I transmit herewith for your approval a home rule petition to the General Court entitled "Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Authorizing the City of Boston to Establish Fossil Fuel-Free Standards for New Construction and Major Renovation Projects."

This Home Rule Petition will enable the City of Boston to adopt and amend an ordinance that sets restrictions or prohibitions on the use of fossil fuels in new construction and major renovation projects. The resulting ordinance will ensure that we do not further exacerbate the climate crisis as Boston continues to grow, while creating more healthful housing and workplaces for our residents.

This Home Rule Petition also identifies a process to work with our diverse communities to develop an ordinance that centers equity and environmental justice, reduces our contribution to global climate changes, promotes improved public health, supports community resilience, and promotes a just transition for fossil fuel and related industry workers. Achieving these goals is part of creating a Green New Deal for Boston.

I urge your Honorable Body to pass this Home Rule Petition expeditiously.

WHEREAS: The City of Boston is committed to reducing dependence on fossil fuels so as to create more healthful housing and workplaces for our diverse communities; and

WHEREAS: The climate crisis is a public health emergency, caused by the combustion of fossil fuels, which not only releases greenhouse gasses that drive global climate change, but also produce particulate matter, ozone, nitrogen dioxide, carbon dioxide and other air pollutants that have been linked to respiratory illnesses and cardiovascular disease; and

WHEREAS: Fossil fuel-based appliances, such as gas stoves or fuel oil boilers, can release elevated levels of indoor air pollutants that exceed national ambient air quality standards, particularly when unvented; and

WHEREAS: Natural gas leaks and unaccounted-for gas place an economic burden on our residents and businesses, and the cost to replace gas infrastructure will be borne for decades and passed onto the next generation; and

WHEREAS: On-site combustion of fossil fuels in buildings accounts for more than a third of greenhouse gas emissions in the City of Boston, contributing to global climate change and local air pollution that disproportionately impact low-income and communities of color in Boston; and

WHEREAS: Energy efficiency is at the core of the City of Boston's decarbonization strategy, and must underpin efforts to transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy, helping to not only limit direct and indirect greenhouse gas emissions from energy consumption, but also to reduce energy demand and costs for building users; and

WHEREAS: Research shows there is little-to-no cost increase for building multi-family housing to a net-zero standard, indicating that it is feasible today to construct high-performance, fossil fuel-free housing, delivering the long-term benefits of increased air quality, lower energy cost burdens, reduced carbon emissions and enhanced thermal comfort to our residents; and

WHEREAS: The City of Boston has adopted a carbon neutrality goal. It is in the interest of public health, safety and welfare of all City of Boston residents, visitors, and businesses to develop and establish fossil fuel-free standards for new construction and major renovation projects; and

WHEREAS: A just transition prioritizes our workers and communities and seeks to create pathways for Boston residents and workers into clean energy and other green jobs; *THEREFORE BE IT*

ORDERED: That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for a special law relating to the City of Boston to be filed with an attested copy of this order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause One (1) of Section Eight (8) of Article Two (2), as amended, of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, provided that the Legislature may reasonably vary the form and substance of the requested legislation within the scope of the general public objectives of this petition.

PETITION FOR A SPECIAL LAW RE: AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF BOSTON TO ESTABLISH FOSSIL FUEL-FREE STANDARDS FOR NEW CONSTRUCTION AND MAJOR RENOVATION PROJECTS

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any general or special law or rule or regulation to the contrary, the City of Boston is authorized to adopt and further amend a municipal ordinance or zoning regulation that restricts or prohibits new building construction or major renovation projects that do not qualify as fossil fuel-free, including through the withholding or conditioning of building permits.


SECTION 2. Said restrictions or prohibitions shall not apply to research laboratories for scientific or medical research, or to hospitals or medical offices regulated by the department of public health as a healthcare facility.

SECTION 3. The ordinance or zoning regulation will establish definitions and criteria for applicability, and timelines for the transition to fossil fuel-free new construction and major renovation projects, that prioritize the joint goals of emissions reduction, resilience, equity and a just transition for workers.

SECTION 4. An Advisory Committee shall be established that reflects a diversity of perspectives and backgrounds from outside stakeholders including representatives from the fields of environmental justice, affordable housing, labor and workers' rights, small business, workforce development, healthcare and public health, building engineering and energy, real estate development and management, architecture, distributed energy systems, or any combination thereof. The Chair and Members of the Advisory Committee will be appointed by the Mayor. The Advisory Committee will meet not less than three times prior to introduction of

said ordinance. The Advisory Committee will collaborate with and advise the City on the ordinance's definitions, criteria for applicability, and transition timelines to fossil fuel-free new construction and major renovation projects.

SECTION 5. This act shall take effect immediately upon signing by the Governor.



REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIR

August 31, 2022

Docket #0458, Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Regarding the Disability Pension for Elaina McAlister, was referred to Committee on March 30, 2022, and sponsored by Ed Flynn; and ***Docket #0510, petition for a special law re: Petition for a Special Law re: An Act regarding the Disability Pension for Kurt Stokinger***, was referred to Committee on April 13, 2022, and sponsored by Councilors Ed Flynn, Erin Murphy, Michael Flaherty. The Committee held a hearing on July 6, 2022 and a working session on August 24, 2022. ***Docket #0955, Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Regarding the Disability Pension for Matthew Morris; Docket #0956, Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Regarding the Disability Pension for Harry Jean; Docket #0957, Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Regarding the Disability Pension for Terry Cotton; Docket #0958, Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Regarding the Disability Pension for Ryan Lenane; Docket #0959, Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Regarding the Disability Pension for Scott O'Brien; and, Docket #0960, Petition for a Special Law Re: An Act Regarding the Disability Pension for Richard Cintolo***, sponsored by Erin Murphy and referred to the Committee on August 10, 2022. The Committee held a working session on August 24, 2022. Dockets #0955-#0960 are refiles from 2020-2021. The Committee held a hearing on these matters on September 24, 2020 and heard testimony from the police officers. The Committee also held a working session on February 2, 2021.

Summary of Legislation As Filed:

Dockets #0458 and #0510

These home rule petitions will increase the accidental disability retirement allowance payable to the police officer and emergency medical technician named individually in each proposal. Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 32, section 7 governs the accidental disability retirement allowance and currently allows for a yearly amount of pension equal to 72 per cent of the annual rate of his regular compensation. These proposals will increase the retirement allowance to the rate of compensation that the officer would have received had such officer continued service as a police officer. All other provisions of Chapter 32 will apply except for section 8 and section 91A. The home rule petitions also provide for the surviving spouse as follows: an annuity in the amount of three-fourths of the amount of the pension payable to the officer, per month, at the time of death, if the surviving spouse remains unmarried; and, if said surviving spouse remarries, the City shall pay, in lieu of the aforesaid annuity, an annuity of \$550.00 dollars per month.

The statutory standard for accidental disability retirement is: “physically unable to perform the essential duties and responsibilities of the job and that such inability is likely or deemed permanent before attaining the maximum age for the member’s group by reason of a personal injury or violent act injury sustained by a hazard undergone as a result of, and while in the performance of, his duties.” See MGL chapter 32, section 7.

Dockets #0955-#0960

These home rule petitions will increase the accidental retirement allowance payable to these officers who as a result of injuries sustained while performing their duties are totally and permanently incapacitated from performing the essential duties of the job. The retirement allowance will be increased to the regular rate of compensation which they would have been paid had they continued in service as a police officer. Under the proposals, the individuals will be able to annually earn up to one-half the amount of their retirement allowance without refund penalty. When the individuals reach the mandatory retirement age for police officers in the city of Boston, they will receive a pension equal to 80 percent of the annual rate of their compensation. The effective date of the legislation is January 31, 2022. All of these dockets were previously passed by the City Council and approved by the Mayor.

Information Gathered at the July 6th Hearing on Dockets #0458 and #0510

Larry Calderone, President of the BPPA; Jamie Kenneally, Legislative Director, BPPA; Matt Anderson, BEMS-BPPA President; Kurt Stokinger; and, Elaina McAlister participated. The Committee discussed the statutory standard for accidental disability. Mr. Stokinger and Ms. McAlister described the circumstances surrounding their injuries and the impact of their injuries. The Committee discussed the impact and the trauma the officers deal with as a result of being injured in the line of duty and in service to and protecting the City. The Committee also discussed similar home rule petitions that were approved in the past. The following individuals participated on behalf of the Administration: Christine Weir, Interim Executive Officer at the Boston Retirement Board and Ellen McCarthy, Comptroller at the City of Boston.

Information Gathered at the August 24th Working Session on Dockets #0458, #0510, #0955-#0960

The Committee held a working session to review the language of the dockets. There was not a consensus for the language as previously passed at the local level. The state desires consistency with language for these types of dockets. Because of the concerns at the state level, Dockets #0955-#0969 are before the Council again because local approval of the new language is required. The substantive changes include allowing annual earnings up to one-half the amount of retirement allowance without refund penalty and 80% compensation upon attaining the mandatory retirement age. Changes were also made to Elaina McAlister’s home rule petition, Docket #0458 to reflect that Chapter 152 applies to EMTs. The substantive language changes from previously approved legislation include allowing annual earnings up to one-half the amount of retirement allowance without refund penalty and 80% compensation upon attaining the mandatory retirement age. Changes were also made to Elaina McAlister’s home rule petition, Docket #0458 to reflect that chapter 152 applies to EMTs. The following individuals participated on behalf of the administration: Kerry G. Nero, Esq., Compensation Agent for the City of Boston and Christine Weir, Interim Executive Officer, for the Boston Retirement Board. Attorney Nero stated that the language concerning the workers compensation and reference to chapter 152 was accurate.

Summary of Amendments

Based upon the information gathered at the hearings and working sessions, the dockets are amended as follows:

- Docket #0458, changes were made to reflect that chapter 152 of the General Laws applies. The following language was also added: "Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, all of Elaina McAlister's reasonable, necessary* and related medical treatment arising out the July 10, 2019 work injury shall be paid for by the City of Boston pursuant to chapter 152 of the General Laws. This includes treatment that may be incurred after the date of her retirement."
- Docket #0458 and Docket #0510, was amended from its initial filing to allow annual earnings up to one-half the amount of retirement allowance without refund penalty and 80% compensation upon attaining the mandatory retirement age.
- Minor changes were made to Dockets #0955-#0960 to change date of injury to "upon retirement in certain clauses.

Rationale and Recommended Action:

Passage of these dockets will ensure that the police officers and emergency medical technician are allowed to receive their full compensation had they continued serving as first responders. These individuals were injured in the line of duty while protecting the public and are not able to continue as first responders because of injuries sustained on the job through no fault of their own. Passage of these dockets allow these individuals to receive their full compensation and will provide security and stability to them and their families. The language ensures that the officers will receive their full compensation while adhering to the other applicable sections of chapter 32 and will allow the officers to earn additional income subject to certain limits.

(a) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Boston Retirement Board shall increase the accidental disability retirement allowance payable to Richard Cintolo, a retired police officer of the police department of the city of Boston who, as a result of injuries sustained while in the performance of his duties on October 12, 2016, is totally and permanently incapacitated from performing the essential duties of a police officer.

(b) The annual amount of pension payable to Richard Cintolo shall be equal to the regular rate of compensation which would have been paid had he continued in service as a police officer of the city of Boston at the grade held by him at the time of his retirement until his death or reaching mandatory retirement age, whichever comes first. All amounts paid under this act shall be non-taxable to the extent allowable under state and federal law.

(c) Notwithstanding section 91A of chapter 32 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, Richard Cintolo's annual earnings, when added to his retirement allowance, may annually earn up to one-half the amount of his retirement allowance without refund penalty.

SECTION 6. - WHEREAS:** The Institute for Justice recently released a report called “Barriers to Business” to study how regulatory burdens impact entrepreneurs across 20 cities including Boston; *and*
- WHEREAS:** The report documents that fees range from \$945 to start a barbershop to \$5,554 to start a restaurant in Boston; *and*
- WHEREAS:** The report scores Boston one out of five in a “one-stop shop” analysis, reporting that the city’s website does not effectively centralize information for entrepreneurs in an intuitive and organized way; *and*
- WHEREAS:** The report reveals the extremely complex process for starting a business stating that food truck entrepreneurs must complete 37 steps, restauranteurs 92 steps, and barbershop owners 81 steps; *and*
- WHEREAS:** There are additional barriers in Boston such as a “clean hands” requirement that means applicants for permits or licenses can be denied even if they owe a small amount of fines or fees to the City; *and*
- WHEREAS:** These burdensome requirements especially impact low-income MWBE entrepreneurs; *and*
- WHEREAS:** We need to do everything possible to support equitable recovery for entrepreneurs and small business owners as we come out of the COVID-19 pandemic; ***NOW THEREFORE BE IT***
- ORDERED:** That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss the licensing and permitting barriers that small businesses face in the city of Boston and strategies to remove them and that representatives from the Office of Economic Opportunity and Inclusion, Licensing, Inspectional Services, and other interested parties be invited to testify.

WHEREAS, However, teachers refuse to allow their students to play in the park due to the trash and overall safety; *and*

WHEREAS, Coaches of local sports teams refuse to play at the park, forcing them to give up on some much-needed sports programs for the local children and teenagers; *and*

WHEREAS, Used needles need to be properly discarded immediately. No parent should worry that their child will get pricked by a needle while out on recess, playing in the nearby park; *and*

WHEREAS, There is also a risk of disease transmission if another person reuses a needle found on the ground; *and*

WHEREAS, The park, once looked at as a “safe haven” for children, is failing the people and children in this area of Roxbury; ***NOW, THEREFORE BE IT***

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to address this ongoing issue at Clifford Park and discuss preventative steps to stop Clifford Park from becoming a gathering spot for illegal activity. WHEREAS, At the start of the year, city officials cleared out dozens of tent encampments at the intersection of Massachusetts Avenue and Melnea Cass Boulevard; *and*

WHEREAS, Yet, the nicer weather catalyzed many of these people with substance use disorders to return to the area. With the tents gone, hundreds of people are staying under large tarps or umbrellas to protect themselves from the weather, day and night; *and*

WHEREAS, The violence and the illegal activity still continue to plague this area. Earlier this month, Boston police working with the Suffolk district attorney’s office, conducted an undercover operation that resulted in the arrests of a dozen men charged with soliciting sex; *and*

WHEREAS, This is a humanitarian crisis with an open-air drug market, a gathering spot for people to shoot up in public, and piles of trash, including used needles and human feces, scattering the block near Atkinson Street and neighborhoods miles out; *and*

WHEREAS, Mayor Wu and the Boston Public Health Commission announced at the beginning of the summer the “Warm Weather Program.” This plan involved directing more health care workers and police officers to the intersection of Massachusetts Avenue and Melnea Cass Boulevard, guiding people to support services and housing options, and arresting those engaging in drug dealing, prostitution, and violent crime; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to address the humanitarian crisis at the intersection of Massachusetts Avenue and

Melnea Cass Boulevard and evaluate whether Section 35 is the proper response to such a crisis. Representatives from the Mayor’s Office, Boston Public Health Commission, Police Department, Public Works, the Coordinated Response Team, community leaders, youth leaders, and any other interested parties shall be invited to attend.

- WHEREAS,** In Charlestown, the Clougherty Pool is an important gathering space for connecting the community and providing a critical recreational area during the summer when the heat in Boston can get dangerous; *and*
- WHEREAS,** According to the Boston Center for Youth and Families The last time this pool was overhauled was in 1988 and the 20-year filtration system installed that same year had long-since expired; *and*
- WHEREAS,** Though 2.7 million dollars were first allocated in the City's 2014 Capital Budget towards the Clougherty Pool for the rehabilitation of the pool's bathhouse, its two pool shells, exterior pool deck, and mechanical systems, it is unclear how those funds were used to improve the Clougherty Pool since then; *and*
- WHEREAS,** It is important for the Council and the community to be given transparent and accountable updates regarding the establishment of deadlines and in sharing information like cost assessments, schedules, budgeting authorities, and financial expenditures, past, present, future; *and*
- WHEREAS,** It continues to be important to have transparency and accessibility of all information around the timetable for an assessment of the pool's problems, options for repair with cost analysis, and detailed reporting on the exact trail of

city funds designated for the Clougherty Pool in order to move forward with goal of receiving funding for both short and long term renovations; *and*

WHEREAS,

The Boston City Council has an obligation to ensure accountability, transparency, accessibility, over public community centers such as the Clougherty Pool, especially in regards to spending, safety, and community needs; ***NOW THEREFORE BE IT***

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING ITALIAN AMERICAN HERITAGE DAY IN THE CITY OF BOSTON

WHEREAS, From 1880 to 1920, an estimated 4 million Italian immigrants arrived in the United States. The Italian unification in 1861, exhausted soil, and high taxes and tariffs drove many Italians out of their homeland, specifically in Southern Italy and Sicily; *and*

WHEREAS, During this time, about a thousand Italian immigrant families came to Boston. These immigrants did not speak English and had to take low-wage jobs to support themselves and their families; *and*

WHEREAS, Today, Americans of Italian descent are the nation's seventh-largest ethnic group, with over 26 million Americans of Italian descent residing in the United States; *and*

WHEREAS, In 2014, people of Italian descent formed the second largest ancestry group in Boston, making up 8.2% of the population. In Massachusetts, 13.6% of the population were of Italian descent; *and*

WHEREAS, The North End, often referred to as Boston's "Little Italy," is a one-square-mile waterfront community and a significant public attraction drawing in thousands of tourists and Bostonians yearly; *and*

2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

Home Rule Petitions Not Responded to by the Mayor³

³Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- Ordinances:*** Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Loan Orders:*** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- Orders:*** Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Home Rule Petitions:*** Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.





WHEREAS, Two years ago the Boston City Council unanimously passed a resolution on shifting the narrative of Bostonians away from deficit-based descriptors and affirming our resilient yet under-represented communities; *and*

WHEREAS, The resolution was a response to the tendency for people to describe certain communities only by what they lack, which not only reinforces helplessness, but fogs the memories of our strengths, our resiliency, and our ability to stand up and speak truth to power; *and*

WHEREAS, “Black Joy” has a lot of different meanings. For some, it is living radiantly and unapologetically in your skin – being fierce and in a true celebration of yourself no matter what your personal or collective circumstance. For others, “Black Joy” is dancing, singing, and laughing even in the most challenging times. It’s the belief that our greatness is older than our oppression, our strength is greater than our struggle; *and*

WHEREAS, Recognizing Black Joy is now more important than ever as symbols of Black love, such as the Roxbury Love mural, were torn down; *and*

WHEREAS, Black Joy is not *just* a celebration, it is a form of resistance, for as Zora Neale Hurston once wrote “sometimes, I feel discriminated against, but it does not make me angry. It merely astonishes me. How can any deny themselves the pleasure of my company? It’s beyond me;” *and*

WHEREAS, Black leaders across the city have been doing the work of uplifting the strength, beauty, and power of the black community in times of civil unrest, from images of black women saging the city, to celebrating the Bodega Makeover Project, to folks simply sharing videos of themselves dancing to stop the doom and gloom; *and*

WHEREAS, Black Joy cannot be limited to the month of February or to Juneteenth; Black Joy needs to be celebrated throughout the year, especially in times like these because, as Imani Perry wrote: “Joy is not found in the absence of pain and suffering. It exists through it;” ***NOW THEREFORE BE IT***

- WHEREAS:** Last year, Ukraine celebrated the 30th anniversary of its independence with three days of events including a large military parade, and other festivities; *and*
- WHEREAS:** In February this year, we watched in horror the illegal and unprovoked invasion of Ukraine by Russian military forces and Ukrainian refugees being forced to flee from their homeland; *and*
- WHEREAS:** We are all inspired by the patriotism of the Ukrainian people, with many bravely taking up arms to defend their country, including President Zelensky and Mayor Klitschko. We greatly admire the Ukrainian people's desire to continue to forge their own path of democracy; *and*
- WHEREAS:** Currently, there are over a million citizens living in the United States who are of Ukrainian descent, representing about 0.3% of the American population. In the City of Boston, residents of Ukrainian descent make up about 0.3% of our city's population as well; *and*
- WHEREAS:** The Ukrainian community enriches Boston by promoting and introducing their culture through different events and festivals. In recent months, we have seen the resiliency of the Ukrainian American community through the poignant display of Ukrainian flags and many efforts to organize donations and supplies. In these challenging times, we stand with Boston's Ukrainian community; *and therefore be it*
- RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council expresses its solidarity for the people of Ukraine and commits to providing Ukrainian American residents here in Boston our continued support, *and Be It Further*
- RESOLVED:** That the Boston City Council celebrates Ukraine and its peoples' courageous and resilient spirit on the 31st anniversary of their Independence Day.
