Dear Councilors:

The Committee on Public Safety & Criminal Justice was referred the following dockets for consideration:

Docket 0845 - Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of One Million One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$1,150,000.00) in the form of a grant for a comprehensive, inter-agency strategy that connects law enforcement, employment, education, public health and youth development agencies to reduce youth violence in the Commonwealth. This additional funding increases the total grant to \$2,300,000.00 over two years, awarded by the MA Executive Office of Health and Human Services to be administered by the Police Department.

Docket 0954 - Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Four Million Dollars (\$4,000,000.00) in the form of a grant, for the FY22 Public Safety Answering Point Support and Incentive Grant, awarded by the MA Executive Office of Public Safety & Security to be administered by the Police Department.

Docket 0956 - Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of Three Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand Four Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Seventy-Three Cents (\$399,418.73) in the form of a grant for the FY22 State 911 Training Grant, awarded by the MA Executive Office of Public Safety & Security to be administered by the Police Department.

Docket 1012 - Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend the amount of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) in the form of a grant for the FY21 Securing the Cities, awarded by the United States Department of Homeland Security to be administered by the Police Department. The grant will fund Year 2 of the Securing the Cities grant project, which enhances the ability of the United States to detect and prevent terrorist attacks and other high-consequence events utilizing nuclear or other radiological materials that pose a threat to homeland security in high-risk urban areas.

Docket 1036 - Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to accept and expend FY2020 DNA Capacity Enhancement and Backlog Reduction Program Funds, Two Hundred Thirty-Nine Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-Four Dollars (\$239,254.00) by the United States Department of Justice.

These matters were sponsored by the Administration, and were referred to the Committee on 7/19/21 (Docket 0845), 9/10/21 (Dockets 0954 and 0956), 9/24/21 (Docket 1012) and 10/4/21 (Docket 1036). A public hearing was held on Thursday, October 21, 2021. Frank DeLuca, Program Administrator, BPD/ORD SSI, Roy Martin, Program Director, BPHC, Aly Boehler, Senior Program Manager, BPHC, Christopher Markunas, Director of Quality Assurance, Operations Division, BPD, Anthony Rizzo, Program Coordinator, BPD/BRIC/STC, Kevin Larade, Director of Quality Assurance, Forensic Division, BPD and Maria Cheevers, BPD Director of Research and Development, all gave the committee a breakdown and overview of how the monies are planned to be used within the department.

Summary of Legislation

Docket 0845, grant in the amount of \$1,150,000.00 will fund FY22 and FY23 Safe and Successful Youth Initiative. BPD has entered into an agreement with BPHC to be the SSI Lead Agency which manages and coordinates delivery of transitional services by various community-based organizations to those identified proven risk young adults.

Docket 0954, grant in the amount of \$4,000,000.00 will fund costs associated with providing Enhanced 911 Services.

Docket 0956, grant in the amount of \$399,418.73 will fund the training and certification of Enhanced 911 Telecommunications staff.

Docket 1012, grant in the amount \$1,500,000.00 will fund Year 2 of the Securing the Cities grant project, which enhances the ability of the United States to detect and prevent terrorist attacks and other high-consequence events utilizing nuclear or other radiological materials that pose a threat to homeland security in high-risk urban areas.

Docket 1036, grant in the amount of, \$239,254.00 will fund FY2020 DNA Capacity Enhancement and Backlog Reduction Program.

Committee Chair Recommended Action



The Boston City Council's Committee on Housing and Community Development to which was referred the following:

Docket #1010 – Message and order authorizing the City of Boston to apply for, and to accept and expend, the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 Continuum of Care grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in the amount not to exceed Forty Five Million Dollars (\$45,000,000.00).

These funds will be used to support programs that provide services and housing to persons experiencing homelessness.

This matter is sponsored by the Mayor and was referred to the Committee on Housing and Community Development on September 29, 2021.

The Committee on Housing and Community Development held a public hearing on October 21, 2021, virtually via Zoom Meeting to take testimony and consider the same.

Councilor Kenzie Bok the Vice-Chair of the Committee on Housing and Community Development, Chaired the Hearing at the request of Councilor Lydia Edwards the Chair of the Committee on Housing and Community Development.

Councilors Present: Councilor Ed Flynn, Councilor Julia Mejia and Councilor Liz Breadon

Laila Bernstein - Deputy Director for the Supportive Housing Division, Department of Neighborhood Development - made a presentation on the particulars of the Continuum of Care grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development that will be used to support programs that provide services and housing to persons experiencing homelessness (attached), and responded to questions from the Chair and Councilors.

Based on the testimony and information presented at the hearing and having considered the same I respectfully recommend that this matter ought to Pass.

***HUD's PY21 Continuum of Care (CoC) Program
Fact Sheet - Application to HUD for PY21***

What is the Continuum of Care Program?

Continuum of Care (CoC) is a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development designed to provide housing and supportive services for homeless individuals and families. As the designated Collaborative Applicant on behalf of the Boston Continuum of Care, the City of Boston is funded for the following eligible program activities within the CoC Program: leasing and rental assistance for Permanent Housing (PH), Supportive Services Only (SSO), Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and CoC Planning.

How are the funds allocated?

HUD allocates the funds through the national annual McKinney Homeless Continuum of Care funding competition. Due to the COVID-19 public health crisis, HUD did not hold a Program Year 2020 (PY20) CoC competition. The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, allowed HUD to renew PY19 grants without the PY20 competition.

How much was the City of Boston awarded under the CoC PY20 program?

The City of Boston was awarded \$38,685,686 in CoC Program funding in the 2020 renewals.

The renewal funds will be used to fund 42 grants that serve over 2,000 households, including nearly 1,300 chronically homeless individuals at any given point in time. The application includes the renewal of nearly 300 permanent housing slots for families. Renewal funds also include permanent housing programs for survivors of domestic violence and human trafficking, and assessor, navigation and technology resources to further support Coordinated Entry, which is a coordinated City-wide housing placement system. The PY20 renewal grants also incorporate 5 grants for permanent housing for youth and young adults that were originally awarded to Boston through HUD's 2017 Youth Housing Demonstration Program (YHDP) competition.

Boston's PY20 CoC award also includes grants to support our Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) software, a federally mandated client-level data collection and reporting system and planning resources to support strategic operations of the CoC and to ensure compliance with HUD regulations.

The grant term for the renewal awards is for one year (the City will seek continued funding for them annually).

monitoring the outcomes of CoC and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) projects; and developing a coordinated community-wide or region-wide process with stakeholders, nonprofit service providers, and community partners.

To whom will the City be awarding funds?

The City will award CoC funds received in PY20 renewals to all currently funded non-profit agencies that administer rental assistance, leasing and support service programs for permanent housing.

What is the City doing to encourage applications from new providers or for new initiatives?

Under HUD's 2021 Continuum of Care Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), the Boston CoC is eligible to apply for new project funding. Based on the formulas stipulated in the NOFO, the CoC can apply for up to \$1,884,032 in CoC Bonus funding and up to \$2,254,662 in DV-Bonus funding.

Bonus funding can be used to create new permanent housing programs, including permanent supportive housing, rapid rehousing and joint transitional -rapid rehousing, SSO-CES programs to support the CoC's required Coordinated Entry system and funding to support the CoC's HMIS.

DV-Bonus funding is an opportunity to create projects that serve survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking and human trafficking. DV-Bonus can be used to create rapid rehousing and joint transitional - rapid rehousing programs, as well as SSO-CES programs to better connect survivors to CoC housing and service resources.

DND issued a publicly advertised Request for Proposals to solicit applications from non-profit homeless service providers interested in creating eligible projects to be included in the CoC's overall application to HUD. The RFP was made available on September 27, 2021, with responses due on October 15, 2021. The RFP was advertised through public notifications via the CoC's listserv, as well as announcements in CoC meetings and on the CoC's webpage.

Who does the funding assist? How many households will be served?

The funding is used to assist individuals and families that meet the HUD definition of homeless. HUD and the City of Boston strongly encourage that CoC permanent housing resources (rental assistance and leasing programs) be prioritized to assist the most vulnerable, including chronically homeless households, as part of the US Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) and the Boston CoC's shared goals of eradicating homelessness.

Additionally, under certain component types and programs, specific homeless sub-populations can be targeted for assistance, such as veterans, victims of domestic violence, and severely mentally ill.

Who are the supportive service partners?

Supportive service project partners provide case management, housing search and stabilization services for clients housed through the CoC program. Partner agencies also provide, or help their clients' access, other appropriate services including, but not limited to, health care, transportation assistance, mental health treatment, substance use disorder services, counseling, education and job training, child care and employment.

Where are the rental assistance and leasing program units located?

The units supported through the CoC program are located predominantly in Boston, with 77% having a Boston address and 23% in surrounding Greater Boston communities. Under the CoC Program, all new lease ups are required to be within the City, with the exception of Tenant-Based Rental Assistance. For units located within the City, every neighborhood, as identified by zip code, is represented as follows:

**ORDER FOR A HEARING REGARDING REPARATIONS AND
THEIR IMPACT ON THE CIVIL RIGHTS OF BLACK
BOSTONIANS**

WHEREAS, Since even before June 19th, 1865, the day upon which the ending of slavery in the United States is commemorated, the idea of paying reparations to formerly enslaved African Americans and their descendants has been a topic of fierce discussion and debate, *and;*

WHEREAS, Reparations are a form of “transitional justice,” which the International Center for Transitional Justice defines as “ways countries emerging from periods of conflict and repression address large-scale or systematic human rights violations so numerous and so serious that the normal justice system will not be able to provide an adequate response” *and;*

WHEREAS, Reparations can take many forms, including: Restitution, which seeks to restore a victim to their position before the violations occurred; Compensation, which is a financial award for harms; Rehabilitation, which seeks to provide care and services for victims beyond monetary payment; Satisfaction, which includes symbolic reparations such as public apologies and verifying facts; and Guarantee of non-repetition, which assures that this kind of harm shall never be repeated, *and;*

WHEREAS, The topic of reparations for slavery have come up time and time again, with historical proposals, such as the infamous *40 Acres and a Mule* promise, symbolically continuing through H.R. 40, a current Congressional bill originally submitted by Rep. John Conyers which seeks to form a commission to study and develop reparations proposals for African Americans, *and;*

WHEREAS, Currently, only two cities in the United States has officially begun the process of administering reparations to its citizens: Evanston, Illinois voted in March of 2021 to grant qualifying households up to \$25,000 for

down payments or home repairs; and San Francisco, California formed a Reparations Committee in May of 2021 to explore the same idea, *and*;

WHEREAS, There is a need in Boston to reconcile its history with slavery, both in confirming and presenting a common understanding of the city’s history with slavery, and in exploring the issuance of reparations to the descendants of those impacted by that history, and;

WHEREAS, The City Council has an obligation to lift up the civil rights of all residents, particularly those who have been systematically marginalized economically, politically, and socially, ***NOW THEREFORE BE IT***

ORDERED,

That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing on reparations and their impact on the civil rights of Black Bostonians, in order to both form a common, shared history regarding Boston’s involvement in the enslavement of Black people as well as to explore the possibility of Boston issuing reparations. Representatives from the City of Boston, including the Mayor’s Office of Resilience and Racial Equity, as well as advocates such as the NAACP, are encouraged to attend.

**AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE A TASK FORCE TO ADDRESS
LITERACY RATES IN THE CITY OF BOSTON**

- WHEREAS,** Being able to read or write in any language is a privilege that can easily be taken for granted; *and*
- WHEREAS,** The National Center for Education Statistics has found that roughly 1 in 5 adults across the United States struggle with being able to read or write English, and while the NCES has in the past conducted more hyper-local studies on Suffolk County, this information has not been updated since 2003; *and*
- WHEREAS,** DESE guidelines address ameliorating literacy challenges with early, rapid, and equitable research-based interventions. Schools are encouraged to utilize a multi-tiered system of support for all students demonstrating literacy challenges. I see the ordinance is seeking to have similar supports for those in the workforce; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Little is known about rates of literacy amongst adults in the United States who speak languages other than English; *and*
- WHEREAS,** At least some level of reading or writing is required to communicate and access an overwhelming majority of services and information offered by the City of Boston ; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Proposing ways to better serve individuals experiencing issues with literacy is a monumental challenge because it requires completely changing the way that cities and towns collect information and source constituent concerns; *and*
- WHEREAS,** For adults, challenges with literacy proves to be a fundamental workforce development hurdle that is difficult to overcome; for children, challenges with literacy demonstrates the intersectionality between English Language Learners, students with a need for targeted literacy support, students with

accessibility needs, and students who experience a chronic lack of instruction; *and*

WHEREAS, Organizations across Boston, such as the Adult Literacy Initiative and ReadBoston, have already begun the work of creating programming that seeks to boost literacy rates amongst adults and children respectively; *and*

WHEREAS, There is a clear need to explore how the City to better understand the scope of literacy in the City of Boston and to better provide services to individuals who either have limited functional reading or writing skills or who cannot read or write in any language; ***NOW THEREFORE BE IT***

Ordained in the City Council of Boston, as follows:

Section 1:

The City of Boston, Ordinances, Chapter XII shall be amended by adding at the end thereof, the following new section and subsections:

12-17 Task Force to Address Literacy Rates in the City of Boston

12-17.1 Purpose.

The purpose of this ordinance is to establish a Task Force on Literacy Rates in the City of Boston whose goals shall be: to study rates of illiteracy across the City of Boston; to develop an action plan that may be undertaken by the City of Boston in order to help both adults and children who are not able to read or write in any language access city services, due to limited function or otherwise; and to help boost opportunities for adults and children to learn how to read through actionable policy and programming recommendations.

12-16.2 Composition and Term.

The Task Force will include the following people, or their designee:

- A member of the Boston City Council shall be designated by the Council President and shall serve on the Commission
- Mayor of Boston
- Superintendent of Boston Public Schools (BPS)
- Director of the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Advancement (MOIA)
- Director of the Mayor's Office of Workforce Development (OWD)
- President of Boston Public Library (BPL)
- Commissioner of Boston Centers for Youth and Families (BCYF)

- Representative of the Adult Literacy Initiative or other organization who works specifically with adults who cannot read or write
- Representative of the Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy Coalition or other organization who works with individuals who are English language learners
- Representative of ReadBoston or other organization who works on literacy amongst early learners
- Two representatives who are recent graduates or current BPS students who have literacy-based lived experiences
- Three representatives who have adult illiteracy lived experience

The Task Force will exist for as long as it takes to provide an accurate understanding to develop a comprehensive and usable plan which the City of Boston can undertake to achieve the goals established in 12-17.1 for up to 5 years from the founding of the Task Force.

Members of the Task Force will elect a Chair of the Task Force every year with a simple majority vote. Upon any instance of vacancy or resignation, the Chair will nominate a replacement from an equally qualified office to be elected by the members of the Task Force with a simple majority vote within ninety (90) days. Members of the Task Force will remain members as long as the Task Force exists or unless voted to be removed by a majority vote of the Task Force.

The Task Force will convene within the first sixty (60) days of the effective date of this ordinance and will meet periodically thereafter as required.

Task Force members who are not currently employed by the City of Boston will receive a stipend for \$100 per meeting, not to exceed \$50,000 for one year.

12-17.3 Responsibilities and Authorities of the Task Force

The primary responsibilities of the Task Force are to determine the scope of illiteracy in Boston as well as to create an actionable and coordinated plan that both boosts literacy rates amongst adults and children as well as finds ways for the City of Boston to make it easier for people who cannot read or write in any language to access city services. In the course of their work, the Task Force may deem it necessary to, among other things: determine the number of people in the City of Boston who cannot read or write in any language based on demographics; make necessary distinctions between individuals with little-to-no literacy versus individuals with some literacy capability; identify clear deliverables and goals for boosting literacy rates in Boston; conduct a cost analysis of providing the necessary resources to improve the accessibility of city services as well as to boost literacy rates; and generate a comprehensive and actionable plan that would sufficiently address the goals identified in 12-17.1.

The Task Force shall prepare annual progress reports on the status of their work along with any necessary materials to the Clerk of the City of Boston, and the Clerk shall forward the report to the Mayor of the City of Boston and shall docket the report and include the docket on the agenda of the next-occurring meeting of the Boston City Council. The Task Force may be called in to testify and to update the City Council on the progress of the Task Force.

12-17.4 Severability

The provisions of this ordinance are severable, and if any provision, or portion thereof, should be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity will not affect the remaining provisions, which will remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 2. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon passage.

- WHEREAS,** Student loan debt is a \$1.7 Trillion national crisis. Since 2003, the number of student debtors has more than doubled to 44 million indebted; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Student debt disproportionately impacts low-income students, students of color, and women, with 84% of Pell Grant students– those coming from the lowest income households– rely on student debt, compared to only 46% of non-Pell students; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Historic barriers to wealth creation and retention drive families of color into debt-reliance for higher education, resulting in nearly 2/3 of Black borrowers owing more than they originally borrowed as early as 12 years after starting college, compared to less than 1/3 of white borrowers; *and*
- WHEREAS,** In Massachusetts in 2017, the average Cost of Attendance at public colleges accounts for an average of only 21% of white household income, but accounts for 38% of Black household income and 43% of Latinx household income, more than double that for white households; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Student debt in Massachusetts is disproportionately a public college problem as public college students graduate with almost equivalent dollars of student debt as private college graduates and more public college students graduate with debt in MA than private college students; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Because of the dramatic decline of public dollars, public colleges and universities have turned to private dollars to finance their budgets as between 2001 and 2016, tuition and fees more than doubled at Massachusetts public college; *and*
- WHEREAS,** While the federal government has the authority to cancel all outstanding debts, state legislatures have the ability to prevent future debts; *and*

WHEREAS, An Act to Guarantee Debt-Free Public Higher Education (H.1339/S.829) by Rep. Higgins and Sen. Eldridge is a systemic solution to the related crises of college unaffordability and student loan debt which will guarantee tuition-and-fees free public college and award additional cost-of-living grant money to low-income families to eliminate the need to borrow for housing, transportation, child care, etc.; **NOW THEREFORE BE IT**

RESOLVED:

That the Boston City Council offers its support for H.1339/S.829 *An Act to Guarantee Debt-Free Public Higher Education* and that we continue to elevate the voices of students and families living with the burden of student debt.

2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

Home Rule Petitions Not Responded to by the Mayor³

³Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- Ordinances:*** Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Loan Orders:*** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- Orders:*** Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Home Rule Petitions:*** Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.
