Supervisors Association, Inc. (BPSTSA). The terms of the contract are September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2027. The major provisions of the contract includes a base wage increase of 2% to be given in September of each year of the contract term and flat amounts of \$200, \$200, \$275, and \$350 to be added to annual salaries in January of each fiscal year.

#### TO THE CITY COUNCIL

Dear Councilors:

I hereby transmit for your approval an Order amending City of Boston Code, Ordinances, Chapter XV, Section 15-11.1, regarding Black Male Advancement for Equity and Welfare. Since its establishment in 2021, the Black Men and Boys Commission has worked to assess the social conditions of the city's Black men and boys, develop strategies to remedy or assist in remedying serious adversities, and recommend courses of action to create equal opportunity for generations of Black men and boys in the City of Boston.

On a day-to-day basis, the Commission's work is supported by the Office of Black Male Advancement. However, the Office of Black Male Advancement has also expanded its scope to include policies, programs, resources, and local and national partnerships beyond the Commission. The Office oversees a chapter of My Brother's Keeper Boston, small grants programming, mentorship opportunities, Project Opportunity for Boston residents with CORIs, and technical assistance support for community-based organizations—all in an effort to improve outcomes, representation of and access to services for Black men and boys at all levels of city government, and ensure that our City's Black men and boys have the support they need to thrive and share in Boston's prosperity. In acknowledgement of the reality, extent, and importance of the work the Office does, these amendments propose to codify the Office of Black Male Advancement permanently within the Boston Municipal Code.

An Ordinance Amending City of Boston Code, Ordinances, Chapter XV, Section 15-11, Black Male Advancement for Equity and Welfare

- WHEREAS: Black males represent 12% of Boston's population, with roughly 22% of Boston's male population identifying as "Black or African-American only;" and
- WHEREAS: A majority of Boston Public School (BPS) students identify as people of color, with 30% of the student population identifying as "Black," and 38% of the male student population identifying as "Black," according to BPS data; and
- WHEREAS: Black male students are identified at high rates for special education, disproportionately placed in separate classrooms and face the worse suspension rates, annual dropout rates, and MCAS math proficiency at the elementary and middle grade levels, according to BPS data; and
- WHEREAS: Black males in Boston enter college less than others, as only 24% of Black/African-American males age 25 years or older have a Bachelor's Degree; and
- WHEREAS: Sixty-two percent (62%) of Black/African American male full-time workers (33,607 workers) earn below \$50,000.00 in Boston according the City of Boston Planning Department Research Division, and Black males experience the largest wage gap among males at forty nine cents (\$0.49) per every white male's dollar according to the Boston Women's Workforce Council; and
- WHEREAS: Fifty-five percent (55%) of Black/African American male renters pay more than 30% of their income in rent, and only 11% of Black males are homeowners, according to the City of Boston Planning Department Research Division; and
- WHEREAS: The City partners with My Brother's Keeper, launched by former President Barack Obama in February 2014 to address persistent opportunity gaps facing boys and young men of color; and
- **WHEREAS:** The City is committed to the work of uplifting the lived experiences of Black men and boys to ensure that we are designing all spaces from a framework of equity and justice; and

- **WHEREAS:** The City of Boston established the Commission on Black Men and Boys in 2021 as a forum for Black men and boys to express their opinions and ideas and as a place to rely on for information, advocacy, and action; and
- **WHEREAS:** The mission of the Office of Black Male Advancement is to improve outcomes and reduce systemic barriers to advancement for Black men and boys living in Boston;
- WHEREAS: The Office of Black Male Advancement works with other City departments, including but not limited to the Office of Economic Opportunity and Inclusion, the Office of Worker Empowerment, the Office of Housing, the Boston Planning Department, the Boston Public Health Commission, Procurement, the Human Services Cabinet, the Equity and Inclusion Cabinet, and Boston Public Schools to improve representation of and access to services for Black men and boys at all levels of city government;
- WHEREAS: The Office of Black Male Advancement will establish outreach programs in conjunction with other City agencies and the Commission on Black Men and Boys to enhance the accessibility of City programs, benefits, and services to Black men and boys;
- WHEREAS: The City of Boston intends to conduct research and data collection on the issues affecting Black men and boys, including, but not limited to, obstacles accessing City programs, benefits, and services, and on demographic and socioeconomic trends related to such persons, in order to be effectively responsive; and
- **WHEREAS:** The Mayor created an Office of Black Male Advancement, and hereby reaffirms the City's commitment to equity and racial justice by officially codifying the Office of Black Male Advancement into the City Code;

Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

**SECTION 1.** City of Boston Code, Ordinances, is hereby amended in **Chapter XV** by replacing the existing Section 15-11 with the following new section and subsections:

15-11 COMMISSION ON BLACK MEN AND BOYS.

#### 15-11.1 Established.

There shall be within the Mayor's office a division to be known as the Commission on Black Men and Boys (hereinafter the "Commission").

#### 15-11.2 Organization.

- a. *Membership*. The membership shall consist of twenty-one (21) members, all of whom shall be appointed by the Mayor. One two-year term member shall be a youth member. One three-year member shall be a youth member.
- b. Terms. The members shall be appointed to serve for the following initial terms:
  - 1. Seven (7) members shall serve for two (2)-year terms;
  - 2. Seven (7) members shall serve for three (3)-year terms;
  - 3. Seven (7) members shall serve for four (4)-year terms;

Thereafter, as the term of a member expires, the member's successor shall be appointed by the Mayor for a term of three (3) years from such expiration.

Any members absent for more than one-third of the Commission meetings within a twelve (12)-month period may be removed from the Commission by the Mayor at the Mayor's discretion by filing a written statement of reasons for removal with the City Clerk, provided, however, that there were at least three meetings of the Commission during the twelve (12)-month period.

Vacancies, other than by reason of expiration of terms, shall be filled for the balance of unexpired terms, appointed in the same manner and by the same body.

- c. Chair. The Mayor shall appoint a member as the chairperson of the Commission.
- d. Executive Director. The Mayor shall appoint an Executive Director of the Commission on Black Men and Boys that shall be an existing, paid employee of the City of Boston, to oversee and run the daily operations and administration of the Commission. The Executive Director shall serve as the advisor of the Commission and shall have the powers of a department head with respect to the execution of contracts and matters of personnel management within said office. The Executive Director shall serve as a member of the Commission, ex officio and without additional compensation, and shall have an official vote on matters before the Commission.
- e. Compensation. The members shall serve without compensation.

### 15-11.3 Duties.

The Duties of the Commission shall include but not be limited to:

- a. Advising the Mayor on issues pertaining to Black men and boys;
- b. Assisting the Office of the Mayor in determining budget and policy priorities;

- c. Monitoring and advising city agencies and departments on issues pertaining to Black men and boys;
- d. Designing projects and programs that promote equity for Black men and boys which are not currently being implemented by existing city agencies;
- e. Performing outreach, communication, and liaison to Black men and boys related to community groups and organizations;
- f. Working with the Department of Intergovernmental Relations concerning state and federal legislation and programs that are of concern to Black men and boys;
- g. Working with all city departments, agencies, commissions and offices to assure that Black men and boys are represented at all levels of city government;
- h. Coordinating dialogues and actions in collaboration with other city agencies on behalf of city government to issues of concern to all Black men and boys and related organizations, including but not limited to: equity and racial justice, economic opportunity and workers empowerment, education and youth advancement, affordable housing and pathways to homeownership, public health and wellness, fatherhood and families, community safety and returning citizens, financial empowerment, and more.
- i. During the first year of its existence, the Commission shall hold monthly meetings and give updates to the City Council on a quarterly basis and shall hold regular meetings thereafter;
- j. Producing a yearly report pertaining to the work of the Commission and the progress of the City and the community to advance the status of Black men and boys. The Commission shall submit the report to the City Clerk of the City of Boston who shall forward the report to the Mayor of the City of Boston and shall file the report and include the docket on the agenda of the next-occurring meeting of the Boston City Council.

#### 15-11.4 Office of Black Male Advancement.

- a. Established. There shall be established in the City of Boston an office known as the Office of Black Male Advancement (hereafter the "Office") which shall be under the charge of the Executive Director.
- b. Purpose. This Ordinance is to establish an Office of Black Male Advancement in the City of Boston to improve outcomes and reduce systemic barriers to advancement for Black men and boys living in Boston. The services of all City departments, agencies, commissions and offices shall be made reasonably available to the Office for effectuating the purpose of this section.
- c. Powers and Duties. The Office, under the charge of the Executive Director, shall have the powers and duties necessary to carry out the purpose of this section and the mission of the Commission.
- d. Reporting. The Office shall file with the City Clerk and post on the Office's website data, outcome metrics, and an annual report on the work of the Office and the progress of the City and the community to advance the purpose of this section.

Overview — Understanding the revenues being collected by the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) from within Charlestown Navy Yard (CNY), specifically around the Constitution Inn, can help ensure a commensurate level of maintenance and investment is going back to this area, and adequate mitigation investments from developers. Transparency around this information will help the Charlestown community and the City of Boston best navigate through development in this area of the neighborhood. Please include documentation that corroborates responses to this information request.

### 1. Constitution Inn/YMCA

i. Is the lessee current in connection with the lease of the property? If not, what is the date that the lessee first failed to pay rent currently?

The lessee currently owes the Boston Redevelopment Authority \$964.12 due to 2 months of Consumer Price Increase adjustments back-charged for September and October 2023. The lessee was invoiced for such amount on October 1, 2023. The CPI data for this adjustment was not available until September 15, 2023, so a back charge was issued for the previous month and the new monthly rent rate began October 1, 2023. Other than such amount, the lessee is current in its rent obligations with respect to the property.

ii. What is the amount of the past due rent as of November 1, 2022 through November 2023? Include real estate taxes for this time period.

See answer to question 1(a)(i) above.

iii. Has the lessee defaulted or failed to perform any other covenants under the lease? If so, what was the nature of the breached covenant and the date of the same?

As of the date hereof and to the BRA's actual knowledge, the lessee has not defaulted or failed to perform any other covenants under the lease.

iv. For each such act of default/breach of the lease, as listed in questions 1-3 above, did the BPDA provide any notice of default to the lessee for the same? If so, which event of default and what was the date of each such notice?

As of the date hereof and to the BRA's actual knowledge, the lessee has not defaulted or failed to perform any other covenants under the lease. As such, the BRA has not notified the lessee of a default.

v. If the BPDA did not default the lessee of the premises for breach of the lease, on each such occasion of default, please explain why no such default notice was sent?

As of the date hereof and to the BRA's actual knowledge, the lessee has not defaulted or failed to perform any other covenants under the lease.

vi. Has the BPDA reached any type of forbearance agreement with the lessee?

If so, what is the date of such agreement and provide a copy of the same.

As of the date hereof and to the BRA's actual knowledge, the lessee has not defaulted or failed to perform any other covenants under the lease. As such, the BRA has not entered into a forbearance agreement with the lessee.

vii. Has the BPDA demanded, received or otherwise arranged for any type of forbearance payment from the lessee who is in default? If so, what is the amount, nature and date of the payment or the anticipated payment?

As of the date hereof and to the BRA's actual knowledge, the lessee has not defaulted or failed to perform any other covenants under the lease.

viii. Has the BPDA provided notice of termination of the lease since the time the lease was placed in default? If so, provide a copy of the termination letter.

As of the date hereof and to the BRA's actual knowledge, the lessee has not defaulted or failed to perform any other covenants under the lease.

ix. Did the BPDA receive a copy of any Letter of Intent by the lessee to transfer the lease obligation to any other person or entity or joint venture?

The BRA has not received a letter of intent from the lessee regarding a transfer of the lease agreement to any other person or entity of joint venture. The BRA first learned of the lessee's desire to sell its lease agreement to a new party in January 2020, and engaged in discussions with the lessee shortly thereafter. In or around October 2020, the lessee informed the BRA that it had been unsuccessful in its efforts to attract a commercial hotel purchaser. In or around October 2021 the lessee informed the BRA that it intends to assign the lease agreement to the Constitution Inn LLC, a limited liability company formed by the Planning Office of Urban Affairs and Saint Francis House.

x. Please provide a copy of such letter of intent and explain what consideration of payment of any type or nature which the BPDA will receive in connection with such lease assignment or transfer from the lessee or the proposed new lessee if such assignment or transfer of lease proceeds.

The BRA has not received a letter of intent from the lessee regarding a transfer of the lease agreement to any other person or entity of joint venture.

Section 19.5 of the Parcel 150 ground lease details the Landlord's Share of Net Transfer Proceeds in the event of a transfer of the lease. Per the lease, "Tenant shall pay to the Landlord as and when the same are received or made available to or for the benefit of Tenant, fifteen percent (15%) of all Net Transfer Proceeds. Net Transfer Proceeds shall be determined by deducting from the transfer price the following: (i) Total Project Costs, or if greater, the amount of Financing or Refinancing to which a fifteen percent (15%) payment has already been made, (ii) all expenses required in connection with the transfer in order to deliver good, clear and marketable leasehold title to the Property."

The BRA does not have a calculation of the transfer rent owed at this time; however, it is expected that, after the deduction of Total Projects Costs (which the BRA and lessee have agreed are \$19,474,000.00) and any other expenses appropriate under clause (ii) above, , the payment to the BRA in connection with the lessee's sale of the lease to the Constitution Inn LLC will be negligible, if not \$0. As of the date hereof, the BRA is still negotiating rent payments with the Constitution Inn LLC.

b. Is there a leasehold mortgage on the property? For any leasehold mortgage, please indicate the dates and the amounts of any such mortgage and any dates of transfer and refinance including any and all documents provided to or executed by the BPDA related to such mortgage, the outstanding balance on these dates if known, any consideration received or paid by either the lessee or the mortgagee related to such assignment or transfer or transaction to the BPDA including legal fees or transactional fees or charges.

The BRA has been made aware of one or more mortgages on the property from time to time, however, the BRA does not have first hand knowledge of a mortgage currently on the property, if any, or the amounts of such mortgage, if any, or any dates of transfer or refinancing. On two occasions, the BRA has issued Estoppel Certificates in connection with mortgage financing on the property, and a third estoppel certificate was requested in 2020, but was not completed. Copies have been provided with this response. No consideration, including legal fees or transactional fees or charges, has been received by or paid to the BRA by either the lessee or the mortgagee related to any assignment or transfer or transaction.

c. Has the Boston Archdiocese or the POUA or any entity associated with either ('Archdiocese'), communicated with the BPDA relative to the Constitution Inn and offered to compensate the BPDA or any city agency or department related to the

proposed conversion of the Constitution Inn to housing for the homeless or any other proposed use? Please provide the dates and nature of the communications between the BPDA and the Archdiocese and provide a copy of same and if there have been any moneys offered by the Archdiocese for any reason associated with the Constitution Inn to the BPDA, the City or any of its agencies or any City endorsed organization or effort to house the homeless, then provide the amounts, dates and entity to which moneys were offered and whether same were accepted.

The BRA and POUA are in active negotiations regarding the assignment and amendment of the ground lease for this site. One aspect of the negotiations is the future rent payment to be paid to the BRA. In order to determine the market value of the property by which to assess future rent payments, an appraisal was completed in May 2022.

Using the appraised value of the site as a not for profit development use and applying the standard BPDA rent formula, it was determined that the annual rent payment to the BRA for the site is \$65,000 in year 1 of the lease. Rent is proposed to increase annually at the higher of: 3%, or, the year over year percentage increase in the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) for Boston-Cambridge-Newton, MA-NH Series ID CWURS11ASA0. The BRA will consider waiving or reducing financial payments subject to evidence of financial hardship satisfactory to BRA.

As currently contemplated, the proposed rent for the Constitution Inn use will be less than the rent currently collected for the property, which is approximately \$80,000 annually. The financial terms discussed above are subject to BRA Board approval.

No other moneys have been offered or accepted in relation to the transfer of this property.



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

### **OUR PROGRAMS**

Black Men and Boys Commission: The Commission was established through a 2021 ordinance and is made up of 21-Black males with experience, knowledge and expertise on issues pertaining to Black men and boys in the City of Boston. The Commission serves as an advisory board for the Mayor's Office of Black Male Advancement.BMBC Subcommittees have each met with Economic Opportunity, Workers Empowerment, Boston Public Schools, Housing, Boston Planning and Development Agency, Office of Returning Citizens, Senior Advisor for Community Safety, Boston Public Health Commission and Human Service Cabinets. BMA will host regular working sessions with each Cabinet and invite Commission members to join on a quarterly basis.

My Brother's Keeper Boston: My Brother's Keeper (MBK) Boston was established in partnership with the Obama Foundation, as the official Boston-chapter of the National MBK Alliance. Housed under the Mayor's Office of Black Male Advancement, the mission of the program is to dismantle the societal, economic, and educational barriers to the advancement of Black boys and young Black men (ages 8-25) in Boston. MBK Boston will tackle these challenges through the concentration of policy, resources, and efforts within 1) higher education 2) mentorship 3) STEAM 4) and community-based organizational funding. Housed under the Office of Black Male Advancement, MBK Boston will utilize the National MBK Alliance Milestones, where interventions can have the greatest impact and are predictive of later success.

Community Empowerment Small Grants: BMA along with Mayor Michelle Wu awarded funding to community based organizations totaling \$500,000. These grants, ranging from \$5,000 to \$20,000, aim to empower Black male-serving community-based organizations and amplify their impact in alignment with 7 core priorities (mentoring and out of school time, youth pathways, housing mobility, economic mobility & wealth building, workforce, fatherhood engagement, wellness). These grants will empower community organizations that serve Black men across Boston's neighborhoods to deepen their impact and bring successful programming to scale.

## **OVERVIEW**

### **OUR PROGRAMS CONT.**

Project Opportunity is an initiative that creates equitable opportunities for Boston residents with CORIs. The program connects residents with free legal consultation for sealing or expunging records, has panel discussions to address challenges and solutions for residents with CORIs, connects residents with employment and training resources, connects residents with key resources for well-being, trains City departments to meet the needs of residents with CORIS. Through this initiative the office of Black Male Advancement created an all-inclusive/one-stop resource guide and webpage that includes all City of Boston-led quality-of-life improvement resources. In addition we hosted a CORI friendly job and resource fair in partnership with MassHire which included 35 employers and resources, resume review and support, job application assistance, digital business cards, and free headshots.

R.E.A.C.H. 1000: BMA is working in partnership with BPS to connect young people with a network of individuals and organizations that serve as mentors. To support the first iteration of this program, BMA is looking to recruit 1,000 adult mentors over the next two years to connect with participating BPS students. As part of R.E.A.C.H. 1000, schools and mentees will have access to the following programs and learning opportunities: Black studies through dual enrollment; financial literacy; reading literacy, digital literacy; college and career pathways; and Generational Talent Small Grant. Mentees will also have an opportunity to engage with an Opportunity Lab, tailored for BPS Black seniors. The Lab will offer expert level technical support to scholars with their post secondary level plans, including higher education and careers.

<u>Capacity Building & Impact Institute</u>: This initiative will allow CBOs servicing the Black Male Community in Boston, to receive 1 on 1 coaching, nonprofit training courses, expert tools, & resources to help raise funds, maximize impact, and build capacity. The pilot cohort will consist of CBO'S with proven or promising programs that share our core values and are highly aligned with our strategies, goals and approaches to deepen their impact or bring their work to scale.

# Black Men & Boys Commission

The Commission was established through a 2021 ordinance and is made up of 21-Black males with experience, knowledge and expertise on issues pertaining to Black men and boys in the City of Boston. The Commission serves as an advisory board for the Mayor's Office of Black Male Advancement, including determining budget and policy priorities.

The Commission seeks to study the social conditions of the city's Black men and boys, develop strategies to remedy or assist in remedying serious adversities, and make recommendations to create equal opportunity for education, employment, access to public accommodations, and fair housing, significantly improving the life trajectory, physical, mental, economic and emotional wellness of generations of Black men and boys in the City of Boston.


Community Empowerment Grants for the past two years have been aimed at building stronger network across Boston to support and connect Black men and boys to programming and resources

# Black Men & Boys Commission's Update on **Budget Recommendations**

**RE: Communication in regards to Docket 0353** 

Mr. Clerk,

I submit to you this communication regarding Docket 0353: a hearing to discuss the feasibility of BPS providing ESOL classes for parents in order to create a public document detailing the developments on this subject since the docket's original filing. We originally filed this docket back in February of 2024 in collaboration with community stakeholders and local nonprofits to address what we feel are gaps in programmatic services made available to English learners and their families.

As you know, 17,000 Boston Public Schools students, which comprise nearly a third of all BPS students (32%), are described as English Learners, meaning they are native of a language other than English and that they are not yet proficient enough in English to perform in the pedagogical settings in which English is the primary language. With 1/3 of the student population being English learners, one can surmise that the parents of said population also identify as limited English proficient. In fact, the BPDA found that "Boston alone is home to 100,000 limited-English speaking adults – 11 percent of all adults in Boston." Parents of English learners who do not speak English themselves can benefit from English language classes not only to support their own children in their academic careers, but also to support their own careers here in the city.

Since filing the hearing, however, our office partnered with English for New Bostonians to identify a pathway through which the Council could use its budgetary powers to create a line item to provide either a programmatic or administrative fund through which ESOL classes for parents could be offered. Thanks to the efforts of English for New Bostonians and my Council colleagues, we successfully passed an override to the Mayor's amended budget, identified as Override 1P. The override stated the following:

Docket #0990 Partially Overridden, as moved, shall be partially overridden as follows:

[Chair of Ways and Means] recommend that we override the following increases:

• Increase Office of Immigrant Advancement Contractual Services, \$300,000 to support ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) parent classes across the city (adding \$300,000 to the line on the tax order).

Our office was proud and honored to be able to help secure this reallocation to help support the parents of English learners in BPS. This funding is not just about learning English; it is a tool through which we can create economic empowerment, establish means through which parents can play a more active role in their child's education, and strengthen communication between different language communities. Given this historic and significant budgetary allocation, we feel the main issues addressed in Docket 0353 have been resolved, at least for the time being. We do not wish to pull this matter from the Green Sheets and place it on file, as we feel it is important to keep it in committee should a hearing be needed. Instead, we elected to submit this communication to state that the Council successfully addressed the urgent need identified in the docket, and that our office will be working closely with the administration to ensure that the money is expended expeditiously. I look forward to continuing to collaborate with my Council colleagues, community stakeholders, and members of the public to fight for language justice for all residents in the City of Boston.

**WHEREAS:** Richard Lopez sustained serious injuries while in the line of duty on June 10, 2006 and as a result is incapacitated from further service as a firefighter for the Boston Fire Department; *and* 

WHEREAS: While employed in the Boston Fire Department, Richard Lopez's pay and retirement are under the jurisdiction of the Boston Retirement Board; *NOW THEREFORE BE IT* 

**ORDERED:** That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause 1 of Section 8 of Article II, as amended, of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows, except for clerical or editorial changes of form only:

# PETITION FOR A SPECIAL LAW RE: AN ACT REGARDING THE DISABILITY PENSION FOR RICHARD LOPEZ

- **SECTION 1.** (a) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Boston retirement board shall increase the accidental disability retirement allowance payable to Richard Lopez, a retired firefighter of the fire department of the city of Boston who, as a result of injuries sustained while in the performance of his duties on June 10, 2006, is totally and permanently incapacitated from performing the essential duties of a firefighter.
  - (b) The annual amount of pension payable to Richard Lopez shall be equal to the regular rate of compensation which would have been paid had he continued in service as a firefighter of the city of Boston at the grade held by him at the time of his retirement until his death or reaching mandatory retirement age, whichever comes first. All amounts paid under this act shall be non-taxable to the extent allowable under state and federal law.
  - (c) Notwithstanding Sections 8 and 91A of chapter 32 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, Richard Lopez's annual earnings, when added to his retirement allowance, may annually earn up to one-half the amount of his retirement allowance without refund penalty.
  - (d) Upon attaining the mandatory retirement age for a firefighter of the city of

Boston, Richard Lopez shall receive a pension pursuant to section 7 of said chapter 32, a yearly amount of pension equal to 80 percent of the annual rate of the compensation he was receiving on the day before he reaches the mandatory retirement age for a firefighter in the city of Boston.

- (e) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the benefits granted herein shall be funded and administered by the Boston retirement board, consistent with and subject to chapter 32 of the General Laws.
- **SECTION 2.** Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, Richard Lopez shall be entitled to receive indemnification for all hospital, medical and related expenses that have been or may be incurred after the date of his retirement as a result of the injuries sustained by him while in the performance of his duties from June 10, 2006, in accordance with sections 100 and 100B of chapter 41 of the General Laws.
- **SECTION 3.** Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Boston retirement board shall forthwith pay to said Richard Lopez the amount credited to him as accumulated total deductions in the annuity savings fund of the Boston Retirement Board as of the effective date of this act.
- **SECTION 4.** Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, if Richard Lopez was married upon retirement, upon his death, if he is still married to the spouse he was married to upon retirement then, should his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement survive him, the retirement board of the city of Boston shall pay to the spouse an annuity in the amount of 75 per cent of the amount of the pension which otherwise would have been payable to Richard Lopez until the spouse's death. The pension benefits provided for in this section and section 1 shall be subject to section 103 of chapter 32 of the General Laws.
- **SECTION 5.** In the event that both Richard Lopez and his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement die before their children reach the age of 18 the payments that would otherwise have been made to his spouse shall be payable, per stirpes, to each surviving children under the age of 18; provided, however, that payments shall continue for the benefit of a surviving child 18 years or older who, on or before the date of death of Richard Lopez or his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement, whichever is later, had been medically determined to be permanently physically or mentally incapacitated from earning or for the benefit of a child under the age of 22 who is enrolled as a full-time student as determined by the criteria of the educational institution.

**SECTION 6.** This act shall take effect upon its passage.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIR

August 7, 2024

Dear Councilors,

Docket #0995, Petition For A Special Law Re: An Act Regarding The Disability Pension For Richard Lopez, was sponsored by Councilor Enrique Pepén and referred to the Committee on June 12, 2024. This docket was filed on behalf of Richard Lopez (petitioner).

The Committee held a hearing on July 18, 2024. The Chair was joined by Councilors Enrique Pepén and Ed Flynn. The Committee received the following documentation from the Petitioner: Petitioner Summary; Incident Reports; Application for Retirement to the Boston Retirement Board; Physician Statement; PERAC Regional Medical Panel Certification; Employer Statement; and Relevant Medical Records.

#### **Petitioner Summary:**

Richard Lopez began his firefighting career in 1996 in Rhode Island while awaiting the opportunity to join the Boston Fire Department, which he successfully did in July 2000. The Petitioner's career took a turn on June 10, 2006, during a rescue operation at a building fire where he sustained a shoulder and neck injury while carrying an incapacitated individual. Despite undergoing right shoulder arthroscopic surgery, and completing multiple rounds of physical therapy, Petitioner continued to experience pain, stiffness and weakness in his shoulder, prompting him to apply for Disability Retirement in 2007. Petitioner's application for accidental disability retirement was approved in 2008. Petitioner testified that he is seeking an increase in his pension payments as his persistent pain, decreased range of motion and unpredictable migraines are debilitating and have left him unable to take on the commitments of a job of any kind.

#### **Summary of Legislation:**

**Docket** #0995 is a Home Rule Petition (HRP) seeking to increase Richard Lopez's accidental disability retirement benefits. Petitioner is a retired City of Boston Firefighter.

The HRP seeks to revise Petitioner's disability benefits by increasing the annual amount of pension payable, the annual amount that may be earned in addition to Petitioner's annual pension allowance, reimbursement compensation, and benefits allowance and disbursement for his beneficiaries.

#### Section 1. (b)

This section of the HRP seeks to increase the annual amount of pension payable to Petitioner from the regular rate of compensation he was paid in 2007, to the regular rate of compensation he would have been paid had he not been injured. Currently, the annual amount of pension payable to Petitioner is based on the rate of compensation he earned in 2007 when he was injured.

#### Section 1. (c)

This section of the HRP seeks to increase the annual amount that Petitioner may earn in addition to his annual pension payments. Currently, **M.G.L. c.32**, **s.91A** states, "If such earnings exceed an amount which when added to the member's retirement allowance is greater than the amount of regular compensation which would have been payable to such member if such member had continued in service in the grade held by him at the time he was retired plus \$15,000, said member shall refund the portion of his retirement allowance for such preceding year equal to such excess and until such refund is made, his pension or retirement allowance shall be held as security therefor." The HRP would revise this provision for Petitioner to allow him to earn up to one-half the amount of his retirement allowance without refund penalty.

#### Section 1. (d)

This section of the HRP increases the yearly amount of pension payable to Petitioner upon attaining the mandatory retirement age to 80%, as opposed to 72% as stipulated in **M.G.L. c.32 s.7**. Under **M.G.L c. 32 § 5 (2) (c)**, the maximum pension payable is limited to 80% of the member's final average salary

#### Section 2.

This section of the HRP provides for reimbursement compensation, in accordance with M.G.L. c.41 s.100 and 100B, which would authorize indemnification for Petitioner, or, in the event of his death, his widow, or if he leaves no widow, his next of kin for all reasonable hospital, medical, surgical, chiropractic, nursing, pharmaceutical, prosthetic and related expenses and reasonable charges for chiropody (podiatry) incurred as the natural and proximate result of an accident occurring or of undergoing a hazard peculiar to his employment, while acting in the performance and within the scope of his duty without fault of his own.

#### Section 3.

This section of the HRP requires the Boston Retirement Board to pay Petitioner the amount credited to him as accumulated total deductions in the annuity savings fund of the Boston Retirement Board as of the effective date of the Special Act if passed by the Legislature.

#### Section 4. and Section 5.

Under M.G.L. c.32 s.12, retirement allowance shall be payable during the lifetime of the member and shall cease upon his death except as otherwise provided for in the option elected. The General Laws describe multiple options to choose from. These sections of the HRP request to elect the following plan instead: that the Retirement Board of the City of Boston pay to the spouse an annuity in the amount of 75 % of the amount of the pension which otherwise would have been payable to Lopez until the spouse's death subject to M.G.L. c.32 s.103 which allows for cost of living increases for any county employee or their widow/next of kin. Further, In the event that both Petitioner and his spouse, to whom he was married on the date upon retirement, die before their children reach the age of eighteen, under this proposed HRP, the payments that would otherwise have been made to his spouse shall be payable, in equal shares, to each surviving children under the age of 18; provided, however, that payments shall continue for the benefit of a surviving child 18 years or older who, on or before the date of death of Petitioner or his spouse to whom he was married on the date upon retirement, whichever is later, had been medically determined to be permanently physically or mentally incapacitated from earning or for the benefit of a child under the age of 22 who is enrolled as a full-time student as determined by the criteria of the educational institution. This language aligns with other "allowance" provisions under M.G.L. c.32 s.7.

# PETITION FOR A SPECIAL LAW RE: AN ACT PROVIDING CERTAIN DEATH BENEFITS FOR THE WIDOW OF A FORMER FIREFIGHTER OF THE CITY OF BOSTON

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding section 100 of chapter 32 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, and to promote the public good, there shall be paid a line of duty death benefit from the Boston Retirement Board to Pamela Thompson, the widow of Anthony Thompson, a former firefighter of the city of Boston who died as a result of injuries sustained while performing the essential duties of a firefighter. The benefits shall be paid and administered in accordance with section 100 of chapter 32 of the General Laws. Pamela Thompson shall receive a lump sum payment from the Boston Retirement Board equal to the total accumulated retirement deductions paid by Anthony Thompson into the annuity savings fund.

SECTION 2. Such line of duty death benefit shall be paid to Pamela Thompson and consist of an annual amount of pension equal to the amount of salary which would have been paid to said firefighter, Anthony Thompson, had he continued in service as a Boston Firefighter. This line of duty death benefit shall maintain parity with the Boston firefighters collective bargaining pay increases. In case of any surviving eligible children there shall be paid to Pamela Thompson the sum of three hundred and twelve dollars per annum for each such child until such time as all such children have attained age eighteen or have attained age twenty-two if a full-time student.

**SECTION 3.** Notwithstanding any general or special law, rule, or regulation to the contrary, the surviving children of Anthony Thompson, a deceased firefighter in the City of Boston, shall be eligible for original appointment to the Boston Fire Department and shall be considered survivors under section 26 of chapter 31 of the General Laws. In order to have their names so certified, said surviving children must first pass the written and physical examinations required of all candidates for entrance to the fire service.

**SECTION 4.** This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Docket #1125, Petition For A Special Law Re: An Act Providing Certain Death Benefits For The Widow Of A Former Firefighter Of The City Of Boston, was sponsored by Councilor Enrique Pepén and referred to the Committee on July 10, 2024. This docket was filed on behalf of Pamela Thompson (petitioner).

The Committee held a hearing on July 26, 2024. The Chair was joined by Councilors Pepén; Flynn; and Murphy. The Committee received the following documentation from the petitioner: Petitioner Summary; Boston Fire Department Injury/Exposure Report; Jared Thompson's (son) Passing Score Report; and a Letter from Boston Retirement System.

#### **Petitioner Summary:**

Pamela Thompson, is the widow of Anthony Thompson, to whom she was married for 28 years. Anthony Thompson served as a Boston Firefighter for 35 years. The Petitioner and Firefighter Thompson shared 3 children together: the eldest is currently 30 years old and will require continued supportive care upon the petitioners death; the middle child works at Massachusetts General Hospital and recently completed the firefighters exam/physical scoring a 97; and finally, the youngest child just finished her second degree and is applying for medical school. Firefighter Thompson passed away due to cancer of the esophagus in March 2020, and following his death, Petitioner began receiving accidental death benefits pursuant to **M.G.L. c.32 s.9**<sup>1</sup> via the presumption established under **M.G.L. c.32 s.94 A-B.**<sup>2</sup>

#### **Summary of Legislation:**

**Docket** #1125, is a Home Rule Petition (HRP) that aims to amend the death benefits the petitioner currently receives under M.G.L. c.32 s.9. The City Council and Mayor must approve this petition to the legislature requesting their permission to achieve the goals outlined below:

#### Section 1. & Section 2.

The first two sections of the HRP declare that Firefighter Thompson died as a result of injuries sustained while performing the essential duties of a firefighter and requests that the petitioner and her children receive the benefits described in **M.G.L. c.32 s.100**.

Under **Section 100**, if a firefighter dies or sustains fatal injuries while responding to or returning from a fire alarm, emergency, or while at the scene of a fire, the surviving spouse is entitled to an annual pension

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Under M.G.L. c.32 s.9, An accidental death benefit allowance is provided to the member's dependent beneficiaries, equivalent to 72% of the member's annual regular compensation at the time of the injury or death, or 72% of the average annual rate of compensation for the preceding twelve months, whichever is greater. This allowance is payable to the surviving spouse as long as they were living together at the time of the member's death, with exceptions for justifiable cause or desertion. If there are surviving unmarried children under 18, physically or mentally incapacitated children over 18, or full-time student children under 22, an additional yearly pension of \$312 per child is paid to the child's guardian.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Under M.G.L. c.32 s.94 A-B, if a paid fire department member develops a health condition related to lung/respiratory disease or cancer leading to total disability or death, it is presumed to have been incurred in the line of duty due to exposure to harmful substances, provided they passed a physical exam that did not detect the condition.

equivalent to the salary the firefighter would have received if they had continued in their position at the time of their death. The pension amount immediately payable is equal to the maximum salary for the position, regardless of whether the firefighter had reached the maximum salary before their death. If the surviving spouse eligible for the pension passes away, and there are children of the deceased firefighter, each child's legal guardian will receive \$312 per year per child. Additionally, the legal guardian will receive 72% of the pension that the surviving spouse was receiving at the time of their death, to be distributed among the children until they reach age 18 or 22 if enrolled as full-time students. Payments will continue for children over 18 who are physically or mentally incapacitated from earning.

Both sections are necessary provisions of the HRP as the presumptions outlined in **Sections 94A-B** do not apply to the death of a firefighter when determining eligibility for **Section 100** benefits.

#### Section 3.

This section requests that the petitioner's younger son be eligible to make a claim for preference under M.G.L. c.31 s.26.

Under Section 26, a son or daughter of a firefighter, police officer, or correction officer who passes the required examinations for entry into the respective service will have their name placed first on the eligible list or reserve roster for appointment if the parent died or sustained fatal injuries in the line of duty. This special consideration applies when the firefighter, police officer, or correction officer was killed or injured resulting in death while performing their official duties due to specific circumstances outlined in the law.

This provision of the HRP is necessary because **Section 26** stipulates that the special preference is not applicable in cases where the Firefighters cause of death was declared pursuant to the presumptions established under **Sections 94A-B.** 

#### **Recommended Action:**

The major provisions of the PSA contract include a base wage increase of 2% to be given in October of each fiscal year of the contract term and flat amounts of \$500, \$250, \$900, \$800 to be added to annual salaries in January of each fiscal year of the contract respectively. The agreement also includes an acceptance of how new technology will be noticed to the union, a clarification of the compensation grade appeal process, and position upgrades at several branches. The estimated cost is \$4.6M over four years. The contract is structured with a three-year agreement (October 1, 2023 - September 30, 2026) and a one-year agreement (October 1, 2026 to September 30, 2027).

The major provisions of the Teamsters Local 25 contract include a base wage increase of 2% to be given in July of each fiscal year of the contract term and flat amounts of \$500, \$250, \$900, \$800 to be added to annual salaries in January of each fiscal year of the contract respectively. The agreement also includes an acceptance of how new technology will be noticed to the union, an acceptance of the citywide bereavement policy, a clarification of the compensation grade appeal process, and the removal of Step 1, and addition of Step 9 in the salary scale. The estimated cost is \$174,000 over four years. The contract is structured with a three-year agreement (July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2026) and a one-year agreement (July 1, 2026 to June 30, 2027).

#### Information Received at Hearing

The Committee held a public hearing on Dockets #1110-1113 on Monday, July 29, 2024. The Committee was joined by Jim Williamson, Budget Director for the City of Boston and Renee Bushey, Director of Labor Relations.

Mr. Williamson stated that the four dockets represent transfers and appropriations to fund collective bargaining contracts for PSA and Teamsters Local 25. He stated the aggregate amount of these contracts is roughly \$821,000, which will be transferred from the Reserve for Collective Bargaining from the FY25 Budget, which was approved at \$96.8M. He stated the Reserve will have \$96M after these contracts are approved.

The Committee was also provided public testimony from the assistant president of the PSA union, Allison Hahn. She provided testimony surrounding the negotiation process, the financial

realities of those in the union, the everyday experience of those in the union, the morale of those at the library, and the safety of those working at the libraries.

#### Committee Chair Recommended Action

As Chair of the Committee on Ways & Means, I recommend moving the listed dockets from the Committee to the full Council for discussion and formal action. At that time, my recommendation to the full Council will be that the matters **OUGHT TO PASS**.

July 29, 2024

The Committee on Ways & Means was referred the following dockets for consideration:

Docket #1110, Message and order for your approval, an Order to reduce the FY25 appropriation for the Reserve for Collective Bargaining by seven hundred eighty-six thousand, five hundred three dollars (\$786,503) to provide funding for a city department for the FY25 increases contained within the collective bargaining agreements between the City of Boston and Boston Public Library Professional Staff Association.

Docket #1111, Message and order for a supplemental appropriation Order for a city department for FY25 in the amount of seven hundred eighty-six thousand, five hundred three dollars (\$786,503) to cover the FY25 cost items contained within the collective bargaining agreements between the City of Boston and the Boston Public Library Professional Staff Association. The terms of the contract are July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2027. The major provision of the contract includes a base wage increase of 2% to be given in October of each fiscal year of the contract term and flat amounts of \$500, \$250, \$900, \$800 to be added to annual salaries in January of each fiscal year.

Docket #1112, Message and order for your approval, an Order to reduce the FY25 appropriation for the Reserve for Collective Bargaining by thirty-four thousand, three hundred thirty-one dollars (\$34,331) to provide funding for a city department for the FY25 increases contained within the collective bargaining agreements between the City of Boston and Teamsters Local 25.

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These matters were sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu and referred to the Committee on July 10, 2024.

#### Summary of Legislation

Dockets #1110 and #1112 transfer funds from the Reserve for Collective Bargaining to provide funding for the following departments: Boston Public Library and Property Management Department. Docket #1111 authorizes the funding of a collective bargaining agreement between the City of Boston and the Boston Public Library Professional Staff Association (PSA). The terms of the contract are July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2027, with an appropriation amount of \$786,503 for FY25. Docket #1113 authorizes the funding of a collective bargaining agreement between the City of Boston and Teamsters Local 25. The terms of the contract are July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2027 with an appropriation amount of \$34,331 for FY25.

The major provisions of the PSA contract include a base wage increase of 2% to be given in October of each fiscal year of the contract term and flat amounts of \$500, \$250, \$900, \$800 to be added to annual salaries in January of each fiscal year of the contract respectively. The agreement also includes an acceptance of how new technology will be noticed to the union, a clarification of the compensation grade appeal process, and position upgrades at several branches. The estimated cost is \$4.6M over four years. The contract is structured with a three-year agreement (October 1, 2023 - September 30, 2026) and a one-year agreement (October 1, 2026 to September 30, 2027).

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#### Additional Related Legislation

Dockets #0908 and #0909 are related dockets that transfer funds from the Reserve for Collective Bargaining to provide funding for Boston Public Health Commission and authorize the funding of a collective bargaining agreement between the City of Boston and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, Council 93, Local 787. The terms of the contracts are October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024 and October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2027. The major provisions of the contract include base wage increases of 2% to be given in January of each fiscal year of the contract term and flat amounts of \$500, \$250, \$900, \$800 to be added to annual salaries in January of each fiscal year of the contract respectively after the percent increase. The contract is structured with a one-year agreement (October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024) and a three-year agreement (October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2027). The appropriation amount for FY25 is \$34,188.

#### Information Received at Hearing

The Committee held a public hearing on Dockets #1110-1113 on Monday, July 29, 2024. The Committee was joined by Jim Williamson, Budget Director for the City of Boston and Renee Bushey, Director of Labor Relations.

Mr. Williamson stated that the four dockets represent transfers and appropriations to fund collective bargaining contracts for PSA and Teamsters Local 25. He stated the aggregate amount of these contracts is roughly \$821,000, which will be transferred from the Reserve for Collective Bargaining from the FY25 Budget, which was approved at \$96.8M. He stated the Reserve will have \$96M after these contracts are approved.

Councilors and the panel also discussed various topics including the following:

- the effective wage increase year over year for lower wage workers when both the flat amounts and the 2% wage increase are summed together
- the issues of low morale at Boston Public Library, and possible solutions to address it, including changing step negotiations that allow children's librarians to stay in location and move up a step, without having to change branches
- the possible building of a third floor to the South End library
- the reasons for having a 3 + 1 contract model, which Admin stated allows the budget team to plan out further
- the renegotiation of steps with regards to the Teamsters Local 25 contract, which allows for one long time employee to move up in step
- the highlights of both agreements
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- the internal managerial decisions regarding staff placement when libraries are closed for capital problems
- the consequences of not settling a contract, which includes union workers not receiving a raise until a new contract is negotiated
- best practices for negotiating contracts in an efficient manner
- the possibilities of negotiating for a child care stipend and tuition reimbursement for contracts in the future
- understanding how safe staffing levels are determined
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The Committee was also provided public testimony from the assistant president of the PSA union, Allison Hahn. She provided testimony surrounding the negotiation process, the financial

realities of those in the union, the everyday experience of those in the union, the morale of those at the library, and the safety of those working at the libraries.

I hereby transmit for your approval an Order authorizing the City of Boston, acting through its Mayor's Office of Housing, to accept and expend payments in the amount of Forty Million Dollars (\$40,000,000) given to the City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Policy Fund.

The City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Policy Fund (IDP) was established by Executive Order in February 2000 to support the production and preservation of affordable housing in new market rate housing developments. The IDP requires all developers of residential development projects with ten or more units to include affordable units in their projects as a condition of receiving relief from the Boston Zoning Code. Further, the Executive Order provides the option for developers to make contributions to the IDP Fund in lieu of providing on-site affordable units, subject to the approval of the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA).

At the inception of the Policy, the Fund had been maintained and administered by the BPDA. In September 2013, the administration of the IDP was transferred from the BPDA to the Mayor's Office of Housing.

I urge your Honorable Body to adopt this Order expeditiously so that the City may accept the funds and expend them for the purposes for which these funds were given.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIR

August 2, 2024

Dear Councilors:

The Committee on Housing and Community Development was referred the following dockets for consideration:

Docket #0633, Message and order for your approval an Order authorizing the City of Boston, acting through its Mayor's Office of Housing, to accept and expend payments in the amount of Forty Million Dollars (\$40,000,000.00) given to the City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Policy Fund. The City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Fund (IDP) was established by Executive Order in February 2000 to support the production and preservation of affordable housing in new market rate housing developments.

Docket #0695, Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) in the form of a grant to provide rapid rehousing services together with wraparound support and recovery services to individuals, with a history of homelessness, awarded by the MA Department of Public Health to be administered by the Mayor's Office of Housing. The grant will fund State ARPA Earmark Mayor's Office of Housing.

These matters were sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu and referred to the Committee on April 3, 2024 and April 10, 2024.

#### Summary of Legislation

**Docket #0633** is a message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend \$40,000,000 from payments to the City's Inclusionary Development Policy (IDP) Fund. The IDP Fund is a part of the IDP, a City policy that was first established in 2000 to increase the supply of affordable housing in the City by having developers build affordable housing units on-site, off-site, or by contributing funds to the IDP pursuant to a formula. Since 2000, the policy has been revised in 2003, 2005, 2006, and 2007. Over the years, the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA), now known as the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA), adopted several policies to interpret and clarify the IDP orders, guiding its implementation. In December 2015, Mayor Walsh issued a new Executive Order, consolidating and updating the collection of orders and policies into a single document. Mayor Wu announced proposed changes to the IDP in December 2022. The BPDA Board of Directors approved said changes on July 13, 2023, and City Council approved said changes on September 27, 2023.

Currently, IDP is triggered by a request for zoning relief for developments of 10 or more units, with exceptions for developments where forty percent (40%) or more of the units are income-restricted. Thirteen percent (13%) of units must be set aside as income-restricted housing if on-site, with eighteen percent (18%) set aside for off-site units in Zones A or B, and fifteen percent (15%) in Zone C. The Payment in Lieu of Unit (PILU) formula—which dictates the amount of money accepted being discussed in this docket—varies by zone and ranges from \$200,000 to \$380,000 per unit.

The revenue from PILU is typically paid over seven years, and from smaller one-time "partial unit payments." Eligible usage of the funds include the creation and preservation of new long-term affordable housing units. The units may be homeownership, rental, cooperative or other forms of permanent or transitional housing, and all affordable units will be subject to an affordable housing restriction. The policy integrates income-targeting, requiring rental units created with IDP funding to have a maximum income limit of 70% of the area median income (AMI) and ownership units to have a maximum income limit of 100% of AMI, requiring additionally that at least half the units must be income restricted at 80% of AMI, or less.

Initially, the BPDA managed all aspects of the IDP program and its Board of Directors authorized expenditures for affordable projects. Starting in 2014, some IDP responsibilities and funds were transferred to City agencies. A Memorandum of Agreement dated July 14, 2014, between the then-BRA and the Department of Neighborhood Development (DND), now the Mayor's Office of Housing (MOH), transferred IDP Funds into a special revenue account held by the City Treasury.

The BPDA continued to enter into Affordable Housing Agreements with developers, while MOH took on the responsibility to collect, administer, and disburse IDP funds for creating or improving additional affordable housing units through a new, transparent, and competitive process. At the time, it was announced that the City of Boston Treasury Department would have a greater role in ensuring that developers pay their obligations in full and on time, and that the Fund would be subject to annual financial audits performed by an independent third party.

Since October 2023, housing compliance staff monitoring and enforcing obligations under IDP agreements have transferred from the BPDA to MOH. On July 18, 2024, the BPDA Board authorized further transfers of the IDP program to MOH, including the authority for the Director to assign Affordable Housing Agreements entered into by the BPDA under the IDP to MOH.

In September 2019, the Boston City Council passed a home rule petition requesting state authorization to codify inclusionary development requirements into the zoning code. The Massachusetts Legislature enacted this amendment to the Boston Zoning Enabling Act in January 2021, and in July 2023, the BPDA Board approved a text amendment incorporating the IDP into the zoning code as Article 79 (Inclusionary Zoning). This amendment was approved by the Boston City Council in September 2023 and adopted by the Zoning Commission in November 2023, effective October 1, 2024. Article 79 increases requirements and maintains certain IDP provisions, including criteria for partial units, off-site unit development, unit characteristics, and an affordability term of 30 years with a 20-year extension, totaling 50 years.

The following data gives a snapshot of the IDP since inception. The policy has permitted or completed 8,261 on-site, off-site, or PILU units. Of those, 6,402 are rental units, 1,835 are ownership units Since FY15, IDP funds have helped create 2,302 new units in income-restricted housing, of those 2,302 units 1,728 are new rental units and 574 are new homeownership units. In addition, IDP funds have been used to acquire or preserve 604 units of existing rental housing, including 450 unrestricted rental units acquired and converted to permanently affordable housing

through the Acquisition Opportunity Program (AOP) and 154 existing affordable rental units preserved in perpetuity. Prior to 2014, the BPDA collected \$21,514,826 in the IDP fund; since MOH took over fund administration, they have collected \$163,029,059, and are projected to collect \$34,305,778 in FY25. The reason for a \$40,000,000 accept and expend order is to ensure MOH is able to collect up to that amount if there are payments that come in during the fiscal year that were not originally projected. Between FY15 and FY24 there were \$143,015,861 in projects funded, and there are projected commitments of \$65,704,355 in FY25 (this amount is subject to change as it includes pending awards and known pipeline projects). Between FY15 and FY25, project management costs came in at \$10,129,448.

Pursuant to section 53A of chapter 44 of the Massachusetts General Laws, the City Council has taken six votes authorizing the acceptance and expenditure of IDP Funds since 2013 (FY14). These authorizations have been in amounts ranging from \$29,945,245 to \$40,000,000 for a total of \$184,945,245 authorized to date. If the City Council votes to approve the requested authorization in the amount of \$40,000,000, the new cumulative amount authorized to be expended from the IDP Fund will be \$224,945,245.

IDP funds are administered as part of the MOH's efforts to address housing inequities and ensure all Bostonians have access to safe, healthy, and affordable housing. To advance this goal, MOH issues Requests for Proposals (RFPs) offering funding support to nonprofit and for-profit developers for affordable rental, cooperative, and homeownership development proposals. A portion of these funds is allocated for supportive housing for homeless and aging populations. Part of this funding comes from the IDP fund. Resources available in the MOH RFP may not be used to support any on-site IDP units required under the IDP or Article 79. Developers complying with the IDP Executive Order must provide at least 40% of the units as affordable to seek other City subsidies. IDP funds cannot be used to support unrestricted units or units required to be built on-site under the IDP Executive Order.

Examples of past and current usage of IDP funds are as follows: Parcel 25, Phase A, Mission Hill – 46 units of mixed income affordable rental housing ranging from 30-60% of the area median income, 775 Huntington Avenue, Mission Hill – 12 story, mixed use, mixed income development with 112 units, including 57 income-restricted rental units and 55 mixed income condominiums, Stonley Brookley, Jamaica Plain – 45 income-restricted homeownership units, including 5 live-work studios, Magnolia-Woodford, Roxbury – seven units of mixed income housing, including five income restricted units that will be held under a long term ground lease with Dudley Neighbors, Inc, Aileron Homeownership, East Boston – seven income-restricted condominiums create on city owned land, and Parcel 12C, Chinatown – mixed income and mixed use development with 36 homeownership units and 96 rental units created on land owned by the Planning Department.

**Docket #0695** is a message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend a grant in the amount of five-million dollars (\$5,000,000) from the U.S. Department of Treasury administered through the Massachusetts Department of Public Health as directed under section 220 of Chapter 268 of the Acts of 2022. The purpose of the grant is to provide rapid rehousing services (rental assistance and housing stabilization) together with wraparound support and recovery services to individuals exiting Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment with a history of homelessness in Boston. It aims to quickly connect those leaving rehabilitation with housing, increase their income (through earned income and benefits), and be equitable in distribution, ensuring no subpopulation receives positive outcomes at a significantly lower percentage than others. The grant must be expended by December 31, 2026, will be expended through a Request for Proposal (RFP), and will be awarded to a nonprofit or partnership of nonprofits with expertise in operating rapid rehousing programs and serving participants with SUD.

#### Information Received at Hearing

The Committee held a virtual public hearing on Dockets #0633 and #0695 on Tuesday, July 30, 2024. In attendance were City personnel representing departments that will expend the grants:

- Chief Dillon, Chief of Housing and Director of Mayor's Office of Housing (MOH)
- Mr. Daniel Lesser, Chief of Staff, MOH
- Mr. Rick Wilson, Director of Administration and Finance, MOH

Mr. Lesser explained the purposes of the post-recovery grant, which are to provide people who are transitioning out of rehabilitation with rapid housing and wraparound services for a period of 24 months. He stated MOH has run many rapid rehousing programs and seen very strong outcomes of participants not returning to homelessness after a 24 month period. He explained that since this is American Rescue Plan (ARPA) funding, this funding must be spent by December 31, 2026, and explained the city will hopefully stand up the program in the coming months. The funds will predominantly cover rental and housing assistance, but part will cover costs for the wraparound services, which include caseworkers and access to other resources. Chief Dillon explained part of these funds will be directed towards veterans with substance use disorders.

Chief Dillon explained the Inclusionary Development Policy Fund appropriation, discussing the basics of the policy, and the impacts of it since its inception. She explained this program has created approximately 8,000 of the 58,000 affordable housing units in the city, or about fourteen percent (14%). Mr. Wilson explained that recently, most projects have opted to build on-site and off-site units rather than paying into the fund. Mr. Wilson gave an overview of the total units created or sustained using the funds and then gave an overview of the total amounts collected into the fund and total amounts expended. He then gave a brief history of all expend and adopt votes taken by the council on these funds since 2013. He concluded by showing examples of built or permitted housing projects that have been funded using IDP funds.

Additionally, MOH representatives responded to questions from the councilors across a variety of issues. In response to a question surrounding the slight difference between the accept and expend appropriation order of \$40,000,000 and the projected revenue of \$34,305,778, representatives responded the difference is to allow for the collection of unexpected funds that may not have been accounted for due to external circumstances. In response to a question on how projects choose their method of IDP compliance – on-site, off-site, or PILU – representatives responded it is in part a community process, and recently there has been a push to have developers build the units on-site, as it is the avenue through which many neighborhoods are creating affordable housing stock. However, in instances where the cash out is very large, and the impacts are evaluated to be greater across the city, MOH does sometimes opt to have the developer cash out. When asked how the funds are distributed, representatives stated it is a request for proposal (RFP) process that looks at proposals that meet some or all of the following requirements: situated in neighborhoods with lower affordable housing opportunities, have been shown to district offices, and are looking at even lower AMIs than required, in part due to the influence of outer Boston communities pushing up Boston's AMI scale. Representatives also discussed other priorities in their distribution, which includes housing for disabled persons and housing being built on previously city owned land.

Councilors and representatives also discussed the financial makeup of the city's affordable housing stock of approximately 58,000, which is a mix of originally federally funded Boston Housing Authority (BHA) housing, IDP units, linkage funds, and other funding sources. They additionally discussed the PILU amounts in the context of construction costs and interest rates

increasing, and representatives stated the PILU amounts have been fixed since 2015. They stated this amount has been a policy until now, but with new changes in the zoning code, this amount will be incorporated into zoning. Representatives stated they are currently having internal conversations weighing IDP requirements against market conditions. Other topics discussed included how to increase homeownership units built with IDP funds, which representatives stated are limited due to the smaller field of other funding sources for homeownership units in comparison to rental units, the structure of the project management expenditures, the roles of the Treasury Department in ensuring fund collection and compliance, the future of the fund as more projects are opting to build units on-site and off-site, the possible mechanisms to ensure projects follow through on obligation to create homeownership units rather than rental units after their project is approved and built, measures to increase the distribution of MOH resources to those who are closest to displacement, and the efforts to redefine perpetuity for IDP projects to be forever and not the current definition of 30 years plus the option to extend 20 years.

### Summary of Amendments

Docket #0695 will pass in a new draft to accurately reflect that the originating authority is the United States Department of Treasury.

#### Committee Chair Recommended Action

As Chair of the Committee on Housing and Community Development, I recommend moving the listed dockets from the Committee to the full Council for discussion and formal action. At that time, my recommendation to the full Council will be as follows:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIR

August 2, 2024

Dear Councilors:

The Committee on Housing and Community Development was referred the following dockets for consideration:

Docket #0633, Message and order for your approval an Order authorizing the City of Boston, acting through its Mayor's Office of Housing, to accept and expend payments in the amount of Forty Million Dollars (\$40,000,000.00) given to the City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Policy Fund. The City of Boston's Inclusionary Development Fund (IDP) was established by Executive Order in February 2000 to support the production and preservation of affordable housing in new market rate housing developments.

Docket #0695, Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) in the form of a grant to provide rapid rehousing services together with wraparound support and recovery services to individuals, with a history of homelessness, awarded by the MA Department of Public Health to be administered by the Mayor's Office of Housing. The grant will fund State ARPA Earmark Mayor's Office of Housing.

These matters were sponsored by Mayor Michelle Wu and referred to the Committee on April 3, 2024 and April 10, 2024.

#### Summary of Legislation

**Docket #0633** is a message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend \$40,000,000 from payments to the City's Inclusionary Development Policy (IDP) Fund. The IDP Fund is a part of the IDP, a City policy that was first established in 2000 to increase the supply of affordable housing in the City by having developers build affordable housing units on-site, off-site, or by contributing funds to the IDP pursuant to a formula. Since 2000, the policy has been revised in 2003, 2005, 2006, and 2007. Over the years, the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA), now known as the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA), adopted several policies to interpret and clarify the IDP orders, guiding its implementation. In December 2015, Mayor Walsh issued a new Executive Order, consolidating and updating the collection of orders and policies into a single document. Mayor Wu announced proposed changes to the IDP in December 2022. The BPDA Board of Directors approved said changes on July 13, 2023, and City Council approved said changes on September 27, 2023.

Currently, IDP is triggered by a request for zoning relief for developments of 10 or more units, with exceptions for developments where forty percent (40%) or more of the units are income-restricted. Thirteen percent (13%) of units must be set aside as income-restricted housing if on-site, with eighteen percent (18%) set aside for off-site units in Zones A or B, and fifteen percent (15%) in Zone C. The Payment in Lieu of Unit (PILU) formula—which dictates the amount of money accepted being discussed in this docket—varies by zone and ranges from \$200,000 to \$380,000 per unit.

The revenue from PILU is typically paid over seven years, and from smaller one-time "partial unit payments." Eligible usage of the funds include the creation and preservation of new long-term affordable housing units. The units may be homeownership, rental, cooperative or other forms of permanent or transitional housing, and all affordable units will be subject to an affordable housing restriction. The policy integrates income-targeting, requiring rental units created with IDP funding to have a maximum income limit of 70% of the area median income (AMI) and ownership units to have a maximum income limit of 100% of AMI, requiring additionally that at least half the units must be income restricted at 80% of AMI, or less.

Initially, the BPDA managed all aspects of the IDP program and its Board of Directors authorized expenditures for affordable projects. Starting in 2014, some IDP responsibilities and funds were transferred to City agencies. A Memorandum of Agreement dated July 14, 2014, between the then-BRA and the Department of Neighborhood Development (DND), now the Mayor's Office of Housing (MOH), transferred IDP Funds into a special revenue account held by the City Treasury.

The BPDA continued to enter into Affordable Housing Agreements with developers, while MOH took on the responsibility to collect, administer, and disburse IDP funds for creating or improving additional affordable housing units through a new, transparent, and competitive process. At the time, it was announced that the City of Boston Treasury Department would have a greater role in ensuring that developers pay their obligations in full and on time, and that the Fund would be subject to annual financial audits performed by an independent third party.

Since October 2023, housing compliance staff monitoring and enforcing obligations under IDP agreements have transferred from the BPDA to MOH. On July 18, 2024, the BPDA Board authorized further transfers of the IDP program to MOH, including the authority for the Director to assign Affordable Housing Agreements entered into by the BPDA under the IDP to MOH.

In September 2019, the Boston City Council passed a home rule petition requesting state authorization to codify inclusionary development requirements into the zoning code. The Massachusetts Legislature enacted this amendment to the Boston Zoning Enabling Act in January 2021, and in July 2023, the BPDA Board approved a text amendment incorporating the IDP into the zoning code as Article 79 (Inclusionary Zoning). This amendment was approved by the Boston City Council in September 2023 and adopted by the Zoning Commission in November 2023, effective October 1, 2024. Article 79 increases requirements and maintains certain IDP provisions, including criteria for partial units, off-site unit development, unit characteristics, and an affordability term of 30 years with a 20-year extension, totaling 50 years.

The following data gives a snapshot of the IDP since inception. The policy has permitted or completed 8,261 on-site, off-site, or PILU units. Of those, 6,402 are rental units, 1,835 are ownership units Since FY15, IDP funds have helped create 2,302 new units in income-restricted housing, of those 2,302 units 1,728 are new rental units and 574 are new homeownership units. In addition, IDP funds have been used to acquire or preserve 604 units of existing rental housing, including 450 unrestricted rental units acquired and converted to permanently affordable housing

through the Acquisition Opportunity Program (AOP) and 154 existing affordable rental units preserved in perpetuity. Prior to 2014, the BPDA collected \$21,514,826 in the IDP fund; since MOH took over fund administration, they have collected \$163,029,059, and are projected to collect \$34,305,778 in FY25. The reason for a \$40,000,000 accept and expend order is to ensure MOH is able to collect up to that amount if there are payments that come in during the fiscal year that were not originally projected. Between FY15 and FY24 there were \$143,015,861 in projects funded, and there are projected commitments of \$65,704,355 in FY25 (this amount is subject to change as it includes pending awards and known pipeline projects). Between FY15 and FY25, project management costs came in at \$10,129,448.

Pursuant to section 53A of chapter 44 of the Massachusetts General Laws, the City Council has taken six votes authorizing the acceptance and expenditure of IDP Funds since 2013 (FY14). These authorizations have been in amounts ranging from \$29,945,245 to \$40,000,000 for a total of \$184,945,245 authorized to date. If the City Council votes to approve the requested authorization in the amount of \$40,000,000, the new cumulative amount authorized to be expended from the IDP Fund will be \$224,945,245.

IDP funds are administered as part of the MOH's efforts to address housing inequities and ensure all Bostonians have access to safe, healthy, and affordable housing. To advance this goal, MOH issues Requests for Proposals (RFPs) offering funding support to nonprofit and for-profit developers for affordable rental, cooperative, and homeownership development proposals. A portion of these funds is allocated for supportive housing for homeless and aging populations. Part of this funding comes from the IDP fund. Resources available in the MOH RFP may not be used to support any on-site IDP units required under the IDP or Article 79. Developers complying with the IDP Executive Order must provide at least 40% of the units as affordable to seek other City subsidies. IDP funds cannot be used to support unrestricted units or units required to be built on-site under the IDP Executive Order.

Examples of past and current usage of IDP funds are as follows: Parcel 25, Phase A, Mission Hill – 46 units of mixed income affordable rental housing ranging from 30-60% of the area median income, 775 Huntington Avenue, Mission Hill – 12 story, mixed use, mixed income development with 112 units, including 57 income-restricted rental units and 55 mixed income condominiums, Stonley Brookley, Jamaica Plain – 45 income-restricted homeownership units, including 5 live-work studios, Magnolia-Woodford, Roxbury – seven units of mixed income housing, including five income restricted units that will be held under a long term ground lease with Dudley Neighbors, Inc, Aileron Homeownership, East Boston – seven income-restricted condominiums create on city owned land, and Parcel 12C, Chinatown – mixed income and mixed use development with 36 homeownership units and 96 rental units created on land owned by the Planning Department.

**Docket #0695** is a message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend a grant in the amount of five-million dollars (\$5,000,000) from the U.S. Department of Treasury administered through the Massachusetts Department of Public Health as directed under section 220 of Chapter 268 of the Acts of 2022. The purpose of the grant is to provide rapid rehousing services (rental assistance and housing stabilization) together with wraparound support and recovery services to individuals exiting Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment with a history of homelessness in Boston. It aims to quickly connect those leaving rehabilitation with housing, increase their income (through earned income and benefits), and be equitable in distribution, ensuring no subpopulation receives positive outcomes at a significantly lower percentage than others. The grant must be expended by December 31, 2026, will be expended through a Request for Proposal (RFP), and will be awarded to a nonprofit or partnership of nonprofits with expertise in operating rapid rehousing programs and serving participants with SUD.

#### Information Received at Hearing

The Committee held a virtual public hearing on Dockets #0633 and #0695 on Tuesday, July 30, 2024. In attendance were City personnel representing departments that will expend the grants:

- Chief Dillon, Chief of Housing and Director of Mayor's Office of Housing (MOH)
- Mr. Daniel Lesser, Chief of Staff, MOH
- Mr. Rick Wilson, Director of Administration and Finance, MOH

Mr. Lesser explained the purposes of the post-recovery grant, which are to provide people who are transitioning out of rehabilitation with rapid housing and wraparound services for a period of 24 months. He stated MOH has run many rapid rehousing programs and seen very strong outcomes of participants not returning to homelessness after a 24 month period. He explained that since this is American Rescue Plan (ARPA) funding, this funding must be spent by December 31, 2026, and explained the city will hopefully stand up the program in the coming months. The funds will predominantly cover rental and housing assistance, but part will cover costs for the wraparound services, which include caseworkers and access to other resources. Chief Dillon explained part of these funds will be directed towards veterans with substance use disorders.

Chief Dillon explained the Inclusionary Development Policy Fund appropriation, discussing the basics of the policy, and the impacts of it since its inception. She explained this program has created approximately 8,000 of the 58,000 affordable housing units in the city, or about fourteen percent (14%). Mr. Wilson explained that recently, most projects have opted to build on-site and off-site units rather than paying into the fund. Mr. Wilson gave an overview of the total units created or sustained using the funds and then gave an overview of the total amounts collected into the fund and total amounts expended. He then gave a brief history of all expend and adopt votes taken by the council on these funds since 2013. He concluded by showing examples of built or permitted housing projects that have been funded using IDP funds.

Additionally, MOH representatives responded to questions from the councilors across a variety of issues. In response to a question surrounding the slight difference between the accept and expend appropriation order of \$40,000,000 and the projected revenue of \$34,305,778, representatives responded the difference is to allow for the collection of unexpected funds that may not have been accounted for due to external circumstances. In response to a question on how projects choose their method of IDP compliance – on-site, off-site, or PILU – representatives responded it is in part a community process, and recently there has been a push to have developers build the units on-site, as it is the avenue through which many neighborhoods are creating affordable housing stock. However, in instances where the cash out is very large, and the impacts are evaluated to be greater across the city, MOH does sometimes opt to have the developer cash out. When asked how the funds are distributed, representatives stated it is a request for proposal (RFP) process that looks at proposals that meet some or all of the following requirements: situated in neighborhoods with lower affordable housing opportunities, have been shown to district offices, and are looking at even lower AMIs than required, in part due to the influence of outer Boston communities pushing up Boston's AMI scale. Representatives also discussed other priorities in their distribution, which includes housing for disabled persons and housing being built on previously city owned land.

Councilors and representatives also discussed the financial makeup of the city's affordable housing stock of approximately 58,000, which is a mix of originally federally funded Boston Housing Authority (BHA) housing, IDP units, linkage funds, and other funding sources. They additionally discussed the PILU amounts in the context of construction costs and interest rates

increasing, and representatives stated the PILU amounts have been fixed since 2015. They stated this amount has been a policy until now, but with new changes in the zoning code, this amount will be incorporated into zoning. Representatives stated they are currently having internal conversations weighing IDP requirements against market conditions. Other topics discussed included how to increase homeownership units built with IDP funds, which representatives stated are limited due to the smaller field of other funding sources for homeownership units in comparison to rental units, the structure of the project management expenditures, the roles of the Treasury Department in ensuring fund collection and compliance, the future of the fund as more projects are opting to build units on-site and off-site, the possible mechanisms to ensure projects follow through on obligation to create homeownership units rather than rental units after their project is approved and built, measures to increase the distribution of MOH resources to those who are closest to displacement, and the efforts to redefine perpetuity for IDP projects to be forever and not the current definition of 30 years plus the option to extend 20 years.

### Summary of Amendments

Docket #0695 will pass in a new draft to accurately reflect that the originating authority is the United States Department of Treasury.

#### Committee Chair Recommended Action

As Chair of the Committee on Housing and Community Development, I recommend moving the listed dockets from the Committee to the full Council for discussion and formal action. At that time, my recommendation to the full Council will be as follows:

that Docket #0633 OUGHT TO PASS, and

that Docket #0695 OUGHT TO PASS IN A NEW DRAFT.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF BOSTON CODE ORDINANCES CHAPTER VII SECTION 7 REGULATING RESTRICTIONS ON PARK FRONTAGES

- WHEREAS, Chapter VII of the Boston Municipal Code outlines regulations related to Environmental Protection in the City of Boston and Section IV of Chapter VII outlines regulations as they pertain to the City's Parks and Recreation Department including guidelines pertaining to building restrictions on park frontages; and
- **WHEREAS,** City of Boston Code, Ordinances, 7-4.10, "Restrictions on Park Frontages.", colloquially known as the "Parks and Parkways Ordinance", provides important protections for our City's green spaces by requiring necessary setbacks and height restrictions for parcels of land abutting the parks; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** The Parks and Parkways Ordinance protects our parks by preserving the aesthetics, user experience, and environmental viability of the park; *and*
- WHEREAS, The historic Emerald Necklace is a publicly-owned, permanently-protected landscape that was enabled through a legislative act and a vote of the people of Boston in the 1870s, constructed by the Boston Parks Commission in the 1880s, and protected through deed restrictions when completed in the 1890s; and
- WHEREAS, Transformed from marshland to a vibrant green space designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, the Back Bay Fens is a key component of Olmsted's Emerald Necklace Park system, which includes a number of important landscape features including the Muddy River, the historic Fenway Victory gardens, recreation space, and reflective open space; and
- WHEREAS, There are several notable gateways to the Fenway neighborhood, which abut or are situated in close proximity to the Back Bay Fens including the North Boylston Gateway Development Area, within the Fenway North Boylston Neighborhood Subdistrict; and
- WHEREAS, The Project Proponent proposing a development of a residential building at 2 Charlesgate W/6 Charlesgate W/1161 Boylston Street within the North Boylston Gateway Development Area is subject to the Parks and Parkways Ordinance; and

- WHEREAS, The 2023 Draft Project Impact Report (DPIR) for the proponent included a subdivision of the parcel to exempt it from the 70' height restriction and the proponent worked with the BPDA and corporation counsel to comply with the Parks and Parkways Ordinance; and
- WHEREAS, The Executive Secretary of the Boston Parks and Recreation Department (BPRD) submitted a letter to the 2 Charlesgate W project proponent on January 21, 2024 which concluded: "BPRD recommends that the proponent seek an amendment to the Municipal Code from the City Council so that its effort to exempt the project from the height restriction does not set a precedent that would have significant negative impact on the iconic design; historic landscape materials; and user experience of the parks and parkways of the Emerald Necklace"; and
- WHEREAS, A text amendment to the Municipal Code's "Restrictions on Park Frontages" would provide the opportunity to build needed housing, including affordable housing, while respecting protections for our historic parks; NOW, THEREFORE

#### Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

#### Section 1.

The City of Boston Code, Ordinances, 7-4.10, "Restrictions on Park Frontages." is hereby amended by adding the following to the end of the section:

"Provided further, as it relates to those certain lots located at the intersection of Boylston Street, Ipswich Street, and Private Alley 938, known and numbered as of the date of adoption of this section as 1161 Boylston Street, 2 Charlesgate West, and 6 Charlesgate West, the following provisions shall apply, anything contained in this chapter to the contrary notwithstanding:

- A. No building shall be erected or placed upon premises within fifteen (15) feet of the easterly boundary of said lots where such property line abuts the Fens;
- B. Any building located in that portion of the lots that is within sixty-seven and one-half (67.5) feet from the sideline of Ipswich Street may be built to a height not exceeding two hundred eighty (280) feet;
- C. Any buildings located in that portion of the lots that is greater than sixty-seven and one-half (67.5) feet from the sideline of Ipswich Street and greater than fifty (50) feet from the easterly boundary of said lots where such property line abuts the Fens may be built to a height not exceeding one hundred eighty (180) feet;
- D. Any buildings located in the remaining portion of said lots may be built to a height not exceeding seventy (70) feet;
- E. Steeples, towers, domes, railings/guardrails, balustrades, parapets, sculptured ornaments, chimneys, flues, roofs, aerials, antennae, elevator and mechanical penthouses, water tanks, screen walls, monitors or other structures normally built

above the roof and not devoted to human occupancy shall not be included in the computation of height of buildings for purposes of subparagraphs b. through d. above. The height of buildings as used in subparagraphs b. through d. above shall be measured from the mean grade of the edgestone or sidewalk on the easterly property line where such property line abuts the Fens;

F. No building or structure shall hereafter be erected or altered on the lots described above without prior written approval by the Boston Redevelopment Authority of the exterior design of such building or structure. The Authority's review of such exterior design shall be concerned with such matters as the exterior facade, exterior materials, signs, the location of roof top structures described in subparagraph e. above, building mass and its placement on the site, the relation of the building to architectural characteristics of the Fenway, and adequacy of vehicular ingress and egress, if any. The purpose of this subparagraph f. is to ensure that new buildings shall, without limiting the dimensions and building volume permitted herein and under applicable zoning regulations, be of outstanding architectural character and harmonious with the Fenway area."

#### Section 2.

The provisions of this ordinance are severable and if any provision, or portion thereof, should be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions, which remain in full force and effect.

#### Section 3.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be effective immediately upon passage.

## Ordinance to Enhance Driveway Accessibility

**WHEREAS:** Many residents—particularly seniors and those with disabilities—rely upon

personal vehicles to attend appointments and events; and

WHEREAS: These residents are frequently long-term residents who own homes with private

driveways and parking; and

**WHEREAS**: Boston's streets were not designed with today's traffic and vehicle size in mind;

WHEREAS: As a result of high traffic and high street parking needs, many residents struggle

to get in and out of their driveways safely; and

WHEREAS: This often results in higher usage of street parking spaces; and

**WHEREAS**: Residents with a private driveway are ineligible for dedicated handicapped

parking spaces in front of their residences; and

**WHEREAS:** Public rideshare service vans often struggle to enter driveways, resulting in

blocked traffic and increased danger for patrons; and

**WHEREAS:** Our residents deserve unimpeded access to their driveways and homes; **NOW** 

**THEREFORE** 

#### Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

#### 6-6.3.u

#### Section One.

- 1. The fine for stopping, standing, or parking a vehicle in front of any driveway including curb cuts and adjacent yellow-painted curb shall be twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars. A penalty of eight (\$8.00) dollars shall be assessed if the fine remains unpaid twenty-one (21) days after issuance of a notice of such violation.
- 2. The prohibited area of yellow-painted curb described in Section 6-6.3.00.1 may extend no further than eighteen (18) inches from the start of the curb cut to be installed and maintained by Boston Transportation Department upon request from owner or resident. Boston Transportation Department shall create a single-form application to request

installation or maintenance and shall have the power to approve or deny any such application.

### Section Two.

If any provision of this shall be held to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such provision shall be considered separately and apart from the remaining provisions, which shall remain in full force and effect.

## Section Three.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be effective upon passage.

# Ordinance Codifying the Department of Innovation and Technology (DoIT)

**WHEREAS:** The City of Boston increasingly relies upon data infrastructure and technology to

establish programming, deliver services, and ensure equitable access to

hardware procurement, data management, and strategy; and

**WHEREAS:** Providing DoIT with clear powers and authority will help streamline city services,

ensure interagency compatibility, reduce costs, and improve data access, quality,

and security; and

**WHEREAS:** The Boston City Council has made it a priority to ensure our City agencies are

responsive and collaborative; NOW THEREFORE

#### Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

That the City of Boston Code Section 5 shall be amended by adding the following new sections and subsections after Section 5-10.2

#### Section One.

#### Section 5-11 Department of Innovation and Technology

#### **Section 5-11.1.1 Appointment of Director:**

There shall be in the City a Department, known as the Department of Innovation and Technology, which shall be under the charge of a Director, known as the Chief Information Officer who shall be appointed by the Mayor for a term expiring at the close of the municipal year after the next biennial municipal election at which a Mayor is elected.

#### **Section 5-11.1.2 Duties of Director:**

It shall be the duty of the Department of Innovation and Technology, and more especially of the Chief Information Officer, under the Mayor, to set and execute a technology strategy for the City of Boston and all of its governmental agents and agencies.

Unless otherwise provided by law, it shall be the responsibility of the Chief Information Officer to, at a minimum:

- 1. Establish procurement policies and guidelines relating to both software and hardware, including but not limited to:
  - a. Customer Relationship Management (CRM) software
  - b. Governmental Websites
  - c. Server equipment
  - d. Database management tools
  - e. Digital subscriptions and account management
  - f. Digital infrastructure assets
- 2. Establish data collection, storage, and access protocols
- 3. Maintain, modernize and secure City's technology infrastructure
- 4. Design, develop, and unify City's web presence
- 5. Develop, implement, and maintain, in consultation with the various department chiefs and directors, internet-based systems for the provision of services
- 6. Coordinate with other agencies and quasi-independent agencies to implement said policies to the extent necessary

The Chief Information Officer shall exclusively have the powers, and perform the duties, of a department head with respect to the appointment, suspension, discharge, compensation and indemnification of subordinates for the Department of Innovation and Technology.

#### **Section 5-11.2 Severability**

If any provision of this shall be held to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such provision shall be considered separately and apart from the remaining provisions, which shall remain in full force and effect.

#### **Section 5-11.3 Implementation**

The provisions of this ordinance shall be effective upon passage.

# Ordinance to Establish RISE: Reshaping Inequities through Systematic Empowerment

**WHEREAS:** On June 12, 2020, the City of Boston declared racism a public health crisis and affirmed the need for proactive reinforcement of policies that promote a more

equitable Boston; and

WHEREAS: In 2021, President Biden, through Executive Order 13985, set a powerful example by charging the Federal Government with advancing equity for all, including underserved communities, addressing systemic racism, and supporting and empowering all Americans, thereby setting a precedent for local governments to follow; and

**WHEREAS:** Reflecting on past city policies, programming, investments, and instances of negligence, we recognize that Boston's communities of color have been consistently disadvantaged and disinvested in, leading to their further marginalization and dismantling; *and* 

**WHEREAS:** In response, former Mayor Martin J. Walsh issued an executive order affirming the role of the Equity & Inclusion Cabinet to instill resilience and racial equity throughout city government, mandating data collection, outreach, inter-agency collaborations, and capacity building across all City departments; and

**WHEREAS:** Building on this foundation, the City launched significant initiatives, including the establishment of the Equity & Inclusion Cabinet, the creation of a racial equity fund, the implementation of new zoning amendments, the Office of Cultural Affairs, and the formation of the Reparations Commission Taskforce; *and* 

WHEREAS: The City of Boston has continued to make substantial strides in promoting racial equity through various initiatives and policies, including the Pilot E+I Academy training and the REAL training series, aimed at building trust, fostering belonging, and equipping employees with tools to better serve diverse populations, reflecting a broader national movement toward systemic empowerment and equitable practices; and

WHEREAS: In this spirit of continuous improvement and alignment with best practices, the District of Columbia implemented the "Racial Equity Achieves Results Amendment Act of 2020," requiring the Mayor to include a summary of how each

- year's proposed budget "advances racial equity in the District, reduces disparate outcomes, and allocates resources to support equitable outcomes; *and*
- **WHEREAS**: In 2021, the residents of Boston voted to give the City Council more budget oversight, empowering local governance to better address community needs and promote equity; and
- **WHEREAS**: Recognizing this power, the government serves in the public's interest and is uniquely positioned to address racial systemic inequity and bias; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** Addressing racialized societal inequities is essential for developing safe, resilient, and collaborative communities, and for preventing crime, violence, homelessness, and poor health outcomes; and
- **WHEREAS:** Proactively pursuing racial equity strengthens government-community relationships and ensures fair opportunities for all, particularly in Black and Brown communities; and
- **WHEREAS:** The City of Boston recognizes the need to implement clear, intentional strategies and practices to address racial disparities and promote equity in all aspects of city governance; and
- WHEREAS: Including the employment of Minority and Women Business Enterprises (MWBEs) in City contracting and promoting equity in public procurement is crucial, with regular reporting and disparity studies essential for monitoring and addressing inequities in city contracts;
- **WHEREAS:** Through this Ordinance, the Boston City Council has made it a priority to examine how each department is addressing inequities; **NOW THEREFORE**

#### Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

That the City of Boston Code, Ordinances, 2-12 shall be amended by adding the following new sections and subsections after 2-12.5

#### Section One.

#### **Section 2-12.6 Equity in Action**

#### Section 2-12.6.1 Purpose:

This legislation intends to establish protocols to ensure that all city ordinances and budgetary decisions are informed by and adhere to principles of racial and social equity with the goal of closing racial wellness and achievement gaps and improving health, educational, economic, and societal outcomes for all residents.

#### **Section 2-12.6.2 Definitions:**

For purposes of this section, the term:

I. "Determinants of equity" refers to the social, economic, geographic, political, and physical environmental conditions in which people in our city are born, grow,

live, work, and age that lead to the creation of a fair and just society. Access to the determinants of equity is necessary to have equity for all people regardless of race, class, ethnicity, religion, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity, language spoken, or perceptions thereof. Inequities are created when barriers exist that prevent individuals and communities from accessing these conditions, thereby preventing them from reaching their full potential. The determinants of equity include, but are not limited to:

- A. Community economic development that supports local ownership of assets including homes & businesses and assures fair access for all to business development & business retention opportunities;
- B. Community & public safety including services such as fire, police, emergency medical services, and code enforcement that is responsive to all residents so that everyone feels safe to live, work, and play in any neighborhood;
- C. A law & justice system that provides equitable access and fair treatment for all:
- D. Early childhood development that supports nurturing relationships, high-quality, affordable child care & early learning opportunities that promote optimal early childhood development and school readiness for all children;
- E. Education that is high quality, accessible, and culturally appropriate;
- F. Equity in practices that eliminate implicit bias and institutional racism in city activities in order to provide fair treatment for all employees, contractors, clients, community partners, residents, and others who interact with the jurisdiction;
- G. Food systems that support local food production and provide access to affordable, healthy, and culturally appropriate foods for all people;
- H. Health & human services that are high quality, affordable, accessible, culturally appropriate, and support the optimal well-being of all people;
- I. Healthy and accessible built & natural environments for all people that include mixes of land use that support: jobs; housing; amenities & services; trees & forest canopy; and clean air, water, soil, & sediment;
- J. Housing for all people that is safe, affordable, high quality, and supportive of good health;
- K. Job training and quality jobs that provide all residents with the knowledge & skills required to support their ability to make sufficient income to support themselves and their families with a decent standard of living;
- L. Neighborhoods that support all communities & individuals through strong social networks, trust among neighbors, and the ability to work together to achieve common goals that improve the quality of life for everyone in the neighborhood;
- M. Parks and natural resources that provide access for all people to safe, accessible, clean, and high-quality outdoor spaces, facilities, and activities that appeal to the interests of all communities; and

- N. Transportation that provides everyone with safe, efficient, affordable, accessible, convenient, and reliable mobility options including public transit, walking, and biking.
- II. "Equity" refers to the elimination of disparities such that race, class, ethnicity, religion, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity, language spoken, or perceptions thereof no longer predict opportunities, outcomes, or the distribution of resources for residents of the City.
- III. "Budget Amendment Packet" refers to the collection of all individual budget amendments proposed by the individual City Councilors.

#### Section 2-12.6.3 Council Central Staff Committee on Equity:

There shall be established an independent Council Central Staff Committee on Equity (C-COE), composed of a Director and the Central Staff legislative liaisons. These individuals shall serve as research & legislative consultants for the offices of the City Councilors.

#### **Section 2-12.6.4 Equity in Action:**

Ordinances and Home Rule Petitions proposed by the Mayor or the individual Councilors shall include a written analysis of if and how the proposed ordinance:

- I. advances access to determinants of equity in the City;
- II. addresses disparities of access to the determinants of equity;
- III. reduces disparate outcomes resulting from an individual's or community's age, race, class, ethnicity, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity, language spoken, or perception thereof;
- IV. and/or allocates resources to support improved individual and/or communal outcomes.

This analysis shall be created by the Mayor's Office or Primary Sponsor's Office with research support and in consultation with the Mayor's Office of Equity And Inclusion and C-COE, respectively, as requested.

This analysis shall be appended as a preamble to be included with the legislation upon initial submission.

Beginning in fiscal year 2026 and in each subsequent fiscal year, the Equity and Inclusion Cabinet will develop guidelines to aid policymakers in establishing a standardized framework for ensuring equity compliance.

#### **Section 2-12.6.5 Equity in Budgeting:**

Beginning in fiscal year 2026 and for each subsequent fiscal year, the Mayor's budget submission package to the Council and the Council's proposed Budget Amendment Packets shall include a written analysis of if and how the proposed budget or amendment(s):

- I. Improves access to the determinants of equity in the City;
- II. Addresses disparities of access to the determinants of equity;
- III. Improves health, educational, economic, and societal outcomes for residents, particularly those from traditionally marginalized communities determined by an individual's or

- community's age, race, class, ethnicity, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity, language spoken, or perception thereof;
- IV. Allocates resources to support equitable access and improved outcomes.

This analysis shall be created by the Mayor's Office or Primary Sponsor's Office with research support and in consultation with the Mayor's Office of Equity And Inclusion and C-COE, respectively, as requested. This analysis shall be included as a preamble to each Mayoral docket submission and each Councilor's Budget Amendment Packet.

Beginning in fiscal year 2026 and for each subsequent fiscal year as part of the annual budget process, the Office of Budget Management shall require each department to submit a written report that summarizes, at a minimum:

- I. Equity activity over the prior fiscal year
- II. Assessment of departmental capacity to fulfill the requirements of this ordinance
- III. Assessment of adherence to policies and procedures implemented to fulfill the requirements of this ordinance
- IV. Assessments of progress and deficits relating to the achievement of annual equity goals laid out in the previous year
  - V. Establishment of new equity goals and objectives
- VI. Plans to fulfill deficits & meet said goals.
- VII. Demographic data relating to:
  - A. Procurements
  - B. Staffing
  - C. Compensation
  - D. Capital expenditures
  - E. Leadership & advancement
  - F. Grant disbursements
  - G. Contracts

These reports shall be included in budget materials to be shared with the Council and made available to the public for the purpose of identifying gaps and assessing the root causes of those gaps.

Beginning in the first quarter of fiscal year 2026, the City's Equity & Inclusion Cabinet and the Office of Budget Management shall develop, establish, and track metrics to measure the overall development and implementation of this ordinance. The City's Equity & Inclusion Cabinet will report on established metrics on a semiannual basis. Such reports shall be submitted to the Clerk and the Clerk shall docket the report and include the docket on the agenda of the next occurring meeting of the City Council.

Beginning in fiscal year 2026 and for each subsequent fiscal year, the City's Equity & Inclusion Cabinet shall design and publish an annual report for elected leadership, employees, and the public on the status & trends in equity in the City, measures of accountability for work plans, and

results related to implementation of this ordinance. The report shall be submitted to the Clerk and the Clerk shall docket the report and include the docket on the agenda of the next-occurring meeting of the City Council.

The Mayor's Office of Equity & Inclusion shall be empowered to establish and modify requirements and protocols for data collection relating to this ordinance in consultation with the Department of Innovation and Technology.

#### **Section 2-12.6.6 Council Equity Task Force:**

Upon passage and upon all swearings in of the Boston City Council, a task force shall be convened consisting of the City Council President, Chair of the City Council Committee on Government Operations, one representative from each of the remaining individual City Councilor offices, the C-COE Director, and in consultation with the Mayor's Office of Equity and Inclusion. The Council Equity Task Force shall be chaired by the C-COE Director and co-vice chaired by the City Council President and Chair of the City Council Committee on Government Operations and shall convene for the purpose of adopting appropriate standards by which to achieve the goals of 2-12.6.5. These standards shall include, but not be limited to:

- I. **Formats and Expectations:** Define specific formats and expectations for Ordinance, Home Rule Petition, and Budget Amendment Packet equity analyses
- II. **Engagement with Marginalized Communities:** Establish methods, mechanisms, and strategies to actively engage with marginalized communities experiencing racial and other disparities and individuals, promoting inclusivity and representation and increasing the influence of such communities in decision-making.
- III. **Guidelines for Committee Hearings:** Set clear guidelines for conducting committee hearings, both in Chamber and remote, to ensure fairness, inclusivity, and the consideration of diverse perspectives.

These standards shall aim to create a structured framework for promoting equity within the Boston City Council's operations and decision-making processes and shall be adopted within 30 business days of the passage of this ordinance or within 30 business days of the opening of the Council cycle, during which time the Council shall continue to operate under the rules adopted by the previous Council Equity Task Force.

#### **Section 2-12.7 Equity in Implementation**

#### **Section 2-12.7.1 Development of Equity Toolkits:**

By fiscal year 2027, the Mayor's Office of Equity & Inclusion and Department of Innovation Technologies shall work in consultation with the individual Departments, Boards, Commissions, Cabinets, and Offices to develop and design individual Equity Toolkits to, at a minimum:

- I. Identify clear strategic initiatives, objectives, and measurable outcomes;
- II. Develop metrics to measure progress in redressing disparate health, educational, economic, and societal outcomes in the City based on age, race, class, ethnicity, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity, language spoken, or perception thereof, including:

- A. Pay equity analysis to identify and address pay disparities based on the above listed categories
- B. Workforce demographic analysis to identify and address disparities in employment and promotional practices and procedures based on the above listed categories
- C. Professional development analysis to monitor and enhance access to training and advancement opportunities to ensure equitable access to opportunities for career advancement
- D. Accessibility audits to assess the accessibility of City facilities and services for individuals with disabilities identifying areas for improvement
- E. Complaints and grievance analysis to identify and address patterns and disparities based on the above listed categories
- III. Examine potential unintended consequences of policy or programmatic decisions and develop a strategy to advance equity & mitigate unintended negative consequences;
- IV. Track and measure how programmatic and policy decisions benefit or burden individuals and communities based on age, race, class, ethnicity, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity, language spoken, or perception thereof; and
- V. Evaluate the efficacy of the City's strategic initiatives and programs aimed at reducing disparate outcomes resulting from an individual's or community's race, class, ethnicity, disability status, sexual orientation, gender identity, language spoken, or perception thereof

Toolkits and initial reports shall be submitted by the individual Departments, Boards, Commissions, Cabinets, and Offices to the Clerk and the Clerk shall docket the report and include the docket on the agenda of the next occurring meeting of the City Council.

The Mayor's Office of Equity & Inclusion, Department of Innovation Technology, and individual Departments, Boards, Commissions, Cabinets, and Offices shall revisit these Toolkits no sooner than 120 days before and no later than 60 days before the end of the Council term, and shall submit a report detailing updates on improvements and changes to the Clerk and the Clerk shall docket the report and include the docket on the agenda of the next occurring meeting of the City Council.

### **Section 2-12.7.2 Policy and Program Equity Review:**

By the start of fiscal year 2026, the Mayor's Office of Equity & Inclusion and the Department of Innovation Technologies shall work in consultation with the individual Departments, Boards, Commissions, Cabinets, and Offices to establish appropriate standards by which to review policy and programmatic impacts upon equity. Policies and programs shall be reviewed by the individual Departments, Boards, Commissions, Cabinets, and Offices annually thereafter to establish efficacy and impact.

#### **Section 2-12.7.3 Council Equity Training:**

The Staff Director and Council President shall schedule an annual training on Equity, Implicit Bias, and Operationalization of Equity Practices. Training shall be mandatory for all Council members, Council staff, & City Council Central Staff, and strongly encouraged for interns & volunteers. If a staff member misses a training, the Staff Director and Council President will

determine an acceptable action plan to ensure that all staff understand the information presented in the training.

### **Section 2-12.7.4 Executive Offices Equity Training:**

The Mayor's Office of Equity & Inclusion shall schedule an annual training on Equity, Implicit Bias, and Operationalization of Equity Practices. Training will be mandatory for all Department, Board, Commission, Cabinet, & Office Chiefs and Deputies, and shall be made available to all City employees. If a staff member misses a training, the Mayor's Office of Equity & Inclusion will determine an acceptable action plan to ensure that all staff understand the information presented in the training.

#### Section Two.

If any provision of this shall be held to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such provision shall be considered separately and apart from the remaining provisions, which shall remain in full force and effect.

#### Section Three.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be effective upon passage.

#### ORDINANCE PREVENTING WAGE THEFT IN THE CITY OF BOSTON

- **WHEREAS:** "Wage theft" refers to the improper withholding of workers' earned wages by an employer. Wage theft takes many forms, including the failure to pay employees for work performed, independent contractor misclassification, misclassification of employees as exempt from overtime pay, tip stealing, failure to pay wages in a timely manner, and prevailing wage job misclassification; and
- **WHEREAS**: Studies have repeatedly shown that wage theft is concentrated among low-wage workers, and particularly women, minorities, non-citizens, and non-union workers, many of whom do not know their workplace rights or are too worried about retaliation by current or even future employers to bring their claims forward; and
- **WHEREAS:** Wage theft is often accompanied by employer tax and insurance fraud, with employers failing to pay their payroll taxes, workers compensation premiums, or unemployment insurance premiums; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** As a result, wage theft is common in industries such as the hospitality service industry, janitorial services, and construction. For example, in June 2021, a UMass Amherst study estimated that, in Massachusetts, misclassification of employees in the construction industry had led to a shortfall in the state's unemployment insurance fund for 2019 of between \$24.5 and \$40.6 million; and
- **WHEREAS**: The City of Boston spends hundreds of thousands of dollars each year on procurement of various goods, services, and labor across every City department and agency; and
- **WHEREAS**: The City of Boston, as a consumer, must be cognizant of the impact that its consumption has on the workers that provide their labor pursuant to City contracts; and

- **WHEREAS:** In an effort to combat wage theft, in October 2014, former City of Boston Mayor Martin J. Walsh signed an Executive Order Establishing Requirements for City Contracts in an Effort to Prevent Wage Theft (referred to as "Executive Order"). The Executive Order required City vendors to 1) verify their compliance with federal and state wage laws; 2) report wage law violations; 3) provide a wage bond where such violations existed; and 4) the Order debarred vendors who committed repeated wage violations; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** The Executive Order further allowed the Boston Licensing Board to revoke or deny licenses to businesses who commit wage violations. It does not appear, however, that even a single license has been revoked or denied due to wage violations since the Executive Order was enacted; *and*
- WHEREAS: Wage theft continues to be an issue in Boston, including with businesses that contract with the City. A recent study by Mayor Michelle Wu's Worker Empowerment Cabinet of wage theft violations issued by the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office and the United States Department of Labor found that 35 percent of Boston wage theft violations (totaling around \$4.3 million in wages and penalties) involved companies that had a City of Boston license or contract.
- **WHEREAS**: Wage theft also makes it harder for honest businesses to compete and creates a race to the bottom for the City's business community, as well as impeding the City's economic development and growth; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** It has long been recognized that the underlying purpose of the wage laws concerns not only the health and welfare of the workers themselves, but also the public health and general welfare. Accordingly, wage theft directly impacts Boston residents' health and contributes to the racial wealth gap, making it difficult for the City's low-wage workers to pay for housing or basic services such as health or child care; and
- **WHEREAS:** Requiring city contractors, subcontractors and bidders to comply with applicable federal and state wage laws, strengthens the City's ability to contract with vendors that ensure that workers are properly paid for their work; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** Prohibiting the City from contracting with debarred contractors for the period of debarment will help to ensure that City resources are not used to support businesses which either intentionally violate state and federal wage laws or permit such violations to occur on projects they oversee; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** Withholding businesses licenses will help the City ensure its workers are treated fairly and that honest business practices that comply with already-existing law are incentivized; *and*
- **WHEREAS:** The Boston City Council has a duty to protect employees from predatory employer practices like wage theft; **NOW THEREFORE**

#### Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston as follows:

That the City of Boston Code, Ordinances be amended in Chapter XXIV by adding the following after 24-14:

#### 25-1: Ordinance preventing wage theft in the City of Boston

### Section 1. Purpose

The purpose of this ordinance is to assure that all workers in the City of Boston are paid in full, for all hours worked on a timely basis and that Boston employers who pay their workers in compliance with applicable wage and hour laws are not undercut by non-compliant employers.

This ordinance will facilitate the enforcement of state and federal wage and hour laws and promote the public welfare of Bostonians. This ordinance is also intended to bolster compliance with the City's existing licensing and permitting requirements.

#### Section 2. Definitions

- A. For the purpose of this Ordinance, the following definitions apply:
- 1. "Employee" any natural person who performs work for an employer that provides any services within the City of Boston, but shall not include a bona fide independent contractor as defined by G.L. c. 149, § 148B;
- 2. "Employer" any natural person or business, whether or not incorporated or unincorporated, who (1) employs an individual in the City of Boston; (2) employs an individual pursuant to a contract to which the City of Boston or one of its Departments is signatory, or under agreement with the City for tax incentives; or (3) who otherwise maintains a commercial presence in the City of Boston. The use of a subcontractor shall not be a bar to a finding of a person or entity as an employer. An individual may be considered to be an employer in addition to an incorporated business as defined by G.L. c. 149, § 148.

#### This definition excludes:

- 1) The United States or a corporation wholly owned by the government of the United States; and
- 2) The Commonwealth of Massachusetts, its subdivisions, and corporate bodies.
- 3. "Employ," including as used in the term "employment," is governed by the ABC Test outlined in G.L. c. 149, § 148B ("Massachusetts Independent Contractor Law").
- 4. "Independent contractor" as defined in G.L. c. 149, § 148B and any applicable regulations or advisory guidance implementing that statute.

- 5. "Joint employer" includes any Employer who suffers or permits an individual to perform work for another entity such as a subcontractor.
- 6. "Minimum wage" as defined at G.L. c. 149 §§ 27-27H, 152A, G.L. c. 151, § 1 and 29 U.S.C. § 206 as well as any other state or federal statute or regulation establishing a minimum fair wage for particular occupations or classes of workers.
- 7. "Overtime" as defined in G.L. c. 151, § 1A and 29 U.S.C. § 207.
- 8. "Prevailing wage" as defined in G.L. c. 149, §§ 26-27H or under federal prevailing wage laws and/or regulations, 40 U.S.C. § 3141, et seq and 41 U.S.C. 351, et seq.
- 9. "Timely Payment of Wages" as defined by G.L. c. 149, § 148.
- 10. "Wage" as defined by G.L. c. 149, §148 and/or 29 U.S.C § 201.
- "Wage Theft" any action or omission by an employer, the employer's officers, agents, or employees, causing an employer to violate federal or state wage laws, such as 29 U.S.C. § 201 et seq., Massachusetts Wage Act, M.G.L. c. 149, §§ 148, 150, federal or state prevailing wage laws, resulting from claims including those of improper (1) classification as an independent contractor and/or non-employee exempt from federal and state minimum wage and/or overtime laws, or any other alleged misclassification under federal or state laws or any alleged misclassification related to other employment-related claims; (2) deductions from compensation and/or wages; (3) failure to pay minimum wages; (4) failure to provide proper pay stubs or other records related to hours worked, wages earned, and/or payroll deductions; (5) failure to pay, indemnify, and/or reimburse for work-related expenses; (6) failure to pay all wages when due; (7) failure to calculate and/or pay overtime compensation; (8) failure to pay or allow the use of accrued vacation or sick time; and (9) failure to keep and maintain any records required to be kept or maintained under federal and/or state wage and hour laws. This list is not exhaustive.
- 12. "Application" an initial application or a renewal of a license or permit.
- 13. "City Contractor" an Employer who currently holds or seeks to hold a contract for goods, services, or labor with the City of Boston.
- 13. "Administrative Citation" a civil citation issued by the Attorney General of the Commonwealth pursuant to G.L c. 149 § 27C, a civil citation issued by the U.S. Department of Labor pursuant to 29 U.S.C. § 201 et seq. and/or 29 C.F.R. § 578, or any other civil citation for violation of M.G.L. c. 149 or c. 151 and/or 29 U.S.C. § 201 et seq. issued by any other federal, state, or local administrative agency.
- 14. "Civil Judgment" a judgment issued by a State or Federal court, including a final adjudication or a ruling on summary judgment, concluding as a matter of law that a contractor

or subcontractor committed wage theft as defined in this Ordinance or misclassification of employees pursuant to Federal law or the law of any State.

- 15. "Stop work order" as defined in G.L. c. 152, § 25C and 452 C.M.R. § 8.00.
- 16. "Subcontractor" a person other than a materialman or laborer who enters into a contract with a contractor for the performance of any part of such contractor's contract.
- 17. "TIF Agreement" a tax increment financing agreement, as such term is defined by G.L. c. 23A, § 3A, c. 40, § 59, and 760 C.M.R. 22.00 et seq.
- 18. "TIF Plan" a tax increment financing plan, as such term is defined by 760 C.M.R. 22.00 et seq.
- 19. "EACC" Economic assistance coordinating council, as defined by G.L. c. 23A, § 3A and established by G.L. c. 23A, § 3B.

# SECTION 3. Office of Labor Compliance and Worker Protection and Wage Theft Advisory Committee.

#### **Purpose**

The City of Boston's Office of Labor Compliance and Worker Protection (OLCWP) shall implement and provide oversight of the City's Wage Theft Prevention activities, including but not limited to community outreach, complaint intake and resolution, coordination with other City departments as set forth below, oversight and performance of this Ordinance's provisions relative to City procurement as set forth below, and cooperation and coordination with the Commonwealth's Office of the Attorney General on issues of common concern. The OLCWP shall also develop guidance, policies, and recommendations from time to time in connection therewith. The OLCWP may take on additional duties related to and advancing the purposes of this Ordinance at the request of the Mayor.

#### **Wage Theft Advisory Council**

The Office of the Mayor shall appoint an Advisory Council of seven members with knowledge of the many communities vulnerable to wage theft in the City of Boston and/or experience in combating wage theft.

The Advisory Council shall include one member representing worker centers, one member from a group of three names nominated by the Greater Boston Labor Council, one member from a group of three names provided by the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce, and one member nominated by the Boston City Council President.

Vacancies on the Council shall be filled as soon as practicable.

The Advisory Council shall meet with the OLCWP on a periodic basis. Consultations between the Advisory Council and the OLCWP shall include, but not be limited to, the establishment and maintenance of a community-based outreach program working with each of the City's communities vulnerable to wage theft to facilitate public education and the eradication of wage theft.

#### Powers and Duties of the Office of Labor Compliance and Worker Protection Regarding the Prevention of Wage Theft

#### (a) Annual Report to the Office of the Mayor and City Council

OLCWP shall publish an annual report detailing all wage theft complaints received and actions taken by the OLCWP in response to such complaints, including specifically the status or final disposition of each complaint. The report shall also include civil and criminal judgments issued by the state and federal courts, administrative citations issued by the Attorney General, and final administrative orders, including but not limited to debarments, against Employers pursuant to G.L. c. 149 §§ 26-27H, 148 and G.L. c. 151 §§ 1, 1A, either related to complaints received by the OLCWP, related to current City Contractors, or related to employers who have had a contract with the City of Boston in the last years.

#### (b) Employee Rights Posters and Other Public Awareness Measures

The OLCWP shall require employers within the City of Boston to post a notice informing Employees of Programs and Services of the OLCWP and the protections offered by the City and Massachusetts law. The poster shall be available in English, Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, and Portuguese, Cape Verdean Creole and Haitian Creole. The Office of Language and Communication Access shall be consulted on whether any languages should be included.

From time to time, the OLCWP shall also publish materials, advertise, and perform outreach to raise public awareness concerning the OLCWP's programs, compliance with state and federal wage and hour laws, and problems associated with wage theft.

#### (c) Wage Theft Complaints Under Massachusetts and Federal Law

The OLCWP shall receive complaints of violations of law committed by Employers under G.L. c. 149 §§ 26-27H, 148 and G.L. c. 151 §§ 1, 1A and/or under 29 U.S.C. 201, et seq. and federal prevailing wage laws.

The OLCWP shall develop a separate form for violations of state and federal law committed by Employers holding contracts with the City ("Contractor Wage Theft Forms").

The OLCWP shall also assist affected employees in filling out municipal, state, and federal complaint forms at its offices and at City-sponsored events in collaboration with other City departments.

# (d) Transmission of Non-Payment and Prevailing Wage Complaints to Massachusetts Attorney General and U.S. Department of Labor

Unless otherwise specified in writing by the complainant, the OLCWP shall forward an original of each complaint submitted to it pursuant to G.L. c. 149 §§ 26-27H, 148 and G.L. c. 151 to the Attorney General's office, contemporaneous with receipt.

Unless otherwise specified in writing by the complainant, the OLCWP shall forward an original of each complaint submitted to it pursuant to 29 U.S.C § 201, et seq. and/or federal prevailing wage statutes to the U.S. DOL, Region 1, contemporaneous with receipt.

On a Quarterly basis, the Mayor, personally or through a designee, will meet with the Office of the Attorney General and U.S. DOL, Region 1 to discuss complaints involving Employers within the City of Boston and to better coordinate on issues of wage theft in the City.

# (e) OLCWP Duty to Monitor Wage Theft Complaints Against Employers with Whom the City Holds Contracts for Goods, Services, and/or Labor.

The OLCWP shall meet with representatives of the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office and the U.S. Department of Labor on a quarterly basis to identify pending investigations and findings of any infractions by those agencies related to work performed by City Contractors. Furthermore, complaints against City Contractors shall be monitored by the OLCWP even after being promptly referred to the relevant State or Federal authorities.

### (f) Voluntary Mediation of Wage Theft Complaints

The OLCWP may develop and offer mediation to complainants and their respective employers as a means to efficiently resolve wage theft complaints. This service shall be voluntary, meaning that both parties must agree to use the OLCWP to mediate the contents of the complaint in writing. The contents and results of any mediation, as well as the identities of the parties shall be kept confidential to the extent permitted by the Massachusetts General Laws and the City's ordinances.

### (f) Public Database of Wage Theft Ordinance Violations

The OLCWP shall compile, develop and maintain on the City's website (www.boston.gov) a publicly accessible, searchable database of criminal and civil judgments, final state administrative orders and citations under G.L. c. 149 §§ 26-27H, 148-148C and G.L. c. 151 §§ 1, 1A against City Contractors as defined by this Ordinance. The database shall also include criminal and civil judgments and consent orders, administrative orders and citations, under 29 U.S.C. § 201, et seq., 40 U.S.C. § 3141, et seq and 41 U.S.C. 351, et seq. The OWPCL shall include information for City Contractors for the above-mentioned infractions starting three years prior to the date this ordinance goes into effect.

The database will also include any pending litigation in State or Federal court or investigations pending with the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office or the federal Department of Labor regarding current City Contractors that relate to the payment of wages.

#### (g) Coordination with City Departments Issuing Permits and Licenses.

(1) Upon Application. All City of Boston Departments responsible for issuing, suspending, or renewing any license of permit regarding businesses of the kind which the City of Boston contracts for the performance of goods, services, or labor, shall notify the OLCWP at least seven (7) business days preceding any action on any license or permit and identify the action sought, the name and address of the applicant business and all owners of the business. Prior to the Department taking action, the OLCWP will notify the applicable Department involved of any civil or criminal judgments, final administrative orders and citations, and/or debarments, or pending legal action that relates to the payment of wages, against the applicant business and/or its owners under state or federal law, as well as and any pending wage theft complaints received by the City against the applicant and/or its owners, within the last three (3) years.

#### (2) After Issuance.

- a. Any complaints of wage theft filed against a license or permit holder with the City's Purchasing Agent, Licensing Commission, the City Council, and/or other City departments and offices shall be forwarded promptly to the OLCWP and complaints filed with the OLCWP shall be provided to the same offices. If the complaint pertains to work performed at any property subject to a TIF Agreement, the OLCWP office shall also send a copy to the EACC.
- b. Upon receipt of a new civil or criminal judgment, final administrative order or citation, and/or debarment against a City license or permit holder, the OLCWP will provide notice of the same, with a copy of the decision, to the relevant City Department for review and action consistent therewith.

# (h) OLCWP coordination with the Auditors' Office in Monitoring Compliance with City Procurement Requirements.

The Auditor's Office shall develop RFP provisions and certifications that require the reporting of wage theft violations and settlements as a condition of securing a contract with the City of Boston for the provision of goods, services, or labor.

# (i) Electronic, Automated Process for Review of Certified Payrolls, Processing of Certified Payrolls, and Investigation of Non-Payments found therein

The City shall require all City Contractors, and sub-contractors of City Contractors, providing goods, services and/or labor in excess of \$100,000 to provide certified payrolls for each pay period within a contract in an electronic format, specified

by the City Auditor, which will be reviewed by the City Auditor or his/her designee on at least a monthly basis. A City Contractor or sub-contractor of a City Contractor will be notified of any payroll with ten or more apparent discrepancies within 30 business days of discovery.

#### (j) Outreach to Community Organizations.

The OLCWP shall establish and maintain a community-based outreach program working with communities across the City to facilitate public education and the eradication of wage theft.

In partnership with organizations involved in the community-based outreach program, the OLCWP shall create outreach materials that are designed for workers in particular industries.

The OLCWP may develop a grant program for organizations it partners with in performing outreach activities.

#### **Section 4. Requirements for City Contractors**

#### A. RFP/Bid and Successful Bidder Requirements

Every Request for Proposals (RFP) or bid issued by the City of Boston's Procurement Agent shall include the certification and disclosure requirements imposed by this Section:

- 1. Every RFP or bid issued shall notify bidders that they have an affirmative duty to report any criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, or final administrative determination for wage theft against the bidder or any of its subcontractors entered within the three (3) years prior to bid submission, as well as any debarments against the bidder or any of its subcontractors in effect while its bid is pending to the City, and shall further notify bidders that if they are the successful bidder, they and any of their subcontractors have an affirmative duty to report any criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, final administrative determination, order, or debarment against the bidder or any its subcontractors while their contract with the City is in effect, within five (5) business days of receipt. The RFP or bid will identify the OLCWP as the department to whom this must be reported.
- 2. Every RFP or bid issued by the Purchasing Agent shall notify bidders that they and their subcontractors have an affirmative duty to report any pending criminal, civil, or administrative action against them, under either federal or state law, for wage theft, in any jurisdiction as a part of their bid package and to include the pleadings therefor in their bid packages. Every RFP or bid issued shall further notify bidders that if they are the successful bidder, they and any of their subcontractors have an affirmative duty to report any criminal, civil, administrative

action for wage theft filed against the bidder or any its subcontractors while their contract with the City is in effect, within five (5) business days of receipt while their contract remains in effect with the City. The RFP or bid will identify the OLCWP as the department to whom this must be reported.

- 3. Every RFP or bid issued by the City and/or its Departments shall notify bidders that they may not contract with the City if they have been either voluntarily or involuntarily debarred by the federal government, any agency of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts or any other state, or any municipal body including, but not limited to, the City of Boston for the entire term of the debarment.
- 4. Every RFP or bid issued by the City and/or its Departments shall notify bidders that they may not utilize subcontractors on their contracts with the City who have been voluntarily or involuntarily debarred by the federal government, any agency of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts or any other state, or any municipal body-including, but not limited to, the City of Boston -for the entire term of the debarment.
- 5. Bidders that are subject to municipal, state, or federal debarment for violation of the above laws, either voluntarily or involuntarily, or that have been prohibited from contracting with the Commonwealth or any of its agencies or subdivisions will be deemed not responsible and their bids or proposals shall be rejected. Such bidders shall be deemed not responsible for the entire term of debarment or other stated time period. During the term of a Contract, upon a finding or order of such debarment or prohibition, the City may terminate the contract.
- 6. Every Request for Proposals (RFP) and/or Grant Application issued by the City, shall include the certification and disclosure requirements included in this Section. All successful Applicants for contracts, grants, and tax incentives shall provide complete and accurate responses to the same.

These certification and disclosure requirements shall include:

- A requirement for documentation reflecting the Applicant's demonstrated commitment to workforce development within Boston and/or the Commonwealth;
- A requirement that the Applicant will provide a statement of intent concerning efforts that it and its contractors and subcontractors will take to promote workforce development on the project if successful;
- A requirement for documentation reflecting the Applicant's demonstrated commitment to economic development within Boston and/or the Commonwealth;

- A requirement that the Applicant provide a statement of intent concerning efforts that it and its contractors and subcontractors on this project will take to promote economic development on the project if successful;
- A requirement for documentation reflecting the Applicant's demonstrated commitment to expand workforce diversity, equity, and inclusion in its past projects within Boston and/or the Commonwealth;
- A requirement that the Applicant provide a statement of intent concerning efforts that it and its contractors and subcontractors on this project, will undertake to expand workforce diversity, equity, and inclusion on the project if successful;
- A requirement that the Applicant disclose whether it and each of its contractors and subcontractors on this project, have previously contracted with a labor organization, as defined by Massachusetts General Laws, c. 150A and/or the National Labor Relations Act, Section 2, in the Commonwealth or elsewhere.
- A requirement that the Applicant specify whether it and each of its contractors and subcontractors on this project participates in a state or Federally certified apprenticeship program and the number of apprentices the apprenticeship program has trained to completion for each of the last five (5) years.

#### 7. Successful bidders and their subcontractors must either:

- a. Provide a certification of compliance with M.G.L. c. 149, c. 151 and 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.* as required by this Section; a form certification will be attached to each RFP issued by the City. To the extent that the bidder has been in business for less than three years prior to the bid deadline, it shall provide a certification certifying compliance for the entire period of time for which the entity has been in existence.
- b. To the extent a judgment, citation, or administrative order has been issued against a bidder within three years prior to its bid, the bidder must provide a copy of the same, in addition to documentation demonstrating that the bidder has paid all damages, fines, penalties, costs, and fees in full. In addition, the bidder must post a wage bond or other comparable form of insurance in an amount equal to the aggregate of one year's gross wages for all employees employed by the bidder in the City of Boston (based on average payroll for the last two years), to be maintained for the life of the contract, as specified by this Section.
- c. To the extent a judgment, citation, or administrative order has been issued against a subcontractor of the successful bidder within three years prior to its bid, the bidder must provide a copy of the same, in addition to documentation demonstrating that the sub-contractor has paid all damages, fines, penalties, costs, and fees in full. In addition, the bidder or its subcontractor must post a wage bond or other comparable form of insurance in an amount equal to the aggregate of one year's gross wages for all employees employed by the sub-contractor in the City of Boston (based on average

payroll for the last two years), to be maintained for the life of the contract, as specified by this Section.

8. Successful bidders and their sub-contractors must agree to post the notice available at <a href="http://www.mass.gov/ago/docs/workplace/wage/wagehourposter.pdf">http://www.mass.gov/ago/docs/workplace/wage/wagehourposter.pdf</a> in a conspicuous location accessible to all of their employees. To the extent not all employees would have reasonable access to the notice if posted in a single location by the successful bidder, the successful bidder must inform the Purchasing Agent or other City department of the number and location of postings in order to ensure that the successful bidder and his/her sub-contractor provide reasonable notice to all of their employees and agrees to make those additional postings.

#### B. Additional Reporting and Notice Requirements during the Contract Term.

- 1. All City Contractors, and/or subcontractors of City Contractors, providing goods, services, or labor in excess of \$100,000 per annum, shall furnish their monthly certified payrolls in an electronic format set forth by the City to the City Auditor and the OLCWP for all employees working on City contracts.
- 2. To the extent a contract is for a term of one year or more, a City Contractor, and his/her sub-contractors, will provide the City of Boston with a certification compliant with this Section on the effective date of the contract and at each anniversary thereof until the contract expires.

#### C. Wage Bonds during the Contract Term.

- 1. Any City Contractor or subcontractor of a City Contractor who has had a criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, final administrative determination, debarment or order, resulting from a violation of M.G.L. c. 149, M.G.L. c. 151, 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.* or any other state or federal laws regulating the payment of wages within three (3) years prior to the date the City Contractor submitted its bid(s), shall be required by the City to obtain a wage bond or other comparable form of insurance in an amount equal to the aggregate of one year's gross wages for all employees employed by the City Contractor (or sub-contractor) on the specific City of Contractor contract, based on an average of its total labor costs in the City for the past two years. Such bond must be maintained for the term and any extensions of any Contract, and proof of such bond must be provided upon request by the City.
- 2. Any City Contractor or sub-contractor of as City Contractor that receives a criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, final administrative determination, order, or debarment, resulting from a violation of M.G.L. c. 149, M.G.L. c. 151, 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.*, or any other state or federal laws regulating the payment of wages during the term of the Contract, and that is not otherwise prohibited from public

contracting, shall be required by the City to obtain a wage bond or other form of comparable insurance in an amount equal to the aggregate of one year's gross wages for employees employed on the specific City of Boston contract, based on an average of its total labor costs on the contract for its duration or two years, whichever is less. Such bond must be maintained for the terms or extensions of any Contract, and proof of such bond must be provided upon request by the City.

## D. Suspension or Revocation of Contract/Wage Theft as Material Breach of Conditions in RFP or Bid

If a City Contractor is found to be in violation of G.L. c. 149, G.L. c. 151, or 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.*, or this Section, and therefore in breach of its contract with the City, the City may take one or more of the following actions:

- 1. Revocation of City Contractor's contract with the City;
- 2. Suspension of City Contractor's contract with the City;
- 3. Imposing conditions on any future contracts with the City, including, but not limited to, the posting of a wage bond and other reasonable requirements.

#### E. Requirements for Successors-in-Interest

The requirements of this Section, including any sanctions imposed herein, that are applicable to any Employer shall also be applicable to, and effective against, any successor Employer that (i) has at least one of the same principals or officers as the prior Employer; and (ii) is engaged in the same or equivalent trade or activity as the prior Employer.

#### F. Additional Requirements for Municipal Construction Contracts.

Whenever the City is procuring construction services pursuant to G.L. c. 149, c. 149A or c. 30, § 39M, in addition to the other requirements described in this ordinance, the following shall also apply:

#### 1. Construction Bidders:

All bidders, proposers, contractors, and subcontractors or subcontractors shall, as a condition of bidding, contracting, or subcontracting, certify in writing that they shall comply with the following conditions:

a. The contractor shall maintain or shall obtain documentation from a subcontractor that it maintains an appropriate level of industrial accident insurance sufficient to provide coverage for all employees on the project in accordance with G.L. c. 152 and provide documentary proof of such coverage as a condition of acceptance of their bid.

- b. The contractor shall not suffer or permit workers to be misclassified as independent contractors on the project and shall neither suffer nor permit workers to be misclassified for the purposes of prevailing wage or overtime, worker's compensation coverage, social security taxes, and state and federal income tax withholding.
- c. The contractor shall not suffer or permit workers on the project to be paid less than their earned wages and that such wages be paid within the time prescribed by federal and Massachusetts law.
- d. The contractor will make arrangements to ensure that all workers on the project complete daily sign-in/signout logs listing: the worker's name, the name of the employer, the location of the project, current date, the time of entry and exit from the worksite. The log shall state that employees are entitled to the prevailing wage rate under state law and the rate sheet for the project shall be attached to the log.
- e. The sign-in/sign-out logs shall be provided to the OLCWP on a weekly basis.

#### 2. Construction Contractors

Contractors or subcontractors awarded or who otherwise obtain projects subject to G.L. c. 149, Sec. 44A(2), c. 149A, of c. 30, Sec. 39M shall comply with each of the obligations set forth above for the entire duration of the project.

#### 3 Sanctions for Violations

Any proposer, bidder, trade contractor or subcontractor under the bidder or prosper that fails to comply with any of the obligations set for herein may be subject to the following at the sole discretion of the City of Boston: 1) stop work order on the project until compliance is obtained; 2) withholding of payment due under any contractor or subcontract related to the project until compliance is obtained; 3) debarment; and/or 4) liquidated damages payable to the City of up to five percent of the dollar value of the contract.

#### <u>Section 5. Requirements for Licensees and Prospective Licensees.</u>

#### A. Requirements for License Applicants

Any application filed by an Employer to the City of Boston for any license or permit issued pursuant to M.G.L. c. 138 or M.G.L. c. 140 may be denied if, during the three (3)-year period prior to the date of the application, the applicant Employer has been subject to a federal or state criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, order, debarment, or final administrative determination resulting from a violation of M.G.L. c. 149, M.G.L. c. 151, 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.*, or any other state or federal laws regulating the payment of wages.

In submitting an application for a license or permit under either section, each such Employer-applicant must either:

- (1) certify that the Employer, its officers, and managers have not been found guilty, liable or responsible, in the past three (3) years, in any judicial or administrative proceeding, for any violation of any of the laws set forth above; or
- (2) To the extent an Employer is unable to truthfully make the above certification, provide:
  - a. a true copy of the federal or state criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, order, debarment, or final administrative determination resulting from a violation of M.G.L. c. 149, M.G.L. c. 151, 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.*, or any other state or federal laws regulating the payment of wages, and
  - b. proof that the Employer has paid all associated damages, fines, penalties in full.

#### **B.** Requirements for License and Permit Holders.

Employers holding licenses and permits subject to Chapters 138 or 140 have an affirmative duty to report any criminal or civil decision and/or judgment, administrative citation or final administrative order issued against them for Wage Theft while their licenses or permits are in effect and to provide a true copy of the same, within five (5) business days of receipt, to the OLCWP.

Any license or permit issued under M.G.L. c. 138 or M.G.L. c. 140 to an Employer may be modified, suspended or revoked if, during the term of the license or permit, the licensee or permittee Employer has been subject to a criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, final administrative determination, order, or debarment resulting from a violation of M.G.L. c. 149, M.G.L. c. 151, 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.* or any other state or federal laws regulating the payment of wages.

Any license or permit issued under M.G.L. c. 138 or M.G.L. c. 140 to an Employer may be modified, suspended or revoked if, during the term of the license or permit, the licensee or permittee Employer fails to timely provide notice and documentation of Wage Theft complaints against the Employer.

#### C. Wage Bonds for License Holders

Employers granted a License or Permit that have disclosed a criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, final administrative determination, order, or debarment resulting from a violation of M.G.L. c. 149, M.G.L. c. 151, 29 U.S.C. § 201 *et seq.* or any other state or federal laws regulating the payment of wages within three (3) years prior to the date they submit their applications, may be required by the City to obtain a wage bond or other form of comparable insurance in an amount equal

to the aggregate of one year's gross wages for all employees, based on an average of its total labor costs for the past two years.

Employers granted a License or Permit who become subject to a federal or state criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, final administrative determination, order, or debarment resulting from a violation of M.G.L. c. 149, M.G.L. c. 151, 29 U.S.C. § 201 et seq., or any other state or federal laws regulating the payment of wages during the term of the License or Permit, may be required by the City to obtain a wage bond or other form of comparable insurance in an amount equal to the aggregate of one year's gross wages for all employees, based on an average of its total labor costs for the past two years.

The bond must be maintained for the terms or extensions of any License or Permit, and proof of such bond must be provided upon request by the City. Failure to comply with this Subsection may constitute grounds for modification, suspension, and/or revocation of the license or permit pursuant to Subsection B.

#### D. Requirements for successors-in-interest.

The requirements of this Section, including any sanctions imposed herein, that are applicable to any Employer shall also be applicable to, and effective against, any successor Employer that (i) has at least one of the same principals, officers, or managers as the prior Employer; and (ii) is engaged in the same or equivalent trade or activity as the prior Employer.

#### Section 6: Requirements for Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Agreements

#### A. Required Notices and Responses.

Every solicitation for a project including TIF funding issued by the City, shall include the certification and disclosure requirements included in this Section. All successful Applicants for contracts, grants, and tax incentives shall provide complete and accurate responses to the same.

These certification and disclosure requirements shall include:

- A requirement for documentation reflecting the Applicant's demonstrated commitment to workforce development within Boston and/or the Commonwealth:
- A requirement that the Applicant will provide a statement of intent concerning efforts that it and its contractors and subcontractors will take to promote workforce development on the project if successful;
- A requirement for documentation reflecting the Applicant's demonstrated commitment to economic development within Boston and/or the Commonwealth;

- A requirement that the Applicant provide a statement of intent concerning efforts that it and its contractors and subcontractors on this project will take to promote economic development on the project if successful;
- A requirement for documentation reflecting the Applicant's demonstrated commitment to expand workforce diversity, equity, and inclusion in its past projects within Boston and/or the Commonwealth;
- A requirement that the Applicant provide a statement of intent concerning efforts that it and its contractors and subcontractors on this project, will undertake to expand workforce diversity, equity, and inclusion on the project if successful;
- A requirement that the Applicant disclose whether it and each of its contractors and subcontractors on this project, have previously contracted with a labor organization, as defined by Massachusetts General Laws, c. 150A and/or the National Labor Relations Act, Section 2, in the Commonwealth or elsewhere.
- A requirement that the Applicant specify whether it and each of its contractors and subcontractors on this project participates in a state or Federally certified apprenticeship program and the number of apprentices the apprenticeship program has trained to completion for each of the last five (5) years.

#### **B.** Additional Certifications and Disclosures.

It shall be a special and material condition of any future TIF Agreement that any and all persons, natural or corporate, who are signatories to the TIF Agreement provide the City of Boston, via the OLCWP, with a list of all construction managers, general contractors, lead or prime contractors, developers, or any entity functioning in any such capacity, and any other contractor or subcontractor of any tier engaged to perform work on the property subject to the tax increment financing plan during the term of the TIF Agreement. An initial list must be provided to the OLCWP at least thirty (30) business days prior to the start of any work on the property subject to the TIF Agreement. Should any additional or replacement entities be engaged to perform work on the property subject to the TIF Agreement during the term of the TIF Agreement, the signatory must provide the name of such entity no later than ten (10) business days before that entity begins work on the property.

All signatories to the TIF Agreement shall certify that they shall not engage any entity to perform work on the property covered under the TIF Agreement which is subject to debarment for any reason or has been found liable/responsible for any unpaid criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, or final administrative determination for Wage Theft.

All TIF signatories shall certify that they do not (a) have entities performing work on the property who have been the subject of an indictment, judgment, or grant of immunity, including pending actions, for any business-related conduct constituting a crime under state or federal law; nor (b) have any entities performing work on the property who have been the subject to voluntary or involuntary debarment under either federal or state law; nor (c) have entities performing work on the property who have been found liable for Wage Theft under state and/or federal law within three (3) years prior to the execution of the TIF Agreement.

If, notwithstanding such certification, any interested person gives the City of Boston written notice, via the OLCWP, that the certification provided by any signatory in the form provided above is materially inaccurate and provide the bases therefore, OLCWP shall write to all signatories to the TIF Agreement within ten (10) business days to request reverification and/or remediation of the certification. Should the signatory fail to come into compliance—by ensuring that the person or entity not in compliance with the terms of the certification fulfills all outstanding obligations under a court or administrative order or is replaced—within fifteen (15) business days of notice, the signatory shall be in material breach of the TIF Agreement because it materially frustrates the public purpose for which this TIF Agreement and any certification of the tax increment financing plan by the City was intended to advance. The consequences of a signatory providing an inaccurate certification and the procedures for remediation will be included in each TIF Agreement.

#### C. Special and Material Conditions of TIF Agreements with City of Boston.

It shall be a special and material condition of any TIF Agreement that any construction manager, general contractor, or other lead or prime contractor, or any entity functioning in any such capacity, and any other contractor or subcontractor of any tier or other person that is engaged to perform the work during the term of their TIF Agreement on the property that is the subject of the Tax Increment Financing Plan shall comply with the following qualification and condition at all times during their performance of work on the property:

- (1) The firm must maintain appropriate industrial accident insurance sufficient to provide coverage for all the employees on the project in accordance with G.L. c.152 and provide documentary proof of such coverage to the Building Inspector to be maintained in the Building Department as a public record;
- (2) The firm must properly classify all workers who are employees and treat them accordingly under the tests set forth in M.G.L. c. 149, § 148B for purposes of compensation on both a straight time and overtime basis and coverage under the earned sick time law, and M.G.L. c. 152, § 1(4) for purposes of workers' compensation insurance coverage;
- (3) The firm must comply with G.L. c. 149, § 148, G.L. c. 151 §§ 1, 1A, and 29 U.S.C. § 201, et seq., with respect to the payment of wages and overtime;
- (4) The firm must comply with G.L. c. 149, G.L. c. 151, and 29 U.S.C. § 201, et seq. with respect to prohibitions on

discrimination, adverse action, interference with, restraint, or denial of the exercise of the rights of any person in connection with the assertion or anticipated assertion of their own or others' rights under these laws; and The firm must be in compliance with the health and hospitalization requirements of the Massachusetts Health Care Reform law established by Chapter 58 of the Acts of 2006, as amended, and regulations promulgated under that statute by the Commonwealth Health Insurance Connector Authority.

#### D. Wage Theft Complaints for Properties Covered by TIF Agreements

Within ten (10) business days of receiving a complaint related to Wage Theft that pertains to work performed at any property subject to a TIF Agreement, the OLCWP shall send notice of such complaint to all signatories of the TIF Agreement.

If, after the OLCWP has properly served notice of a complaint upon the signatories to a TIF Agreement pursuant to this subsection, any Employer becomes subject to a federal or state criminal or civil judgment, administrative citation, stop work order, debarment, or final administrative determination resulting from a violation of any of the legal obligations outlined at subsections (B)(l)-(4), and if such judgment, citation, or order is not satisfied or discharged, or the offending Employer replaced on the project, within fifteen (15) business days of the entry of such judgment, citation, or order, the parties agree that such an event materially frustrates the public purpose that the TIF Agreement and any certification of the tax increment financing plan by the City was intended to advance.

#### **E.** Termination of TIF Agreements

In the event the public purpose of a TIF Agreement or TIF Plan is materially frustrated pursuant to Subsection (A) and/or (C), the OLCWP will promptly refer the matter to the City Council, which shall hold a public hearing and vote at its next regularly scheduled meeting regarding whether to terminate the tax relief provided by such TIF agreement and petition the EACC for revocation of that portion of its certification of the TIF Plan corresponding to such TIF Agreement. If the termination of such TIF Agreement is approved by the Council and Mayor, or by the Council over the Mayor's veto, the owner of the property covered by such TIF Agreement shall forfeit the receipt of any funds or future tax benefits and/or shall return any such funds already received in connection with the project.

In the event the owner of the property challenges a revocation of tax relief, the owner shall set aside an amount equal to the full amount of the tax savings that previously would have accrued under the agreement into an escrow account while any such challenge remains pending. The conditions of the escrow account shall provide that, in the event the owner is unsuccessful in challenging the tax relief revocation, the full amount of the escrow account will be paid to the City. Residents of the City will be acknowledged as third-party beneficiaries of such an agreement and may enforce the

agreement's provisions in a civil proceeding brought by not less than 10 taxable inhabitants.

#### F. Requirements for Successors-in-Interest

The requirements of this Section, including any sanctions imposed herein, that are applicable to any Employer shall also be applicable to, and effective against, any successor Employer that (i) has at least one of the same principals or officers as the prior Employer; and (ii) is engaged in the same or equivalent trade or activity as the prior Employer.

#### **Section 7. Severability**

If any provision of this Ordinance is held invalid or unenforceable by any court, such a holding does not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision of the Ordinance, and the rest of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### Section 1.

(a) Notwithstanding Section 9 of Chapter 32 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, and in order to promote the public good, there shall be paid an accidental death benefit from the Boston Retirement Board to Rachel Marie Troy, the surviving spouse of Mathew M. Troy, a former Firefighter of the City of Boston, who died as a result of a condition of impairment of health, including Cholangiocarcinoma, suffered while performing the essential duties of a Firefighter. The benefits shall be paid and administered in accordance with Section 9 of Chapter 32 of the General Laws. Rachel Marie Troy shall receive a lump sum payment from the Boston Retirement Board equal to the total accumulated retirement deductions paid by Mathew M. Troy into the annuity savings fund.

#### Section 2.

Such an accidental death benefit allowance shall consist of a yearly amount of pension equal to seventy-two percent of the annual rate of regular compensation of such member on the date such injury was sustained or such hazard was undergone, or equal to seventy-two percent of the average annual rate of compensation for the twelve-month period for which he last received regular compensation immediately preceding the date of his death, whichever is greater.

#### Section 3.

Rachel Marie Troy, the surviving spouse of Mathew M. Troy, a former Firefighter of the City of Boston, shall be afforded the opportunity to retain medical insurance coverage equivalent to such coverage that Matthew M. Troy would have been entitled to if he had retired from the City of Boston.

**Section 4.** This act shall take effect upon its passage.

**WHEREAS:** While the tents are gone, hundreds of people are gathering daily throughout the area, often engaging in open drug dealing, drug use, and other illicit activities throughout South End, Roxbury, Dorchester, and South Boston; *and* 

WHEREAS: As violence and illegal activities still continue to impact these neighborhoods, the Boston Police, and the Coordinated Response Team are working with Suffolk County District Attorney's office and other state agencies to address these issues; *and* 

**WHEREAS:** Mass and Cass continues to be a humanitarian crisis, and it is impacting the quality of life for residents and businesses, with piles of trash, including used needles and human feces scattering neighborhoods miles out; *and* 

WHEREAS: There is an urgent need to reevaluate the current strategies in addressing the public safety, quality of life, neighborhood services, and public health issues related to the situation in Mass and Cass and in the impacted neighborhood of South End, Roxbury, Dorchester, and South Boston. We need to identify ways to improve the City's response to the opioid crisis, drug dealing activities, and homelessness; *and* 

#### **NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:**

That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to address this humanitarian crisis, public safety and public health emergency, and the critical need to enhance city response and services related to this area. WHEREAS, East Boston is considered both an environmental justice community and a low-income, low-food access community by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In Massachusetts today, 1 in 3 Hispanic/Latinx families with children are food insecure and in East Boston, 59% of residents are Hispanic/Latinx and 21% of the community's population are children. In short, East Boston faces numerous challenges related to accessing and affording healthy and sustainable food; and

#### WHEREAS,

However, it's important to note that there is a range of existing community food assets that aim to address food access issues in the neighborhood. For example, though there is only one large-scale grocery store in East Boston (Shaw's), there are many corner stores and mini-marts that offer food items for purchase, as well as a seasonal farmers market that sells local produce; and

#### WHEREAS.

Additionally, there are numerous food pantries, soup kitchens, and mobile market locations in East Boston that provide free meals and groceries to the community. To provide examples, Maverick Landing Community Services distributes healthy groceries to residents and has a robust food rescue program, East Boston Community Soup Kitchen offers both a hot meal and groceries on a weekly basis, and the Sacred Heart Parish hosts a free monthly community dinner. Finally, Eastie Farm, an urban agriculture organization, provides a subsidized community-supported agriculture (CSA) program; and

#### WHEREAS,

In other parts of Boston, food insecurity has been addressed through creative solutions. These models could serve as inspiration for future actions to lower the disproportionately high food insecurity rates in East Boston. Some examples include the Dorchester Food Co-op, a community and worker-owned health & local food store, Daily Table, a non-profit, low-cost grocery store chain, and the Office of Food Justice's future Food Rescue Hub at 30 Northampton Street in Roxbury; and

#### WHEREAS.

Boston needs to collect more information to fully understand the food access landscape in East Boston. Then, the city can craft a corresponding plan to fill the remaining gaps and address food insecurity and environmental justice issues in this neighborhood through a food hub or other similar solution; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

## ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS BOSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT STAFFING LEVELS

**WHEREAS:** The longstanding issues of understaffing, overstretched resources, forced overtime, and looming retirements at the Boston Police Department is a public safety and public health emergency, which also disregards officers' personal physical and emotional well-being, as well as that of their families; *and* 

**WHEREAS:** In July of 1980, the minimum number of patrolmen at a given time for the Boston Police Department rose from 2,300 to 2,500 by law in the City Municipal Code to ensure adequate staffing among detailing projects and other police duties; *and* 

WHEREAS: The increase in voluntary retirement and resignations is resulting in mandatory overtime for police officers. In fact, resignations rose from one in 2018 to thirty six in 2022, while voluntary retirement rose from seventeen in 2018 to 127 in 2022. Current staff is ordered to fill those gaps, resulting in the physical and emotional burnout in the officers, and potentially diminished ability to serve Boston residents; *and* 

**WHEREAS:** The environment at the Boston Police Department must be one that fosters a strong relationship within the community. It is important that there is trust between officers and the residents, and officers and their superiors. Officers who feel valued and respected are more likely to have positive interactions with the public, ultimately improving trust and cooperation through community policing; *and* 

WHEREAS: Boston Police needs a consistent influx of recruits to replace those that are retiring, resigning, and transferring to other police departments throughout Massachusetts to help prevent shortages. There are several recruiting practices that can be put in place to increase staffing, including mentorship programs, incentive programs, and community outreach; and

**WHEREAS:** It is critical that the City of Boston act promptly to ensure that Boston Police Department is comfortably in excess of 2,500 officers to prevent the overstretched resources, forced overtime, and overworked officers that has resulted in this ongoing emergency and crisis; *therefore* 

#### **NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:**

That the appropriate Committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to discuss adequate police staffing in the City of Boston. Representatives from the Boston Police Department, the Boston Police commissioner, and Boston City Council are invited to attend.

## ORDER FOR A HEARING TO REVIEW THE USAGE OF SECURITY CAMERAS IN BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

- WHEREAS, In 2021, the Boston City Council unanimously passed an ordinance to increase accountability, transparency, and oversight of the City's use of surveillance technology and data, including requiring each City department to publish a Surveillance Use Policy for each surveillance technology in use or intended use, as well as an Annual Surveillance Report detailing actual usage of surveillance technology and data in the past year; the Ordinance additionally tasks the City Council with reviewing "whether the benefits to the impacted City department(s) and the community of the Surveillance Technology outweigh the financial and operational costs and whether reasonable safeguards exist to address reasonable concerns regarding privacy, civil liberties, and civil rights impacted by the deployment of the Surveillance Technology"; and,
- **WHEREAS,** During the development and passage of that Ordinance, many of the community advocates expressed particular interest in transparency about the usage of surveillance technologies affecting Boston Public Schools (BPS); *and*,
- **WHEREAS,** Pursuant to the aforementioned Ordinance, the 2023 Annual Surveillance Report on the BPS Video Management System was published by the Administration and provided to the City Council on July 8, 2024; *and*,
- WHEREAS, The Committee on Public Safety and Criminal Justice has received inquiries from both community advocates and Councilors requesting discussion of the use of security cameras in BPS facilities, particularly given the limited information available in the corresponding 2023 Annual Surveillance Report; and,
- **WHEREAS,** "In 2023, BPS spent \$1,809,412 on security cameras and cabling installation" per the report, but the report provides no further detail on the purpose or nature of these expenditures; *and*,
- **WHEREAS,** The report provides no information on the number or locations of cameras, and includes limited details on the intention in their placement and usage, noting only: "The cameras are used for security purposes. The technology is deployed in

various Boston Public Schools buildings. The technology is in continual use, and doesn't have a specific use case."; and: "The technology's identified purpose is the security for students and staff attending school. Security cameras are known for deterring criminals from threatening the safety of students and staff. On a 5-point scale, BPS would give the cameras a '4' rating for effectiveness."; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

**ORDERED:** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to review the usage of security cameras in Boston Public Schools. Representatives from Boston Public Schools, the Department of Innovation and Technology (DoIT), the Boston Police Department, and community advocacy organizations will be invited, and members of the public are encouraged to attend and testify.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO DISCUSS HOW BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS CAN EXPAND THE USE OF EVIDENCE-BASED BEST PRACTICES FOR INCLUSIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS FOR MULTILINGUAL AND SPECIAL EDUCATION LEARNERS

WHEREAS,

"Inclusion" is an education model that seeks to ensure the effective education of students with diverse learning needs, including multilingual learners and students with disabilities, while enhancing the social and emotional development for all students in an integrated learning environment that supports the needs of each student, instead of segregating students based on their learning needs; and,

**WHEREAS.** The U.S. Department of Education identifies multilingualism and multiliteracy as highly beneficial for the cognitive and socio-emotional development of children, with peer-reviewed research demonstrating increased understanding of math concepts, easier development of strong thinking skills and use of logic, improved focus and decision-making, better self-control, and strengthened connections with culture and community, in addition to long-term practical benefits for job opportunities and participation in multilingual local and global communities; and,

WHEREAS,

It is therefore highly beneficial for English Learners to have their native language fostered through native language instruction while simultaneously developing skills in the English language, rather than receive instruction solely in English; and it is further of benefit for native English speakers to gain exposure to other languages through inclusive classrooms that support and integrate Multilingual Learners with instruction in their native languages in addition to English; and,

WHEREAS, Further, the inclusion of students with disabilities provides similar benefits for social and emotional development of all students, while enhancing positive outcomes for students who learn differently; and,

WHEREAS, BPS currently places students in substantially separate classrooms (SSCs) at highly disproportionate rates, particularly for Black male students and English Learners, with over twice the state and national rate of students in SSCs, Black male students being over three times as likely to be placed in emotional impairment SSCs as other student groups, and English Learners with an identified communication disability being over two and a half times more likely to be placed in SSCs; and,

- WHEREAS, BPS leadership has recognized this deficiency and urgency to implement a more inclusive approach, including as part of a 2022 deal with the Massachusetts Education Commissioner, which mandated structural changes to address what state leaders described as "systemic disarray" in BPS's special education services, and which allowed BPS the opportunity to address these shortcomings to avoid being immediately labeled "underperforming" or requiring state receivership; and.
- WHEREAS, A May 22, 2024 BPS School Proposals report reflects these necessary changes, discussing investments BPS is making: "[to] create inclusive opportunities to the maximum extent possible, to increase students' access to grade level content and high-quality instructional materials with the appropriate resources and supports to ensure that ALL students can be successful, especially students we have not served well. This work is at the center of our efforts to eliminate gaps in opportunities and outcomes."; and,
- **WHEREAS,** Research studies on special education outcomes consistently demonstrate that students having access to targeted subject matter interventions and sufficient support are both critical, making the specific details of the implementation of Inclusion extremely important; *and*,
- **WHEREAS,** Teachers and staff must be adequately trained and provided resources to maximize the positive impact of Inclusion on student outcomes; *and*,
- **WHEREAS,** Some BPS schools have been nationally recognized for highly effective implementations of Inclusion, and their systems should be discussed as models for expansion to the majority of other BPS schools that do not currently implement similar systems, and consequently have measurably poorer outcomes; *and*,
- WHEREAS, Inclusive classrooms are best facilitated by a team of educators who are dedicated to one classroom of students, so the educators can build relationships and provide consistency for those students, and collectively meet each of their needs, without overtaxing teachers to possess multiple licenses and perform the duties of more than one job at once, or jump between classrooms and split attention across too many students to maintain close relationships; and,
- WHEREAS, Emphasizing the necessity of a team of educators for effective implementation of Inclusion, the Council of Great City Schools, a coalition of 75 of the nation's largest urban public school systems, of which the Boston School Committee is a member, published a report in 2022 commissioned by BPS, which highlighted: "No districts we are familiar with use dually certified general/special educators to meet the needs of all of their students, even with paraeducator support"; and,

**WHEREAS,** Providing native language instruction requires a sustained pipeline of educators who are fluent in the primary home languages of students, making it critical to implement systems to attract, hire, and retain enough teachers to meet students' needs; *and*,

**WHEREAS,** The effective implementation of inclusive classrooms requires guidance and support from families and students, and must therefore integrate community outreach on a school-by-school basis with both the school's community at large, as well as the individual families of that school's students.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to discuss how Boston Public Schools can expand the use of evidence-based best practices for Inclusive Learning Environments for Multilingual and Special Education Learners. Experts on classroom Inclusion models; community groups representing Boston Public School teachers, students, parents, and staff; and representatives from Boston Public Schools will be invited, and members of the public are encouraged to attend and testify.

#### ORDER FOR A HEARING TO SUPPORT THE CREATION OF LENDING LIBRARIES TO BENEFIT RESIDENTS AND REDUCE WASTEFUL PURCHASES

- **WHEREAS,** Boston residents may want access to tools they do not have for sewing, cooking, wood-working, audio-visual projects, parties, auto and home repair, games, sports and outdoor activities, science, gardening, and cycling, leading many to purchase or rent redundant items they only need on special occasions; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** The production of these tools for only occasional use has an unnecessary large environmental footprint, wasting plastic, metal, and aluminum; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Offering a space where residents can borrow commonly needed items is an opportunity to bring people together and offer education on their use; *and*
- WHEREAS, Many active online spaces such as the Buy Nothing Project— which provide spaces for people to lend, share, give and receive items as well as inspire informal giving platforms on social media— prove there is demand for a community-centered program for item lending and giving; and
- **WHEREAS,** The Boston Public Library already manages a program to circulate non-traditional materials, the "Library of Things," which is limited in its scale, city reach, and wealth of items; *and*
- WHEREAS, Several local communities in the Greater Boston Area including Quincy, Somerville, Brookline, and Watertown have robust, established item lending programs through their local libraries. Dozens of communities nationwide have implemented lending libraries in some form, including Chicago (IL), San Francisco (CA), and New York (NY); and
- **WHEREAS,** The North Portland Tool Library (NPTL) has saved its residents more than \$447,000 or an average of \$60 per tool that was loaned out for use; and
- WHEREAS, These programs have come at limited cost due to volunteer staffing, donations from the community, and private philanthropy; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- **ORDERED:** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss how Boston Public Libraries and other city properties can loan useful tools to our community.

**WHEREAS**, The City Council passed a Home Rule Petition allowing the property tax burden borne by businesses to be raised from 175% to 200% in the next fiscal year, then decreasing over five years with an eventual return to the original 175%.

**WHEREAS**, That Home Rule Petition has since failed at the State House, leaving uncertainty as to what, if any, measures will be implemented in its place, especially given the Administration's stance that there was no "backup plan" to its attempt to change the property tax reclassification

**WHEREAS**, The Home Rule Petition did not provide a solution for the post-five-year period where property owners and renters will still experience high property taxes relative to today. This proposition would have only smoothed the rise over five years, leaving many residents we are trying to protect still vulnerable.

**WHEREAS**, Both business and residents must be served and protected. Businesses form an important part of the fabric of our city; and raising their tax burden would have a profound and negative impact on an already struggling business community. Residents already face an extremely high cost of living in Boston, and we need answers for them.

WHEREAS, There has been much discussion on what information and data was available at the time of formulation of the Home Rule Petition, what models were used, how that information and data was found and decided upon, how that information and data is stored, how often that information and data is updated, how that information and data is applied in the Administration's analysis, how that information and data will be utilized going forward, and how options developed or changed when the Home Rule Petition was debated at the State House.

**WHEREAS**, There must be communication with the City Council as to what the next steps the Administration is looking at are and how they are planning to respond to protect residents and businesses. **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT** 

**ORDERED**, That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council audit the steps that led to the Home Rule Petition and the steps that now come after it, and that representatives from the Auditing Office, the Commissioner of Assessing, the Chief Financial Officer, and other interested parties be invited to attend and give testimony.

- WHEREAS, The City of Boston and the Boston City Council possess the ability to establish Commissions, Boards, Oversight Committees, Task Forces, and other bodies in order to provide oversight over administrative work, make policy and programmatic recommendations, and create dedicated community spaces addressing unique and substantive issues; and
- **WHEREAS,** The City of Boston currently lists 70 active Boards and Commissions addressing a variety of issues from arts and culture to public safety to disability rights and more, with over half of them (37) currently having open seats which need to be filled; *and*
- WHEREAS, While some boards and commissions possess enabling legislation which allows input from the City Council and other community organizations to recommend Commissioners and board members, the vast majority of the City's Boards and Commissions with enabling legislation state that members must be appointed by the Mayor while others have no enabling legislation whatsoever; and
- **WHEREAS,** The composition and function of Boards and Commissions within the City of Boston plays a crucial role in shaping policies, programs, and initiatives that impact the lives of residents; *and*
- WHEREAS, Transparency and accountability in the selection process for Commissioners also plays a pivotal role in fostering public trust and confidence, ensuring not only that diverse voices and perspectives are heard and actively represented in decision-making processes, but also to ensure that the City adheres to relevant laws such as M.G.L. Chapter 30A, Section 11A, which outlines requirements for public access to governmental decision-making processes, ensures transparency and accountability in the City's governance structures, and promotes greater inclusivity and equity in governance; and
- **WHEREAS,** There is a need to conduct a comprehensive audit of all Boards and Commissions within the city to evaluate their composition, selection processes, criteria for

appointment, selection timeline, and adherence to principles of equity and inclusion; *and* 

**WHEREAS,** Residents across Boston who represent a wide spectrum of backgrounds and cultures deserve unequivocal assurance that Board and Commission appointments reflect the rich diversity inherent within our communities, and that appointees possess not only relevant expertise but also a profound understanding of the nuanced challenges and aspirations of our diverse populace; *and* 

WHEREAS, Providing residents, through a public hearing, information relative to the demographic and biographic information of all existing Board and Commission members, the timeline for appointments, and the criteria for appointments will be necessary to identify any gaps or disparities in the composition of Boards and Commissions, with the opportunity to recommend strategies to promote greater diversity, equity, and inclusion in future appointments; and

WHEREAS, Auditing the selection and composition of Boards and Commissions serves as a crucial step towards fostering a more accountable and representative municipal government, ensuring that all residents have equitable access to opportunities and resources, and reaffirming our commitment to building a more just and inclusive community for all; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to conduct a full audit of all Boards and Commissions within the City to evaluate their composition, criteria for appointment, selection processes, selection timeline, and adherence to principles of equity and inclusion, in accordance with the mandates outlined in relevant municipal and Massachusetts General Laws and regulations. Representatives from the Administration, including representatives from the City's various Boards and Commissions, in addition to advocates and members of the public are encouraged to testify.

CBC 8-10 to better understand how the funds are collected and allocated to

ensure the funds are being managed efficiently; and

WHEREAS, CBC 8-10 is not widely publicized or highlighted, resulting in residents lacking a

clear understanding of its current status and the application process for

reimbursement: and

WHEREAS, Auditing CBC 8-10 will improve public transparency, accessibility, and

knowledge regarding the existence of a "Disruption Impact Fund" in response to

the public's demand for accountable governance; and

**WHEREAS**, It is the role of the Boston City Council to ensure administrative compliance with

legislative intent and evaluate the efficiency, effectiveness, and accessibility of operations and programs. The City Council must examine municipal financial statements to ensure public funds and assets are managed responsibly and

effectively; NOW THEREFORE BE IT

**ORDERED**: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to audit the City of Boston's accountability, transparency, and accessibility regarding the enforcement of CBC 8-10. Representatives from the appropriate Boston City Departments and members of the public are encouraged to attend.

Biz-M-Power Crowdfunding Program, and Small Business Relief Fund offer

financial assistance; and

**WHEREAS**, Ensuring the equitable distribution of local, state, and federal grants is crucial to

supporting Boston's diverse small business community, particularly those owned by women, minorities, immigrants, and other historically marginalized groups;

public awareness about the dangers of fentanyl and promote preventative strategies,

poisonings, support grieving families, and advocate for effective legislation in our

state and programs within our communities to prevent future tragedies; and

unsuspecting fatal poisonings in our city and across the United States. In 2023,

Massachusetts reported 2,125 fatal opioid-related overdose deaths; and

**WHEREAS**, Illicitly manufactured fentanyl is impossible to detect, posing significant risks to the

health and safety of individuals. According to the DEA, 305 lives are lost daily across the United States to fentanyl poisonings. Based on CDC data, 74,702 of the 107,543 drug overdose deaths in the United States in 2023 were related to fentanyl;

and

**WHEREAS**, Collaborative efforts between healthcare professionals, law enforcement,

community organizations, and policymakers are essential to developing

comprehensive strategies to address the fentanyl epidemic, ensuring a multifaceted

approach for prevention, treatment, and support; NOW THEREFORE BE IT

**RESOLVED**, The Boston City Council recognizes August 21, 2024, as Fentanyl Prevention and

Awareness Day in the City of Boston in support of the goals and ideals of promoting

preventative measures and raising awareness.

- WHEREAS, In 1950, India became a republic and adopted a pluralist and democratic Constitution that gave equal rights to all citizens regardless of faith and other identity markers and guaranteed there would be no discrimination on the basis of caste, creed, color or sex, with the Constituent Assembly of India creating a most democratic constitution of its own, taking clues from the British, American and French constitutions; and
- WHEREAS, Since declaring independence, the people and government of India have worked to gain political, social, and economic power on the world stage, with India showing an unsurpassed growth in education, health, agriculture, and technology since its independence 77 years ago; and
- WHEREAS, India's Independence Day is celebrated by over 1.4 billion people across the country with flag-hoisting ceremonies, kite-flying, and parades and is not only a celebration of political liberation but also a tribute to the enduring spirit of its people, who demonstrated remarkable courage, resilience, and unity in their quest

# RESOLUTION CALLING FOR THE BOSTON PUBLIC HEALTH COMMISSION TO DECLARE A PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY RELATIVE TO THE CLOSING OF CARNEY HOSPITAL

- **WHEREAS,** Steward Health Care System, LLC (Steward) is one of the nation's largest private for-profit healthcare networks, owning over 30 hospitals in nine states, including Carney Hospital (founded 1863 in South Boston) in Dorchester, which serves a large and diverse patient population in the City of Boston; *and*,
- **WHEREAS,** On July 26th, Steward revealed in its bankruptcy court filings that it is planning to close Carney Hospital and Nashoba Valley Medical Center in Ayer by Aug. 31, citing lack of qualified bids for these two hospitals; *and*,
- **WHEREAS,** The August 31st closure date is about three months earlier than the state required 120 day notice for closing hospitals, leaving patients and hospital staff little time to prepare and transfer their care; *and*,
- **WHEREAS,** The request from Steward to close these two hospitals so quickly is unconscionable, and the closure of Carney Hospital will have devastating and cascading negative impacts on Boston residents who are reliant on care from Carney Hospital; and,
- **WHEREAS,** Carney Hospital has a long history of serving patients in our city, as it serves many residents of color living in Dorchester and elsewhere, as well as many immigrant patients, and has strong ties to many South Boston residents who had either visited or worked there; *and*,

**RESOLVED:** That the City Council urges the City of Boston and State Government to be prepared that if there are no bidders for Carney hospital, to seize the property by eminent domain and to continue to operate the facility until a permanent operator is found.

- **WHEREAS,** Melvin Herbert King was born on October 20, 1928 in the South End neighborhood of Boston, one of eleven children to parents Ursula and Watts King, themselves immigrants from Guyana and Barbados, respectively; *and*
- WHEREAS, Friends since childhood, Mel King married his wife Joyce in 1951, and they remained together for nearly 72 years until his passing on March 28th, 2023; and
- WHEREAS, After graduating from Boston Technical High School and later Boston State College with a Masters of Arts in education, King found his calling as a community activist and neighborhood leader, founding the Community Assembly for a United South End (C.A.U.S.E.) to give tenants and community residents a voice; and
- WHEREAS, Thanks to the efforts of Mel King and others, residents in the South End and Roxbury successfully fought against the expansion of Interstate 95 through the heart of these two neighborhoods, saving the community from utmost destruction, displacement, and environmental catastrophe; and
- WHEREAS, Elected in 1973 to represent the Massachusetts' 9th Suffolk district, King advocated for a number of progressive policies, including championing divestment from Apartheid in South Africa and supporting LGBTQ+ rights at a time when few were willing to speak up; and
- WHEREAS, In 1983, King ran for Mayor of Boston, making him the first African American to make it to the general election for Mayor in the history of Boston, running a grassroots campaign focusing on neighborhood supports, easing racial tension, and promoting access to high-quality education for all; and
- WHEREAS, From the time after the election up until his passing in early 2023, Mel King continued to provide guidance, wisdom, and insights to organizers of all backgrounds, going on to found the Rainbow Coalition Party in Massachusetts and the South End Technology Center to provide computer training for low-income people; and

- **WHEREAS,** King passed away in March of 2023 at the age of 94, remembered as one of Boston's most celebrated civil rights leaders of the 20th century; *and*
- WHEREAS, Originally founded in 1877, the South End Branch of the Boston Public Library is currently undergoing a major renovation to its existing building erected in 1971, presenting an opportunity to rename the library in honor of one of Boston's most significant and honored historical figures; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT



#### 2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.



<sup>3</sup>Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

*Ordinances*: Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.

**Loan Orders:** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.

*Orders*: Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Home Rule Petitions: Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City

Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.

*Order for a Hearing*: A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular

matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative

action of placing it on file.

Legislative Resolution: A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal

effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as

a whole.

#### RESOLUTION CELEBRATING AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT'S (ADA) DAY ON JULY 17, 2024

WHEREAS:

This year, July 17 marks Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Day in the City of Boston. The American with Disabilities Act is a federal act that prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities. It is a civil rights law that ensures all people with disabilities are entitled to the same rights, opportunities, and services as every other American. The ADA serves as a powerful instrument in promoting a society where people with disabilities can fully participate and thrive, without facing unjust barriers or prejudice; *and* 

WHEREAS:

Signed into law on July 26th, 1990, this July marks the 33rd anniversary of the passage of ADA; and

WHEREAS:

Through its extensive network of regional centers, the ADA National Network works to ensure awareness and compliance with ADA regulations in order to promote equality of opportunity, full participation, and self-sufficient living for individuals with disabilities; *and* 

WHEREAS:

According to a 2021 US Census Bureau report, 8.3% of Boston residents under 65 live with disabilities. This includes difficulties in self-care, hearing, vision, independent living, cognition, and walking; *and* 

WHEREAS:

The City of Boston's Disabilities Commission works to reduce barriers for individuals with disabilities so that they can have full and equal participation in all aspects of life. In 2022, the Disabilities Commission improved City Hall Plaza's ADA compliance by adding accessibility features. Citywide, they increased accessibility for those with limited hearing through expanding closed captioning on public screens; *and* 

WHEREAS:

In 2016, the City Council and Mayor Walsh created the Language and Communications Access (LCA) program to provide translation and interpretation services for non-English speaking residents and those with communication-related disabilities in all City departments. The LCA office ensures accessibility for constituents and upholds Boston's citywide Language and Communication Access Ordinance; and

**WHEREAS:** 

The City of Boston has greatly improved and continues to work in improving access for people with disabilities by requiring facilities and public ways to be ADA compliant.

WHEREAS:

We also want to recognize the tremendous work of organizations dedicated to the engagement of persons with disabilities, such as the Challenger Baseball League for children with special needs, which was sponsored by Sean O'Brien and Local 25 of the Teamsters Union, with former Boston Mayor Ray Flynn and Joe "Okie" O'Connor acting as coaches; *and* 

#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED:
