REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIR

September 21, 2022

Dear Councilors.

Docket #0934, message and order authorizing an appropriation order in the amount of Six Hundred Eighty-Six Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$686,800.00) for the Cemetery Division of the Parks and Recreation Department and the Trust Office of the Treasury Department to be funded from the Cemetery Trust Fund established under Chapter 13 of the Acts of 1961: was sponsored by the Administration and referred to the Committee on August 10, 2022. The committee held a hearing on September 9, 2022.

Summary of Legislation:

This Docket appropriates \$686,800 out of the fund established under Chapter 13 of the Acts of 1961, known as the Cemetery Trust Fund for the Cemetery Division of the Parks and Recreation Department. The appropriation will go towards renovation projects at two of the three cemeteries in the city with remaining burial space. Of the sum, \$28,800 will go towards expanding and improving the infrastructure for the veteran and indigent sections of the Fairview Cemetery; \$258,000 will go towards rehabilitating the Mount Hope Cemetery facilities; and finally, \$400,000 will go towards rehabilitating the entrance and grounds of the Mount Hope Cemetery.

Information Gathered at the Hearing:

The following individuals participated at the hearing on behalf of the administration: Thomas Sullivan, Director of Cemeteries, Cemetery Division; and Margaret Dyson, Trust Manager, Treasury Department. During this hearing, the Administration respectfully requested the City Council release funds from the Cemetery Trust to support the maintenance, repair, improvement, and embellishment of the three cemeteries in Boston with open space for burials. Cemetery Trusts were established in 1961 and mandated that any cities and towns adopting the legislation maintain an independent account and Trust separate from the department. Traditionally, this type of appropriation has been done annually; however, the last appropriation to the Cemetery Division from the Trust was in October 2019 for \$175,000.

In breaking down the dollar amounts designated for the projects at both cemeteries, the panel elaborated upon the specific work needed at each site. For example, to expand the veteran and indigent burial area at the Fairview Cemetery, the \$28,800 will go towards laying new concrete foundations. To rehabilitate the Mount Hope Cemetery, \$258,000 will go towards the design, construction, and capital costs necessary to repair the disarray the facility is in due to failure to

maintain the exterior, which has led to storm damage and rodent/raccoon infestation. Finally, to rehabilitate the face of the Mount Hope Cemetery, the \$400,000 will go towards repairing the entrance fencing and surrounding landscape. The Administration explained that completing this work is necessary to serve and support the community-at-large, the bereaved, and the staff on site. The timing for interior repair at Mount Hope Cemetery is sensitive as the fall construction season approaches and as it concerns the health and safety of cemetery employees.

The maintenance and repair projects discussed during the hearing will be contracted out with the Parks Department advertising for landscape work and the Public Facilities Department advertising for facility construction work. The Administration confirmed that the departments responsible for choosing the contractors to do this work are aware of and in line with the City's procurement goals to contract with women and minority-owned businesses. The Chair requested more information on what the RFP process will look like when hiring contractors to complete the projects for which funds are being appropriated. The administration's response is as follows: "The Parks and Recreation Department will conduct the standard outreach plan for construction related bids. The Contract Unit will first consult the certified business directory to search for MWBE companies to contact. They then fill out the Equitable Procurement Compliance & Assistance form and send the scope of work to the Office of Economic Development and Inclusion for assistance with finding qualified bidders in related industries."

Recommended Action:

The Chair of the Committee on Environmental Justice, Resiliency and Parks, to which the following was referred:

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO ENSURE THAT ALL INCIDENTS OF BULLYING AND VIOLENCE ARE PROPERLY REPORTED TO ENSURE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT FOR ALL STUDENTS AND STAFF IN THE BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

- **WHEREAS,** A recent audit of Boston Public Schools by the state Department of Elementary and Secondary Education reported that the Boston Public School system does not support the physical, social, and emotional well-being of all students and does not ensure a safe environment for all students; and
- WHEREAS, That audit also found that the district's system for managing, responding to, and resolving complaints is not responsive to parent and guardian concerns. This has led to some parents not believing that the district schools prioritize the physical, social, and emotional well-being and safety of all students: and
- **WHEREAS,** Acts of violence in Boston Public Schools, including physical assaults, bullying, and sexual assaults, are much to blame for this report; *and*
- WHEREAS, District data shows more than an 80% increase in bullying complaints to 440 this year, compared to the 243 complaints in 2018-2019, the last full year of in-person learning. The rise in bullying prompted a student-led protest at the Boston Arts Academy in Dorchester and parental criticism of behavior in a third-grade class at the Manning School in Jamaica Plain; and
- **WHEREAS,** The recent report on the Mission Hill School makes painfully clear that unabated sexual and mental abuse of students took place there for nearly a decade to countless students as young as 4 and 5; and
- **WHEREAS,** With all the recent, tragic incidents in schools nationally, it's clear that sensible, timely communication regarding dangerous school situations is more important than ever. Now is the time for law enforcement and Boston Public Schools to cooperate, rather than alienate; and
- WHEREAS, Due to a 2020 school policy to protect students' privacy, schools now provide less information to law enforcement than ever before, which in some cases, adversely impacts the safety of students. The policy requires law enforcement officials to get approval from Boston Public School lawyers or obtain a subpoena or court

order for information about students except in extreme emergencies, such as an active shooter situation; and

- WHEREAS, There is frustration with the lack of action and accountability by Boston Public Schools. *The Boston Globe* reported on three assaults this spring where one student beat another with a Chromebook laptop, leaving one child bloodied and another with a concussion. In all three cases, the parents, rather than the schools, contacted the police; *and*
- WHEREAS, Crimes happening outside school grounds are also a growing worry. The May 11th stabbing at Nubian Square Station is one recent incident. Both victim and attacker were students of Boston Public Schools. In another incident, earlier this spring, a teacher and student were shot just outside of TechBoston Academy in Dorchester; and
- **WHEREAS,** Concerned parents and guardians are removing their children from Boston Public Schools. Enrollment has steadily dropped for over ten years and has only accelerated in the last two years; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Boston Public Schools is responsible for over 46,000 students and 10,000 school staff. The mental and physical safety of these students and school employees is of most importance; *and*
- WHEREAS, The recent acts of violence assaults, bullying, and sexual harassment must be investigated and appropriately addressed with the help of the Boston Police Department to ensure the public safety of all students and staff in Boston Public Schools; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to examine how the Boston Public School Administration handles all types of assaults and misconduct with law enforcement and to discuss much-needed transparency and solutions for such incidents in the upcoming school year. Representatives from the City of Boston, Boston Public Schools, Boston Police Department, MBTA Transit Police Department, the Office of Safety Services in Boston Public Schools, the Office of Equity in Boston Public Schools, youth leaders, members of the public, and any other interested parties shall be invited and are encouraged to attend.

ORDER FOR THE ADOPTION OF CITY COUNCIL REDISTRICTING PRINCIPLES

- WHEREAS, At the 1981 municipal election, residents of the City of Boston voted 41,973 to 34,623 in favor of a binding referendum changing the structure of the Boston City Council from being elected entirely at-large to adding district representation; and
- WHEREAS, The Massachusetts Legislature enacted chapter 605 of the Acts of 1982, providing for the election of a City Council consisting of nine members elected from equally populous districts and four members elected at-large, specifying the process by which the final City Council to be elected entirely at-large was to draw the inaugural district lines; and
- WHEREAS,
 Boston's first electoral district map passed by the City Council, 7 to 2, and approved by the Mayor (chapter 6 of the Ordinances of 1982) was challenged by a lawsuit from a coalition of the Latino Political Action Committee, Caucus Latino de Poliza Social de Massachusetts, Inc., the Black Political Task Force, and the Boston Peoples Organization; and
- WHEREAS, Drawn on the basis of the 1975 state census, the districts were invalidated in Latino Political Action v. City of Boston, 568 F. Supp. 1012 (D. Mass. 1983) when 1980 federal census data revealed a constitutionally impermissible population variance of 23.6 percent violating the "one person, one vote" standard, a ruling upheld on appeal, 716 F.2d 68 (1st Cir. 1983); and
- WHEREAS, U.S. Supreme Court Justice William J. Brennan, Jr. in August 1983 ruled that the delay caused by having to redraw districts for the November 1983 municipal election did not warrant approval of the Massachusetts Attorney General's application for stay, Bellotti v. Latino Political Action, 463 U.S. 1319 (1983), prompting passage of a home rule petition for Boston's one-time emergency election procedures in chapter 357 of the Acts of 1983; and
- WHEREAS, A second map that unanimously passed the Council with Mayoral approval (chapter 25 of the Ordinances of 1983) was again challenged by the coalition, with the addition of the Asian Political Caucus, alleging unlawful dilution of minority voting power and infringing on the rights of minority candidates; however, the Court ruled that the Council was absolutely immune from suit in exercising their legislative duties, Latino Political Action v. City of Boston, 581 F. Supp. 478 (D. Mass. 1984) and the map was later upheld 609 F. Supp. 739 (D. Mass. 1985) and affirmed, 784 F.2d 409 (1st Cir. 1986); and
- WHEREAS, The City Council again redrew electoral districts in 1987, 1993, and 2002 amid the backdrop of further redistricting litigation for equal representation of Boston's Black voters at the state and federal levels, Black Political Task Force v. Connolly, 679 F. Supp. 109 (D. Mass. 1988), Black Political Task Force v. Connolly, F. Supp. Civ., Nos. 91-12750-H, 91-12751-H (D. Mass. 1992), Black Political Task Force v. Galvin, 300 F. Supp. 2d 291 (D. Mass. 2004); and
- WHEREAS, Historic context led the Massachusetts Legislature's Special Joint Committee on Redistricting and the Boston City Council's Committee on Census and Redistricting to facilitate 2011-2012 redistricting processes by intentionally prioritizing meaningful engagement of residents from marginalized communities and neighborhoods historically split across district lines, with ample time to scrutinize proposals at dozens of public hearings and committee meetings spanning more than one year, and, despite these efforts, the Mayor twice disapproved the Council's maps due to inequitable racial imbalance; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED:

That the Boston City Council adopt the following principles to guide and inform procedures led by its Committee on Redistricting for crafting legally defensible City Council electoral districts for the City of Boston, pursuant to chapter 605 of the Acts of 1982, as amended by chapter 343 of the Acts of 1986:

2022 Redistricting Principles (Draft - August 31, 2022)

- I. Conduct. Councilors will adhere to Rule 38 of the City Council Rules relative to conduct during debate and deliberation, and refer to present or proposed electoral districts by the assigned district number or neighborhood name(s), refraining from using the name of any incumbent City Councilor;
- II. Public Participation. To enhance and expand civic participation while strengthening public confidence in elections and governance, transparency in redistricting is essential. Deliberation among Councilors as decision-makers, or with legal and mapping consultants, must remain restricted to public Committee hearings, working sessions, and meetings duly noticed pursuant to the Open Meeting Law, with opportunities for the public to provide testimony, where appropriate. Ample outreach to communities and access to redistricting tools to allow meaningful participation is also essential.
- III. Legal Standards. To craft a legally defensible redistricting plan, Councilors must consider pertinent constitutional and statutory provisions, such as the Voting Rights Act and City Charter provisions, as well as redistricting case law, including those involving the City of Boston;
- IV. Use of Existing Precincts. Notwithstanding any imperfections of geographic boundaries due to decadeslong deferral of citywide reprecincting, proposed electoral districts must be composed of existing precincts, as most recently adopted by the Board of Election Commissioners;
- V. Guidelines. Proposed maps should be drawn to ensure population equality and avoidance of excessive deviation, have compact and contiguous boundaries, avoid over-concentration of protected groups, preserve communities of interest, provide voters of protected groups opportunities to achieve proportionality by electing their candidates of choice, and prohibit favoring of incumbent residency.
- VI. Presentation of Proposals. Submissions of nine (9) proposed districts should consist of the following:
 - A. Written descriptions in the form of an ordinance listing wards and precincts;
 - B. A corresponding map illustrating proposed districts, produced using Esri Redistricting software in coordination with City Council Central Staff and City of Boston GIS staff;
 - C. Corresponding tables presenting the following demographic statistics for each district:
 - 1. Total population deviation by district *and* the plan's overall deviation range;
 - 2. Total population disaggregated by race, *and* each racial group's population as a percentage of each district's total population;
 - 3. Aggregate racial minority (total non-White) population, *and* minority population as a percentage of each district's total population;
 - 4. Total Voting Age Population (VAP), or Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP), disaggregated by race, *and* each racial group's VAP or CVAP as a percentage of each district's total VAP or CVAP, for purposes of evaluating potential voter strength;
 - D. If possible, present total population change from 2010 to 2020 Census, *and* future population projections based on generally accepted statistical methods; and
 - E. If possible, present total housing unit change from 2010 to 2020 Census, *and* future housing unit estimates based on approved and permitted residential unit development pipeline; and
- VII. Deadline for Action. Electoral districts must be drawn with approval of the Mayor by no later than November 7, 2022. Councilors may file proposed ordinances for the City Council meetings of September 14, September 21, September 28, or October 5, aiming for passage by October 19, and, in the event of disapproval, leave October 26 and/or November 2 for revision.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor's weekly report, released on August 25, roughly 96 percent of the state experienced severe drought conditions at some point this summer. So far this year, there have been 24 days when the temperature was 90 or above, marking the sixth-highest number of days in one year at 90 and above in Boston; and
- **WHEREAS,** The Boston Centers for Youth & Families (BCYF) manages 17 indoor pools, two outdoor pools, and three beaches in the City; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** At the very start of the summer, only seven of the 19 pools were open, and the three beaches located at the Curley Community Center in South Boston were closed; and
- WHEREAS, According to the Boston Centers for Youth & Families (BCYF), the nine pools closed due to facility issues and capital construction projects were the Curley Community Center in South Boston, the Mattapan Community Center Pool in Dorchester, the Paris Street Community Center Pool in East Boston, the Draper Pool in West Roxbury, the Blackstone Community Center Pool in the South End, Clougherty Pool in Charlestown, the Hennigan Community Center Pool in Jamaica Plain, the Marshall and the Holland Community Center pools, both in Dorchester; and
- WHEREAS, Only two of the seven opened pools were located in neighborhoods with an area median income lower than the city's average: the Mason Pool in Roxbury and the pool inside the Leahy-Holloran Community Center in Dorchester. In the South End and West Roxbury, no public pools were open at one point; and
- **WHEREAS,** These closures were a disservice to residents, prohibiting several neighborhoods from city services like recreational swimming and aquatic lessons, especially in one of Boston's hottest and driest summers to date; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** It is in the best interest of our residents to proactively address the current facility conditions of all indoor and outdoor pools to avoid sudden closures due to facility

issues, so preparations and renovations can be made for next summer; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to address the facility conditions with a full facility assessment of every pool managed by the Boston Centers for Youth and Families (BCYF) in order to ensure equitable city services to all city residents. Representatives from the Boston Centers for Youth and Families, Boston Public Schools, the Public Facilities Department, members of the Community Centers, the BCYF foundation, neighborhood organizations, residents, and members of the public shall be invited to attend.

- WHEREAS, Last month was the hottest August on record in Massachusetts according to annual statewide data from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAS); and

- **WHEREAS,** At the very start of the summer, only seven of the 19 pools were open, and the three beaches located at the Curley Community Center in South Boston were closed; *and*
- WHEREAS, According to the Boston Centers for Youth & Families (BCYF), the four pools closed due to staffing shortages were the Hennigan Community Center Pool in Jamaica Plain, the Marshall Community Center Pool in Dorchester, the Perkins Community Center Pool in Dorchester, and the Condon Community Center Pool in South Boston; and
- WHEREAS, Only two of the seven opened pools were located in neighborhoods with an area median income lower than the city's average: the Mason Pool in Roxbury and the pool inside the Leahy-Holloran Community Center in Dorchester. In the South End and West Roxbury, no public pools were open at one point; and
- WHEREAS, These closures were a disservice to residents, prohibiting several neighborhoods from city services like recreational swimming and aquatic lessons, especially in one of Boston's hottest and driest summers to date; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council holds a hearing to address and brainstorm solutions for the lifeguard labor shortage affecting pools managed by the Boston Centers for Youth and Families (BCYF) in order to ensure equitable city services to all city residents. Representatives from the Boston Centers for Youth and Families, Workforce Development, members of the Community Centers, the BCYF foundation, neighborhood organizations, and members of the public shall be invited to attend.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO ADDRESS FIRE EMERGENCIES AND OTHER EMERGENCY RESPONSE

- **WHEREAS,** On July 19th, 2022, a fire occurred at a triple-decker on Princeton Street in East Boston in the midst of some of the highest temperatures on record across the City of Boston; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Approximately 150 brave firefighters fought the five-alarm fire that burned through all three stories of the building while battling heat exhaustion; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** The fire displaced twenty-eight people, including eight children four who are under the age of two, many had no housing after losing all of their belongings, and almost none had renters or homeowners insurance; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** The City of Boston response from Neighborhood Services, Emergency Management and Medical, Housing Stability, and others proved vital to assist non-English speaking and undocumented families on scene; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** Local organizations like Mutual Aid Eastie and East Boston Social Centers raised money to find housing for the displaced residents. However, many still lack stable and adequate housing two months later due to the skyrocketing rate of rental units; and

The Office of Housing Stability's process in partnership with local organizations is in need of assessment to better serve families impacted by these types of crisis; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss the coordination of the fire and other emergencies and that the Mayor's Office of Housing, the Office of Housing Stability, Office of Neighborhood Services, Emergency Management, and other relevant departments be invited to testify.

ORDER FOR A HEARING TO REVIEW CITY OF BOSTON CODE 12-16 SAFE SHARPS DISPOSAL PROGRAM.

- *WHEREAS*, In early 2020 the Boston City Council and Mayor of Boston signed in to ordinance the Safe Sharps Disposal program; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** The purpose of the ordinance is to provide for the safe and orderly collection and disposal of sharps by requiring retailers of sharps to take them back at no additional cost to the consumer, providing a more convenient way to return them; and
- **WHEREAS,** The ordinance was a response to cleaning up used hypodermic needles that continue to litter Boston's streets, parks, school yards, and sidewalks, by requiring pharmacies that sell the syringes to provide a way to safely dispose of them; *and*
- **WHEREAS,** The program was intended to create approximately over 100 collection sites across Boston, as an alternative location to discarding on the ground or in household trash, as prohibited by state law; *and*
- WHEREAS, The ordinance states that every pharmacy, with more than three locations, that sells needles in Boston is to provide collection kiosks for returning sharps, and must be free of charge, or may present a different collection plan for review and approval by the Boston Public Health; and
- **WHEREAS,** Pharmacies must also provide the city data on the sharps collected on a yearly basis, and ISD has the power to enforce the ordinance; *and*
- WHEREAS, It is unclear how many collection sites in the city exist, if the ordinance is currently being enforced, pharmacies are providing data, and if the BPHC has approved any alternative collection plans; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to review CBC 12-16 Safe Sharps Disposal Program and that individuals and organizations including the Office of Recovery Services, Inspections Services Department, EMS, health centers and other non-profit health care service providers be invited to testify.

ORDER FOR A HEARING ON THE NEEDS AND SERVICES FOR MIGRANT POPULATIONS

- WHEREAS, On September 14, approximately 50 migrants arrived on Martha's Vineyard after being fraudulently induced to board planes with false promises of work, educational opportunities, and help with immigration paperwork. They initially believed they were heading to Boston, but told mid-flight that their destination would be Martha's Vineyard. The Florida governor has since taken credit in the hopes of inciting chaos and publicity for himself; and
- WHEREAS, However, Vineyard residents themselves quickly came together to feed and shelter the Venezuelan migrants, and attorneys helped them navigate the immigration system. Martha's Vineyard Community Services purchased cell phones for all the migrants and other organizations helped address their immediate needs; and
- WHEREAS, Boston has seen a substantial rise in the number of migrant families seeking shelter and asylum over the past several months. Many of these families are showing up in emergency rooms around the Boston area in need of medical care and shelter; and
- **WHEREAS,** In statements, Boston Medical Center and Mass General Brigham acknowledged its hospitals are reporting an increase of migrants in need of shelter, a need that the hospitals are not equipped to meet; and
- WHEREAS, The Immigrant Family Services Institute, a Mattapan nonprofit organization that meets the needs of migrants who have made it to Boston, said it has welcomed more than 1,800 people between May and July, and August numbers are estimated to be more than 600 people, most fleeing violence in Haiti, a six-fold increase from a typical month; and
- **WHEREAS,** The Legislature recently allocated \$8 million to the Immigrant Family Services Institute, yet because of the ongoing migrant crisis that money was quickly used and more is needed; and

- **WHEREAS,** The Boston City Council approved \$1.1 Million of the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") for temporary housing for migrants, but these funds have yet to be allocated; and
- **WHEREAS,** Recently the gradual arrival of around 7,000 migrants caused Washington, D.C.'s mayor to declare a FEMA public emergency, and ask the National Guard for help. The New York governor and Legislature are also looking at similar options for emergency support for new arrivals; *and*
- WHEREAS, Boston should also allocate additional funding to city programs, services and nonprofits providing legal assistance, work to remove barriers in accessing city services for migrants, particularly Black migrants, and survey whether city-owned empty buildings can provide temporary housing; and
- **WHEREAS,** The Mayor's Office of Immigrant Advancement must be prepared to allocate resources, direct aid, and offer additional resources to migrant relief organizations; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT**
- ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing on the needs and services for migrant populations and that appropriate individuals and organizations attend including the Mayor's Office for Immigrant Advancement, Mayor's Office of Housing, Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy Coalition, Massachusetts Office for Immigrants and Refugees, and others be invited to testify.

The City Council shall consider each ordinance or loan order so presented and shall either adopt or reject the same within sixty days after the date when it is filed as aforesaid. If such ordinance or loan order is not rejected within sixty days, it shall be in force as if adopted by the city council unless previously withdrawn by the mayor.



2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.



³Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

Ordinances: Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Loan Orders: Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.

Orders: Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.

Home Rule Petitions: Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City

Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.

Order for a Hearing: A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular

matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City

Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative

action of placing it on file.

Legislative Resolution: A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal

effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as

a whole.
