On October 26, 2021, the Boston Landmarks Commission unanimously voted to designate the Warren House in Roxbury as a Landmark under the provisions of Chapter 772 of the Acts of 1975, as amended.

The Warren House is a habitable memorial structure designed by the descendants of a nationally important historical figure, Dr. Joseph Warren.

The Warren House is historically significant at the local, state, and national levels for its association with Dr. Joseph Warren, the first high-ranking American officer killed during the Revolutionary War at the Battle of Bunker Hill in 1775. Several other members of the Warren family – who were either born and/or lived at this site – made unprecedented contributions to the field of medicine. Today, counties in 14 states bear the name of Joseph Warren, as do four towns in New England.

Constructed entirely from Roxbury puddingstone, a type of stone unique to Eastern Massachusetts, the building is one of the few puddingstone cottages in the City of Boston. Fact Sheet

What is the Continuum of Care Program?

Continuum of Care (CoC) is a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development designed to provide housing and supportive services for homeless individuals and families. The City of Boston, Mayor's Office of Housing is the designated Collaborative Applicant on behalf of the Boston Continuum of Care.

How are the funds allocated?

This is a competitive grant opportunity designed to provide new funds dedicated to serving highly vulnerable individuals and families with histories of unsheltered homelessness.

How much is the City of Boston eligible to apply for?

Based on HUD guidance, the City of Boston is eligible to apply for up to \$16,527,831 million. The grant term is three years.

How will the CoC Unsheltered funds be used?

The City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for all of the eligible activity types under this funding opportunity:

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

Long term subsidized housing paired with supportive services

Rapid Rehousing (RRH)

Short to medium term subsidized housing paired with supportive services

Joint Transitional Housing–Rapid Rehousing (Joint TH-RRH)

Rapid rehousing that includes the option for people to access transitional housing prior to moving into their own housing

Supportive Services Only- Coordinated Entry (SSO-CE): Creation of projects to develop or operate a centralized or coordinated assessment system

Supportive Services Only - Street Outreach (SSO-SO): Funds may be used to provide supportive services to unsheltered homeless persons for whom the recipient or subrecipient is not providing housing or housing assistance.

Supportive Services Only - Other

What is the City doing to encourage applications from new providers or for new initiatives?

The City widely advertised the Request for Proposals, including on the [Boston Continuum of Care webpage](#) and through a broad mailing list that anyone can join for information about funding and other opportunities related to the Continuum of Care Program. MOH hosted an information session as well as Applicants' Conference for all interested parties and was available to answer questions from potential applicants. MOH also conducted outreach about the RFP to certified MWBE homeless services providers in the City's database, many of whom have not contracted with MOH before.

Who does the funding assist? How many households will be served?

The funding must assist people with severe service needs and histories of unsheltered homelessness.

Who are the supportive service partners?

This is yet to be determined through the procurement process. MOH convened the review committee for the first meeting on 9/21/22 and will finalize scoring on 10/3/22.

Where are the rental assistance and leasing program units located?

This is yet to be determined since funds haven't been allocated yet. Housing vouchers will be used in the private market.

What is the Continuum of Care Program?

Continuum of Care (CoC) is a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development designed to provide housing and supportive services for homeless individuals and families. As the designated Collaborative Applicant on behalf of the Boston Continuum of Care, the City of Boston is funded for the following eligible program activities within the CoC Program: leasing and rental assistance for Permanent Housing (PH), Supportive Services Only (SSO), Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and CoC Planning.

How are the funds allocated?

HUD allocates the funds through the national annual McKinney-Vento Homeless Continuum of Care funding competition. This year HUD has an abbreviated application timeline; the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) was published on August 1, 2022 and responses are due to HUD on Friday, September 30, 2022.

How much was the City of Boston awarded under the CoC PY21 program?

The City of Boston was awarded \$36,958,241 in CoC Program funding under the PY21 NOFO.

The renewal funds will be used to fund 38 grants that serve over 2,000 households, including nearly 1,300 chronically homeless individuals at any given point in time. The application includes the renewal of nearly 300 permanent housing slots for families. Renewal funds also include permanent housing programs for survivors of domestic violence and human trafficking, and assessor, navigation and technology resources to further support Coordinated Entry, which is a coordinated City-wide housing placement system. The PY21 renewal grants also incorporate 5 grants for permanent housing for youth and young adults that were originally awarded to Boston through HUD's 2017 Youth Housing Demonstration Program (YHDP) competition.

Boston's PY21 CoC award also includes grants to support our Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) software, a federally mandated client-level data collection and reporting system and planning resources to support strategic operations of the CoC and to ensure compliance with HUD regulations.

The grant term for the renewal awards is for one year (the City will seek continued funding for them annually).

How will the CoC funds be used?

By HUD regulation, funds may be used **ONLY** to fund these program components:

1. **Rental Assistance** is paid to private property owners that rent housing units to homeless households. Clients are required to pay 30% of their income towards the cost of the rent.
2. **Leasing Assistance** is paid directly to landlords to lease units on behalf of homeless households. It is not required that the lease be in the client's name nor that the client contributes a portion of their income towards rent.
3. **Transitional Housing** programs provide housing for up to 24-months for individuals and families exiting the shelter system. During their stay, clients are assisted with housing search services to locate permanent, affordable housing upon exit.
4. **Supportive Services** programs provide an array of services to assist homeless households, including, but not limited to, assistance with obtaining permanent housing, housing stabilization services, job search, education and employment training, referrals to substance abuse programs, assistance with accessing mainstream benefits, nutritional and health services. CoCs may also create Coordinated Entry Systems within this component type.
5. **HMIS (Homeless Management Information System)**. A Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is a local information technology system used to collect client-level data and data on the provision of housing and services to homeless individuals and families and persons at risk of homelessness.

6. **Continuum of Care Planning** funding may be used for designing and carrying out a collaborative process for the development of an application to HUD; evaluating and monitoring the outcomes of CoC and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) projects; and developing a coordinated community-wide or region-wide process with stakeholders, nonprofit service providers, and community partners.

To whom will the City be awarding funds?

The City will award CoC funds received in PY21 renewals to all currently funded non-profit agencies that administer rental assistance, leasing and support service programs for permanent housing.

What is the City doing to encourage applications from new providers or for new initiatives?

In Spring 2022, in anticipation of a regular PY22 competition, the City drafted a Request for Proposals (RFP), intending to release it once HUD published the CoC NOFO. MOH announced its intention to issue the RFP at public CoC meetings, the goal being to give interested prospective applicants more lead time to conceptualize new projects, identify potential project partners and become familiar with HUD's project application forms; connect with new partners who may have decided not to apply to prior years' Continuum of Care program RFPs due to the short RFP timeline or other constraints (the timeline is mandated by HUD's application schedule); and facilitate connections between agencies who may want to partner together on a new project. However, given the unprecedented accelerated NOFO schedule, MOH was unable to issue the RFP within the mandated timeframe that HUD imposed this year. Therefore, MOH reached out to respondents to last year's RFP to find out if they would like to resubmit an application for new funding. At the same time, MOH has focused its efforts on soliciting applications from new providers and initiatives under the Special Unsheltered NOFO.

Who does the funding assist? How many households will be served?

The funding is used to assist individuals and families that meet the HUD definition of homeless. HUD and the City of Boston strongly encourage that CoC permanent housing resources (rental assistance and leasing programs) be prioritized to assist the most vulnerable, including chronically homeless households. Additionally, under certain component types and programs, specific homeless sub-populations can be targeted for assistance, such as veterans, victims of domestic violence, and severely mentally ill.

During the COVID-19 public health crisis, it became critical to target resources and prioritize people who meet CDC criteria for being at increased risk for COVID-19 and are staying outside or in congregate shelters that cannot follow CDC physical distancing guidance.

The funding has a Point In Time capacity of over 2,000 participants.

Who are the supportive service partners?

Supportive service project partners provide case management, housing search and stabilization services for clients housed through the CoC program. Partner agencies also provide, or help their clients' access, other appropriate services including, but not limited to, health care, transportation assistance, mental health treatment, alcohol and other substance abuse services, counseling, education and job training, child care and employment.

Where are the rental assistance and leasing program units located?

The units supported through the CoC program are located predominantly in Boston, with 77% having a Boston address and 23% in surrounding Greater Boston communities. Under the CoC Program, all new lease ups are required to be within the City, with the exception of Tenant-Based Rental Assistance. For units located within the City, every neighborhood, as identified by zip code, is represented as follows:



ORDER FOR THE ADOPTION OF CITY COUNCIL REDISTRICTING PRINCIPLES

- WHEREAS,* At the 1981 municipal election, residents of the City of Boston voted 41,973 to 34,623 in favor of a binding referendum changing the structure of the Boston City Council from being elected entirely at-large to adding district representation; *and*
- WHEREAS,* The Massachusetts Legislature enacted chapter 605 of the Acts of 1982, providing for the election of a City Council consisting of nine members elected from equally populous districts and four members elected at-large, specifying the process by which the final City Council to be elected entirely at-large was to draw the inaugural district lines; *and*
- WHEREAS,* Boston's first electoral district map passed by the City Council, 7 to 2, and approved by the Mayor (chapter 6 of the Ordinances of 1982) was challenged by a lawsuit from a coalition of the Latino Political Action Committee, Caucus Latino de Poliza Social de Massachusetts, Inc., the Black Political Task Force, and the Boston Peoples Organization; *and*
- WHEREAS,* Drawn on the basis of the 1975 state census, the districts were invalidated in *Latino Political Action v. City of Boston*, 568 F. Supp. 1012 (D. Mass. 1983) when 1980 federal census data revealed a constitutionally impermissible population variance of 23.6 percent violating the "one person, one vote" standard, a ruling upheld on appeal, 716 F.2d 68 (1st Cir. 1983); *and*
- WHEREAS,* U.S. Supreme Court Justice William J. Brennan, Jr. in August 1983 ruled that the delay caused by having to redraw districts for the November 1983 municipal election did not warrant approval of the Massachusetts Attorney General's application for stay, *Bellotti v. Latino Political Action*, 463 U.S. 1319 (1983), prompting passage of a home rule petition for Boston's one-time emergency election procedures in chapter 357 of the Acts of 1983; *and*
- WHEREAS,* A second map that unanimously passed the Council with Mayoral approval (chapter 25 of the Ordinances of 1983) was again challenged by the coalition, with the addition of the Asian Political Caucus, alleging unlawful dilution of minority voting power and infringing on the rights of minority candidates; however, the Court ruled that the Council was absolutely immune from suit in exercising their legislative duties, *Latino Political Action v. City of Boston*, 581 F. Supp. 478 (D. Mass. 1984) and the map was later upheld 609 F. Supp. 739 (D. Mass. 1985) and affirmed, 784 F.2d 409 (1st Cir. 1986); *and*
- WHEREAS,* The City Council again redrew electoral districts in 1987, 1993, and 2002 amid the backdrop of further redistricting litigation for equal representation of Boston's Black voters at the state and federal levels, *Black Political Task Force v. Connolly*, 679 F. Supp. 109 (D. Mass. 1988), *Black Political Task Force v. Connolly*, F. Supp. Civ., Nos. 91-12750-H, 91-12751-H (D. Mass. 1992), *Black Political Task Force v. Galvin*, 300 F. Supp. 2d 291 (D. Mass. 2004); *and*
- WHEREAS,* Historic context led the Massachusetts Legislature's Special Joint Committee on Redistricting and the Boston City Council's Committee on Census and Redistricting to facilitate 2011-2012 redistricting processes by intentionally prioritizing meaningful engagement of residents from marginalized communities and neighborhoods historically split across district lines, with ample time to scrutinize proposals at dozens of public hearings and committee meetings spanning more than one year, and, despite these efforts, the Mayor twice disapproved the Council's maps due to inequitable racial imbalance; *NOW, THEREFORE BE IT*

ORDERED: That the Boston City Council adopt the following principles to guide and inform procedures led by its Committee on Redistricting for crafting legally defensible City Council electoral districts for the City of Boston, pursuant to chapter 605 of the Acts of 1982, as amended by chapter 343 of the Acts of 1986:

2022 Redistricting Principles (Draft – August 31, 2022)

- I. *Conduct.* Councilors will adhere to Rule 38 of the City Council Rules relative to conduct during debate and deliberation, and refer to present or proposed electoral districts by the assigned district number or neighborhood name(s), refraining from using the name of any incumbent City Councilor;
- II. *Public Participation.* To enhance and expand civic participation while strengthening public confidence in elections and governance, transparency in redistricting is essential. Deliberation among Councilors as decision-makers, or with legal and mapping consultants, must remain restricted to public Committee hearings, working sessions, and meetings duly noticed pursuant to the Open Meeting Law, with opportunities for the public to provide testimony, where appropriate. Ample outreach to communities and access to redistricting tools to allow meaningful participation is also essential.
- III. *Legal Standards.* To craft a legally defensible redistricting plan, Councilors must consider pertinent constitutional and statutory provisions, such as the Voting Rights Act and City Charter provisions, as well as redistricting case law, including those involving the City of Boston;
- IV. *Use of Existing Precincts.* Notwithstanding any imperfections of geographic boundaries due to decadeslong deferral of citywide reprecincting, proposed electoral districts must be composed of existing precincts, as most recently adopted by the Board of Election Commissioners;
- V. *Guidelines.* Proposed maps should be drawn to ensure population equality and avoidance of excessive deviation, have compact and contiguous boundaries, avoid over-concentration of protected groups, preserve communities of interest, provide voters of protected groups opportunities to achieve proportionality by electing their candidates of choice, and prohibit favoring of incumbent residency.
- VI. *Presentation of Proposals.* Submissions of nine (9) proposed districts should consist of the following:
 - A. Written descriptions in the form of an ordinance listing wards and precincts;
 - B. A corresponding map illustrating proposed districts, produced using Esri Redistricting software in coordination with City Council Central Staff and City of Boston GIS staff;
 - C. Corresponding tables presenting the following demographic statistics for each district:
 1. Total population deviation by district *and* the plan's overall deviation range;
 2. Total population disaggregated by race, *and* each racial group's population as a percentage of each district's total population;
 3. Aggregate racial minority (total non-White) population, *and* minority population as a percentage of each district's total population;
 4. Total Voting Age Population (VAP), or Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP), disaggregated by race, *and* each racial group's VAP or CVAP as a percentage of each district's total VAP or CVAP, for purposes of evaluating potential voter strength;
 - D. If possible, present total population change from 2010 to 2020 Census, *and* future population projections based on generally accepted statistical methods; and
 - E. If possible, present total housing unit change from 2010 to 2020 Census, *and* future housing unit estimates based on approved and permitted residential unit development pipeline; and
- VII. *Deadline for Action.* Electoral districts must be drawn with approval of the Mayor by no later than November 7, 2022. Councilors may file proposed ordinances for the City Council meetings of September 14, September 21, September 28, or October 5, aiming for passage by October 19, and, in the event of disapproval, leave October 26 and/or November 2 for revision.



Be it ordained by the City Council of Boston, as follows:

City of Boston Code, Ordinances, Chapter Two be amended by striking 2-9.2 in its entirety and replacing it with the following new language:

The districts redrawn under the authority of Chapter 605 of the Acts of 1982 as amended by Chapter 343 of the Actions of 1986 are hereby redrawn, as follows:

District One - Consisting of precincts numbered one through fourteen of Ward One; precincts one through eight of Ward Two; precincts numbered one through four and ten and eleven of Ward Three.

District Two - Consisting of precincts numbered six through eight and twelve through sixteen in Ward Three; precincts numbered one and thirteen in Ward Five; precincts numbered one through twelve in Ward Six; and precincts numbered one through seven in Ward Seven.

District Three - Consisting of precincts numbered one through five in Ward Four; precinct numbered fourteen in Ward Five; precincts numbered eight and nine in Ward Seven; precincts numbered one, two, and six in Ward Eight; precincts numbered one and two in Ward Nine; precincts numbered three, and six through ten in Ward Thirteen; precincts numbered three, four, six, eight, and nine in Ward Fifteen; and precincts numbered one, two, four through ten, and twelve in Ward Sixteen.

District Four - Consisting of precincts numbered one through seven and nine through thirteen in Ward Fourteen; precincts numbered two, five, and seven in Ward Fifteen; precincts numbered three and eleven in Ward Sixteen; precincts numbered one through fourteen in Ward Seventeen; and precincts numbered one and two in Ward Eighteen.

District Five - Consisting of precincts numbered eight and fourteen in Ward Fourteen; precincts numbered three through twenty-three in Ward Eighteen; precincts numbered ten through thirteen in Ward Nineteen; and precincts numbered one, two, four, and nine in Ward Twenty.

District Six - Consisting of precincts numbered six through nine in Ward Ten; precincts numbered four through ten in Ward Eleven; precincts numbered one through nine in Ward

Nineteen; precincts numbered three, five through eight, and ten through twenty-one in Ward Twenty.

District Seven - Consisting of precincts numbered eight, nine, and eleven in Ward Four; precinct numbered ten in Ward Seven; precincts numbered three through five in Ward Eight; precincts numbered three through seven in Ward Nine; precincts numbered one through three in Ward Eleven; precincts numbered one through nine in Ward Twelve; precincts numbered one, two, four, and five in Ward Thirteen; and precinct numbered one in Ward Fifteen.

District Eight - Consisting of precincts numbered five, nine, and seventeen in Ward Three; precincts numbered six, seven, ten, and twelve in Ward Four; precincts numbered two through twelve, and fifteen in Ward Five; precincts numbered one through five in Ward Ten; and precincts numbered one and two in Ward Twenty-One.

District Nine - Consisting of precincts numbered three through sixteen in Ward Twenty-One; and precincts numbered one through thirteen in Ward Twenty-Two.

The mayor from time to time may make to the city council in the form of an ordinance or loan order filed with the city clerk such recommendations as he may deem to be for the welfare of the city. The City Council shall consider each ordinance or loan order so presented and shall either adopt or reject the same within sixty days after the date when it is filed as aforesaid. If such ordinance or loan order is not rejected within sixty days, it shall be in force as if adopted by the city council unless previously withdrawn by the mayor.

2 - Section 17F of Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1948 (as amended):

The city council may at any time request from the mayor specific information on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction, and may request his presence to answer written questions relating thereto at a meeting to be held not earlier than one week from the date of the receipt of said questions, in which case the mayor shall personally, or through a head of a department or a member of a board, attend such meeting and publicly answer all such questions. The person so attending shall not be obliged to answer questions relating to any other matter.

Home Rule Petitions Not Responded to by the Mayor³

³*Section 22 of Chapter 190 of the Acts of 1982:*

Every order of the city council approving a petition to the general court pursuant to Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2 of the amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth shall be presented to the mayor who shall forthwith consider the same, and, within fifteen days of presentation, either approve it, or file with the city council a statement in detail of his reasons for not approving the same, including any objection based on form, on content, or both; provided, that no such order shall be deemed approved or in force unless the mayor affixes his signature thereto.

Matters in Committee

The following matters were previously filed with the City Council and have been referred to a committee. Matters in committee can be brought back before the City Council pursuant to City Council Rule 24. The following *definitions* describe different types of matters in committee:

- Ordinances:*** Local laws enacted by the Boston City Council and the Mayor that become part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Loan Orders:*** Authorization for the City of Boston to incur debt and expend money for projects, purchases, or other obligations.
- Orders:*** Directives that authorize action. Orders are legally binding but are not part of the City Code of Ordinances.
- Home Rule Petitions:*** Requests for special acts that concern a particular municipality. Home Rule Petitions require approval of the Boston City Council and Mayor, as well as passage by the state legislature.
- Order for a Hearing:*** A formal request sponsored by a councilor that a committee of the Boston City Council conduct a hearing about a particular matter, issue, or policy that impacts the City of Boston. An Order for a Hearing is not a law and is not voted on by the City Council. The only action concerning an Order for a Hearing that can be taken at a City Council meeting is the administrative action of placing it on file.
- Legislative Resolution:*** A recommendation concerning policy issues that may urge action on particular matters. Legislative resolutions have no legal effect. Legislative resolutions represent a particular position or statement by a Councilor, Councilors, or the City Council as a whole.
