amount of regular compensation which would have been payable to such member if such member had continued in service in the grade held by him at the time he was retired plus \$15,000, said member shall refund the portion of his retirement allowance for such preceding year equal to such excess and until such refund is made, his pension or retirement allowance shall be held as security therefor." The proposed HRP would revise this provision for McPherson to allow him to earn up to one-half the amount of his retirement allowance without refund penalty.

Section 1. (d)

This section of the proposed HRP increases the yearly amount of pension payable to McPherson upon attaining the mandatory retirement age to 100%, as opposed to 72% as stipulated in Chapter 32, section 7 of the General Laws.

Section 2.

This section of the proposed HRP provides for reimbursement compensation, in accordance with sections 100 and 100B of Chapter 41 of the General Laws, which would authorize indemnification for McPherson, or, in the event of his death, his widow, or if he leaves no widow, his next of kin for all reasonable hospital, medical, surgical, chiropractic, nursing, pharmaceutical, prosthetic and related expenses and reasonable charges for chiropody (podiatry) incurred as the natural and proximate result of an accident occurring or of undergoing a hazard peculiar to his employment, while acting in the performance and within the scope of his duty without fault of his own.

Section 3.

This section of the proposed HRP requires the Boston Retirement Board to pay McPherson the amount credited to him as accumulated total deductions in the annuity savings fund of the Boston Retirement Board as of the effective date of the Special Act if passed by the Legislature.

Section 4. and Section 5.

Under section 12 of Chapter 32 of the General Laws, retirement allowance shall be payable during the lifetime of the member and shall cease upon his death except as otherwise provided for in the option elected. The General Laws describe multiple options to choose from. Sections 3 and 4 of the proposed HRP request to elect the following plan instead: that the Retirement Board of the City of Boston pay to the spouse an annuity in the amount of 75 % of the amount of the pension which otherwise would have been payable to McPherson until the spouse's death subject to section 103 which allows for cost of living increases for any county employee or their widow/next of kin. Further, In the event that both Brian McPherson and his spouse, to whom he was married on the date upon retirement, die before their children reach the age of eighteen, under this proposed HRP, the payments that would otherwise have been made to his spouse shall be payable, in equal shares, to each surviving children under the age of 18; provided, however, that payments shall continue for the benefit of a surviving child 18 years or older who, on or before the date of death of Brian McPherson or his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement, whichever is later, had been medically determined to be permanently physically or mentally incapacitated from earning or for the benefit of a child under the age of 22 who is enrolled as a full-time student as determined by the criteria of the educational institution. This language falls in line with other "allowance" provisions under section 7 of Chapter 32, Conditions for Accidental Disability Allowance.

Information Gathered at the Hearing:

The Committee held a hearing on April 18, 2024. The Chair was joined by Councilors Louijeune, Flynn, and Murphy.

The Committee heard testimony from the petitioner Brian McPherson, who testified as to the incident that led to his injury, his efforts to recover and return to work, his eventual application for disability retirement benefits in 2009, which was approved retroactively in 2011, and the resulting financial impact which has motivated him to seek the requested increase described in Docket #0263. While in the performance of his duties on May 13, 2008, McPherson sustained serious injuries and testified that he was forced to retire at age 37. McPherson explained that he had a successful career in the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, holding various positions. However, in 2008, while responding to a fight between inmates, he stated he was violently attacked and suffered permanent injuries. As a result, he was medically discharged and stated that medically, he was forced to retire as physicians advised him that the injuries he sustained were permanent. McPherson emphasized the financial impact this has had on his family, as his capped salary has led to the loss of overtime pay and the inability to work part-time jobs. He also mentioned the strain

on his children, who have witnessed his medical struggles and the financial challenges the family continues to face.

With regard to the request for an increase to 100% of his yearly annual pension allowance, the Committee discussed potentially including language that allowed for flexibility in the percentage increase. The Committee expressed support for landing on language that would ensure the HRP aligns with the goals of providing McPherson with a fair and adequate disability pension.

Summary of Amendments

Pursuant to M.G.L c. 32 § 5 (2) (c), which limits the maximum pension payable to 80% of the member's final average salary (the average of three consecutive years of the members highest annual salary), I recommend the following amendments:

SECTION 1.

(d) Upon attaining the mandatory retirement age for a Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, Brian McPherson shall receive a pension pursuant to Section 7 of said Chapter 32, a yearly amount of pension equal to 100 percent 80% of the annual rate of the compensation he was receiving on the day before he reaches the mandatory retirement age for a Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department.

- **WHEREAS:** Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff Brian C. McPherson sustained serious injuries while in the performance of his duties, and as a result is incapacitated from further service as a Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff in the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department; *and*,
- **WHEREAS:** While employed in the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff Brian C. McPherson's pay and retirement are under the jurisdiction of the Boston Retirement Board; *NOW THEREFORE BE IT*
- **ORDERED:** That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause 1 of Section 8 of Article II, as amended, of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

PETITION FOR A SPECIAL LAW RE: AN ACT REGARDING THE DISABILITY PENSION FOR BRIAN MCPHERSON

Section 1.

(a) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Boston Retirement Board shall increase the accidental disability retirement allowance payable to Brian McPherson, a retired Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department who, as a result of injuries sustained while in the performance of his duties on May 13, 2008, is totally and permanently incapacitated from performing the essential duties of a Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff.

(b) The annual amount of pension payable to Brian McPherson shall be equal to the regular rate of compensation which would have been paid had he continued in service as a Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department at the grade held by him at the time of his retirement until his death or reaching mandatory retirement age, whichever comes first. All amounts paid under this act shall be non-taxable to the extent allowable under state and federal law. (c) Notwithstanding Sections 8 and 91A of Chapter 32 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, Brian McPherson's annual earnings, when added to his retirement allowance, may annually earn up to one-half the amount of his retirement allowance without refund penalty.

(d) Upon attaining the mandatory retirement age for a Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, Brian McPherson shall receive a pension pursuant to Section 7 of said Chapter 32, a yearly amount of pension equal to 80 percent of the annual rate of the compensation he was receiving on the day before he reaches the mandatory retirement age for a Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department.

(e) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the benefits granted herein shall be funded and administered by the Boston Retirement Board, consistent with and subject to chapter 32 of the General Laws.

Section 2.

Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, Brian McPherson shall be entitled to receive indemnification for all hospital, medical and related expenses that have been or may be incurred after the date of his retirement as a result of the injuries sustained by him while in the performance of his duties on May 13, 2008, in accordance with Sections 100 and 100B of Chapter 41 of the General Laws.

Section 3.

Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Boston Retirement Board shall forthwith pay to said Brian McPherson the amount credited to him as accumulated total deductions in the annuity savings fund of the Boston Retirement Board as of the effective date of this act.

Section 4.

Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, if Brian McPherson was married upon retirement, upon his death, if he is still married to the spouse he was married to upon retirement then, should his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement survive him, the Retirement Board of the City of Boston shall pay to the spouse an annuity in the amount of 75 percent of the amount of the pension which otherwise would have been payable to Brian McPherson until the spouse's death. The pension benefits provided for in this section and section 1 shall be subject to Section 103 of Chapter 32 of the General Laws.

Section 5.

In the event that both Brian McPherson and his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement die before their children reach the age of eighteen, the payments that would otherwise have been made to his spouse shall be payable, in equal shares, to each surviving children under the age of 18; provided, however, that payments shall continue for the benefit of a surviving child 18 years or older who, on or before the date of death of Brian McPherson or his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement, whichever is later, had been medically determined to be permanently physically or mentally incapacitated from earning or for the benefit of a child under the age of 22 who is enrolled as a full-time student as determined by the criteria of the educational institution.

Section 6. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS EXPANDING THE URBAN TREE CANOPY IN DISTRICT 2

- **WHEREAS:** Having a healthy urban tree canopy is important to our environment and quality of life, as trees not only beautify our landscapes, but they also provide filters for pollutants, absorb excess stormwater runoff, provide shades during hot summers, and other environmental and public health benefits; *and*,
- **WHEREAS:** Residents across the city treasure the trees in their neighborhoods, and view the trees as an integral part of their community, and residents of District 2 have often advocate for more tree plantings in their neighborhoods, especially as it encompasses neighborhoods with low tree coverage, such as Chinatown, Downtown, and South Boston; *and*,
- **WHEREAS:** The City released its Urban Forest Plan in September of 2022, which lays out strategies for the preservation, cultivation, and expansion of our urban canopy, and the City Council passed the tree protection ordinance late 2023, which regulates the process of tree removals, trimming, and maintenance; *and*,
- WHEREAS: Aside from preservation of trees, we also need to expand our tree coverage to ensure that every neighborhood has a healthy tree canopy. The Urban Forest Plan finds that neighborhoods in the south and west parts of the city have more trees, while neighborhoods in the north and east parts of the City, such as South Boston, have the least tree coverage. As of 2019. South Boston only had 8% tree coverage, and a census tract in Chinatown only had 7%, while the city average was 27%; *and*,
- **WHEREAS:** In thinking of expanding tree canopies in our neighborhoods, we need to identify areas that would be suitable for new tree plants, select appropriate tree species that would survive in our environment, and ensure that the City has sufficient staffing levels to plant and maintain our trees; *and*,,
- **WHEREAS:** The expansion of our tree canopies, especially in neighborhoods that have low tree coverage, should be a priority for our continued efforts to combat climate change, and community input about the removal of trees is also an issue of climate justice; *and*,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:

That the appropriate Committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to discuss ways to expand our urban tree canopies in District 2 and City of Boston. Representatives from the Parks Department, environmental justice organizations, as well as other relevant and interested parties shall be invited to attend.

- *WHEREAS*, Workers being injured on the job and not being properly compensated is all too common in Boston and in the Commonwealth; *and*
- *WHEREAS*, Nationally, less than 40% of workers who are eligible for workers' compensation benefits apply for them, according to data from the National Employment Law Project; *and*
- *WHEREAS*, It is illegal for employers to prevent injured employees from apply for workers' compensation but there are no public enforcement mechanisms for those who do; *and*
- *WHEREAS*, Employers often have the upperhand and discourage their employees from filing workers' compensation claims in fear that the claim could drive up their rates, reveal that they don't have workers' compensation insurance, a proper amount of insurance or open them up to scrutiny which could reveal other unrelated violations; *and*
- *WHEREAS*, Employees that want to take employers to court over worker compensation claims are often pressured not to and fear retaliation; this is especially true for immigrants and those who are undocumented; *and*
- *WHEREAS*, Employees seeking workers' compensation claims are discouraged by the process which requires them to file a claim and hire a private attorney to recover benefits, which could take months, delaying crucial medical care; *and*
- *WHEREAS*, Oftentimes lawyers won't take workers' compensation cases unless their client has been fired the claim which is close to impossible to prove; *and*
- *WHEREAS*, S.1165, sponsored by Sen. Jamie B. Eldridge, would empower the Attorney General's Office to investigate and resolve retaliation complaints, specifically for those employees who are retaliated against after making a workers' compensation claim; *and*

- *WHEREAS*, This bill would empower more employees to seek workers' compensation claims and strengthen anti-retaliation law for workers so they can assert their rights, protect themselves from employer misconduct, retaliation or any other efforts to deprive them of their compensation rights; and *NOW*, *THEREFORE BE IT*
- **RESOLVED**: The Boston City Council supports S.1165 "An Act to Protect Injured Workers" and urges members of the Massachusetts Senate to support the measure.

WHEREAS:	The AAPI community is incredibly diverse, as it comprises more than 50 distinct ethnicities, and over 100 language dialects. The stories of the AAPI community are part of the story of the United States, and their experiences reflect the ups and downs in our nation's history; <i>and</i>
WHEREAS:	AAPIs contributed to the building of this nation, with the examples of Chinese immigrants being essential in the building of the transcontinental railroad, and Japanese, Korean, and Filipino immigrants being an important workforce in areas such as Hawaii and California; <i>and</i>
WHEREAS:	Despite their achievements and contributions, AAPIs have faced strong institutional discrimination and racism, with the Chinese Exclusion Act prohibiting immigration from China, and Japanese internment during World War II being two of the most prominent examples; <i>and</i>
WHEREAS:	During the COVID-19 pandemic, we witnessed a significant rise in racist incidents and hate crimes against AAPI residents nationally, and increased reports of physical and verbal assaults against AAPI residents illustrate just how malicious anti-Asian hate can be, and how we need to continue to support our AAPI residents; <i>and</i>
WHEREAS:	AAPIs are an integral part of our society, as they are our neighbors, frontline healthcare workers, teachers, business owners, policymakers, military members,

youth sports coaches, among many others, including Mayor Michelle Wu, the first Asian American Mayor of Boston. Many AAPIs are leaders in our community in Boston, helping to move our city forward; *and*

- WHEREAS: There are also many AAPIs who have served and continue to serve our U.S. Armed Forces with honor and distinction. In 1911, Filipino American Army Private Jose Nisperos was the first AAPI to be awarded the Medal of Honor, and since then, the Medal of Honor has been awarded to AAPI service members for 31 times in ensuing wars and conflicts; *and*
- WHEREAS: Here in Boston's Chinatown, we have the American Legion Boston Chinatown Post 328, which will be marking over 75 years of service to the Chinatown and veteran community this year. The Post is made up of veterans who served as far back as World War II. Last October, Veterans Commissioner Santiago and I took part in Private Wing O. Hom's Hero Square dedication in Chinatown. Private Hom was among 20,000 Chinese Americans who served during World War II, who was killed in action when he was 20 years old, and whose body was recently identified and recovered in Italy. His square now sits in front of his home on Beach Street where he lived more than 80 years ago; and
- **WHEREAS:** It is important that we recognize the significant contributions of our AAPI community; we must celebrate and support our AAPI and immigrant communities as their experience and cultural heritage enrich our city and nation; *and*
- WHEREAS: May is officially designated as Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month in the United States Code under section 102 of title 36, and it requests that there is an annual proclamation from the President calling on the people in the U.S. to celebrate the AAPI community during May; *and*

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:

That the Boston City Council honors and recognizes the contributions and achievements of our AAPI residents during Asian American Pacific Islander Heritage Month in May, and continues to support our AAPI community in standing up against discrimination and racism.

2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

³Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- *Loan Orders*: Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- *Orders*: Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- *Home Rule Petitions*: Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- *Order for a Hearing*: A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- *Legislative Resolution*: A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.
